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Verion GOP Rips Mayor's Budget, Says It Is 'Irresponsible'

Republican Town Committee Chairman Thomas G. Carveth and the GOP Town Committee have leveled a blast at the town budget, and are calling for its immediate repeal.

In a statement issued today, Carveth, a member of the town board of representatives (Council), said the town committee has issued instructions to form a committee to work with many groups or individuals in an effort to reduce the mayor's budget.

Carveth said he hopes "that the budget as presented is not a psychological or political gimmick" of the mayor to hoodwink the taxpayers into accepting an eight or nine mill rate increase with the feeling that the administration of their government have done them a favor or that the Democratic administration is especially "run their government."

Carveth said that the town committee is not a resolution, urging all town boards, agencies, groups or individuals, including the board of representatives, to re-examine the budget. He said that there is no question of dishonoring the action.

The motion passed by the town committee is:

"Whereas the mayor's financial irresponsibility in presenting to the board of representatives a budget that would necessitate a tax increase of 11 mills, over and above the six mill increase imposed on the taxpayers last year, the Republican Town Committee hereby urges the board of representatives and all other boards, agencies, groups and individuals in the town of Verion to re-examine the mayor's budget for items in the said budget that can be eliminated or cut, and further urges that all department heads review their budget requests and withdraw all requests for all items that can be deferred to a future budget."

Lawyers Hopeful in Plea For American POWs' Safety

WASHINGTON (AP) — A small group of southern New Jersey lawyers expressed optimism today on its efforts to provide the legal rights of the more than 60 Americans taken prisoner by the North Vietnamese.

Patrick T. McGahn Jr., an Atlantic City lawyer who headed the Society for the Defense of American Prisoners in North Viet Nam, said its proposal was being forwarded to Ho Chi Minh, president of North Viet Nam.

"After many weeks of waiting," McGahn said in an interview, "we have just received word that our proposal has been forwarded to Viet Nam through the embassy of the United Arab Republic."

McGahn's proposal to Ho Chi Minh asks for permission to allow the society to visit Hanoi to discuss the terms of the 1948 Geneva Convention regarding prisoners held by detaining power.

"We hope that we might be afforded the opportunity to visit the prisoners who are being detained by your government," the proposal asserts.

"I'm satisfied if they will tell me there is no need to go because they intend to abide by the Geneva Convention," McGahn said. He was in Washington the past few days working on his project.

"But only recently, Nguyen Xuan, the North Viet Nam ambassador to Beirut, said in Cairo Americans will be treated like criminals," he said. "If that's going to happen I think they're wrong."

Rep. Cornelius E. Gallagher, D-N.J., and Peter H.B. Frelinghuysen, R-N.J., members of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, have publicly announced their joint support of the society's aims.

It also has received the support of the New Jersey Bar Association.

