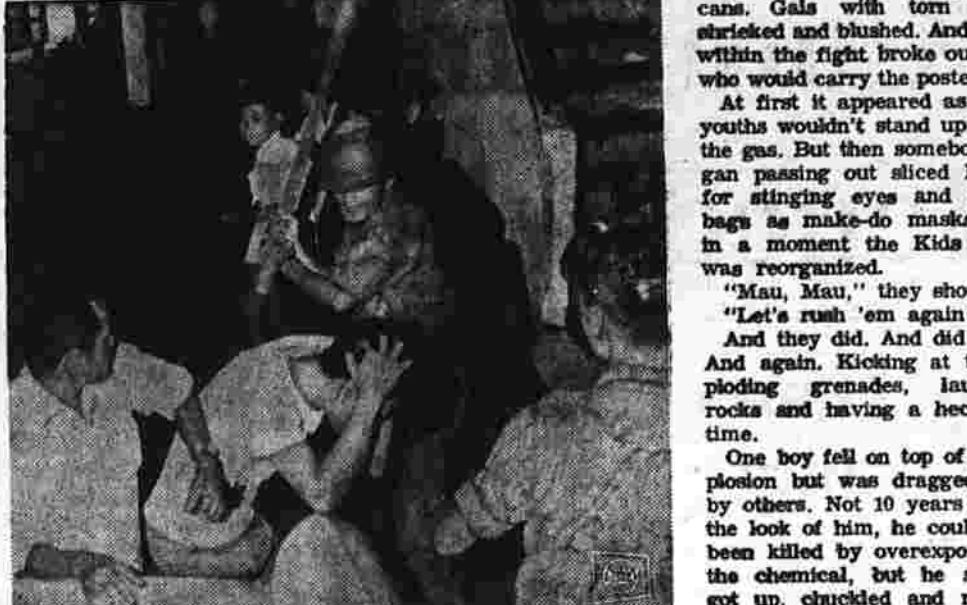

BACON, Viet Nam (NEA)—At the anti-demonstration recently going on here weren't so serious, some of them would be quite funny. Coventry Plan Board Adopts Rules For Garden Apartments

A regulation governing the construction of garden apartments, adopted by the Coventry Planning and Zoning Commission, becomes effective Monday.

Adoption of the regulation by the commission was held at a public hearing at the town hall in Coventry, Conn., Monday.

The regulation requires 50 acres of land for a minimum of 500 square feet of floor space for each three-room dwelling unit, with 150 square feet more for a fourth room.

The regulation requires 20 percent of the dwelling units may be efficiency or combination units, a minimum of 400 square feet.

Vernon Minutely Detailed Budget Goes to Representatives

The town's proposed 1966-67 budget, the most thoroughly detailed in the town's history, was presented to the board of representatives at a special meeting Wednesday night.

The proposed budget, combining costs of the board of education and the general government totals more than \$5,700,000, an increase over this year's budget of more than \$700,000.

No action was taken, because the entire budget was not considered. Members viewed it for the first time when they entered the meeting.

Another meeting to consider the budget has been set for Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at the administration building.

A number of town residents, concerned about a reported 11 percent increase in the tax rate to view the proceedings. The residents and heads of many of the town's departments packed the meeting room.

It took 187 pages to explain the budget, but Mayor Thomas J. McCallister had the final word in the budget presentation to the representatives who must approve it.

The mayor recommended a proposed expenditure, but most of his changes were reductions in the budgetary items.

Most of the residents left Wednesday night, after a brief discussion by board of education chairman Frank DeLolito.

The finance committee of the school board had been invited to attend to explain its request including an increase of almost \$600,000.

Details asked for, and received, the school's budget request back. He explained that more work was required on the part of the board.

Seven sections of the budget were discussed Wednesday. In most cases, each item was covered on one department.

However, in the case of the town's two fire departments, the department was discussed separately, and the public works department was broken down into three sections: The filtration plant, supervision, and general maintenance.

Pay hikes and the hiring of new employees generally accounted for most increases within the departments.

"That makes me a very high paid clerk," Bellville said.

The total budget for the assessor's office is \$26,640, while the request from Bellville is \$27,840. The mayor recommended a reduction in the purchase of office equipment and in other minor areas.

Building Inspector Francis McNulty requested a \$1,000 pay raise for himself, and increases for the plumbing and heating inspector and secretary in his office.

The mayor approved the raises, but cut McNulty's request by \$500.

"McNulty has done a fine job," Mayor McCusker said. McNulty presently earns \$7,500.

Total budget for running the Building Inspector's office was \$20,800 last year. This year's budget, recommended by the mayor, would be \$22,870.

Public Works Director Andrew Tricario requested a salary increase of \$2,500, reduced to \$1,500 by the mayor.

Mayor McCusker defended the raise, and explained that the recommendation was based on position, performance, the amount of work done to a man, and the fact that a recently approved union contract would bring some public works employees up near the income level of Tricario when overtime is considered.

Rockville Fire Chief John Ashe requested a total of \$46,435 for his department, but the mayor recommended an increase to \$47,531.

Salaries for the 41 firemen and their officers total \$18,420; and equipment and supplies requested include replacing four Scott Air Pak face plates, the first replacement in 15 years. The packs provide oxygen for firemen entering burning buildings.

A new clerk for the assessor's office and pay raises for the assessor and his secretary account for a budget increase of about \$4,000 over last year.

The assessor, Edgar Bellville, presently earns \$5,500. He requested an increase of \$500, and the mayor is recommending that amount. His secretary would earn an additional \$260 next year.

The new clerk for the assessor's office is required, Mayor McCusker said, because of the volume of work. A new task assigned to the office is processing sewer and rubbish collection users charges.

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Court Change Possible In Handling Alcoholics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Each year the bottle is taken more than 200 times before Government sources say they need time to provide facilities other than jail for chronic alcoholics. One judge, who asked that his name not be used, said: "We are still sentencing defendants to jail on drunkenness convictions because we have no place else to send them."

Two federal Circuit Court decisions are giving the revolution steam and direction. And last week, an Oakland junior named Thomas F. Budd asked the Supreme Court to rule on the two circuit courts have: That a chronic alcoholic is a sick person who cannot be treated by the law as a criminal for drunkenness alone.

The Circuit Court rulings, Jan. 22 and March 21, cited the 4th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which forbids "crust and unusual punishments."

Washington is a prime example of the problem. There have been 22,000 drunk cases in court yearly, only 40 beds are available to accommodate alcoholics in the D.C. General Hospital.

But this is a special rural setting and William Ray Nelson, assistant director of the D.C. Department of Corrections, says "treatment for alcoholism should be in a controlled atmosphere in the community where the problems are."

There would be doctors, nurses, welfare workers and blood tests to detect ailments that bedevil alcoholics.

In Washington courts, only a few of the habitual drunkards who appear before judges have raised the new defenses of chronic alcoholism.

Three did in one day — three of the 396 who passed before Judge Thomas C. Sealey — and one changed his mind, preferring a 35-day sentence to being sent to D.C. General Hospital for 90 days.
