INFORMING PARTNER MAY COST A TRICK

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

When you begin to play bridge the height of your ambition is to learn all the rules of good play. When you have learned them, your ambition changes: You now want to know when to break all the rules.

Opening lead—Two of Diamonds.

The average good player would know the "correct" play with the East hand. He would win the first trick with the jack of diamonds and continue with the ace of diamonds.

This defense would give South no trouble. He would ruff, draw trumps and knock out the ace of spades. Declarer would regain the lead with a spade and would run the clubs to discard a spade from dummy.

East should switch to spades at the second trick, but this does not good. It makes the "correct" lead of the jack of spades. South plays the king to break the ace, and dummy's nine-eight of spades can then be used, if necessary, for a finesse through dummy.

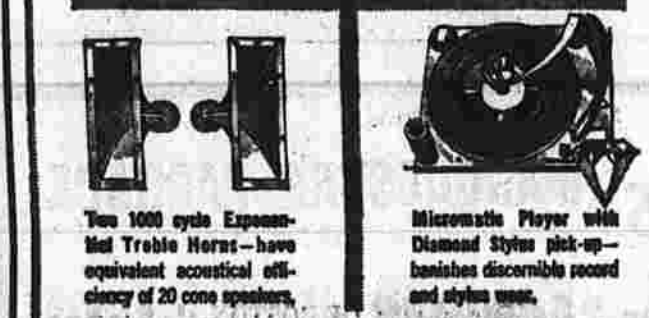
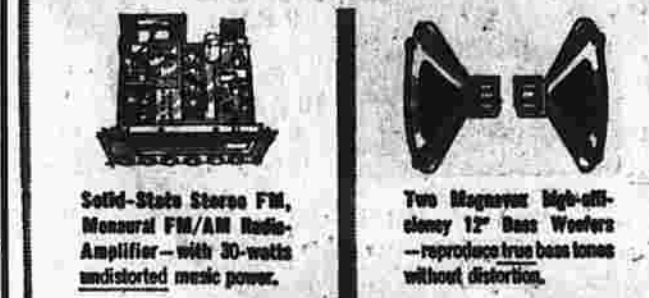

trip he tried out some of the plane's new facilities. Unlike commercial airliners, Johnson's plane now has a main passenger cabin in which all seats face the tail. Although experts say this arrangement provides greater safety in a crash landing, this was not the reason for reversing the seats. The purpose was to permit passengers to face the presidential suite, located just to the rear of the wings.

This looking-backward posture is a key element in the new design of the plane because the wall between the passenger compartment and Johnson's combination office-lounge can be opened.

Under the new arrangement, Johnson can sit at his kidney-shaped desk, with microphones in front of him, and talk directly to a plane load of guests. New electronic facilities enable passengers to address the President directly, too, and their words are heard through-out the aircraft which can carry about 20 passengers.

In this fashion, Johnson could use his intercontinental jet for aerial news conferences. The President last year invited the White House press corps to fly with him on several occasions. He once attempted an en route news conference but lack of microphones and loudspeakers hampered the effort. This experience apparently prompted installation of the new equipment.

Another unique feature of the refitted plane is a wooden folding wall separating the office-lounge from Johnson's bedroom. It was Johnson's own idea to install a folding partition between the two rooms. He reasoned that, since the bedroom is used only occasionally, it often represented wasted space that could be used to entertain more guests in the privacy of his personal quarters where there some way to devise an opening to the office-lounge. The result is a new wall of natural-finish wood slats that can be rolled aside much like the top of an old-fashioned rolltop desk.

The two rooms now can be converted quickly, even in flight, into one large and luxuriously appointed conference room. All that's needed to accomplish this, it was understood, is elbow grease and a screwdriver.

If the enlarged conference room proved too small, the President has the further option of folding aside the walls to the passenger cabin, transforming virtually the entire plane into a single room.

