**South Windsor Developers Win Appeals For Conventual Homes**

The zoning board of appeals has granted the request of two conventual home developers for variances to allow construction of the homes in the Main St. area.

The board reversed the decision of Building Inspector Donald McLaughlin and said they found that there had been diligent pursuit of preliminary planning and construction of the permits.

The board said the conventual homes would be the most suitable use for the land. The decision noted that in the LaFrance property, a portion of the land was sold after the permit was originally granted which resulted in limited use of the remaining land.

The board also ruled that the extension of the building permit would not expire until May 30. The decision said that the applicants had spent both considerable time and money and they had made certain contractual agreements based on the permits.

"We feel that in the interest of fair play and justice, these permits should be allowed to continue with their plans," the board said.

Attorneys for the petitioners presented their cases to the zoning board of appeals and 15 town residents last night.

Permits originally issued for the conventual homes were revoked by the town building inspector following a non-compliance hearing on May 10. Under the zoning regulations, the homes would be non-conforming use.

Francis C. Vignati, attorney for Diane and Paul LaFrance, recent home on Indent Rd. noted that the permit was revoked on May 23. He said the property in question was purchased by LaFrance in April, 1965 and contained 36 acres.

LaFrance applied for a residential subdivision use and the application was denied by the planning and zoning commission and traffic control conditions.

Vignati said LaFrance applied for an extension of the permit in November and was granted an extension until February.

In January, LaFrance applied for a variance to allow a 150-foot lot on Main St. before the hearing on the appeal was heard, the zone was changed from R-1 to A-1.

In February of this year, LaFrance applied for a second extension and it was granted until May 20 within a week or so after the extension was granted, the permit was revoked, the attorney said.

Mrs. LaFrance said the proposed site of the home would be some 800 feet from Main St. with the building facing Indent Rd. She called attention to the dense woods from the rear of the property to Main St. and the natural boundary of a brook on the land that divides the property in half from Main St. to Indent Rd.

Vignati said the hardship involved in the matter lay on the fact that a portion of the land sold on Main St. was done contingent on the permit for the conventual home.

Several residents of the immediate area spoke in favor of the restoration of the permit. Michael Paul of Indent Rd. noted that no contact had been made by members of the commission with residents of the street. He called attention to the fact that

### Westhill Work Near Finished

The 100-unit addition to Westhill Gardens, housing for the elderly, is fast nearing completion and is scheduled for a July dedication, according to a progress report issued by Leon Biederlin, executive director of the Manchester Housing Authority.

The 18-building project, being constructed by the Green Meter Construction Co. at a cost of \$1,645,000, will be completed two months before the deadline date.

Biederlin reports that the masonry, roof-shingling, and the main and loops of the rough heating installation are all 100 per cent complete.

Batteries have been installed in 14 of the buildings, with 11 already piped to the main and loops, and the installation of baseboard heating units has been started in all of the apartments.

The cast-iron and copper installation of the rough plumbing has been completed in 14 buildings and the installation of the kitchen and bathroom sub-floors are 88 per cent complete.

The porch trim is 100 per cent complete, the glazing 90 per cent, and the insulation 70 per cent. The dry walls are 70 per cent installed, the taping of the dry walls is 46 per cent complete, and the finish floor, which is 95 per cent installed. The kitchen and bathroom sub-floors are 88 per cent complete.

In exterior work, the roads and curbs are 85 per cent complete, the rough grading 90 per cent, gas service lines, site plumbing lines, and site sanitary lines, all 100 per cent complete, and site electric lines, 90 per cent.

### Several Financial Issues Before Directors Tuesday

The board of directors Tuesday night will consider a \$100,000 allocation for architect's fees for the drawing of preliminary plans and specifications for a proposed new 12-room elementary school in the Garden-Spring St. area.

The board of education, on March 14, endorsed a proposal that the new school be built on a 20-acre town-owned site, and that it consists of one kindergarten room, three primary and six intermediate rooms, and two special rooms for retarded pupils.

The school board, in recommending the new facility, has said that it would take care of the area's needs for the next five or six years, and that it would relieve the overcrowding of South School for the next two years.

