Munitions Blast Felt In 3 States

CORNING, Ark. (AP) — A "boxcar" loaded with 175mm artillery shells exploded near here early today with a force felt in three states.

The explosion, felt in Arkansas, Missouri and Tennessee, ruptured a natural gas line and forced the evacuation of several hundred Corning residents before the gas was shut off.

One house was demolished by the explosion and fire. Walls of two others were blown away. Only one person was injured, not seriously.

John Hutchinson of the Corning Volunteer Fire Department said the fear of more explosions kept firemen from battling the fire in the wreckage.

The gas leak, which existed for about two hours, could not be repaired because it, too, was near the fire, Hutchinson said.

Deputy Sheriff Jess Watson said the artillery shells exploded as the car stood on the siding to which it had been pulled to.

Kidney Machine Bought 3,625 Mobilize To Save a Life

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — The 3,625 residents of heavily Man-cott, Ill., have mobilized to help save the life of Mrs. John Votrain.

Mrs. Votrain, 35, the wife of a school teacher and mother of two sons, took her first home treatment Tuesday on a kidney machine paid for with funds collected by the citizens of Mascoutah.

"I'm thankful," said Mrs. Votrain. "I didn't know I had so many friends."

The machine does the job ordinarily done by the kidneys, Mrs. Votrain has Bright's disease.

Her husband was trained to operate the machine by the Washington University Medical School at Barnes Hospital in St. Louis.

"I will still have to go back to Barnes for checkups about once each month," said Mrs. Votrain.

Dr. Herbert Lubowitz, a member of the medical school staff, said: "Without the treatment available by the kidney machine, death probably would come within six weeks. With the machine, it is theoretically possible to live almost normally."

A dance, a chicken supper and a picnic are planned to raise money for the machine.

Tight Guard On Philip's Miami Visit

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Prince Philip, husband of Queen Elizabeth II of England, arrived today amid security as thick as a London fog to start a 10,000-mile North American fund raising tour.

The prince, lanned after a five-week Caribbean tour, piloted his twin-jet Andover plane from Nassau, the Bahamas. He landed on an airstrip sealed off from the public.

The prince landed at the airport in a motorcade of Rolls Royces and Jaguars for his Miami headquarters in the Fontainebleau Hotel.

The procession continued sharply with those along his Caribbean island route where Philip and the Queen waved to crowds from open cars. Here he rode in a bullet proof car and the public was not allowed to touch him.

Sir Patrick Dean, British ambassador to the United States, accompanied Philip here.

Three mayors welcomed the prince — Elliott Roosevelt of Miami Beach, Robert King High of Miami and Chuck Hill of Dade County, British Consul Walter Hollis Adams also was among the official greeters.

The prince hoped to raise as much as a million dollars for children's charities throughout the world.

NEW YORK (AP) — Each March, like a time bomb, a miniature arms race explodes in New York. It's the annual Toy Fair, where manufacturers display their latest creations for Christmas.

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U.S. Medicine—1966 'New' Doctor, a Quarterback

NEW YORK (AP) — Dramatic, profound changes are spreading from the collision between new health demands and traditional care.

Emerging, in a sense, is the "super doctor" and "super nurse."

The do-it-yourself days of the physician are closing out. Instead, he's becoming more the quarterback of a new kind of health team. He is, of necessity, delegating some familiar old functions to people specifically trained to perform them.

"Fifteen years ago, a doctor would have screamed if a nurse dared to give a hypodermic or set up an intravenous feeding.

Now it's becoming routine for her," one physician said.

Time is called the scarcest commodity for the doctor who spent 10 years or more learning his skills.

So he is stepping up the ladder, to the top of a pyramid where he can care for more people, do more and new things.

Jailed Spy Unemotional On Release

LEAVENWORTH, Kan. (AP) — George John Gessner drew his first free breath after five years in government custody and said "Justice delayed is justice denied."

The 29-year-old former soldier showed no emotion as he was released from the U.S. penitentiary where he had been since his conviction June 4, 1961, of giving nuclear weapons secrets to the Soviet Union. He was the first convicted under the Atomic Energy Act.

An appeals court last year nullified Gessner's conviction and life sentence because it found his confession, the basis of the government's case — was made involuntarily.

U.S. Atty. Gen. Newell George stood before the same three judges Tuesday and declared, "Without the confession we do not have sufficient evidence to go to trial."

He filed a motion to dismiss charges against Gessner and a few hours later Gessner was free.

"Because of continued interrogation months and months and promise of total immunity," Gessner said.

"Of course, it was not true," he said.

"How can a man have plans when he has been locked up five years or better?" he asked.

When asked about his future, "I hope to return to college — if any colleges will have me. I've done so to school, he said. "It is not my intention to restrict my personal opinions."

Gessner, a private first class, was a nuclear weapons specialist at Ft. Bliss, Tex., when he was arrested in 1958 and sent to Mexico City. The confession, introduced at his trial, said he had met with officers of the Soviet Embassy on several occasions and gave them all he knew about the atomic bomb.

He was arrested in Panama City, Panama, March 28, 1961, and has been in custody since then — one year of it for desertion.