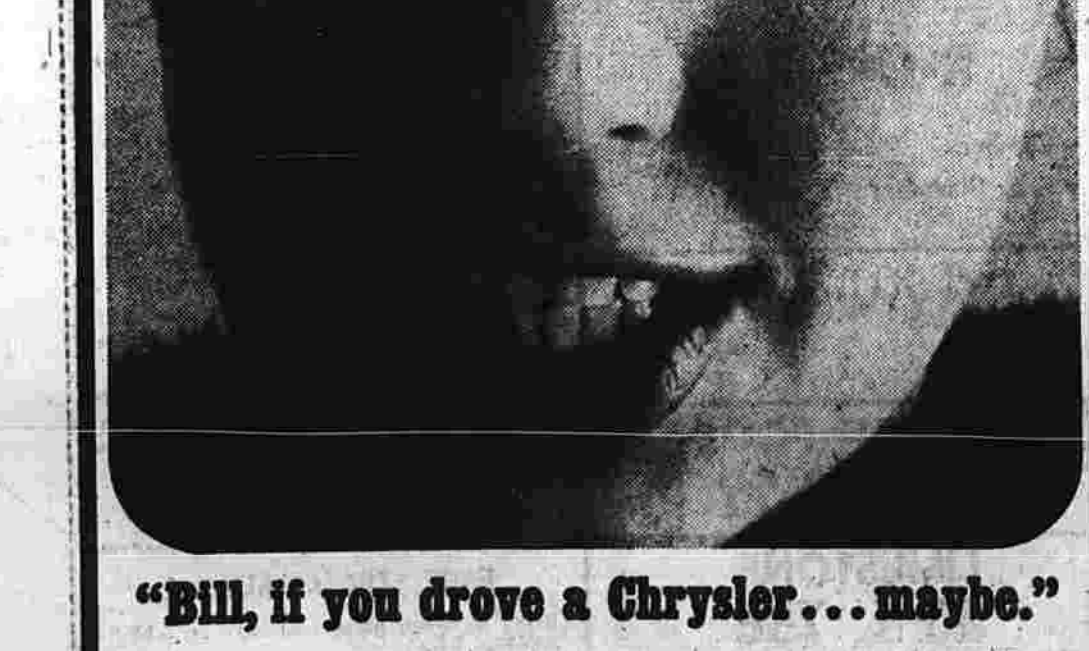

Which Way Contamination?

Our worry about the possible contamination which may be involved in the various space travels from time forward is something the opposite to that normally expressed. The normal worry seems to be over the possibility that whoever is landing on foreign surfaces, like the Russians in the case of Venus, may not have been sufficiently careful to decontaminate their space packages, with the result that we may be spreading some of our own germs to other planets.

What is burning Senator Kennedy in the evidence that the Russian diplomats can be placed under such special suspicion when they go abroad, if it is, somebody in the Johnson administration doesn't happen to like the cut of their ideologies.

Bolton Business Zone Is Extended For Fiano Shopping Center

The zoning commission, meeting after a public hearing last night, approved a request for a zone extension and denied two requests for zone changes. Approved was the request of Lawrence P. and Rose D. Fiano for the extension of the present 200-foot depth business zone into the 12.4 acres of interior land zoned R-2. Fiano plans to use the land, which is across Rts. 6 and 44A from Hilltop Motors for a shopping plaza.

Denied were a request by Ernest J. and Patricia S. Reed for a zone change from R-1 to general business for a parcel of land on Rt. 88, and a request by London Park Inc. for a similar change for a parcel of land on the corner of Rt. 88 and School Rd.

The public hearing, held in somewhat cramped quarters in the Fireplace Room, was attended by about 25 persons, including the principals. A tape recorder shrouded throughout the hearing, as the proponents and opponents of each request presented their views.

Recommendations by the town planning commission were not read until after all testimony was finished. That commission considered the Fiano request "excellent" and "in line with the general planning for the zone."

On the other hand, the planning commission wrote that it had "no merit in converting an isolated piece of property to business in both the Reed and London Park requests."

Fiano led off the discussion with a brief description, illustrated with blueprints of his proposed shopping plaza. He said he is planning on about 100,000 square feet of office and store area, which will be at least a million dollar enterprise. The buildings would be leased, he explained, except for a service station.

No one opposed the request. In answer to a question of the drainage, First Selectman Richard Morris said that the area, being mostly gravel, would provide excellent drainage.

Morris also noted that when Rt. 4 is relocated the present route will not be so heavily traveled. Also backing Fiano were Norman Freese, owner of an appliance store next to the property, who saw the plans as a chance to gain much-needed tax dollars; and Robert Murdoch, the London Park representative and a Bolton resident, who saw the zone change as one toward "the highest and best use of the property or stores."

The zoning board explained that its decision must be based on land use alone, much as its members are, individually, interested in broadening the tax base.

