### The Vote And The Debate

Yesterday, in Congress, President Johnson's request for \$4.8 billion for new spending in the war in Vietnam went through both houses of Congress. The House by a vote of 292 to 147 and the Senate by a vote of 98 to 2.

At the same time, in the Senate, a motion of Senator Morse, to have the Senate revoke the President's authority to send armed forces in Southeast Asia, it had voted the President in the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution in August, 1964, was voted down, 92 to 8.

These three votes President Johnson immediately interpreted, as was his privilege, as endorsing support for his conduct of the war in Vietnam.

But he himself had had entirely too much experience in the business of being voted around to be under any illusion that the voting yesterday was actually a free expression of the inclination and feeling of members of Congress.

Some of the voting was enthusiastic; some was reluctant.

The big determining factor, however, was that negative vote yesterday was no respectable option for members of Congress.

They would not and could not refuse to appropriate money for the war in which American blood is being spilled.

They would not and they could not vote to strip the President of power which he was in the act of using.

We are not to imagine, either, that if there had somehow been possible yesterday a completely free vote from the members of Congress, the result would have gone against the war or the President either. The hawk probably had a strong basic edge in both House and Senate.

What would have been revealed, in a totally free vote, on some phrasing of the issue which would have made free voting seem possible. The result would have been a division similar to the division which has already been revealed in the debate which has finally begun to occur in Congress on the question of war in Vietnam.

The importance of this debate is not that anybody has won it, or that it has advanced toward any decision. The important thing about it is that it has been held, and that it is a sign that the doubting side of the issue as one which has important leadership and following in Congress and among the American people themselves.

The existence of this formidable division both hampers and compels the President in his future conduct of the war. No one has offered the President a perfect formula for either winning or ending the war. But the national situation as revealed by the debate compels him to restrain and moderation, and is in itself an effective amendment to the reckless unlimited authorizations of the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution, and this the President himself, if he remembers anything from Congress, knows well enough even as he claims his victory.

If, indeed, the debate has slowed the President down, and warned him that the country has reservations not going to be satisfied by any barage of words alone, the debate has probably served as much of a purpose as can be imagined for debate at the moment.

### See If He Loses?

We now see demonstrated the pliability on the other side of the British election system.

The feature of British democracy we sometimes think we almost envy is that which allows Parliament, as the presumed representatives of the people, to repudiate a government in power on some important national issue and thus force the government to hold an election to find out where the people themselves really do stand. This is a much more direct and responsible form of democracy than we think we have; under our system we might be trapped for four long years with a government we ourselves longer supported.

The other side of the British election system gives what might be called a sporting option to the government which

is in power. It must call a general election at least once every five years. But, like the street on the dusty street in an American western, the British government can call off its opponent at any moment of its own choosing, and by winning, get itself another five year term of office.

This is what Prime Minister Harold Wilson has now done, by suddenly calling for an election March 31, only a year and a half after the election by which his party took office. His reason is totally obvious and shames the public opinion polls which he and his party go to the people now, he and his party will do better than they did when they won their narrow victory a year ago last October. They are supposed to get, on March 31, a margin of 100 seats in Commons, as compared to a margin of three seats now.

Why is this so? In it because labor has been doing consistently particularly right lately? Not necessarily. It could be just because the moment catches British Conservatives without very much leadership, very much firm principle, very much clear argument to make about anything. Actually, both Labor and Conservative parties seem confused and divided about just where and how they want Britain to act in the world of today. But the theory seems to be that at least the Labor party presents a more amiable contention of good intentions at the moment.

If, on March 31, Prime Minister Wilson loses, he can, from the leisure of his retirement, see the public opinion polls who tramped him.

**It Has Happened Again**  
The wind, the wet, the street sand blowing, the high winds, the sun shining higher and longer at both ends, the obvious imminence of bloom and burst and new song, the swarming and breaking of the ice that almost never get hot in time, all these could tell us, without benefit of a calendar to flip, that we are in a new atmosphere.

