Salve Offers Hope For Burn Treatment

Editor's note — A white salve presents hope for a leap ahead in the treatment of burns, one of the most frequent killers of people, especially children, and yet one of the least understood injuries. The salve was developed at the Brooke Army Medical Center.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Two years ago a 9-year-old boy with third-degree burns over 45 per cent of his body was rushed from England to Brooke Army Medical Center's burn ward here.

He was "moribund," the hospital term for near death. His burns, which had been suffered several days before, were grossly infected. He was in severe pain.

Doctors began applying to the boy's wounds a white creamy substance which looks and smells like the cold cream of a woman puts on her face at night.

Within three days, the boy was bright-eyed, feeling better and even managing a smile. "We got a Christmas card from him this year," Col. John A. Moncrief, head of the burn ward, said recently. "He's growing and feeling well."

Moncrief said the boy was one of the first patients to benefit from the white salve. In two years since, Brooke hospital reports it has been able to reduce its burn mortality rate by almost half by using the cream.

It's called miltanymon cream. A new application of an older drug called miltanymon which the Germans used in World War II and in medical experiments on humans.

Development of the cream was possible only after recent discoveries on the nature of burns, which Moncrief said had been a largely neglected area of research.

A large burn throws the whole body into a severe strain, and death can come quickly by shock, or gradually through kidney or liver failure, infection, internal failure or pneumonia.

Burns are not like other injuries which can be treated and then allowed to heal. Burns often must be cared for day after day, sometimes for months.

Even miltanymon's healing processes must be closely watched. The body lays down over burns a thick, insulating scar tissue which can contract joints and rend limbs immovable and useless.

About 8,000 people die each year from burns — half of them children. Chances for surviving a burn over 50 per cent of the body have improved little in the last 30 years.

Infection is the greatest danger in burns, but ordinary means of treating infection do not work because circulation to the burned area is destroyed. Before the loss of circulation was discovered, burn patients had been treated with massive injections of antibiotics, with little effect.

Without use of the cream, Moncrief said, burns often have bacteria counts of 10 million to one million per gram of tissue. The cream can cut the count to about 10,000 per gram.

The increases the odds for survival by halting the progressive cell injury, he said. The cream has proved most effective in saving patients with third-degree burns on 21 to 30 per cent of their bodies.

Congress Set To Extend Time On Medicare

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress is ready, without apparently eager to grant President Johnson's request for an extension of the deadline for older citizens to sign up for 48-month doctors' bills insurance under the new medical care program.

The only question was whether it would act before the Easter recess starts next Thursday or wait until legislative business is resumed on April 18.

The original deadline expired at midnight Thursday night with the number signing up estimated at near 90 per cent — some 17 million of the 19.1 million Americans over 65. The President requested a two-month extension.

Other patients nearby, more advanced in their healing and past the constant pain, looked at him occasionally as they talked. They didn't turn away as do many who visit the ward.

They understood. They had been there themselves.

A budget is a fiscal plan with a dollar sign in front of it. As in your home budget it involves the balancing of needs against the ability to pay for them. Unlike the household budget, income is more flexible in the government budget by using the simple expedient of raising the taxes.

GENERAL COMMENTS:

In taking an objective look at Manchester over the past few months since my appointment, the following observations that have budget implications are worthy of mention.

1. Manchester is at a crossroads in its development. Depending upon vital decisions made in the next few years, the town can either look forward to continued residential development without the concurrent development of nonresidential tax producers (which means ever increasing taxes) or to balanced growth with industrial and commercial development keeping pace with residential development (which can mean tax stabilization).

2. During the postwar rapid residential growth period, the only capital needs of the town that have been satisfactorily met are in the area of the construction of new school facilities. The emphasis on schools is understandable since physical requirements were so apparent and the townpeople were willing to satisfy these needs.

3. The present awareness on the part of the Federal Government of the fact that we are now an urban rather than a rural community has resulted in revolutionary new Federal programs affecting cities and towns. This change of emphasis is affecting our State Government as well.

4. With the advent of Electronic Data Processing as a practical management tool, we should prepare for the utilization of this modern approach to the handling of information.

5. Very careful analysis should precede investments in the field of Data Processing. Various approaches for cooperative arrangements should be explored including regional or sub-regional Data Processing centers.

6. There is a serious problem of communication in keeping the various appointed Boards and Committees and the full-time Town staff informed of each other's activities. In some cases this means duplication of effort by several groups or individuals and in other cases no activity or group being involved where there is a crucial need.

7. The General Manager's Office must be organized to coordinate all activities of the Town and to keep the Board of Directors well informed. At the same time, the Manager's Office must be staffed in such a way as to provide him with the time to devote to economic development and long-range planning for these two activities cannot be effectively delegated to others.

8. There appears to be a discrepancy in salary and working conditions between the Board of Education and the Town. This is obvious when salaries for administrative personnel are compared.

9. It would seem appropriate for the Board of Directors and Board of Education to appoint a continuing joint committee to explore means of equalizing salaries between the two agencies of the Town.

10. In the preparation of the budget that follows, the above concepts have motivated my thinking and recommendations. For example, in order to establish a climate and conditions attractive for industrial development, the tax rate has been held at the present level. This will mean difficulties for nearly every spending agency, and the deferment of many justified improvements or changes. It means also that no expenditures for capital improvements are recommended to come from current funds but rather from a long-term bond issue to permit us to catch up with some urgent but previously deferred improvements.

11. It assumes cooperation with the Eighth Utilities District and the Manchester Water Company in order to coordinate water and sewer extensions to attractive industrial areas. And it provides for added emphasis on the planning function in order to meet tomorrow's needs as well as satisfying today's demands.

12. Finally, the General Manager will emphasize economic development. Not only will this be the most important activity for the General Manager but each and every Town employee, and agency will become part of the team organized for this vital purpose.

13. The Department Heads and others concerned with budget preparations have shown a keen awareness of the problems of the taxpayer. The complete cooperation of these individuals has made my task of stabilizing the tax rate an easier one than it might have been had attitudes been different. The Board of Directors and townpeople can take justifiable pride in the loyalty and competence of their employees.

14. Manchester is an unusual community in the initiative and resourcefulness of individual people as exemplified by the program for the retarded, the Lutz Museum and the Manchester Memorial Hospital. This same zeal applied toward problems of development can assure good results.

This was not the time for the polls to be wrong, and Prime Minister Harold Wilson and his Labour Party have the parliamentary landslide the polls predicted.

It is a little difficult to realize that such a handsome parliamentary margin is based on no more than a 40 per cent of the popular vote, which makes it actually a minority victory.

Two side thoughts suggest themselves. First, the British got the one over with in very swift order, there being hardly more than three weeks time to elapse between the calling of the election and the coming of the vote.

One reservation has to be stated, however. In the past, the national election campaign parties are one and the same; the leaders of the two sides have been conducting their campaign on national issues as a regular part of their procedure and responsibility.
