Hearing Set on Charter Of Refuse Disposal District

A public hearing will be held March 16 at 7:30 p.m. on the proposed charter of the North Central Refuse Disposal District. The charter will be considered by the town council...

In June the General Assembly authorized the town of South Windsor, Vernon and Bolton to form the district by vote of their legislative bodies. In July South Windsor passed the special act and agreed to it. Vernon approved the act, and with South Windsor formed the district.

The charter, which was drawn from the original charter of the Northeast Refuse Disposal District, now drafted by the town council, approved by the town council before the district can carry on its operations. The charter is designed to implement the special act which authorized it and allow the district flexibility to carry on operations.

Based on population, the town of Vernon would have three votes on the act, and the town of South Windsor would have two votes. However, a three-quarter vote of the entire district is needed for issuance of bonds.

Unusual Robber Pleads Guilty; Must Be Tried

HARTFORD (AP)—The admitted perpetrator of one of last year's most unusual holdups will have to be tried, despite a plea of guilty. U.S. District Court Judge M. Joseph Blumenthal said Monday that because Clifford A. Hamilton, 21, of Uncasville admitted robbing the Franklin Square office of the Chatham Savings Bank in Norwich on Oct. 11 primarily to draw attention to himself, there was a serious question of whether he ever intended to actually rob the bank.

Hamilton, a former patient at Norwich State Hospital, filed suit a bank withdrawal slip, writing "all the money" on the amount line, and signing the slip "robber of the bank."

When the teller told Hamilton she would have to check with bank officers before she could give him any money, Hamilton waited around and chatted with employees. Police arrested him later.

A Good Kill

There has just been an especially good kill in Vietnam, achieved by a combination of United States Marines and South Vietnamese troops against what has been identified as highly trained regular army units from North Vietnam.

The good kill has taken place in the battle of Quang Nhai, where, either from desperate courage, or because they were trapped so they could not escape as usual, the enemy stood and fought with us for several days.

At the end of the engagement, as both sides withdrew from the field, our side was claiming 633 North Vietnamese bodies, plus additional enemy equipment, including tanks, trucks, and heavy weapons.

This, then, has been a fairly decisive action for the war in Vietnam, and one which can be classified as a clear American victory. And it is being cited, as proof that, after all, the war in Vietnam can be won, that victory is not beyond our reach, if we are resolute enough, if we are willing to continue expending our own heroic resources of bomb and shell farther and farther into the jungle.

Yet from this good kill, the normal thrill is somehow missing, even though Americans have long been impatient for some sign that this might be a war that could include some clear-cut victory for our men and our arms and our strategy.

One remembers back to the battle bullets of World War II, or those of the Korean police action, one remembers there was a warm satisfaction in the news, grim though the price might be, that the enemy was being slaughtered. For some reason of psychology or history, the grim excitement we felt over the death of German or Japanese or North Korean soldiers over that many enemies no longer alive to fight us again, is not being repeated and duplicated in the Vietnam conflict.

There are perhaps several factors involved in this failure of sensation. First, we are, so far, fighting this war with a very fortunate and exceptional ability to use unlimited resources of men and air power without being subjected ourselves to attack in either category.

We found this enemy with bombs and shells at will, and a bomb or shell and shell and he has no method of putting his bombs and shells out of operation. Only the enemy's skill in guerrilla tactics and operations has to stop him, and he can't make the war at least a stalemate part of the time.

When the world's greatest military power enjoys such special odds in engaging a relatively small enemy, the blood doesn't rise as it has in other wars.

Beyond that, it has been the fab, or the blessing, or the curse, of our generation to grow more sophisticated about the nature and the practicality of war of any kind.

And, to make the problem still more complex, this is obviously a war which is controversial in many ways to many Americans. Of all our modern wars, this is the one in which we are least sure of our own cause and purpose.

Since we are there, it is blisfully better, to win battles than to lose them. But, since we really do not know what we should gain, we could win all the battles, there is still distinction between even with victories — as if the deaths on both sides should not be necessary, as if anything can be decided through bloodshed, and as if we should eventually be determined by some means, as if this is truly as much a tragedy for those who must do the killing as it is for those who make up the daily score when the kill has been made.

For those lucky enough to have a favor pair of high tops, there was the little pocket on the side for a knife.

But so have other cities, in other states. It's all right, it's par for the course, to have all these representatives at work for the city's share of the Washington bonanza.

But if the city wants to do just a little better than the routine, if it wants to be sure its own requests and possibilities are getting something just a little bit special in the way of attention, then the special lobbyist, thinking only of his own one and only client, becomes the thing.

After Mayor Lindsay has begun doing this, it would not be surprising to find that other large cities, or states, began deciding they could not leave their Washington prospects to their elected Senators and Congressmen alone.

And in time, we suppose, such communities as Manchester would have to make some arrangement to get at least a few minutes a day devoted from some professional Washington procurer of authorizations, grants, and contracts.

The ironic thing about all this, for most communities, is that if we could find some way to shut off the transfer of our money to Washington, where we have to go in order to try to get some of it back, we could make our own needs, ourselves, out of our own resources without paying other slices of tribute and overhead to Washington, or lobbyist salaries to people who hire to go down and get something back for us.

That might weed out and separate a few communities or a few states where there is not much resource to begin with, though we all, as the nation, would have to extend help to, through federal agencies, out of our own resource. But we wouldn't have to pay all those present premiums for getting our own money back for our own use.