"A man tends to get justice in proportion to the thickness of his wallet and inversely to the power and prestige of the accuser," Gessner said.

Aiken Backs LBJ

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — At least two Red campes assaulted an isolated camp of U.S. Special Forces men and mountain tribes early today near the Laotian border.

The 300 Montagnard troops and their 12 "green beret" advisers were best of the attackers in a day-long battle.

Rescue helicopters brought out three wounded crewmen of the C-47, a souped-up type nicknamed "Puff, the Magic Dragon" for the machine gun added to the lumbering two-engine transport.

But heavy Red fire prevented the helicopters from bringing out the dead.

About 200 Reds launched the attack at 2 a.m. At dawn, U.S. forces lost contact with the camp, raising fears it may have been overwhelmed.

Terrorism Clouds Election In Hot Dominican Republic

SAO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — Uncontrolled terrorism is shaping up as a decisive factor in the forthcoming Dominican general election.

It may determine whether two of the country's most important political parties will participate in the June voting. If they do not, the validity of the elections could be questioned.

This appeared to be the consensus among Dominican and foreign observers, including some Latin-American diplomats, after the latest violence during the weekend in which six persons were wounded, including an American and two Dominican members of the Inter-American peace force.

There is some apprehension that unless the provincial government and the Organization of American States act decisively to stop the terrorism even greater repercussions may follow — including the spread of anti-election sentiment, which now is confined chiefly to the left-wing extremist factions.

Because the provocation that set off the weekend incidents in downtown Santo Domingo was small, there is concern about what will happen as voting time approaches.

Terrorists from the extreme right and left have been active throughout the country almost from the time the provincial government was installed last Sept. 3.

Unofficial casualty estimates range upward from 100 killed in various incidents since then.

The violence has shown how widely the civilian population is armed.

Characteristics of the violence have exposed the skill and resourcefulness of the urban guerrillas who may have been trained by Communist co-sponsors.

The volume and efficiency of explosives in the terrorism — as in the destruction of the news magazine "Ahoru" — has caused speculation about the extent of armed forces collaboration with terrorists from the extreme right.

The armed forces have pledged impartiality in the election. But it is no secret that influential military figures are determined to prevent former President Juan Bosch — leader of the Dominican Revolutionary party — PRD — from regaining power even through honest elections.

The pattern of recent terrorism, especially in the rural districts, has convinced the PRD leadership that right-wing strategy is aimed at curbing party participation in the interior

and forcing the PRD to abstain from the election.

"The party will not be intimidated by violence," Bosch says.

"But the responsibility of having to send party workers out without the security of human rights guarantees is too great. There is no proper climate presently for an election count."

Officials of the government, including Bosch, have censured the failure of President Hector Garcia-Godoy to use decisive measures to quell the violence. It has been pointed out the Inter-American peace force is available for any security measure the Dominican army or police could not effectively undertake.

"The Inter-American peace force has already intervened in this country," Bosch said recently. "Why doesn't it continue intervening then to insure at least the application of human rights guarantees?"

Critics of Garcia-Godoy say one possible way to stop the violence is through the deportation of extremists of the right and left. The president himself has said these people are well-known to authorities.

The precedent for this was established, the critics claim, with the case in September of Gen. Elias Wessely Wessely, the militant anti-Communist leader from the time the provincial government was installed last Sept. 3.

S. Africa Pumps Sympathy Past Embargo to Rhodesia

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Sympathy for Rhodesia in its independence crisis is sweeping South Africa.

Thousands of gallons of gasoline daily pour into Rhodesia from the white population of its southern neighbor.

While the South African government outwardly plays a neutral hand, declining to intervene between Britain and Rhodesia, "Friends of Rhodesia" associations are springing up. Major centers and even small towns and villages in the most remote government's concern over gas areas have formed groups to contribute toward aid for Rhodesia.

Britain, intent on crushing the Rhodesian rebellion and using

that his government would not prevent individuals or oil companies from sending gasoline supplies to Rhodesia. It would intervene in what was strictly a matter between Britain and Rhodesia. He said South Africa should maintain normal trade relations with both countries.

The whites of South Africa and Rhodesia have close ties. Many of Rhodesia's 230,000 whites are South Africans or of South African descent.

There is great secrecy about the movement of gasoline. No one seems to know how much is being taken across the border or, in many cases, who is supplying and delivering it.

There could be as much as 20,000 gallons daily being sent to Rhodesia, with an equal amount supplied from the neighboring Portuguese territory of Mozambique. If this figure were correct, the supply would go a long way to

ward meeting Rhodesia's needs.

The "Friends of Rhodesia" associations are selling gasoline coupons at filling stations, gas-rages and special offices in towns. The chairman of the Pretoria branch, Fred Barnard, former private secretary to Prime Minister Verwoerd, said books of gasoline coupons worth \$1.4 million have been printed and delivered for sale.

Aid has not been restricted to supplies of golf balls for Rhodesia, where imported supplies have been out of

PTA's Hear Two Speak On Renewal

Parent groups at Lincoln and Nathan Hale Schools last night planning in each area might affect each school.