In the eyes of man, only the earliest take the arrival of March for granted. For the middle and later ages, March is an annual miracle, never to be believed until it has suddenly appeared on the scene, with its own unmistakable signs, with its own new air to breathe. It is not bound to come, but it is here. Nobody could guarantee it anybody, but all greet it together. Some people do not dare ask for it. Their gratitude to have it offered them is all the greater.

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### Bolton

#### BEA Provisionally Accepts Two-Year Salary Package

The Bolton Education Association (BEA) has come to a preliminary agreement with the board of education on a salary schedule and fringe benefits for a two-year period, according to a spokesman for the board.

The board has offered the teachers a two-year contract which includes a new salary schedule for 1966-67 and a cost-of-living adjustment of 1.25 percent for 1967-68. It didn't really make any difference with no more salary negotiations until 1968-69.

Fringe benefits, however, could come up for negotiation next spring.

At a special meeting last night, the board read an answer from the BEA to its two-year proposal, asking a meeting to discuss the cost-of-living adjustment. Representatives from the board are expected to meet with the teachers and the superintendent to explain the board's intentions more fully.

The BEA has accepted all the board's other proposals, including the salary schedule for next year. Because the package runs for two years, board chairman Walter Waddell, explained, the salary schedule for the coming year is dependent on the cost-of-living adjustment of the following year.

The teachers do not object to the proposal for the second year, and the figures for the first year might be changed, he said.

The board's proposal is as follows:

- SA—\$4,400 to \$5,600 in 15 steps, with the largest increments in the middle steps. The 1965-66 schedule is \$4,100 to \$5,100 in 15 steps.
- MA—\$5,700 to \$9,600 in 15 steps. This year's schedule is \$5,400 to \$9,400.
- Sixth year—\$6,200 to \$10,100 in 15 steps. This year's schedule is \$5,900 to \$9,700.

The board also established three maximums for merit-increases: 3 percent for first-year teachers, 4 percent for second-year teachers and 5 percent for those with more than two years of experience. At the BEA level, this was set at \$4,800; at the MA level, \$10,200, and at the sixth-year level, \$10,700.

This current year, merit-increase percentages were allowed for 15, 20 and 25 years of service. The new merit rates have no longevity requirements, since the last salary step has been reached.

Fringe benefits agreed on by both parties include 100 per cent payment by the board of the cost of major medical insurance and a \$2,000 life insurance policy, for teachers who have been in the Bolton system for five years. Otherwise, the board and the teachers split the cost. Blue Cross and Blue Shield remain a 50-50 proposition.

One teacher was added to the 30-teacher committee, which reviews courses teachers plan to take to achieve advanced placement on the salary schedule.

It was established that teachers are not entitled to personal leave for such things as death, but that leave will be granted on application and approval by the administration.

One fringe benefit is still under negotiation. The teachers have requested adequate sick leave for on-the-job injury. The board has advanced the possibility of a weekly indemnity insurance policy instead.

Agreement on the salary schedule and fringe benefits has been reached after a series of meetings, joint and separate, of the board of education and the BEA. All in executive session.

According to figures furnished by Superintendent of Schools Philip Ligouri, the salary schedule represents a compromise between what the teachers originally asked and what the board counter-proposed.

The original requests of the teachers would have topped the budget, based on present and anticipated staff, by \$13,180.

The board countered with a proposal that would have raised the budget for salaries \$3,480. The schedule is provisionally agreed upon at this point, and the budget for salaries is \$8,600.

Cost-of-Living Increase—The proposed cost of living increase was intensively discussed with differences of opinion even among board members on the definition of terms.

Board member Robert Treat suggested that the cost of living increase be based on the difference during the 12-month period ending June 1966 and the corresponding figure during the 12-month period ending June 1965. All board members agreed that this would be a fair figure to use, since annual fluctuations would be ironed out.

