WHEN IN HOT WATER CLIMB OUT QUICKLY

When today's hand was played in the recent national team championship, one of the world's most famous bridge players found himself in hot water. There was a pass out, but his foot slipped.

Opening lead — Jack of Hearts.

After much thought South allowed West to hold the first trick with the jack of hearts. West led his other heart to dummy's king, and declarer led dummy's queen of clubs to force out the ace.

East returned the queen of hearts to South's ace. Now South had to hope that West had the ace of spades and that he could manage to get three clubs, three spades, two hearts and one diamond. For this purpose he had to lead a 3-3 break in clubs, a successful finesse against the jack of spades, and a split in the two black aces.

It was too much to hope for. East turned up with the ace of spades and the rest of his hearts to defeat the contract. South was lucky to go down only one.

South had a better chance for his contract. Even if East had both of the missing aces, which was a near certainty, the con-

### 40 Testify In License 'Fix' Probe

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Forty-five witnesses have testified before Superior Court Judge Ayala P. Lioiselle on alleged payoffs to fix state's motor license suspension system.

Lioiselle called a halt to scheduled testimony Wednesday, and called an "indefinite recess" in his one-man grand jury probe of the State Motor Vehicle Department.

No hint of the possible outcome of the closed-door probe was given by the judge, who said it would take about a week for the court reporter to transcribe all the testimony.

Then Lioiselle will review it, but he said that the probe is not over, and he might call more witnesses if he feels it necessary.

There will be no delay in issuing a report on the probe to the Superior Court, Lioiselle added, but he left open the question of whether the findings will be made public.

State's Atty. George R. Tierman requested Superior Court investigation after an initial probe by his office and state police.

Four months ago that the case began with a report that a New Haven man had paid \$500 and \$1,000 to get his license returned.

Tierman said six weeks ago that the initial probe had been stymied by a lack of subpoena power. The court's powers over the state's motor vehicle department are limited.

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### Tiede in Viet Nam Huts of Horror; Houses of Hope

LONG BINH, Viet Nam — (NHA) — The unpainted, unpretentious, round-roofed buildings are settled in the dust of a small hillside. Each one is newly constructed but already drying and aging under a sun with no shade.

They are the wards of a war hospital.

Up here one rests with part of his leg bone removed.

Between them is the mutilated victim of an exploding mine.

Three beds off the end of one wing, two attendants are placing an oxygen tent around a GI with several bullet holes in him. Those who can see watch in grim solemnity.

"It's a bad sign," one of them whispers.

"Two of them like that yesterday."

"Wish I was asleep."

The men tighten their eyes and look away. They think of other things . . . of home and children and neighbors and times made ancient by artillery and armed assaults.

They, the inmates of this war hospital, are also the daily spectators of its pain, its doom, its files, its dust and its moaning, mangled men.

Few others have observed the sights and suffering here. And that is the pity.

Every man should witness this . . . and remember it.

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### Injured Whale Shot to Death

### South Windsor Small Hearing Crowd Likes Council's School Proposals

The town council's \$2,600,430 recommended budget for the board of education was presented to a sparsely attended public hearing last night.

The residents at the hearing voted, after taking part in a discussion of proposed budget cuts, to ask the council to re-approve the rest of the council's budget as presented.

Mayor James Throws that, under the town charter, the council is required to hold a public hearing on the budget and that a straw vote on the budget would be taken of the citizens attending.

The mayor said the board of education presented a budget of \$2,714,324 to the council for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, 1966. Following an analysis of the school board's request, the council recommended a reduction of the budget by \$33 per projected-student, for a total cut of \$166,222 in additional duties beyond the board's cuts.

The school board, meeting in special session, has selected areas where cuts totaling \$80,673 would probably be made. The council then asked an additional \$23,200 be deleted from the budget.

The only area where the school board felt suggested cuts could be made without impairing the quality of service was a \$23,500 item which represented a new method of projecting the cost of new teaching positions and the difference between the salaries of experienced teachers resigned to date and the cost of replacement teachers, the board said.

The mayor said the budget was being presented at the public hearing to allow questions and comments from town residents. He noted that, while the budget is not based on the hearing's consensus, part of the council's deliberations are dependent on what the public says.

Donald A. Giza, T-1 Governor Highway, asked that the general criteria used to formulate the budget be made available to the public. He commented that this would enable the public to understand the means of arriving at budget figures and permit a better assay of the budget.