Edward Rybczyk, director of the Manchester Redevelopment Agency, told parents at Lincoln that it is the function of the board of education rather than his agency to make proposals regarding the fate of Lincoln School, and that any proposal for either refurbishing it or abandoning it in favor of another site must be initiated by the school board.

Rybczyk, discussing how proposed Downtown Renewal might affect the present school, said it is possible the building could remain, since preliminary plans, which call for widening Main St. at the Center, envision taking away a strip of about 10 feet along the front of the school property.

Although traffic conditions at the Center were termed "uncalled" by the redevelopment head, he cautioned his listeners that the problem is still being worked out by his department, together with Raymond & May, planning consultants, and the State Highway Department.

Because any proposals for Downtown Renewal are still subject to referendum, Rybczyk explained he could not be very specific at this time about them. He stressed that his function is to coordinate renewal activities with any plans that might be made for Lincoln, and that the renewal agency stands ready to cooperate with those plans in every way possible.

Following his talk, Mrs. Walter Collins, chairman of the Lincoln School Association's improvement committee, showed pictures of the condition of the building and urged the audience to attend the public hearings, on the town budget April 8.

Partially as the result of pressure from the Lincoln Association, the school board has proposed a \$1,200,000 capital improvements program to upgrade the town's older elementary schools.

Speaking to parents at Nathan Hale School, which would share in the capital works project and is in the path of proposed renewal, was Joseph Tamasky, town planning director.

Speaking primarily to the town's master plan, which is termed "very general," Tamasky said there is a need to get down to specifics.

He termed the area, from the east side of Spruce St. (outside renewal plans) to Autumn and from Chapter Oak to B. Center St. a "gray area" that someday might deteriorate if steps are not taken to forestall it. Financial assistance here is needed, he asserted.

Such areas on the edge of renewal often get little or no attention, while the refurbished ones are transformed into islands of beauty, Tamasky said.

He suggested that maintaining the quality of the gray area could be effected by removal of individual nuisances such as dilapidated homes and stores, by building small neighborhood parks and playgrounds, and by widening streets, improving existing walks and curbs, and constructing new ones.

Tamasky urged his audience to organize in pressure groups to seek help for the area.

Like Rybczyk, Tamasky felt that suggestions on the fate of Nathan Hale School were outside the province of his office.

Snow Removal Can Be Costly

Snow and ice control and allied work can be, and is, costly, as statistics released by the Town Highway Department show. In February, it spent \$1,683.15 for each inch of snow that fell in the month.

Crown Princess Beatrix Prepares for Her Wedding

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) — When the Dutch princess Beatrix, 24, is married to Prince Claus of the Netherlands, it comes naturally after 10 years of "petticoat reign."

"She reminds me of her grandmother," said the old Dutchman in talking about Crown Princess Beatrix and her husband-to-be, Prince Claus, a German diplomat, Claus von Amsterg.

The wedding festivities got under way Tuesday night with a banquet at Amsterdam's Hilton Hotel, followed by a royal ball at the huge City Hall festooned with 20,000 blossoms.

A smoke bomb went off outside the royal palace in Amsterdam as mounted police waited to escort guests to the banquet. No one was injured. Later, hundreds cheered Beatrix and her fiancé as they left the banquet to drive to the City Hall.

The crown princess and Von Amsterg opened the ball with a waltz. Court officials said 433 guests attended the dance.

Beatrix is in line to inherit the throne in a series of queenships that began with Queen Emma's regency for Wilhelm III in 1890.

Grandmother Wilhelmina was described by Winston Churchill during World War II as the only "feminine" in the Dutch government in exile in London. They are divided over the centuries into many political and religious denominations.

The Dutch queens — and Crown Princess Beatrix — have shown a determination along with womanly wit in getting their own way with Parliaments dominated by men.

Wilhelmina, an ascetic, was ready to accept the splendid but weighty task of the throne.

Her engagement two years later to Duke Henry of Mecklenburg-Schwerin raised concern among the Dutch people mistrustful of foreign influences.

Wilhelmina reigned 50 years before abdicating in favor of her daughter, Juliana, and withdrawing entirely from public life.

She devoted herself to the study of religious subjects and writing an autobiography — "Lonely But Not Alone." She died in November, 1962.

Juliana's reign has been called "the replet queen."

On taking the oath she told the 15-million-Dutch people: "Who am I, that I should be worthy of this?"

Juliana did away with some elements of the old-fashioned court formalities that still remained. She went to live in a palace in the country, at Soestdijk, where informal life was possible. She does not like to see even the slightest bending of knees by persons being presented.

From her devout Orthodox Protestant mother, amiable Juliana got her mysticism which landed the Dutch royal family in a crisis in the summer of 1966. She is a child to a soothsayer, against the advice of the government. In her motherly hope to restore eyesight to her young daughter Christina, nearly blind in one eye, Christina, now 19, has overcome this handicap somewhat and will be a bride next August.

King William III, the last schoolboy king with the Nazi regime, brought Juliana to her regent from his death in 1890 until her daughter Wilhelmina took the throne.

Wilhelmina's husband was a German. Juliana's husband, Prince Bernhard, is from Germany. She is one of the few royal women who have been in the right hand of their husbands.

Juliana gets an annual state income of \$975,000 plus \$140,000 for maintaining a dozen or so palaces.

