DETROIT (AP)—Rabbi Morris Adler, 59, shot in the head during Sabbath services nearly a month ago by a young member of his congregation, died today. Adler never regained consciousness after the Feb. 12 shooting at Shazary Zedek synagogue in suburban Southfield.

medications be continued to keep breath in aged, helpless persons who may be only technically alive? Who might decide whether or when to stop?

When, as one heart specialist puts it, "Should we allow human beings the dignity of death?"

To too much effort, some physicians wonder, being spent on adding a few years to adult life, as against preserving children and younger adults from grave health threats, or overcoming their physical or emotional handicaps?

And where is the money coming from for all the proposed programs for expanded health care, for training new health professionals, for improving hospitals, and paying salaries commensurate with those in other occupations?

Some say we cannot afford it all, or at least in a rush. Others believe we can, through insurance systems and tax funds, in a generally prosperous nation that ought to have good health for its citizens as one of its prime goals.

How shall it be done without diluting quality of medical care, or interference with the physician's best judgment for his patients?

The clear trend, from these interviews, is toward better, more effective, more widespread medical care.

In the planning stage now — and a mass of some controversy — is establishing a national network of regional centers for heart disease, cancer and strokes. It is intended to bring the best skills in diagnosis and treatment of these diseases to every physician and patient, region by region, to overcome the lag between discovery and application, to spur research, to train more health personnel and specialists.

Change is moving through hospitals. They are modernizing in more attractive and efficient design, and in adopting labor-saving techniques.

Automation in hospital laboratories is becoming well advanced; computers are entering to reduce paper work, keep records, to speed the flow of information, even to aid in more careful administration of drugs to patients. More supplies are

160 U.S. Mills Make Plywood

PORTLAND, Ore. — In 1965 when the Douglas Fir Plywood Association (DFPA) was formed there were 21 U.S. mills producing plywood, mainly for door panels and dresser bottoms.

According to the American Plywood Association (APA), successor, there are now more than 160 mills, which turn out 1.6 billion square feet of plywood annually.

If you're going to stage a robbery in broad daylight in a innocent look is a better disguise than a black silk mask. It just doesn't sound right to you, just look at a hand from a recent team championship.

Opening lead: king of hearts.

At the first table of the match South made it obvious that he planned to do away with a trick, and he immediately discarded the ace of clubs out of the way.

South next cashed the top spades and led a low spade. West saw that South wanted desperately to get to dummy to deal up with the ace of trumps and cashed a heart trick before he got away from him.

East eventually took the not-in-trick with the king of diamonds, and everybody tossed complacently at West for being so alert. Nobody thought of losing a cabbage at South for being so dummy.

Delays Clubs
At the second table, South dealt the club situation so obvious. After winning the first trick with the ace of hearts, declarer led out the top spades. The queen dropped, and South saw what would happen if he cleared the ace of clubs out of the way.

Instead, South led a low spade. West discarded a club. South ruffed in dummy and cashed the king of clubs to get rid of the long heart. Then he cashed a heart trick and made his contract.

The longest way around was sometimes the shortest way home.

Daily Question
Partner opens with one spade, and the next player passes. You hold: Spades, 10-9-7-3; Hearts, 10-8-6-5; Diamonds, K; Clubs, 4-3-2-1. What do you say?
Answer: Bid two spades. You have only a point in high cards, but the singleton combined with four trumps adds enough to give you the values for a raise.

Philip Visits NASA Center In Houston

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Prince Philip of Great Britain visits the manned spacecraft center today during the second day of his three-day Texas visit.

Ready for his inspection at the training base of the U.S. space team were devices in which they simulate such maneuvers as a rendezvous of two space ships, and mission control, the nerve center for next week's Gemini 8 mission of astronaut Neil A. Armstrong and David R. Scott.

The husband of Queen Elizabeth II arrived here Thursday at the controls of twin turbojet Andover plane for a visit to promote trade and variety club charities.

The prince shook hands briefly at the airport and then held a short news conference.

"I think I play a big role as a disciplinarian, but the children don't think so," he told newsmen.

