

Nobody's Loved On Another's Soil

Not many days ago, we examined in his space what seemed the rather daring and fantastic theory advanced by Joseph C. Harsch, Christian Science Monitor columnist, about what had been happening in Indonesia. A victory against Communism had been taking place in that country, Harsch theorized, because the United States had had sense enough to stay away from the situation there. Our best friends there, he wrote, had implored us to diminish our role. The more we seemed to want to take part in Indonesia's internal struggle, the theory was, the more difficult we made the role of those native Indonesians who wanted to be rid of

the Communists. This theory may seem, to most of us. still a hopeless mixture of the plausible and the fantastic.

But there has been, in the past few days, something quite parallel and comparable going on in South Vietnam. There it has been conceded that Premier Ky was weakened among his own countrymen, not strengthened among hem, by the famous official embrace he received at Honolulu from the President

of the United States. There it has been conceded that just about the worst thing we could do in our effort to keep Premier Ky in power is to show our own military fist on his side of his struggle with his civilian

There it is being increasingly admitted that the presence of Americans in South Vietnam grows continually more controversial, and that, ironically enough, the popularity of our presence seems to diminish in proportion to the degree of military success we obtain out

All this is difficult for all of us, who like to think of ourselves as on the side of the angels, and as volunteers fighting other people's battles for them without demanding anything in particular for ourselves, to even begin to under-But it is actually a very old law of

what might be called a density of occupation. The more men we have in Vietnam, and the more killing they succeed in doing, the less our popularity in Vietnam is going to be. On the other hand, our rating among the Vietnamese is likely to begin going up after we have, some day, finally evacuated ourselves from the country.

This is an old law of nations, peoples, and occupations. We are a littlé surprised and shocked when it applies to us as it has applied, in the past, to the Romans, the Chinese, the British, the French, and the Russians whenever they have been assuming responsibilities outside their own borders. We consider ourselves better and more benevolent than any of these, but what we think of ourselves, or whatever real degrees of difference there may be, doesn't wipe out the influence of the basic formula: Outsiders are always being resented.





\$2.6 Million Sewer System Proposed

Plans for a proposed sewer system along Rt. 5, at an estimated \$2.6 million, have been announced by Richard Reeves, shairman of the town sewer

The proposal calls for about six miles of sewers to be constructed through the major por-tion of the town's industrial area, along with the trunk lines needed to carry the sewage to a proposed treatment plant off Vibert Rd.

If approved at a town referendum, the project will require an initial increase in the tax mill rate anticipated at 2.2 mills, decreasing to a low of a half mill over a period of 20 years, Reeves said.

The town will realize income of approximately \$350,000 from sewer assessments to be paid by abutting property owners. The sum will be used to help pay off the bonds to be issued by the town for the project. The commission noted that the installation of a sewage system will foster continued indus-trial growth, and estimated that additional growth would "pay for the system in 10 years." "From studies made in other

towns and in South Windsor, installation of a sewer system will double the town's industrial growth," Reeves said. "Some 35 per cent of the annual growth in South Windsor is in the industrial area, and, with the installation of sewers, this should be raised to 50 per Approximately 950 acres of industrial land will be made available for development in the Rt. 5 area with the installa-

tion of the sewers, the commis-Final cost figures will be determined after the project is let out for bid. The estimated costs have been determined b consulting engineers, based on their experience and evaluation of recent bid prices.

"The estimated costs are considered to be a realistic appraisal of the final costs that will be encountered," the commis-