The House of Orange is said to be the wealthiest of the royal families. Juliana is worth about \$70 million, according to some estimates, and owns some 100,000 acres of land.

While the Dutch queens have no direct political power, they have an influence.

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Another crisis arose in June 1964 when daughter Irene defied government and family to become a Roman Catholic and married Prince Carlos of Bourbon Parma, a pretender to the Spanish throne.

Irene, 27, lives in virtual exile but enjoys her mother's embrace on private visits back to her homeland.

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Castro Plea Saves Lives Of Attackers

HAVANA (AP) — Four men accused of plotting to assassinate Prime Minister Fidel Castro apparently have escaped the firing squad through an appeal from Castro to spare their lives.

Prosecutor Jorge Serrera quickly switched his demand from death to 30 years imprisonment for the four after telling the five-man military court that Castro had asked him not to seek the death penalty.

Castro denounced the plot as "cowardly and repugnant" and said it violated the death penalty. But "the revolution is strong," he said. "I ask that you not appeal for the death penalty for any of those accused."

Serrera demanded 30-year sentences for former army Major Rolando Cubela and Ramon Guin and for Jose Luis Gonzalez Gallarreta and Alberto Bianco Romariz.

Cubela had testified that he quickly switched his demand from death to 30 years imprisonment for the four after telling

the five-man military court that Castro had asked him not to seek the death penalty.

Three others also are on trial. Serrera asked for a 10-year sentence for Juan Almas Navarro and said the court should decide penalties for Guillermo Cimil Alvarez and Angel Herroero Velaz.

The prosecution introduced a surprise witness Tuesday who claimed he was a double agent employed until last month by the CIA. The witness, who identified himself as Juan Pelayo Canan, said he actually was in the service of Cuban Intelligence during the three years he said he worked for the CIA in Miami and Cuba.

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8% Increase Reported Exodus to Suburbia Includes Criminals

NEW YORK (AP) — Police officials say suburbia's population, public apathy and small police forces contribute to the exodus of crime from the suburbs, an Associated Press survey shows.

Millions of Americans have escaped to the suburbs. But criminals apparently have joined in the exodus from the cities.

The FBI said Monday the suburbs paced a 5 per cent increase in the nation's reported crimes in 1965. Crime in suburbia was up by 8 per cent over 1964, with 12 per cent more rape and 15 per cent more robbery.

"Certainly our crime rate is growing, but then so is our population. They follow together," says Donald McMahon, police chief of Alhambra, Calif., a suburb of Los Angeles.

"We're getting some of the crime that used to be elsewhere," said Police Chief John O. Kenyon of Overland Park, Kan., which is 12 miles from downtown Kansas City and one of the 10 fastest growing communities in the nation.

In Yorkers, just outside New York City, Safety Commissioner Daniel F. McMahon says: "We're part of the national picture — lowering of moral standards and a growing disrespect for law and authority, and we haven't been helped by court decisions."

One of the major problems facing suburban communities is that their police forces have not kept up with the population.

"We're just not able to get the personnel, and we have had the personnel for 10, 12, 14 years now," said Chief James P. Corr of Lexington, Mass., a suburb of Boston. He said he needs 65 policemen, but has only 34.

"Perhaps because I'm the affluent suburb, I don't think too many parents say to their children, 'You ought to be a policeman,'" Corr said. "There are too many professors and scientists here."

Chief McMahon of Alhambra says: "We're getting calls now for things we never did 20 years ago. We're expected to check routine domestic squabbles. The citizenry is expecting and getting more services without an appreciable boost in our manpower."

"We have to get the citizens to help us if we're to make a real effort against crime."

Chief McMahon has 17 officers to patrol a community of 65,000 persons.

In nearby Burbank, Calif., Police Chief Rex R. Andrews has 137 officers to police a community of 90,000. He has no views about the rise in crime.

"Anyone who can tell you what causes crime to increase is either a damn fool or a damn liar or both," Andrews said. "We're trying to fight public apathy, the feeling that if it isn't happening to me, I'm not interested. Last week we had 10 officers trying to make an arrest and they asked a bystander to call for help. He answered: 'Oh, hell, I'm late for work already.'"

Despite the statistics, all is not bleak in the suburbs.

In the Atlanta, Ga., suburb of College Park, crime is down 13 per cent. "This year I've had one auto stolen in two months," says Police Chief T. Owen Smith.

Smith said he believes the decrease stems from cooperation by Greater Atlanta authorities. He said: "We feel that our Metropolitan organization has done something better education, and communication."

One of the wealthiest suburbs in the country is Winnetka, Ill., just north of Chicago. It is dry, its population is stationary — and so is its crime rate.

Winnetka has had no homicides rapes in more than two years. Last year it had 99 burglaries and 23 major felonies. Chief Don Derringer says residents are quick to report suspicious persons and to notify police when they are leaving town.

Many of the communities surveyed are affluent, and that means money.

Exodus to Suburbia Includes Criminals

It seems like wealthy people are moving out of the cities into areas like ours," said Chief R. J. Hundley of Prairie Village, Kan., a community near Kansas City. "This is increasing our losses. We try to combat it by looking police into areas with the greatest incidents."