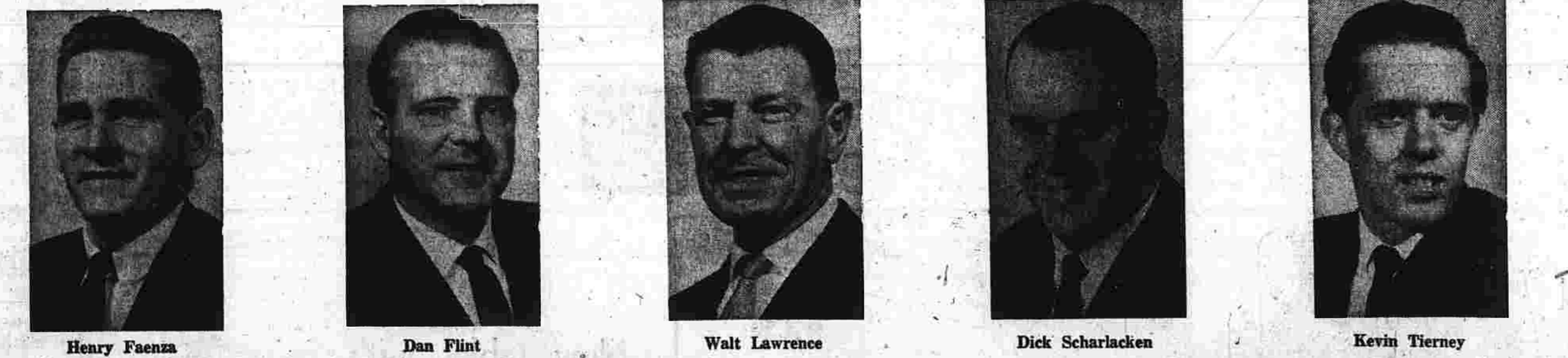

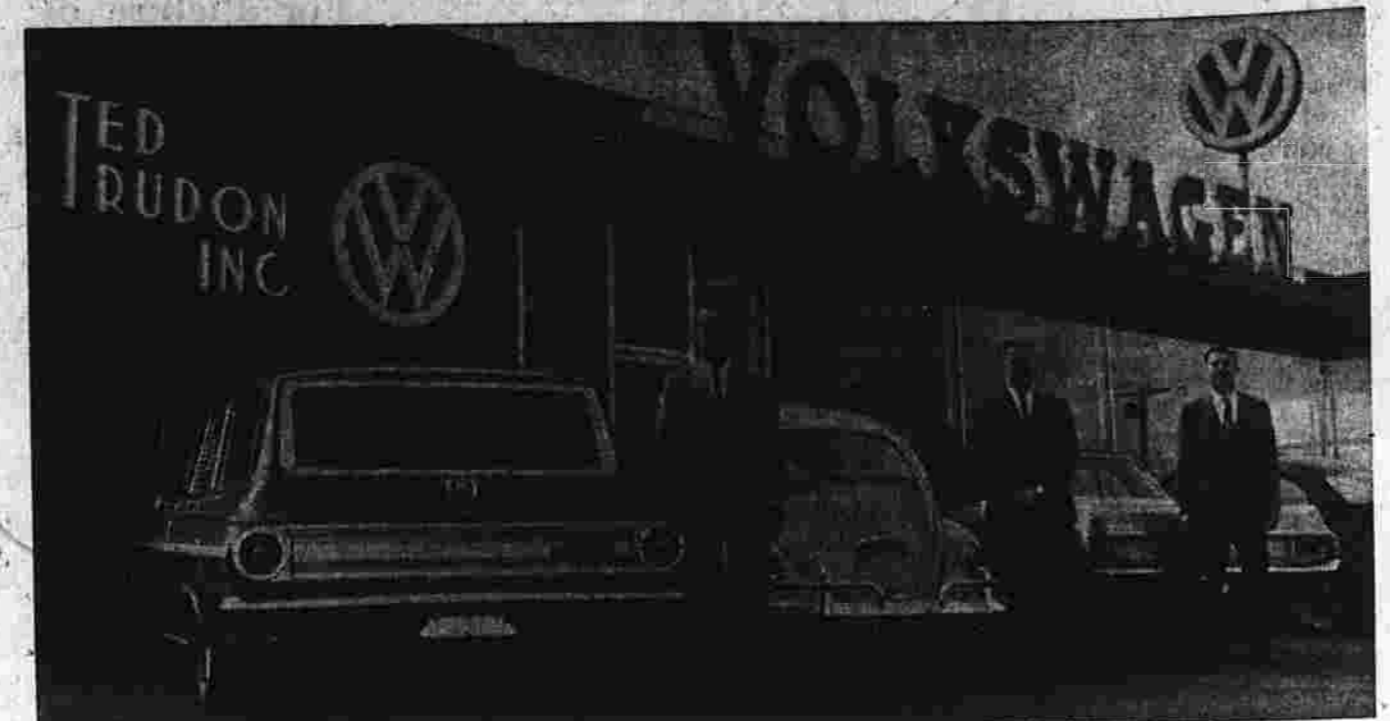

Few Uniformed Russians Noticed Leipzig Fair

LEIPZIG, East Germany (AP)—The Russians are the most noticeable visitors to the Leipzig spring trade fair — but not in uniform and not at night.

By day, Russians of all descriptions walk the streets of the City Center, where fair consumer goods are shown, as well as the streets of the main fair grounds. Russian is spoken widely. The fair is a major attraction for visitors from Communist countries.

Although the Red army maintains some 20 divisions in East Germany, few uniformed Russians are seen in Leipzig itself except for officers with their wives, eating ice cream, buying postcards and stamps, and carrying cameras.

And at night, Russians of any description are not readily noticed in downtown streets, bars and restaurants. A waiter in a restaurant reserved "for foreigners only" commented: "The Russians do not have the money to spend."

Said a young man in a beer hall packed with people and rocking with traditional German drinking songs: "You never see any Russians at night and except at fair time, hardly in the daytime."

They say on Capitol Hill that you can lose yourself all spring if you get on at the wrong floor in the new Senate office building.

As elevators go, these look typical. But on each floor there are two sets of up and down buttons, one set marked "senators only." Punch those and an elevator boy must recognize a senator and his party to their destination — the rest of the passengers fuming in the rear.

Assume, for instance, you're going to the fifth floor but get on with a senator going to six. You go to six first, and if another senator hits the button on the ground floor before you're out at five, you go back down again — and so on.

It's not unheard of to spend 10 or 20 minutes going to the fifth floor after lunch.

None Out at Night Few Uniformed Russians Noticed Leipzig Fair

LEIPZIG, East Germany (AP)—The Russians are the most noticeable visitors to the Leipzig spring trade fair — but not in uniform and not at night.

By day, Russians of all descriptions walk the streets of the City Center, where fair consumer goods are shown, as well as the streets of the main fair grounds. Russian is spoken widely. The fair is a major attraction for visitors from Communist countries.

Although the Red army maintains some 20 divisions in East Germany, few uniformed Russians are seen in Leipzig itself except for officers with their wives, eating ice cream, buying postcards and stamps, and carrying cameras.

And at night, Russians of any description are not readily noticed in downtown streets, bars and restaurants. A waiter in a restaurant reserved "for foreigners only" commented: "The Russians do not have the money to spend."

Said a young man in a beer hall packed with people and rocking with traditional German drinking songs: "You never see any Russians at night and except at fair time, hardly in the daytime."

