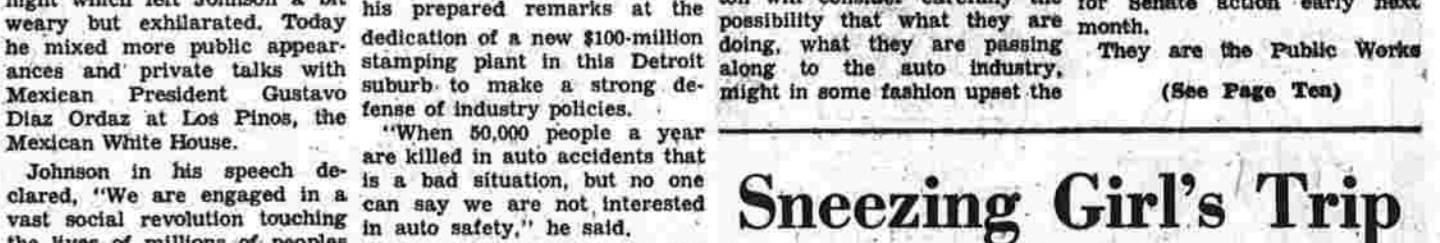
President Johnson's welcoming motorcade passes under arch of balloons en route from airport to presidential palace. (AP Photofax)



