Regional Desegregation Plan Of State Board of Education

A number of large cities in the United States have taken action to desegregate their schools in their schools. One of the techniques being seriously considered as a possible practice is the transportation of non-white children to suburban schools. This procedure is now being studied by the State Board of Education.

When this procedure is implemented, it is obvious that the educational opportunities will be improved or made more available.

Since the recommendation for transporting children to suburban Connecticut cities to suburban school districts has already been made and has received some acceptance, it is essential that a small scale demonstration program be based on a detailed instructional program be initiated so that the elimination of de facto segregation through the transportation of non-white children to suburban schools be anticipated as this type of practice increases.

Very recently, the climate in the Metropolitan District of Hartford has been stimulated to consider the feasibility of cooperative agreements between Hartford and nearby suburban towns to overcome the racial imbalance of the region. The Chamber of Commerce in Hartford has reacted favorably to the idea and presented by a study team from Harvard University. This Harvard Report recommended the transportation of non-white children from racially imbalanced schools in the City of Hartford to schools in suburban areas. This position of the Hartford Chamber of Commerce and the Harvard Report has resulted in a wide discussion of the transportation of children concept and considerable acceptance of the idea has been expressed. Consequently, it is the intention of this project to study the educational and selected activities associated with the transportation of non-white children from the inner city of Hartford to suburban schools for the elementary education.

The purpose of this study is to plan, implement and analyze the potential of a support instructional program for children transported to suburban schools as a means of reducing de facto segregation in inner-city schools. More specifically, this study is concerned with the following questions:

1. What are the characteristics of an instructional program needed for non-white children transported from inner-city to suburban schools?
2. What are the attitudinal patterns of white and non-white children when pupils are transported from inner-city to suburban schools?
3. What are the attitudinal patterns of adults when non-white children are transported from inner-city to suburban schools?
4. What are the educational efforts when non-white children are transported from inner-city to suburban schools?
5. What are the appropriate community programs which can be established when non-white children are transported from inner-city to suburban schools?

The need for a revision of segregated educational programs typical of metropolitan areas is the accumulation of considerable evidence that Negro children attending segregated schools do not achieve as well as their peers in either segregated or all white schools. Furthermore, the measurement of children's operational intelligence as shown by standardized tests, which are highly correlated to success in school, indicates a tendency toward decreasing school success for non-white children involved in segregated education.

Studies of attitudes of children, who attend segregated schools, indicate a generally negative attitude toward schools and teachers although they appear to feel that education is the only means of escaping from the poverty cycle. Other evidence indicates that experienced teachers who have a choice, frequently leave segregated schools for those in other parts of the city or in suburban systems. This results in having a great preponderance of new and inexperienced teachers, as well as long-term substitutes in inner-city schools. School buildings which house non-white children are usually located in low-income areas of the inner-city and tend to be older as well as less modern.

All of these circumstances come together to create a negative attitude toward the best interests of the children attending these inner-city schools.

1. Selection and distribution of children and teachers - who determine the non-white children who will participate in this study.