All board members agreed that if there were no cost of living increase, there would be no salary adjustment for next year. But no one thought that probable. If the cost of living decreased, by some remote possibility, board members would not decrease the base salary.

The semantic arguments centered on whether the salary schedule plus the cost of living adjustment would form a new salary schedule, with new base, or whether there was just an annual adjustment with adjustments.

Other officers of the Board of Finance are: Chairman, Walter Waddell; Treasurer, Mrs. Gladys Jilison; Secretary, Mrs. Ethel Nelson; Auditor, Mrs. Martin Stanley.

### Dublin Police Probe Latest Bomb Attack

Dublin, Ireland (AP) — Detectives are investigating an attack Tuesday night to burn the home of the British military attaché in Dublin.

It was the latest in a series of gasoline bomb attacks accompanying the approach of the 50th anniversary celebrations next month of the 1916 Easter Rising against British rule.

There have been similar incidents in Belfast, capital of Northern Ireland, where the outlawed Irish Republican Army was quick to deny responsibility.

A group of men hurled a gasoline bomb into the kitchen of the British military attaché's 13-room home in Dublin's Donnybrook district, and drove off in the car.

The fire badly damaged the house and the first brigade put it out. No one was in the house at the time.

Police linked the attack with a fire last Thursday at the British Legion Club. Two empty gunpowder cans were found there. The British Embassy in London is normally unguarded.

do. I think you ought to obey all of them."

What about young men who burn their draft cards? He describes these demonstrators as "misguided adolescents" and says, "They should be spanked. Maybe they should be inducted."

In speaking of the "soft life," Hershey said, "We're somewhat the victim of a life that has been easier than that of five or six generations ago. I don't know how many generations we could live through this and still hang on."

Hershey is confident, however, Americans would respond if the war in Viet Nam took its toll. He said, "I think they've got some hardbore left in them," he said.

Hershey's own military training began 25 years ago when he enlisted in the Indiana National Guard as a teen-age private. He served during the Mexican border incident of 1916 and in France during World War I.

His Army career appeared at an end when he was retired after removal of his right eye, injured while playing polo. But in 1934-35, he was an executive officer of an Army-Navy Commission to study out post fires or emergency rescue operations, according to a report filed by the committee.

He was named deputy director of the system in 1940, and became director a year later.

He could have retired in 1942, when he was 70, but said at the time he would stay in the job until he was fired.

His attitude has changed. "That sort of thing generally takes care of itself," he said when asked if he has considered retirement.

Hershey concedes, though, he is not as active as he once was. He said a Boy Scout leader, who was asked if he still participates in hikes and campouts.

"There isn't no use in my hikin' about it," he replied. "I'm a little past being the hairy sort who goes out and steps the road with a great deal of satisfaction."

