

A Highly Divisible Freedom

As the war in Vietnam intensifies, an old cliche of doubtful validity is being resurrected: Freedom, it is said, is in divisible; more concretely, loss of free-

To some the words have an agree able ring, what with their overtones of Lincoln's rejection of a nation half slave and half free and the later visions of "one world." But we think they miss the point about the U.S. presence in Vietnam and to that extent only help confuse an already murky issue.

It is hypothetically probable, to begin with, that if the whole world outside these shores were in the grip of a super-dictatorship, the security and hence, the freedom of this country would be menaced because such a di storship would almost certainly have designs on it. That nightmarish poss though, is short on realism; how lifficult it is to establish and maintain a nearly global hegemony can be see Kremlin's loosening hold on the Euro-

History, moreover, offers scant evidence that freedom is indivisible. Infectious it can be at times (so too can authoritarism trends), but relatively free nations have often coexisted with relatively unfree ones. At times, in fact, the

It mything, the dictator seemed to be rying to avoid a military clash with the U.S., and essentially we went to war with him because he was on a genocidal rampage and creating monstrous conditions or the millions he did not kill.

Since World War II the U.S. has had to live under the incessant threat of war, and the actuality of it in Korea from the Communist regimes. That is one thing; it is quite another to conclude that the mere existence of Communist alave-states imperils freedon here. Only when they go on the warpath do they endanger others' liberty, and even then they have shied away from direct attack on the U.S.

When it comes to Vietnam the theory of indivisible freedom appears especiali weak. The first assumption must be that the Vietnamese have a long history as free men, which is hardly so in any sense Americans would recognize. The U.S. wants them to be able to develop and enjoy free institutions, but by all accounts few Vietnamese believe freedom is their purpose in fighting if they understand the concept at

Nor would the loss of Vietnam, much as the U.S. is struggling to avoid it, automatically constitute a danger this country. Here again it would largely depend on what the Communists went on to do, and particularly whether they indicated an intention and capacity to attack the U.S.

Now these remarks are not meant as an argument against the U.S. involvement in Vietnam. On the contrary, i can be reasonably argued that since in the long run an expanding Red China could pose a threat to American security, it is better to be on the safe side and contain China now, as close to its borders as possible. It can be further argued that if Peking learns the lesson that aggression will not be allowed to pay, Vietnam will have served the fu-

ture peace of the world. All we are saying is that consider the idea of indivisible freedom. The cold truth about freedom is that it is a fragile flower which requires special sofis for its nurturing and consequently

What it takes to get and keep freedom, American-style, is a high degree of political sophistication and a fairly complicated legal system to prevent tyranny from rising, plus a considerable amount of good will toward one's fellow man. These commodities having been notably lacking in most parts of the world most of the time, so has lib-

erty been mostly absent.

The gulf between communism and democracy itself shows how thoroughly divisible freedom is. Much as we may want liberty for all peoples, it is mis-leading to imply that only thus can we hope to preserve our own. If a supposed interdependence of freedom were the main reason for being in Vietnam,

### **Key Photos** Lacking in Police Show

By OYNTHIA LOWBY NEW YORK (AP) - CBS News made a valiant effort Tuesday night to present a subject much in the headlines and plaguing a large segment of the civilian, law enforcement

and legal community. It involves allegations of police brutality and disregard of the rights of the accused on one hand and stringent legal reon the other.

"OBS Reports," - presented the tangled and emotionwrapped subject in some sort of understandable visual form. But it failed simply because it was impossible to get shots to illustrate the vital points.

"The Policeman's Lot" summarized the problem by narration and the usual statements by authorities and experts. It quoted the awesome statistics - 14 serious crimes per 1,000 population, a 13 per cent increase in crime last year over 1964, New York City police alone receiving more than four million telephone calls a year, most of them for help, 25 per cent of all big city arrests for drunkenness and vagrancy.

But when it comes to illustrating the heart of the matter, there were no pictures of policemen interrogating a suspect, and no film showing a suggestion of police brutality.

The program was at its best when it focused on the smaller, more human aspects of police work.