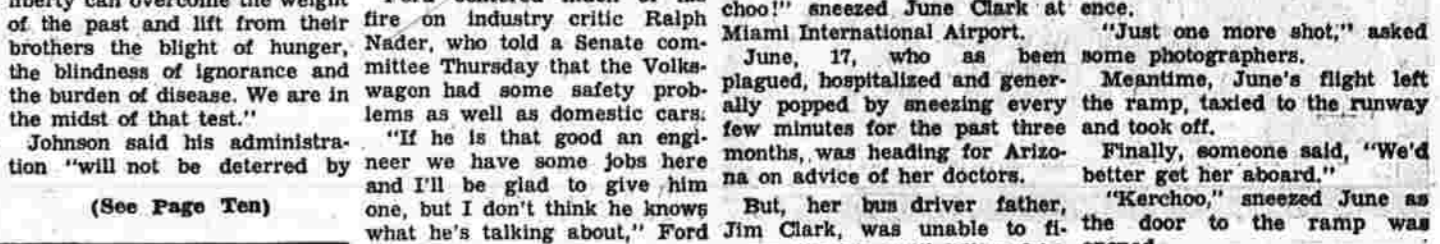

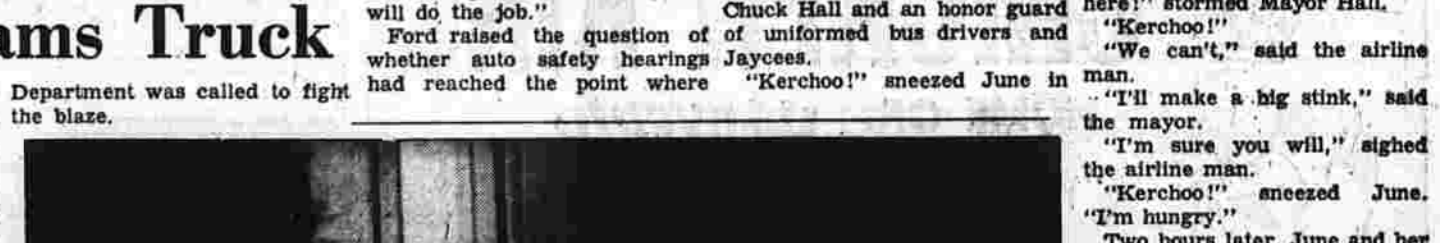

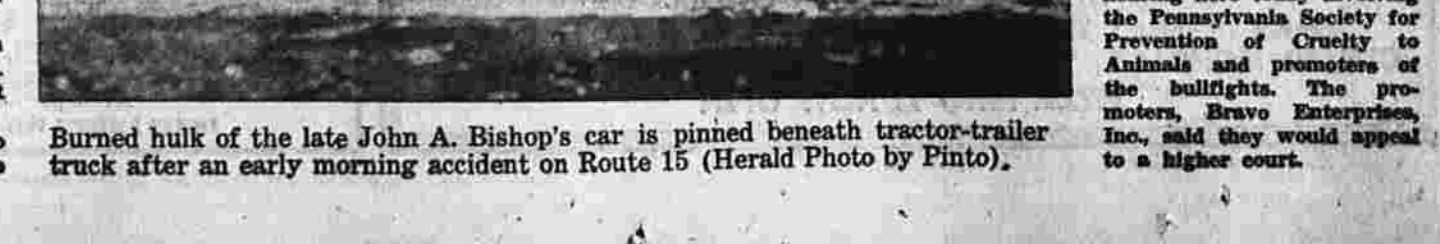

Tolland Zanghi Ordered to Court To Explain Lock on Files

First Selectman Carmelo Zanghi has been ordered to appear at a show cause hearing April 20 at 2 p.m. in Superior Court, to explain why he will not permit minority Selectman Stuart Danforth to perform the duties of day, Mrs. Donald Morgan, his office.

The order, signed yesterday, requires Zanghi's presence at the proceedings, which will be heard by Judge Alva Lohelle.

The hearing is a preliminary step to the filing of a writ of mandamus, calling for Zanghi to grant Danforth the full legal rights as selectman.

Danforth has repeatedly requested access to Board of selectmen meetings. He has been told by Zanghi that he can look at the records, at a mutually convenient date, when Zanghi can accompany him.

Zanghi, a Democrat, and Danforth, a Republican, are both members of the Board of Selectmen.

Danforth last month when he got his first look at the Selectmen's files.

Zanghi maintains that Zanghi's title denies him the complete freedoms of his office as a selectman under the minority representation laws.

The Democratic Town Committee endorsed the legal proceedings at a meeting last month. The Democratic statement by releasing Mr. Danforth the rights of free access to the records of his office, Zanghi is denying all Democratic legal constitutional guarantees of minority representation. His denial of his rights of representation is in defiance of all the concepts of the two-party system, and is completely contrary to a democracy. The statement concluded: "The Democrats of Tolland, intend to be represented whether Zanghi likes it or not."

Tons of 'Catchable Trout' Ready for State's Anglers

HARTFORD (AP)—The worst thing that can happen to a trout stream is the opening of the trout season.

Some humans also think it's bad—mostly wives who are left home on opening day.

But ready or not the official fishing season opens Saturday at 6 a.m.

The Connecticut Board of Fisheries and Game has been working up to this great day by planting tons of "catchable trout."

The department spread its largest lot so with a warning.

"Anglers have been previously warned," said Theodore P. Hampton, director of the department. "Due to drought conditions which have curtailed hatchery production, a reduction of from 15 to 25 per cent in numbers of fish stocked this year, compared to 1965 can be expected. The major cut was made in 9 to 12 inch brown trout."

Hampton pointed out, however, that 1965 was a record year, with more than 37,000 catchable-size trout released. This year the man-made trout hatch will match the 1964 season.

Some news about this season is on the grim side. A few popular fishing spots are closed because of dam construction and lake cleaning operations. And probably the best fishing hole in Connecticut, Lake Ballston, located in East Haven and owned by the New Haven Water Co., has been shut down this year to the anglers.

