Only Rocket Launched Is Off Target

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. Air Force planes brought the war to Hanoi's outskirts Sunday, striking missile sites 15 and 17 miles from the North Vietnamese capital in the closest stab yet to the city.
The jet fighter-bombers un-

leashed rockets, bombs and 20mm cannon fire at the two Soviet-built missile sites, south and southwest of Hanoi, setting off secondary explosions. The pilots spotted rockets on the launching pads just before they roared in, but only one missile was sent up. It missed.

A U.S. spokesman said the F105 Thunderchiefs and F100 Super Sabres hit the missile sites in connection with an attack on a bridge 33 miles south of Hanoi. He said there was no assessment yet of damage to the bridge, which was considered strategic in the North Vietnamese supply system,

North Viet Nam protested the attacks in the Hanoi area to the International Control Commisaion as "a brazen challenge to peace and justice-loving public opinion in the world," Radio

"These reckless air raids prove the U.S. imperialists are deliberately intensifying and expanding their war of aggresaion in an attempt to save their drastic situation by South Viet Nam," the note aid.

No American planes were re-ported lost in the raids on the

Three Questions About Busing The most thoughtful discussion about the issue of busing 75 Negro children from the North End of Hartford to vacant seats in Manchester schools seems to be heading toward two central questions, which are so closely related they are almost the same single question. We suggest some attempted an-

We would like it if others should try to give their answers. The first question we all should try to answer is one concerning our motivation, and it is this:

If we, as a community, decide to bus" will it be because we believe in busing as a contribution toward a solution to this nation's greatest problem, or because we are afraid of being judged prejudiced if we don't bus? If we could chart the sentiment of

this community — probably any other community too - we would say that there is one die-hard group which will be against busing or anything else almost forever, and another zealous group which would almost always be in favor of busing or any other idealistic proposition. And in between these two definite groups there must be many people who have very sensitive minds and hearts busy trying to decide how to

Some of the thoughts present in them wo like this: They don't want Manchester to get a name for refusing to do a right and brave thing. But they don't want Manchester to take this proposition if the proposition itself is not worthy, and if our only real reason for taking it is our desire to be on the side of the angels, or our fear of being labeled backward and prejudiced. The second question is linked to this

first question because it does ask whether "busing" is something worth while in itself, for its own sake, for what it will do, for the results it promises. Perhaps this ought to be the single question on which everything is decid-

Whenever this newspaper has previously discussed busing and the artificial ransfer of school populations it has doubted very much that such strategies presented any fundamental answer to the great problem American civilization has to solve for itself.

Is there any particular reason why we should see the issue differently, now that the issue happens to have come alive in But suppose it is conceded that bus-

ing is not a fundamental answer.

Suppose the argument concedes that this is an artificial, even unhappy contrivance, which misses and evades the main issues involved, and suppose the argument then shifts itself to the rather small claim that such artificial arrangements, running on ahead of real change in our society and even ahead of real change in our hearts, do play a measurable and effective part in changing the climate of society in a direction which will make later and more fundamental solutions easier to plan and easier to

One answer then becomes this: That there has indeed been accumulating all over America increased and heartening evidence that the artificial arrangement which puts the races together in one context or another-church, school, voting booth, public office, fraternal orranization, and real estate neighbor hood-does have various significant effects. The experience loses its strangeness and its shock; it drifts toward the routine; the experience of having it routine subtly and gradually underlines the essential brotherhood which exists in mankind along with mankind's divi-

Then it tends to become true that, alhough, as always, this battle will never be won until it is won inside the feelings and instincts of people, artifically decreed circumstance can and does adrance the course of that battle.

To put it plainly: White people fee differently about Negro people after they have worshipped with them, stu-ied with them, voted with them, and become used to the sight of them, on the street, or even on television as entertainers, for a certain amount of

ferently about white people and about their own place in society and the whole question of race relationship the more experience they have in the effort to live together. It is not required to do nothing, then,

until instincts and feelings have changed. There are things that can be consciously and deliberately done, including some very artificial contrivances, which may help begin changing those instincts and feelings.

This is the positive answer to question number two. It may be just as true and valid, for its part, as the sweeping negative answer, which says that busing is not the answer to the problem school segregation. How could it be? It would involve a constant shuffle of a constantly shuffling population. There is a third question to which we

suggest no answer, but which we would like to see discussed. Is there some other concrete, practical, forward course of action Manchester could find to make its own contribution to the national problem?

There is a recurrent theme in much of the opinion expressing itself on this issue. It says busing is not the answer, and it wants Manchester, instead, to do something really courageous and fundamental, like provide a piece of permanent solution for the problem. The usual thought is that if we were to find home and acceptance for a few more Negro families in Manchester, so that their children would go naturally to our schools, we would be doing something vastly better than the busing experi

But does anybody have any concrete idea for making this a community program, for carrying it forward to actual, tangible results? Otherwise, of course, this view stands as noble in theory, and right in principle, but deficient as an answer Manchester might proudly presume to offer as an alternative to the busing proposition which has been made to us.

Any comments-not as long as this editorial, please-will be welcome.



less than in Old Saybrook, and \$800 less than in Portland. In all county towns he teachers would earn more than in Middletown in this period. With statistics like this to ponder, is there much doubt that Middletown would be well advised to raise teachers' salaries? It can be argued that money isn't everything, and that this is not the single most important motivation to many, if not most teachers. And it can be argued that a starting salary does not in itself provide good teachers. But finally t is a matter of not taking chances, a matter of not trying to recruit with a salary schedule that produces less money in the first decade than even the poorest

towns in the county.