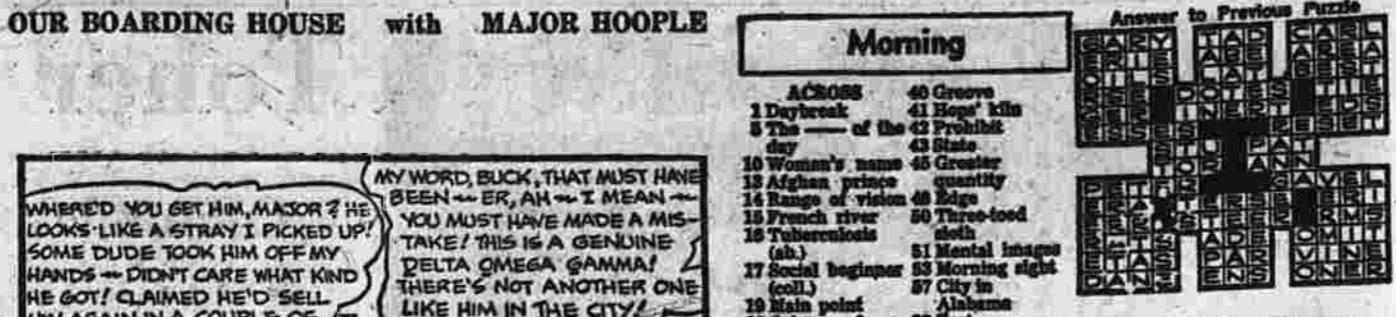

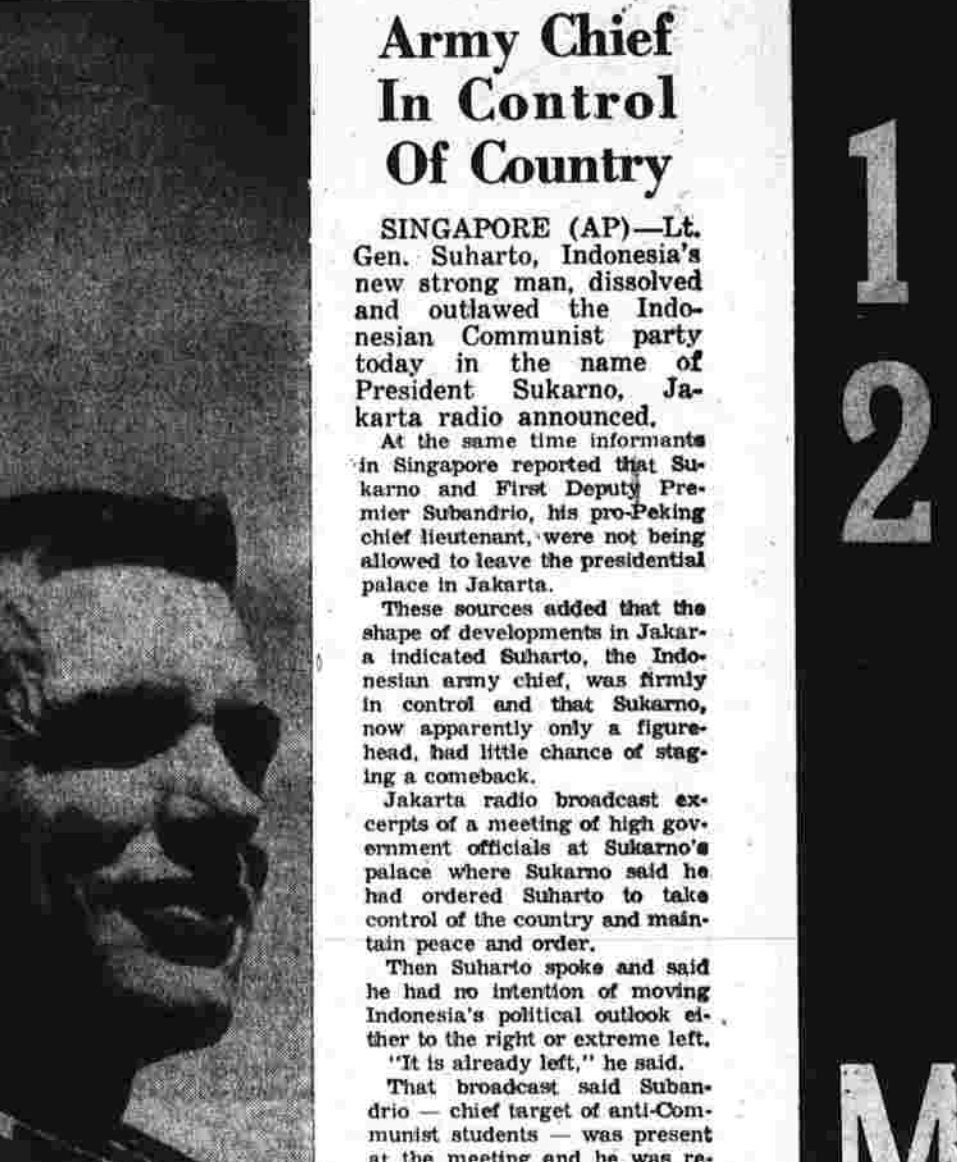