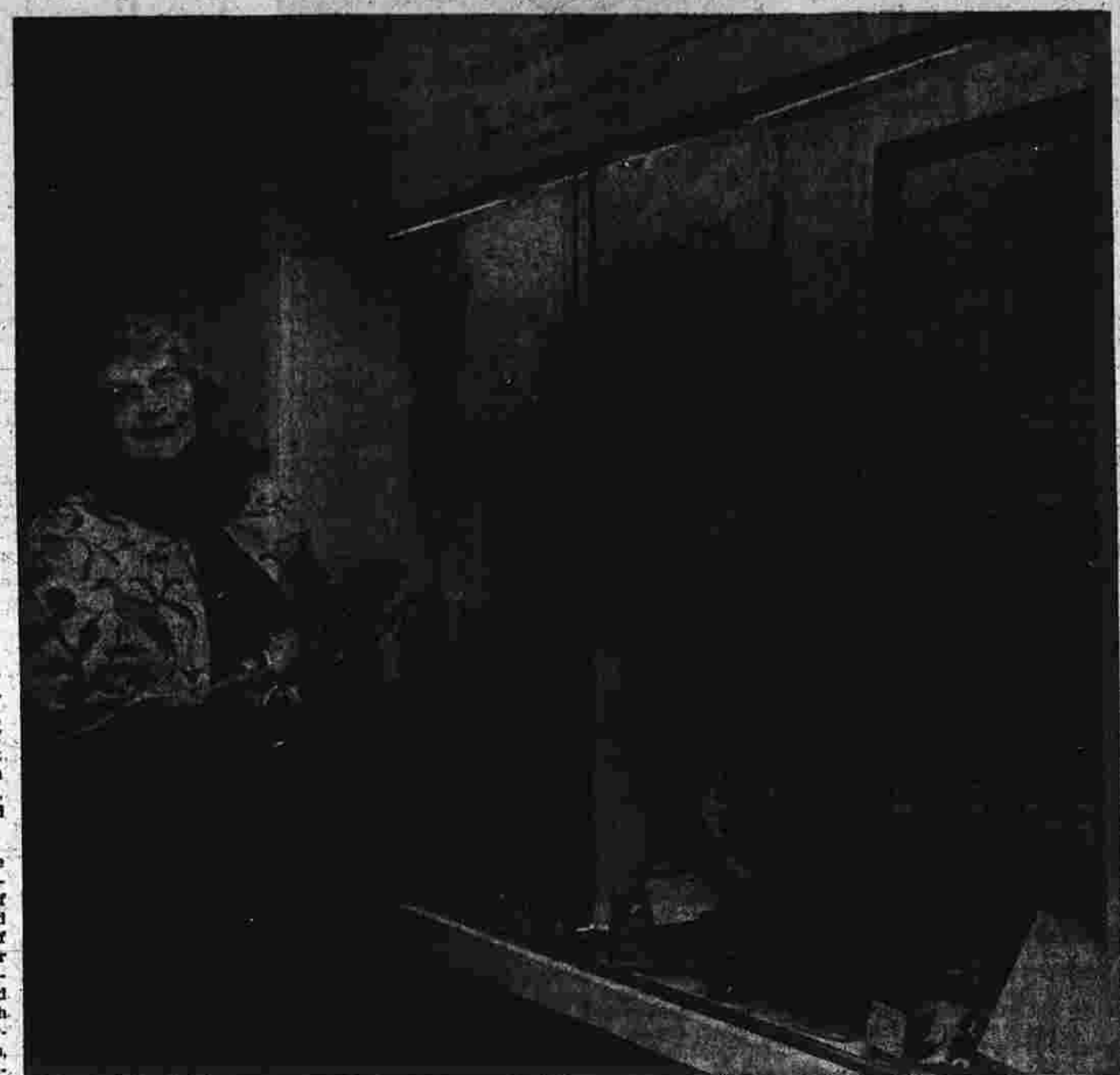
The display, arranged by Mrs. Adeline Simmons, of the Coventry Herb Farm on Hill St., is centered around a chapter of the book "Herb Gardening in Five Seasons" of which Mrs. Simmons is the author, and the numerous dried herbs, spices and fixatives that go into rose jars potpourri.

The herb fragrances have permeated the glass frame and permeate the halls of the town building.

The shelves of the case have attractive arrangements of colorful dried items in bulk, as well as in ground form, displayed in small market-type baskets, packets, and colored paper holders, interspersed with a background of draped antique-green velvet, and colorful linen print of roses and flowers.

Included are benzoin of Siam, sandalwood, vetiver root, frankincense and myrror rose buds from the south of France, rose petals, orris root (a fixative), cloves, cinnamon sticks, tonka beans, lavender, sticks of vanilla beans, and pandanum leaves.

To complete the display are two English figurines emphasizing the gathering of flowers, a very old maple wood mortar and pestle, booklets of instructions and book open for reading, and a fragrant Victorian wreath made up of dried materials of lavender, French rose buds, silver king, orange, all in natural colors, typical of the colors in Victorian times.
