EAST HARTFORD (AP) — A truck driver was killed today and a tow truck operator was injured in a crash on the Wilbur Cross Highway.

The victim was Querino Mercadante, 47, of 627 Sunderland Road, Worcester, Mass.

Wreckage of two tractor trailers and a cargo trailer mangled blocked morning rush hour traffic. State police said there was a two-hour traffic backup.

State police said a wrecker was parked in front of a disabled truck when another truck driven by Mercadante plowed into the rear of the stalled truck.

Bronchial Rupture Possible Heart Patient Dies

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Marcel DeRudder died today five days after doctors implanted a partial artificial heart in him in a dramatic operation that had promise for thousands of heart victims.

Doctors attributed death to a possible rupture of his bronchus or trachea through which air passes to and from the lungs. The exact cause would not be known until a post-mortem operation was completed, they said.

Dr. Michael E. DeBakey, who led a team of specialists in the operation last Tuesday, was at the bedside of the retired coal miner from Westville, Ill., when death came at 2:04 a.m. in Methodist Hospital.

A hospital spokesman termed DeRudder's death "sad." DeRudder, 65, had been unconscious since the operation, but the artificial heart designed to relieve the workload of his own damaged organ, was functioning at the time of his death, the spokesman said.

Another MIG Bagged By U.S. Phantom Jets

First Kill Of Hanoi's 'Best' Jet

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Heat-seeking Sidewinder missiles fired by a U.S. F40 Phantom jet destroyed a Communist MIG21 challenging American raiders today in the North Vietnamese zone between Hanoi and Red China's frontier.

An American spokesman announced this was the first kill of the Soviet-designed, delta-winged, supersonic fighter, the best jet the Communists have in Asia. The pilot is believed to have ejected before the crash.

The clash, in which two Phantoms took on two MIG21s, was the third such encounter in the zone between Hanoi and Red China since last Saturday.

American officials said they do not know where the MIG's came from or the nationality of the men flying them.

The proximity to China gave rise to speculation that the MIG's may have flown in from Chinese bases. However, North Viet Nam is believed to have about 15, obtained from either the Soviet Union or the Chinese.

New Tax Payment Plan Takes Effect on Monday

WASHINGTON (AP) — Uncle Sam begins next week to take a bigger chunk of the average American paycheck to help finance the Viet Nam war.

It is the first graduated withholding system in U.S. history and for millions it means less take-home pay. But for others, especially low income families, less federal income tax will be deducted from their paychecks.

Everybody's overall tax bill for the year will remain the same. The new system is designed merely to bring the amount withheld from paychecks closer to a person's actual taxes.

Since the plan will withdraw about \$800 million from the economy by Dec. 31, government economists also hope it will dampen inflationary trends which could lead to a tax increase later.

Beginning May 1, taxes will be withheld from paychecks at six different rates — 14, 15, 17, 20, 25 and 30 per cent.

At present income taxes are withheld at a uniform 14 per cent based only on the taxpayer's salary and number of exemptions he claims.

The new system includes these factors but also takes into account the standard deduction and whether a taxpayer is married. Thus, a taxpayer can take advantage of the split income provisions of federal tax law as

part of his withholding for the first time. The split income provisions allow a married couple a lower tax rate. Previously, this could be used only in figuring taxes at the end of the year. Under the new system, taxes can be withheld at this lower rate. Graduated withholding is part of the administration's tax program, signed by President Johnson March 15, to raise

about \$8 billion over 15 months to help finance the Viet Nam war. Other major provisions of the law — suspension of excise tax rate and speeded up estate tax — for example, would be required to go into effect.

Speeding Meteor Seen By Hundreds in State

HARTFORD (AP) — Hundreds of Connecticut residents got a good look at a fireball, described by scientists as a meteor, that streaked across the northern sky at 8:15 Monday night.

Among them were several newsmen, including L. P. Yale, chief of The Associated Press bureau in New Haven.

Yale's description was similar to many others: a brightly glowing object, bluish-green in front, reddish in back, heading slightly north, leaving a vapor trail that lasted for several minutes.

"The colors were beautiful," said Yale.

One motorist who saw a similar sight over Fairfield County drove north in chase, trying to see where it landed.

Brian Dow of WHNE-TV saw a vapor trail overhead but assumed it was made by a jet airplane. Then he arrived at the studio and the telephones began ringing.

Two more underground tremors struck the city later in the day, each about half as strong as the early morning quake. There were no immediate reports of damage from the later shocks.