The board of directors, meeting at 8 p.m. in the Municipal Building, will also consider several other allocations and appropriations, with four of the latter scheduled for public hearings:

1. A proposed additional appropriation of \$21,047 to the fund of education for the "Operation Head Start" program, scheduled to start on Monday and end on July 1. The appropriation would be financed by an equal grant from the federal government.
2. A proposed additional appropriation of \$2,000 to the library board, for purchase of the latter's books, grants, and financed by an equal grant, already received, from the state.
3. A proposed additional appropriation of \$1,500 to the planning and zoning account, to pay for the services of Wilbur Smith, Associates of New Haven, for conducting a traffic study. The appropriation would be financed from the Other Revenue—Miscellaneous income account of the General Fund.
4. A proposed additional appropriation of \$7,500 to the planning and zoning account, to pay for the services of Wilbur Smith, Associates of New Haven, for conducting a traffic study. The appropriation would be financed from the Other Revenue—Miscellaneous income account of the General Fund.

### Vernon Mayor Brands as 'Assinine' Carruthers' Budget Critique

Mayor Thomas J. McCusker has replied to charges of fiscal irresponsibility in preparing a budget for the town made by Republican Town Chairman Thomas Carruthers, and has countercharged that Carruthers has made an "assinine" statement.

"Surely Mr. Carruthers knows that I merely forward the education budget to the board, and take no action on it."

"Mr. Carruthers is one of six Republican members of the board of representatives," McCusker continued. "The board must approve any budget, so he has a ready-made committee to study it."

The mayor charged that Carruthers is often absent from board meetings, and does not always participate in town decisions.

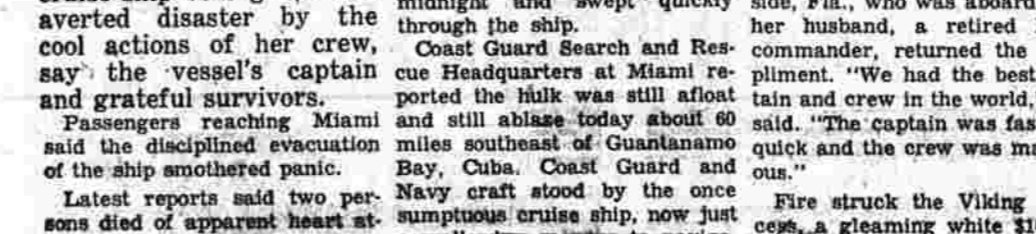

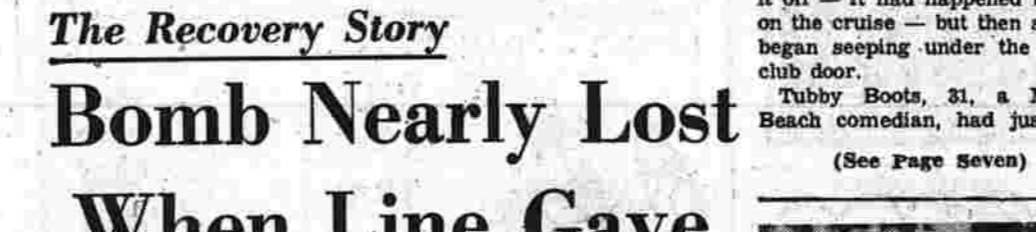

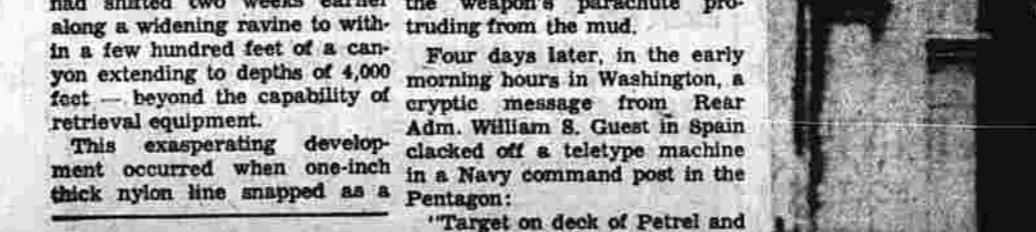

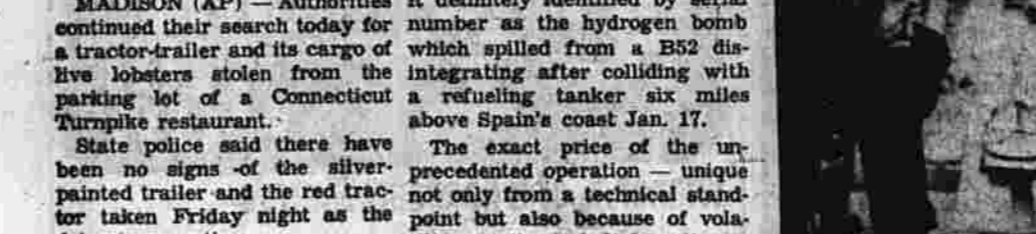
