A Good Kill

ere has just been an especially rood kill in Vietnam, achieved by a combination of United States Marines nd South Vietnamese troops against what have been identified as highly trained regular army units from North

The good kill has taken place in the attle of Quang Ngal, where, either from desperate courage, or because they were trapped so they could not escape usual, the enemy stood and fought ith us for several days.

At the end of the engagement, as oth sides withdrew from the field, our de was claiming 533 North Vietnamese bodies, plus additional likely casualties aused by our bombs and shells. It is alculated that the enemy regiment involved has been smashed out of action or at least three months.

This, then, has been a fairly decisive ction for the war in Vietnam, and one which can be classified as a clear Amercan victory. And it is being cited as proof that, after all, the war in Vietam can be won, that victory is not be yond our reach, if we are resolute mough, if we are willing to continue aploding our own terrific resource of comb and shell farther and farther into

Yet from this good kill, the normal Americans have long been impatient for some sign that this might be a war that could include some clear-cut victory for our men and our arms and our

If one remembers back to the battle onletins of World War II, or those of he Korean police action, one rememers there was a warm satisfaction in the blood, an intoxicating reassurance in the news, grim though the price might be, that the enemy was being laughtered. For some reason of psyhology or history, the grim exalted satsfaction we felt over the death of German or Japanese or North Korean solsiers, over that many enemies no longer alive to fight us again, is not being repeated and duplicated in the Vietna-

There are perhaps several factors inaved in this failure of consation. First are, so far, fighting this war with yery fortunate and exceptional abil-ity to use unlimited resources of sea d air power without being subjected lives to attack in either category. Fe pound this enemy with bombs and lls at will; he has no bombs and is and he has no method of putting bombs and shells out of operation. bly the enemy's skill in guerrilla junoperation enables him to stay alive at all, or make the war at least a stalemate part of the time.

When the world's greatest military ower enjoys such special odds in enaging a relatively small enemy, the doesn't rise as it has in other

Beyond that, it has been the fate, or he blessing, or the curse, of our genration to grow more sophisticated about the nature and the practicality of war of any kind. And, to make the problem still more

simplex, this is obviously a war which controversial in many ways to many mericans. Of all our modern wars, this the one in which we are least sure of our own case and purpose. Since we are there, it is blessedly bet-

ter to win battles than to lose them. But, since we really do not know what we should gain if we could win all the pattles, there is still disillusion and sorrow even with victories - as if the leaths on both sides should not be neceary, as if anything that can be de-termined through bloodshed could and all must eventually be determined by means, as if this is truly as much tragedy for those who must do the ing as it is for those who make up daily score when the kill has been

These high tops ordered from the catalog always came with cotton laces, but I had a supply of leather laces that



Then, each time you put on the high tops, you had the pleasure of grasping the thongs and forcing them into the hooks, crisscrossing, and trying to the a knot that held. t never did, but when the knot loosened and the laces dribbled down, you could call attention to your high tops by lacing them up again.

This was one real pleasure: Having others notice that you were the possessor of high tops. In winter, they were an obvious joy.

You could wade through high snow drifts and never feel a drop of wetness -providing, of course, that you had on a pair of high wool socks with their colorful horizontal bands. In a pinch, you could use high tops instead of ski boots, for the bindings would lash just as well to a high top as to a ski boot. But winter was only one season for What I remember most fondly about my high tops was the jackknife that I always had tucked into a boot top in

I have no idea why you had to keep the knife in the top of your high tops, but you did. No self-respecting lad would do otherwise, whether or not he happened to be a Boy Scout. At least you always knew where the knife was, for it chafed against your leg. Its silvered end exposed, it also seemed to be some sign of manliness—as if its owner were Daniel Boone or Mike Fink. I know that I never felt so strong and powerful as when I strode about with my high tops on and a jackknife tucked into the top of my right boot.

LBJ Urges Revision of Federal Law WASHINGTON (AP)-

President Johnson called today for a redoubled national effort against crime. While proposing no major leg-islation, Johnson urged swift passage of a number of bills that have been before Congress for some time. He urged appointment of a blue-ribbon commission to recommend drastic revision of all ederal criminal laws by 1968 And he called for more feder al money to help state and local law enforcement agencies bring their methods up to date "I call on the Congress and the nation," Johnson said, "to

join in a three-stage national strategy against crime, welding together the efforts of local, The President said that despite the warnings of law enforcement officials, "years of public neglect have too often left the law enforcement system without necessary resources and public support. As outlined by Johnson, the

national strategy against crime is divided into three phases The first is a schedule of immediate action through passage of pending legislation The second includes a program of experiment and assessment of the crime problem of