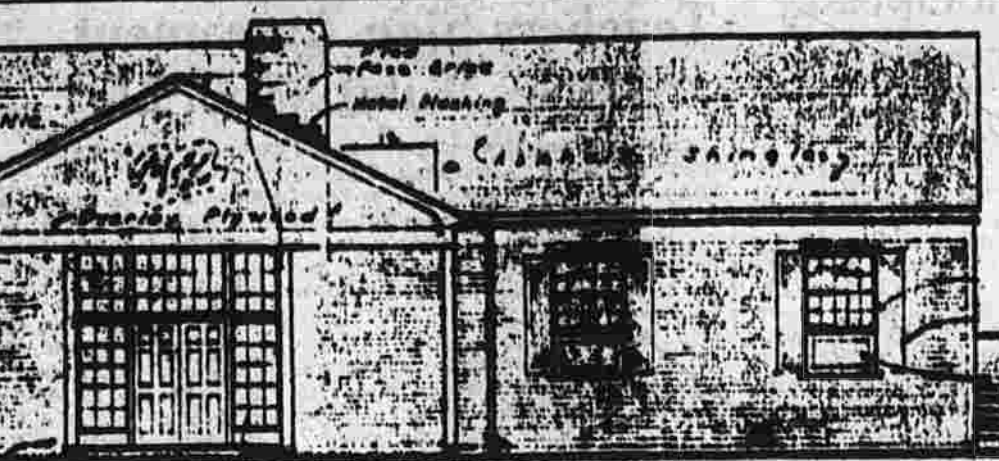

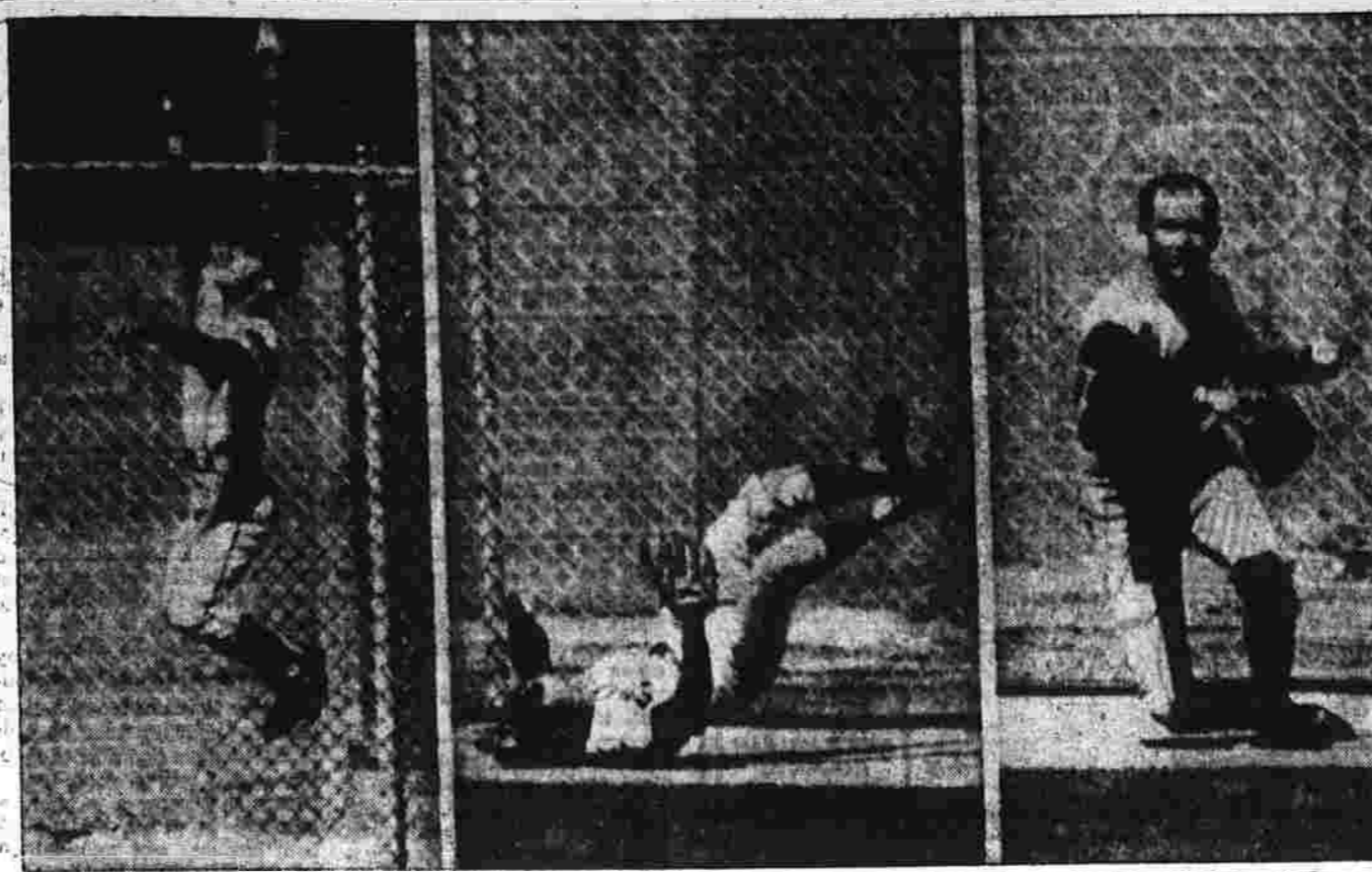