James Nay, Foster St., commented on the difference between the board recommended figures and those recommended by the council, and asked for an explanation.

Mayor Throws replied that, while it is the duty of the town council to set the total amount

### Jobless Claims Up 10 in Week

Unemployment compensation claims filed last week in the Manchester office of the Connecticut Labor Department rose slightly by two per cent, with 461 claims filed for the week ending April 9, compared to 471 claims filed for the week ending April 2.

The entire increase was reflected in the Rockville sub-office, where claims rose by 11 per cent, with 117 claims filed for the week ending April 2, to 89 for last week. Claims filed throughout the state last week dropped by 850 as to a total of 17,777. During the corresponding period last year, 17,800 claims were filed.

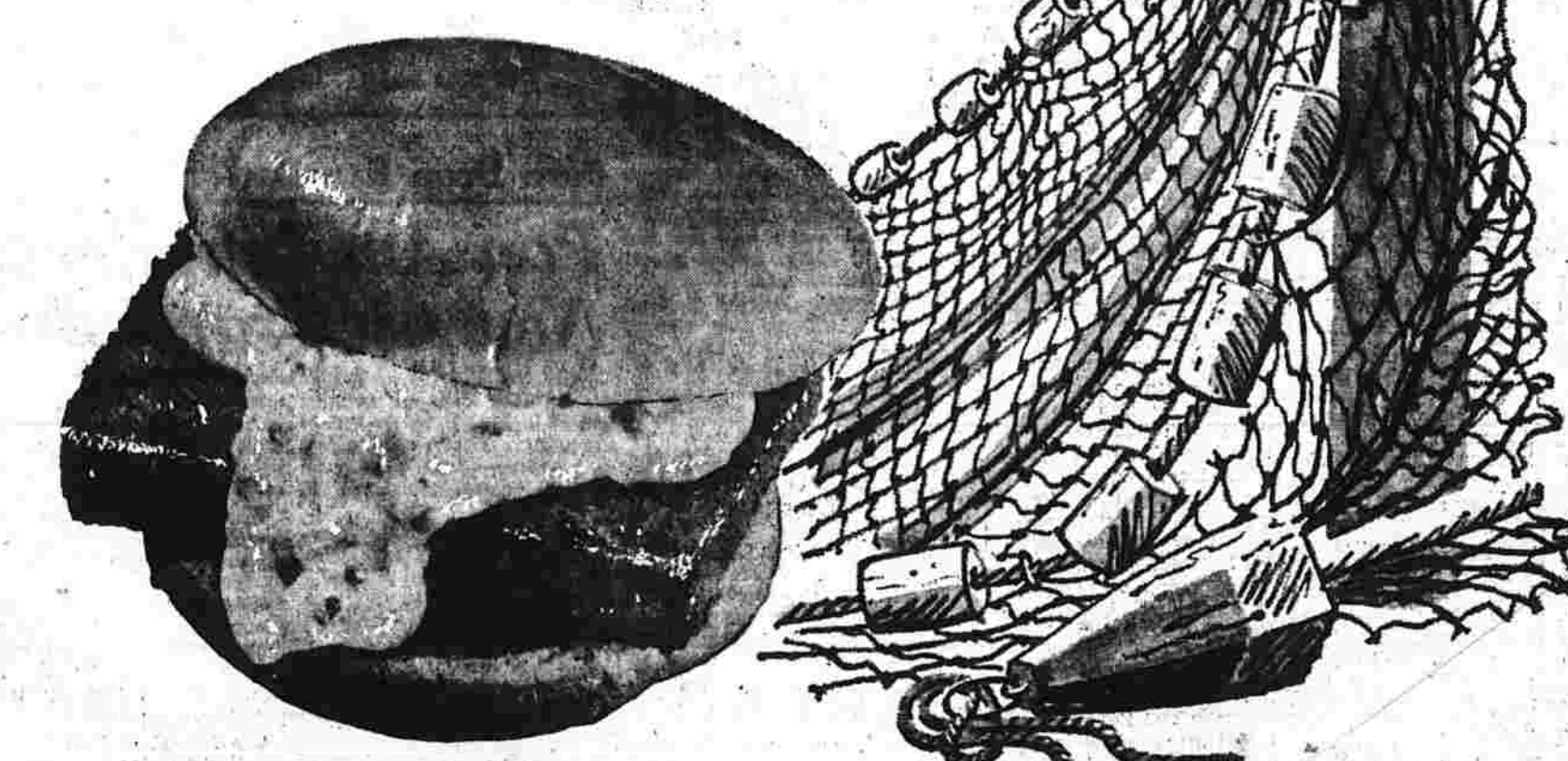

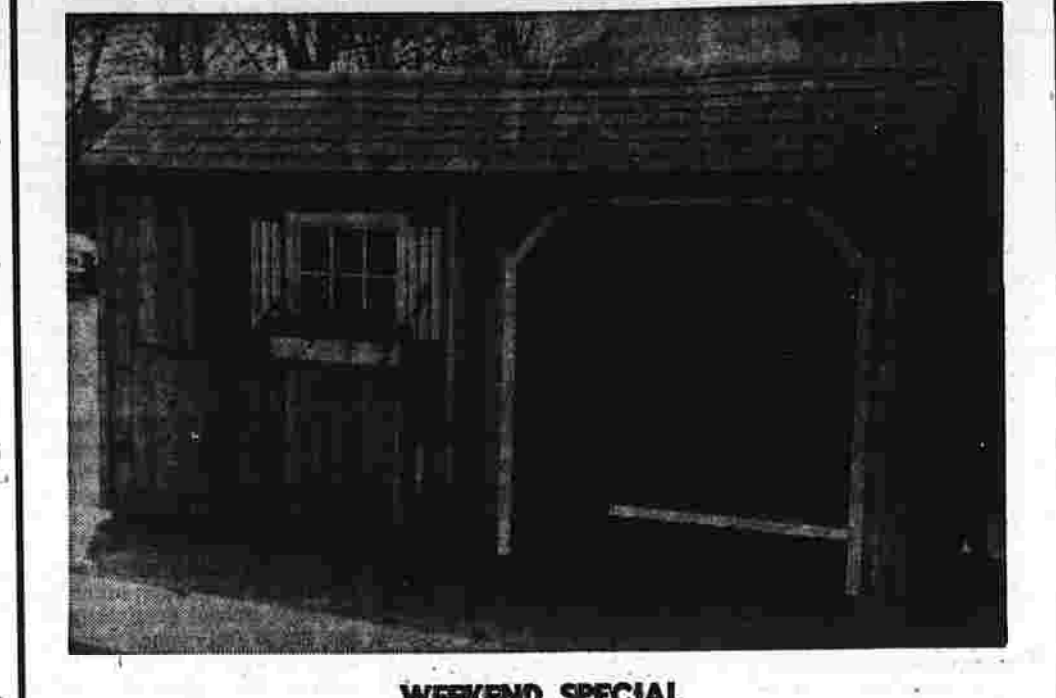