"We may go a year or two without a murder, but house-breaking is our biggest problem," said Philip Purcell, chief of police in Newton, Mass., and president of the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

Commissioner McMahon of Yorkers attributes a high percentage of the burglaries to narcotics problem, he said, and "a very substantial decrease in the crime rate would follow."

Local governments faced with a steadily increasing population have been slow to increase their police forces, an FBI spokesman said.

The government, usually controlled by persons who have lived in the communities for years, require time to assess and react to their crime problems. This in turn contributes to the increase in the crime rate.

What else are police doing to cope with this problem?

"We must continue to recruit new officers, and make people aware of the need to help us, to secure their property and assist us when something is wrong," said William A. Beach,

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Manchester: Past Places, People

Manchester has 540 accepted streets, covering 102.8 miles. Each street was named, some names identify residents, some describe a locale or destination, some commemorate prominent men.

Historically, the first roads were Indian trails. W. Center, Center, and E. Center Sts. were not named as the center of a community but rather were part of a trail through the center of the Five Mile Tract purchased from Joshua an Indian sachem, in 1675 by Major Talcott of Hartford.

Tolland Tpk. extended from the Podunk Indians' summer village in East Hartford to Sinopec Lake near Tolland, in 1675 by Major Talcott of Hartford.

Another trail went from the meadows of the Hockanum River eastward over Brush Hill (Hassun-adchu-suk) over Hackmatack St. (Hocquannum) and Sunset Hill (Hocquannum) to Manchester Green and Bolton.

Richard Martin, who served from 1882 to 1885. He is known that two streets were named for governors of this state: Haynes and Lilley. John Haynes was the first Colonial governor. He began in 1689 and served in the unbroken years, alternating with a man named Hopkins for eight terms. George Lilley was governor in 1882.

There are several streets that bear governors' names but some of them were definitely not named for the officials: Wytlys, Pitkin, Trumbull, Huntington, Griswold, Baldwin, Bissell, Buckingham, Bigelow, Harrison, Lake and Cross.

Presidents have been remembered: Washington, Adams, Madison, Harrison, Taylor, Lincoln, McKinley, Coolidge and Roosevelt.

PLAN MIDDLE TURNPIKE
At a meeting of the Parish of Orford held on Dec. 8, 1796, it was voted to lay out a new highway. The following year Middle Turnpike was opened. There was a toll gate at Lovell Lane, which had been an Indian foot-path, and by 1872 John Gilbert had opened a road to his saw mill on the Hockanum.

After Middle Turnpike was opened, stage coaches began to operate over the road. It took four days for a trip between New York and Manchester.

NAMES FROM NATURE
There are 17 streets with names of trees, though in some cases the variety of tree did not grow on the street but its name. At least two exceptions are Chestnut St., where there were many chestnut trees before the blight, and Hackmatack St., where the Indians cut hackmatack logs for their canoes.

The four seasons are represented in widely separated areas. Four streets are named for plants: St. James, St. John, St. Lawrence, and St. Paul.

Developers have had a lot to do with street names and have left clues to their interests. E. J. Hill has an English background. His used Oxford and Cambridge in an early development and later, in another section, Cromwell, Wellington, Scarborough and Westminster. R. J. Smith named streets for the colleges attended by his daughter and son—Wellesley and Harvard—before he added Princeton, a football rival of Harvard, but he left out Dartmouth and Cornell, which were used by later developers.

ORIGINAL RESIDENT
Street names can reflect the past as well as the future. Original land owners — Pitkin, Olcott, Bissell, Kenney, Bidwell, Shaws and Woodruff, to name a few.

A house facing Pitkin St. was built by Elijah Pitkin in 1782. Members of the family built glass works — Manchester's runs now under the care of the Daughters of the American Revolution. One of Elijah's brothers, William, was a governor of the colony for several years and a grandnephew, Fred, became governor of Colorado. Richard Rd. was named for Richard Pitkin.

There is an Olcott St. and an Olcott Dr. Joseph Olcott was the moderator of the first meeting of Orford Parish on Aug. 12, 1772, after permission had been granted by the General Assembly to set up a Society separate from East Hartford. Subsequent Olcotts were agriculturists and inventors.

MEADOW LANE
Meadow Lane is rapidly losing what the name implies, as a meadow. It is a wide street with attractive homes. Other streets with descriptive names are Sheep Hollow, Highgate, Chatter Oak and the street named after a great historical significance but it loses its identity as it merges into Highland.