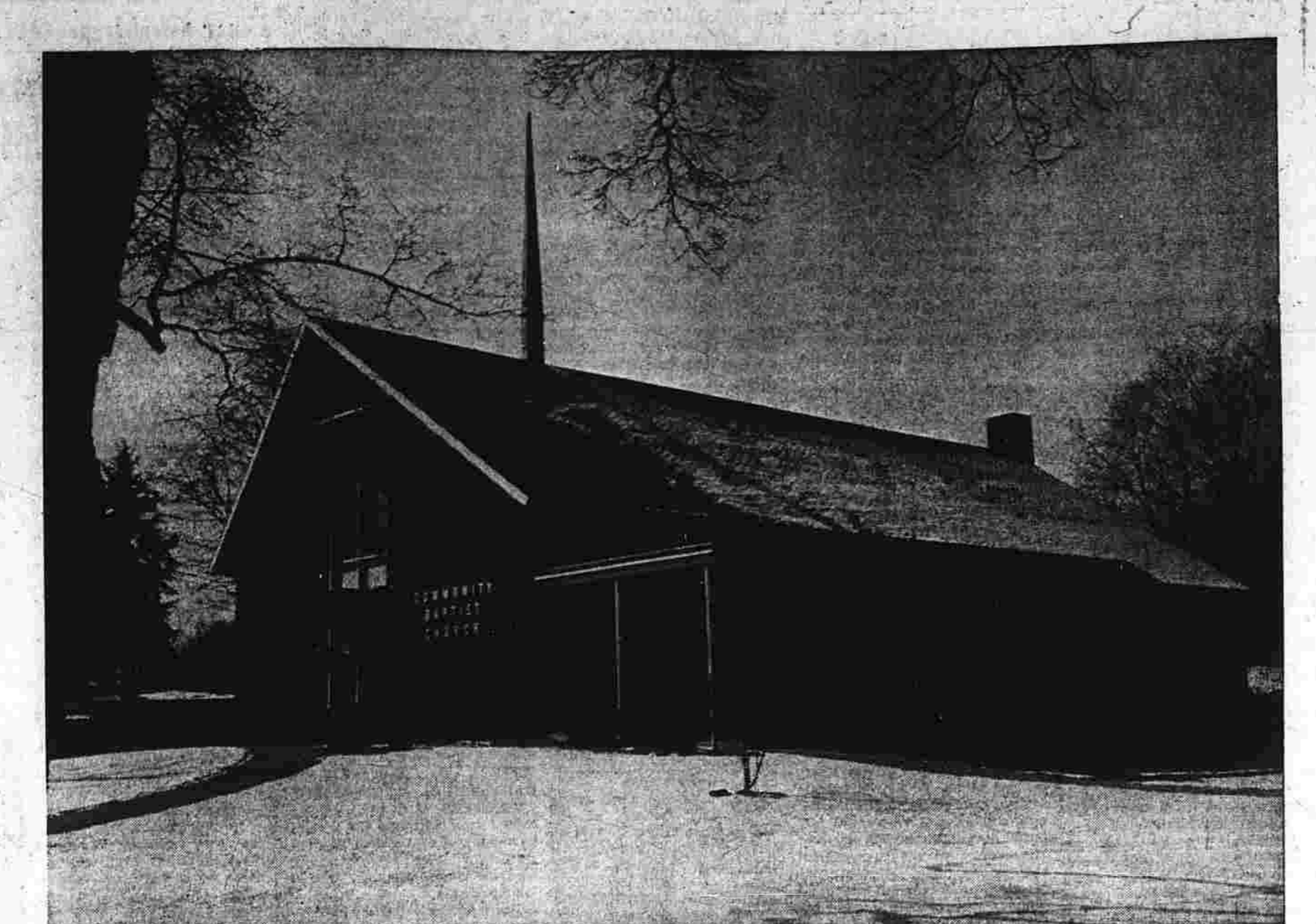
It is a good time, what with the state of the world being what it is, for some real treasure to be troved.

Not many days ago, we examined in this space what seemed the rather daring and fantastic theory advanced by Joseph C. Hirsch, Christian Science Monitor columnist, about what has been happening in Indonesia.

Lewis asked him a question, "We all have constructive criticism, it insures the continuation of a true democratic government, but the other kind, the destructive criticism, is unwelcome."

"In the short time I have been in Manchester," he said, "I have come to admire the great pride and the evident ability which our town employees have in their work, and I think that it is unfair to attack them for no apparent reason."

Weiss defended his proposed budget, including the recommended \$2.5 million bond issue, saying, "Government is a service activity and yes, nothing else. You get more value for your dollar spent for taxes than you get for any dollar spent for other services or commodities."

He said, "Manchester is at the crossroads of its history and is facing great pressures and changes. The question which we must resolve is, 'Will we plan our future now, or will we let things slide, to be decided as the pressures mount and become urgent?'"

"If we plan now," he said, "we can keep Manchester the fine residential town that it is, and still provide for some industrial development, so that we may broaden the tax base."

"With the excellent job which has been done for schools," Weiss said, "the time has come to catch up with some of our other needs—sewers, water, roads and the like."

Weiss, speaking after about half of the 600 attendees had left, drew applause for his remarks.

Frank Lupien of 21 Sunset St. last night's first speaker, called the budget proposal an arbitrary, dictatorial attitude, education is dominated by ex-school teachers who don't have the gumption to stand up for the people of Manchester."