WASHINGTON (AP) — Communist work crews attempting to clear the landslide-blocked Mu Gia Pass in North Viet Nam are in for an explosive surprise. Some may already have gotten it.

A sizeable number of the half-ton bombs dropped there by a force of B52 bombers two days ago were rigged with delayed action mechanisms, sources said today.

These bombs, which buried themselves in the ground, were set to blow up over a period of days after they fell from the bellies of the giant jets.

Thus, the sources said, there's a good chance the big bombs are raising havoc with labor gangs sent in to try and reopen the infiltration road through the pass that leads to Laos and eventually to South Viet Nam.

There also is a possibility that these delayed explosions might touch off new earth slides to complicate the road clearing operations.

It was reported that about 20 per cent of the bomber force mustered targets in South Viet Nam, have involved 750-pound bombs.

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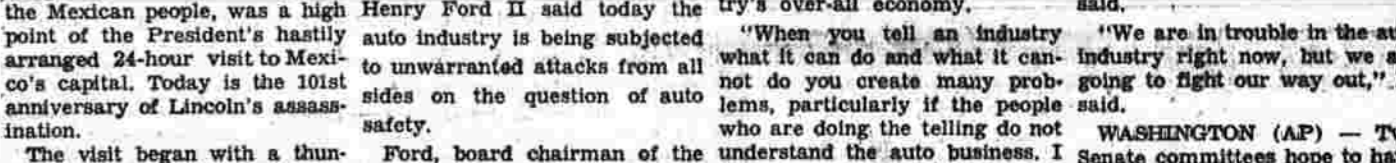
