Spring Comes To The North End All who passed through the North End of Manchester this morning on their way to work could hardly fail to notice the giant, towering smoke signal which gave notice to all that spring had, once again, come to North Main St. and its

And to residents who were thinking that this might be the first day out without a coat, and to housewives who might be thinking that this would be a pleasant day to hang out clothes, or plant the season's first pansies, the same great plume of asphalt smoke gave greeting, spring greeting. It looks distinctive against a blue

It has a unique smell. It puts a romantic misty film on windows, on house paint, and on clothes. This morning was a morning of little wind. So, this morning, the plume went straight up, so high it could be seen for miles around, conserving its contamination for later drift and fallout over

wider areas. When the wind is blowing strong it comes right down to its neighbors, im-

And if, despite the de sials of McNamara the computer that the war he is waging in Vietnam constitutes a drain on the strength of mili-

tary units left in this country and on military units stationed in Germany, it is soon revealed that units here are below strength and units in Germany are to be weakened in order to perform training services in this country, then it also seems sensible to admit that Mc-Namara the computer may have made a couple of mistakes.

This slow and tardy omission that Mc-Namara the computer can make mistakes seems to us a distinct service, rather than any unkindness, to McNamara the human being. He will make out better in every respect, it seems to us, as soon as everybody, including McNamara, realizes and admits that computers don't have all the answers.

All Styles Come Back Every style comes back to him who waits, and that infallible arbiter of styles, the Wall Street Journal, which knows what we are going to wear because it finds out what is going to be made for us and sold to us, has great good news for those males who have suffered through this whole era of narrowness-pants legs so narrow one has to use a shoehorn to tease one's ankles

down through them-neckties so narrow they offer shirts none of the traditional protection against soup spatters -and hat brims so narrow they catch no rain at all. Not many of us can afford to withstand the dictates of style trends, or to play the long-range odds which say that every extreme will be followed by a

another extreme. Most of us, therefore, have gone for the narrow nonsense of the past few. years, gradually consoling ourselves with the thought that the discomfort and the idiocy were somehow diminished because everybody else was suffering

On Trash Troubles

For a suburbanite, spring cleaning is a chore, but it's easy compared with getting rid of what he has cleared out. there's nary an empty lot or stretch of woods left on which to dump junk. Even dumps are getting fewer and farther between. And with planned obsolescence and the endless replacement of good old gadgets with sleeker newer nodels, there's more junk to dump. Almost nobody seems to want old stuff any more. Take cars. An old heap won't bring \$10 from the junk man

In fact, he may charge to tow away. The result: Old heaps abandoned on streets, for towns to dispose of. As for smaller pieces, try to get rid of an old rug, mattress, bed spring, sagging chair, or washer. Even many welfare agencies that used to ask for such things in usable condition won't take the trouble to send a truck to pick them up any more. One enterprisig suburbanite (me) got rid of an old automatic washing machine no one wanted by taking it apart and putting it out with the regular garbage, piece by piece. It took weeks, but it went. To solve the problem of accumulating

funk-and to keep it off what vacant land is left in suburbia—many towns have what is known as Cleanup Week in the spring, and sometimes again in the fall. During that week a homeowner is supposed to stack at the curb whatever he's tossing out, usually limited to things no heavier or bigger than two men can handle. But even this municipal spring clean-

ing presents problems. For one thing, it can be expensive. In one New Jersey town near where I live, for example, i has cost \$2 per home to clean up. One resident got more than his tax money's worth. It took three truckloads before his junk was gone from the curb. Another problem is raiding by one neighbor of another neighbors trash. Every Cleanup Week people pick through each other's junk piles in search of interesting or usable items

In the fall, there are fallen leaves to contend with. In the old days the season meant the pleasantly pungent smell of burning leaves. No longer. Pollutes the air, some say, and ruins the asphalt if they're burned in the street.

As a result, towns are buying what is known as a leaf vacuum. This equipment, like street sweepers, moves along the curb, inhaling the offending autumn debris. It's efficient, except when it picks up smoldering leaves. Then the vacuum machine catches fire. And often by the time the leaf vacuum comes around to my house, my pile of leaves has blown back all over the lawn. And then, of course, comes winter with snow plows pushing mounds of