He scoffed at a 32-signature petition, backing the busing proposal, which had been submitted to the board of education by Manchester High School students, and said, "The school board should rather listen to the parents—the taxpayers."

He suggested, "Let Curtis devote full-time to Manchester problems and let Hartford handle its own problems."

Lupien called the board of education budget "padded" and asked the board of directors to trim it down even before Weiss' \$300,000 cut, so that it would be "for Manchester children only."

Frank Sinsigall of 30 Falknor Dr., addressing himself to "Manchester's homeowners," said, "We have elected men and women who aren't doing their work, and if they don't like their jobs, we should tell them to get out."

He said, "We don't want to just hold the line—we want a five-mill decrease, and if the directors don't give it to us we contact the governor and the state's attorney general."

Charles Blisset of 99 Frances Dr., president of the Manchester YR (Young Republicans) Club, asked, "Are we trying to increase inflation in Manchester?"

After hitting the need for an administrative assistant and for an assistant for the planning department, he said, "We are not living by civil law but by Parkinson's Law—everytime we add someone, we add others by his recommendation that no 'assistant manager' be hired and that Curtis be denied his \$1,300 proposed raise. Curtis now is paid \$18,000 annually and would get \$20,000 under the proposal. The suggestion is to increase his salary and numbers. It is comparing taxes—we should go forward, not backward."

As has been his habit in recent years, he defended the board of education's budget, but he said it is important for us to keep our teachers in a competitive salary range."

He said that the public must resign itself to the answer to one question, "Who do you want to educate your children next school year—the experienced teachers that we now have, or the inexperienced teachers that we are hiring from out of state?"

\$2.6 Million Sewer System Proposed

Plans for a proposed sewer system along Rt. 6 at an estimated \$2.6 million, have been announced by Richard Reeves, chairman of the town sewer commission.

The proposal calls for about six miles of sewers to be constructed through the major portion of the town's industrial area, along with the trunk lines needed to carry the sewage to a proposed treatment plant off Vibert Rd.

If approved at a town referendum, the project will require an initial increase in the tax mill rate anticipated at 2.2 mills, decreasing to a low of a half mill over a period of 20 years, Reeves said.

The town will realize income of approximately \$350,000 from sewer assessments to be paid by abutting property owners. The sum will be used to help pay off the bonds to be issued by the town for the project.

The commission noted that the installation of a sewer system will foster continued industrial growth, and estimated that additional growth would "pay for the system in 10 years."

"From studies made in other towns and in South Windsor, installation of a sewer system will double the estimated industrial growth," Reeves said.

"Some 85 per cent of the annual growth in South Windsor is in the industrial area, and with the installation of sewers, this should be raised to 90 per cent," he continued.

Approximately 500 acres of industrial land will be made available for development in the Rt. 6 area with the installation of the sewers, the commission said.

Final cost figures will be determined after the project is let out for bid. The estimated costs have been determined by consulting engineers, based on their experience and evaluation of recent bid prices.

"The estimated costs are considered to be a realistic appraisal of the final costs that will be encountered," the commission noted.

The proposed treatment plant will be designed eventually to handle the sewage collected from the entire town, for a minimum of 20 years. If additional facilities are needed then, the area is adequate for expansion.

The plant, equipped with primary treatment facilities, will be designed for expansion to secondary treatment in the future, when the state requires higher degrees of treatment of sewage, the commission said.

A number of reports have noted the falling of subsurface disposal systems, the commission said.

"A sewerage system will eliminate the possibility of contamination of surface and ground water supplies where public water is not available," the commission noted.

In June, 1961, a six-man sanitary study committee, appointed by the board of selectmen, submitted a request for immediate preparation of a preliminary report. In November, 1962, an application was made to the federal Housing and Home Finance Agency for a planning advance to finance a preliminary study of a sewer system.

The preliminary report was completed in July, 1963, and contained an overall outline for developing a sewer system throughout the town, in logical stages. The report was studied

health reports indicating that areas of the town are becoming polluted, the commission said.