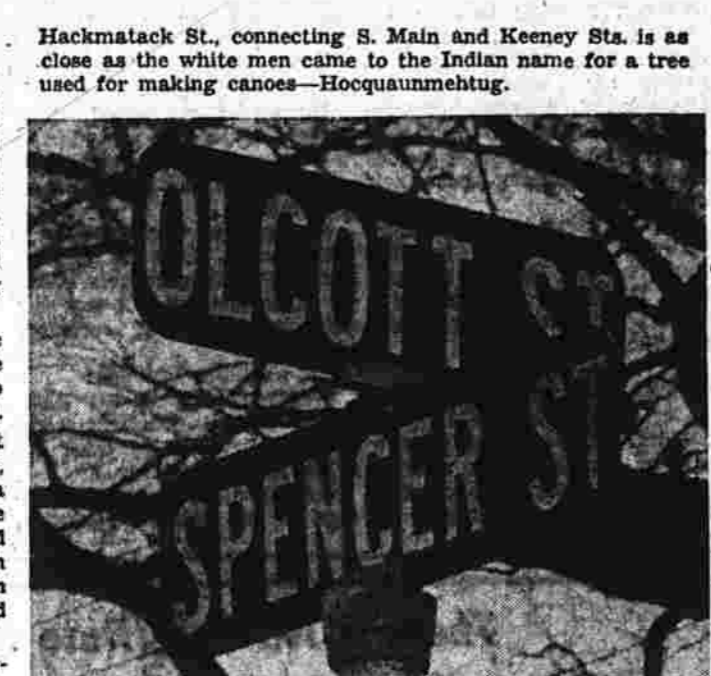
Perhaps there are not many people in Manchester today who realize that there really was an academy on Academy St., bordering on Parker. It flourished in 1850 to 1860 but was discontinued during the Civil War.

NO CHERNEY STREET
Members of the Cheney family and the silk mill they operated have contributed greatly to the development of this community. Yet there is no Cheney nor Silk Street.

Once there was an apple orchard where the Westhill apartments now are. There is no street in the area to indicate the family or farm. But across the road are O'Leary and Hooker Dns., where families with those names once lived. Doughtery St. is not far from them, and, unlike them, still has a Doughtery family living on it.

Bowers, Hathaway, and Hyde were prominent lawyers in the early part of the century who served the town in many ways. Elwood Elm issued the first Manchester Herald on Dec. 15, 1881. Eventually he built a home on a hill which became Boulder Rd. In time he and R. J. Smith cut streets through the land, below the hill which he used Oxford and Cambridge in an early development and later, in another section, Cromwell, Wellington, Scarborough and Westminster. R. J. Smith named streets for the colleges attended by his daughter and son—Wellesley and Harvard—before he added Princeton, a football rival of Harvard, but he left out Dartmouth and Cornell, which were used by later developers.

GUATEMALA (AP) — Guatemalans faced a serious crisis today as rival political parties disputed the results of the presidential election.

The government-backed Institutional Democratic Party (IDP) charged fraud in strong terms. It said the party would probably combine with Ponce's to give him a majority in the 16-seat Congress.

Revolutionary party candidate Julio Cesar Mendez Montenegro, who leads in the re-vote, claimed "total victory by the absolute majority" of the country's 204 municipalities gave Mendez 100,822 votes, Col. Juan de Dios Aguilar of the PID 148,086 and Col. Miguel Angel Ponce of the right-wing National Liberation Movement 100,491.

Although the official figures put the civilian candidate well in the lead, they left him short of the majority required for election. He now gets a majority, the new Congress elected Sunday will choose between the two high men.

"I don't believe the information of the Electoral Commission," said Mendez, a former law professor, "is done under the government's thumb."

Besides, people who attain wealth the hard way often become embittered and stingy. They sometimes get sadistic satisfaction out of keeping you dangling between hope and despair.

If they fall ill and you send them a dozen roses, they suspect you are trying to rush them to an early grave. You merely send them a get-well card, they think you aren't attentive enough.

Yes, it is a bore waiting to inherit money. But as long as your neighbors know you are a prospective heir, your position is secure in the community.

The worst thing that can happen to your social standing is for word to get around that you not only have no real money of your own but that there is no earthly possibility of your inheriting any.

Then nobody cares what your views on Viet Nam are. Nobody asks you for your recipe on how to make backyard smit kebabs. You probably can't even run for an office in the PTA and win. Lower than that it is pretty hard to get a fellow job.

In this dilemma what can an ambitious man do to save himself and his family from ostracism?

A simple way out is to invent a rich relative.