House Said Hospital Announces Long-Range Plans

Officials of Case Bros. Paper Co., which owned the Birch Mt. Rd. farm house occupied by the family of the late Dr. W. Murphy J. Quality, Demand Cause Shortage

At least 15 new medical schools are being started, but it takes 10 years and \$25 million or more from initial plans for a school to the first graduating class. And medical education is costly—\$10,000 to \$20,000 over four years—and the majority of students come from middle-class families or those higher on the economic scale.

Many rejected U.S. students have been going to foreign countries, but some of those schools are now closing their doors to them. American students, however, are estimated to comprise about one-quarter of the 1,400 newly licensed doctors each year studied outside the United States and Canada.

The rest constitute part of the "brain drain" from other countries. This "raises the moral question whether we, with all our health facilities, should be exporting doctors," says Dr. William H. Stewart, surgeon-general of the U.S. Public Health Service.

Spokesmen for the American Medical Association, long a leader for high quality in medicine, insist it has strongly championed more medical schools. But critics of the AMA declare the main battle for more schools was waged by others, including the Association of American Medical Colleges.

"The AMA gradually abandoned its leadership in medicine in its fight against 'socialized medicine,' now there's a vacuum of leadership," says one prominent physician. Others see this as a main organization of doctors being "counter-cultural," denying that some social problems exist.

"Organized medicine and organizations of medical education are not facing up to the problems of the medical manpower shortage," says Dr. Elliot Conitt, president of the American College of Cardiology.

Organizations, like individuals often tend to resist change. Dr. Michael E. DeBakey of Houston, Tex., notes that professional organizations tend to become "guild-like, and rigidly and staunchly defend their health domains."

It is still necessary to train all medical students alike, he adds. Present laws virtually require this — to obtain his license, the physician must pass examinations measuring his knowledge in many areas of medicine.

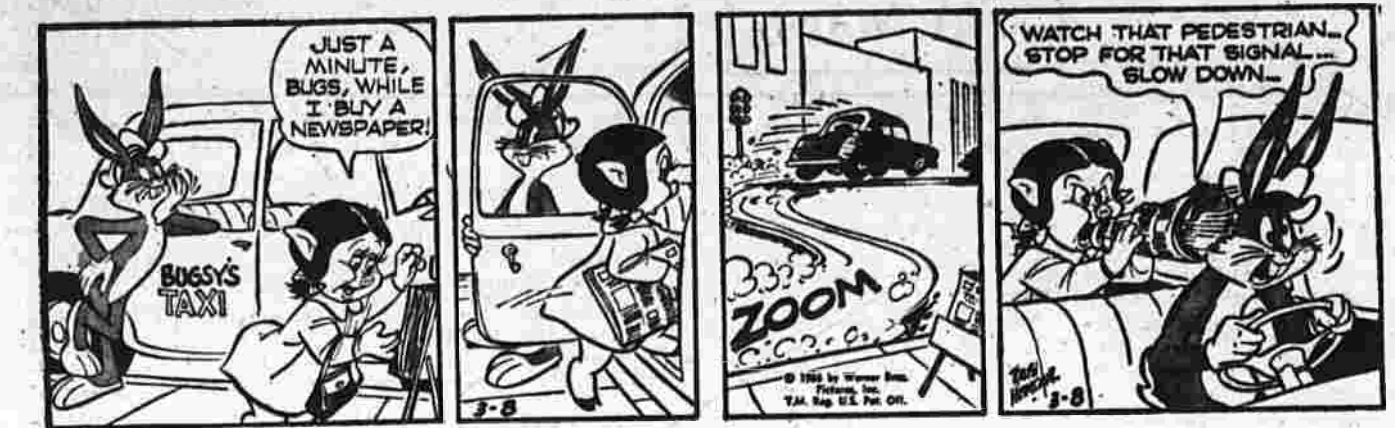

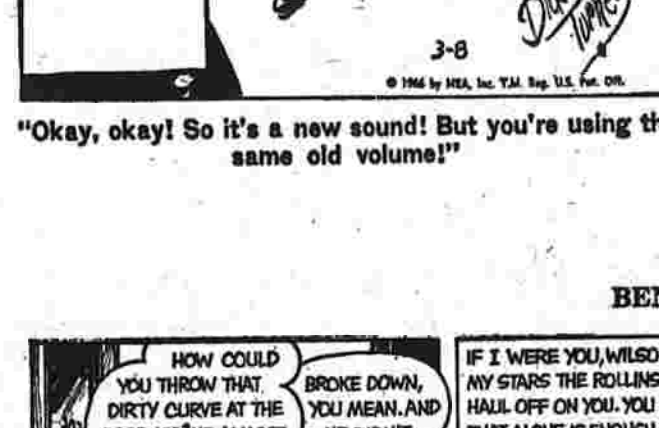

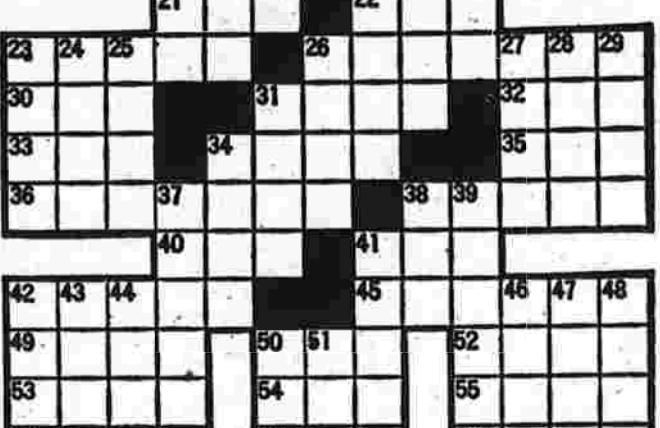