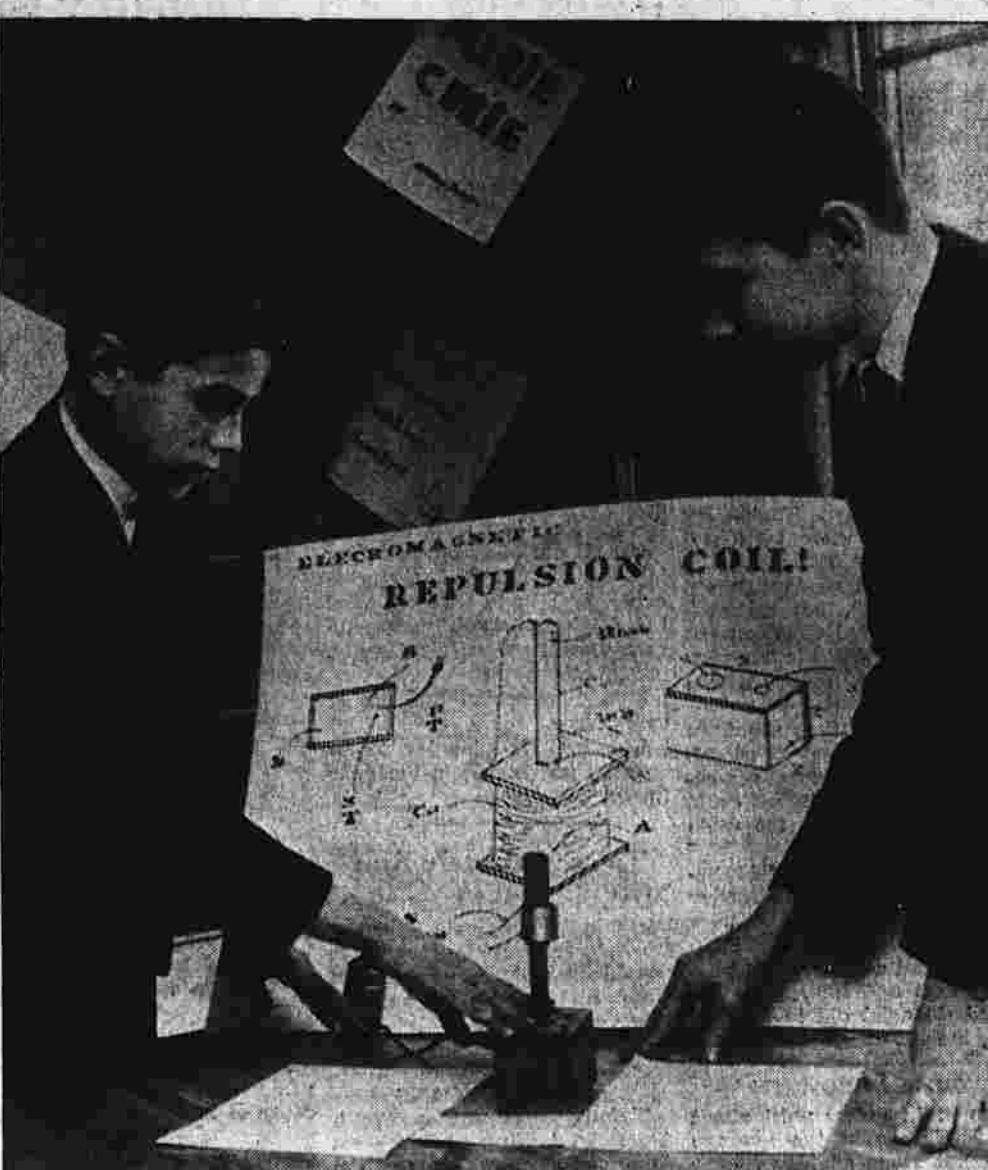

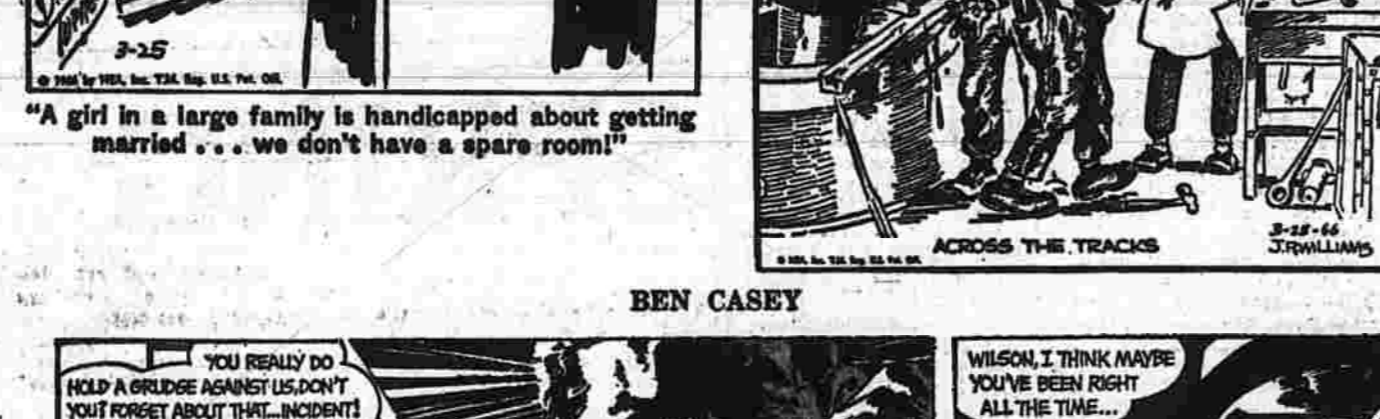