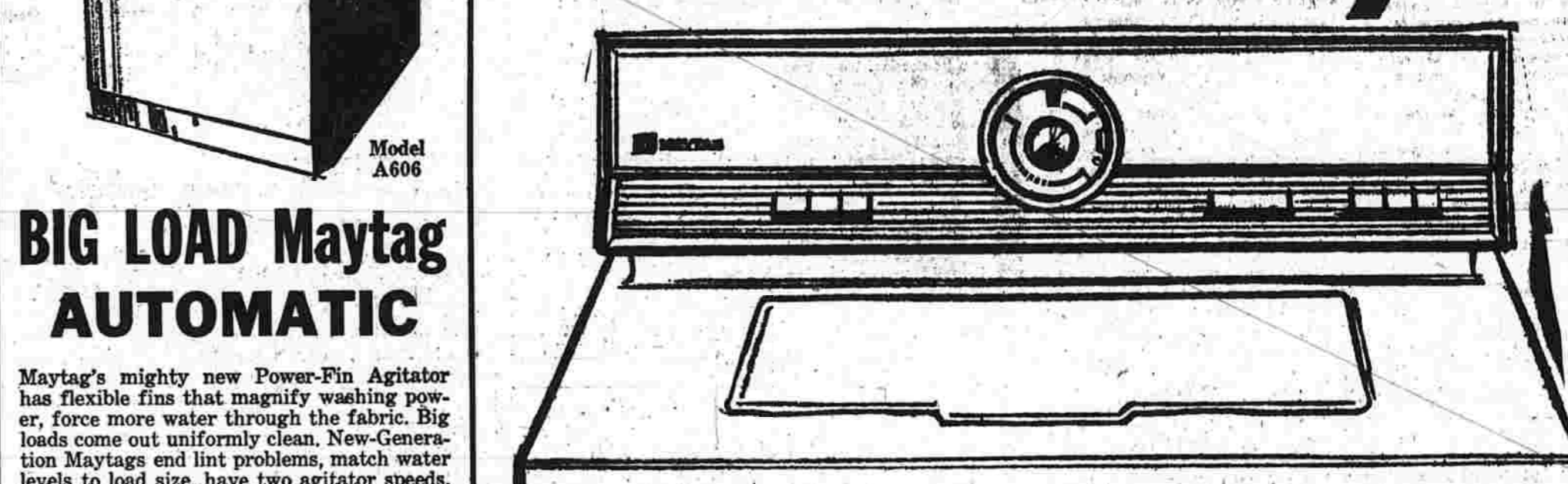

NEW YORK (AP) — An elaborate 400-million theater complex — called Cinema City — is planned for midtown Manhattan on the site now occupied by Madison Square Garden, the famed sports arena.

Details of the proposed development were made public Monday by Irving Felt, chairman of the project, which is being developed by the Madison Square Garden Corp., which will own and operate the center.

The project will feature twin 30-story office towers, four motion picture theaters and film and recording studios.

Felt said construction would begin after demolition of the 41-year-old Madison Square Garden in late 1967. A new sports and convention hall is under construction atop Penn Station, 18 blocks south of the present site.

The twin skyscrapers will be located at the Eighth and Ninth Avenue ends of the area, which is bounded on the north and south by 49th and 50th Streets.

The theaters will be at ground-floor levels between the towers with television and film studios in sound-proof spaces below street level.

The legitimate theater — the first built in the city in many years with the exception of the newly opened New York State Theater at Lincoln Center — will each accommodate 1,500 persons. The motion picture theaters will seat 700 persons each.

The report issued Tuesday by a Senate Refugee subcommittee

headed by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., urged long-range programs in education, care of orphans and health; efforts to encourage more political action in refugee centers; and efforts to stimulate the South Vietnamese government "to end the lethargic attitude to refugees."

Kennedy said in a statement accompanying the report he hoped policy declarations by President Johnson and Vietnamese leaders at Honolulu "will have finally generated on the part of both governments the sense of urgency and resolute action which is needed in all these areas."

3rd Union Plans Strike Against Boston's Press

BOSTON (AP) — Boston's four-day newspaper strike appeared to deepen today as a third craft union threatened to join the walkout of printers and mailers.

Newspaper stenographers, the men who cast the lead page plates for presses, voted 107-7 Tuesday night authorizing their negotiators to call a strike "when and if the committee deems it necessary."

A statement by Donald F. Butler, president of stereotypers local No. 2, said the publishers "did not respond favorably" to a contract proposal presented by the union Tuesday.

Butler did not specify the nature of the disagreement. He did not indicate if the stenographers are working without a contract.

The printers and mailers were not working without a contract since Jan. 1, 1965.

Five of Boston's daily newspapers have been idle since Sunday night in the walkout. The cash rates instead of a health-welfare and pension plan offered by management.

James B. White, president of the mailers' local, said the dis-

pute "stretches about the same today as it did yesterday."

He said negotiators would meet separately and in a joint session today.

Federal and state mediators met with the publishers yesterday but made no statement at the conclusion of the session.

Meanwhile, the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce said the strike was causing a "direct economic loss of \$600,000 a day." It said businesses were suffering an additional \$200,000 in "indirect losses."

Coventry Teacher Contracts Issued Under New Salary Schedule

Committee members have interviewed representatives of three additional architects since a new salary schedule of \$8,300 minimum for teachers with a bachelor of arts degree, an increase of \$300 over the previous schedule of \$8,100. The maximum of \$8,400 is \$300 more than the previous final step of \$8,100.

Teachers at this level will receive increments of \$200 for each additional four years of service, \$300 for each of the next six steps and \$400 for the 11th year.

The new salary schedule provides a minimum of \$8,300 for those with a B.A. degree plus 30 hours, going to a maximum of \$8,700; for those with a master's degree the new minimum is \$8,700 to a maximum of \$9,100; master's plus 30 hours has a minimum of \$9,000 to a maximum of \$9,200 and the sixth year, \$9,200 minimum to \$9,400 maximum. All maximums are reached in 11 steps with the first step, excluding the B.A. holders, giving \$200 increments and the remaining steps giving \$300 each to reach the maximum salary on the schedule.

The contractual provisions for the coming school year were agreed upon between the Education Association of Coventry and the Coventry Board of Education.

