SEATO has had the incongruity of having more non-Asian than Asian members. Its greatest distinction has been that it occasionally serves as the Johnson Administration's explanation of our role in South Vietnam, not because the alliance itself has taken any action but because we, who happen to be one of its members, have volunteered to take action for it there.

As for NATO, the current headlines are full of its difficulties, which, in this instance, are sometimes discussed as it they stemmed merely from the difficult personality of President de Gaulle.

But the troubles and weaknesses and impermanences of such regional power politics alliances are built into them by very people who organize them in the first place. The world is always lucky if such alliances somehow manage to fade away without bringing on the very kind of war they are supposedly designed to prevent.

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)-The U.S. Air Force reported today that the first B52 raid on North Viet Nam set off huge landslides which sealed the strategic Mu Gia Pass through which the Communists funnel men and supplies to the Viet Cong in South Viet Nam.

The report of the B52 success came on the heels of a Viet Cong mortar attack early today on Saigon's huge military and civilian airport which killed seven U.S. servicemen and a Vietnamese civilian, wounded 108 American military men, one American civilian and 19 Vietnamese, destroyed four planes and set a 400,000- gallon fuel The airport attack demonstrated once more the power of the