There are 97 teachers in the system. Of these 63 hold B.A. degrees, eight have B.A. with 30 hours, 28 hold M.A. degrees, one has an M.A. with 30 hours and two hold sixth year certification. There are 15 teachers who have reached the 11th step on the salary schedule with nine having B.A., one with M.A. plus 30 hours, five with M.A., and two with sixth year certification, with their actual number of years of experience ranging from one teacher with 12 years to two teachers with 25 years of experience. There are one each with 18, 19, 22, and one with 18 years' experience, a report of the board of education shows.

New teacher contracts will be in effect from Sept. 1 through Aug. 31, 1967 and will require no less than 187 and no more than 187 work days. The contract is made for full salary teachers for 15 days per year of local service for absence due to personal illness or quarantine, with unused such allowed to accumulate to 90 days after 90 days of accumulation, 10 days sick leave per year at one half pay will be allowed with unused sick leave during this period to be allowed to accumulate for an additional 90 days at one half pay or a total of 180 days.

Substitute teachers will be paid \$18 per day for the first 10 consecutive days in the same classroom compared with the previous \$18 per day, and \$20 per day, from the previous \$18, for the next 10 consecutive days in the same classroom, and after 20 days of consecutive substitution in the same classroom the rate will be 2/3 of the minimum salary.

All teachers will have an uninterrupted duty-free lunch period daily through an agreed arrangement by staggering the teachers lunch schedule.

The provisions cover only additional and revisions to the already existing agreement between the EAC and the local Board of Education.

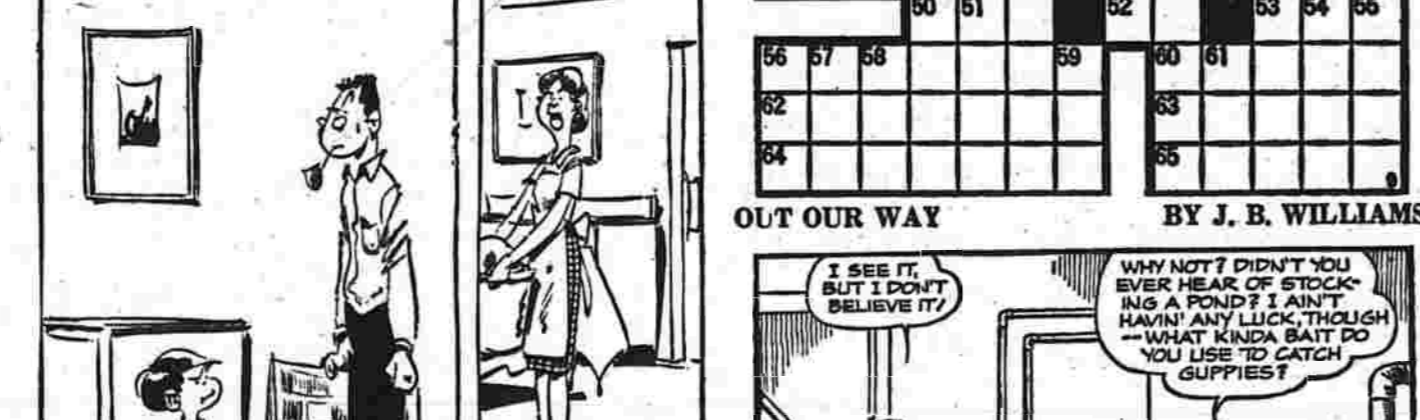

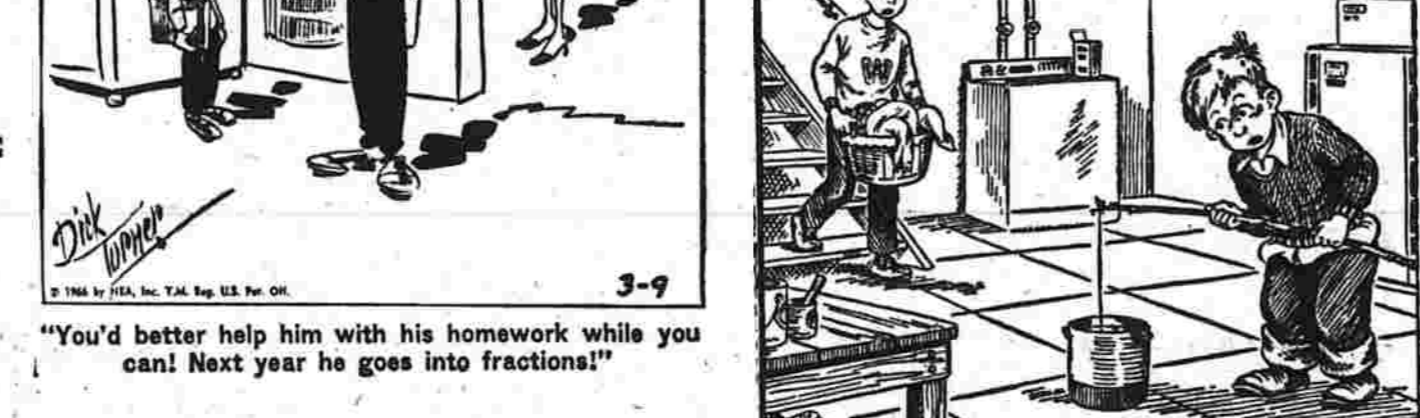