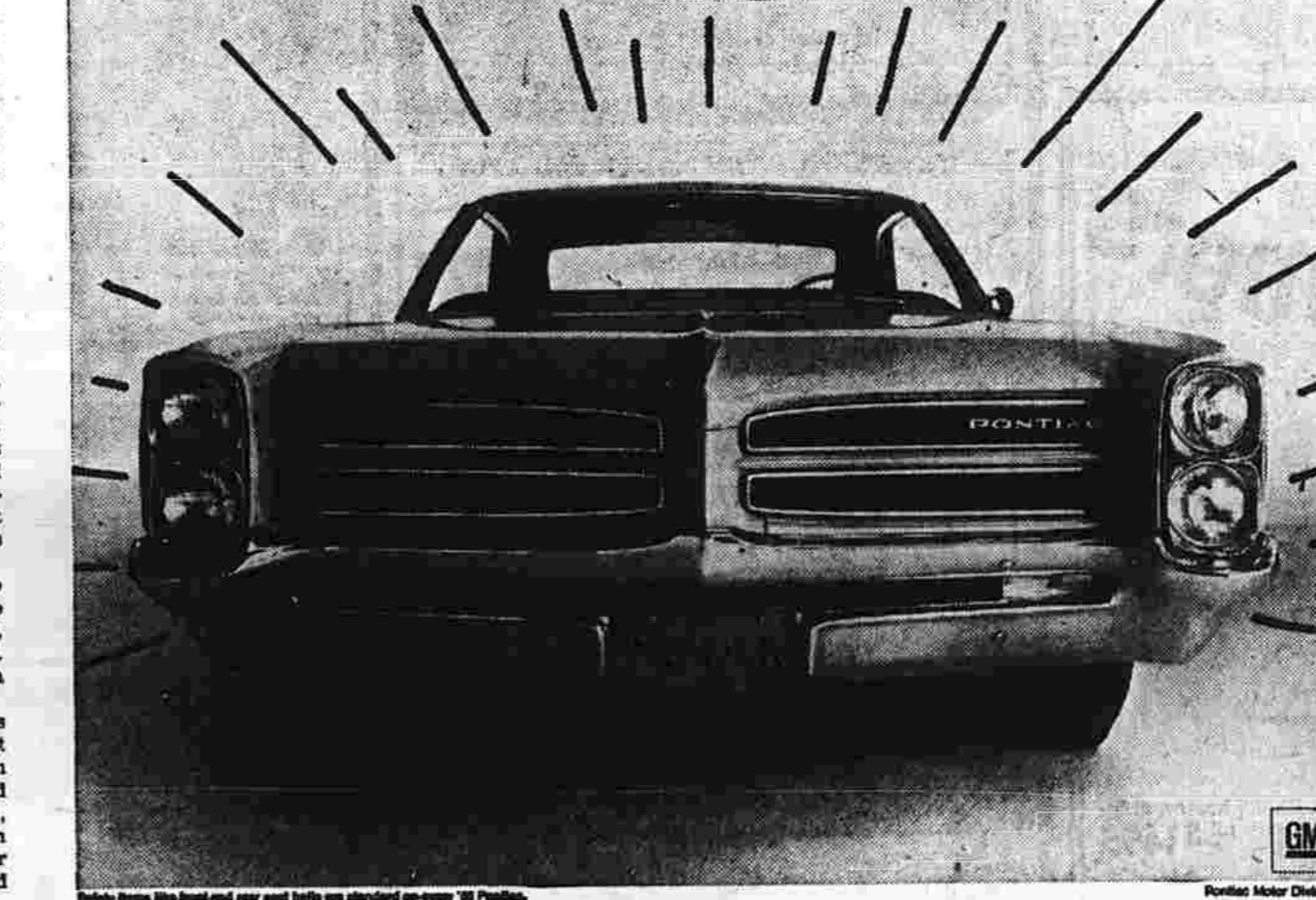

Valenti, usually ebullient, was strangely subdued when he told newsmen of his plans.
"I'm going to miss being at the White House with him in 1968. He's a great guy. It's more than a job."

### ELJEM SPEAKING

Weather has always been a great concern of man. Long before weather forecasting as we know it today, man has sought to understand the forces that control the weather. In 1947, Chicago residents were startled by a dust storm that originated in the desert. The dust particles, carried by the wind, were so fine that they could be inhaled. It was another important clue to the forces that control the weather. Very often their lives or crops depended on their ability to predict a storm or a cold snap. Some of the weather sayings contain tiny particles of truth collected as they fell to earth. Today there are more than 10,000 weather reporting stations around the world. Some are operated by people, but others are complex instruments that automatically send information from the middle of the ocean or from a wind-swept mountain peak. Still other weather information is automatically reduced to earth from satellites, rockets and high-altitude balloons. These methods of forecasting are more accurate than ever before. They tell us not only the direction and speed of the weather, but also its temperature, atmospheric pressure, humidity and so on. As we sort and analyze the information, we are able to predict tomorrow's weather with a 70 percent accuracy. We know that clouds and other particles in the atmosphere scatter the sun's light. The longer red rays of deflected sunlight come through the atmosphere, the more they are scattered. This is why the sky is blue in the day and red in the evening. The sun's rays, as they travel through the atmosphere, are scattered by the molecules and atoms of the air. The shorter blue rays, which have the highest frequency, are scattered the most. The longer red rays, which have the lowest frequency, are scattered the least. This is why the sky is blue in the day and red in the evening.

## Fighting Viet Inflation As Uncertain as Real War

SARONG, South Viet Nam (AP) — South Viet Nam is a small country with a big war and big inflation.

Figures from economists and housewives indicate the battle against inflation is as uncertain as the fight against guerrillas. There are voices of both hope and despair.

A U.S. economist working with the U.S. Agency for International Development said: "Prices now are 40 to 50 per cent higher than they were in 1959. That is inflation one can live with, and we would reduce it to 25 per cent this year with good management."

A housewife: "Every time I go to the market food costs more, day by day. There is no end. We become poor just to eat." She estimated her food bill tripled in two years.

Comparatively, the rice that has made South Viet Nam the rice bowl of the world is up 100 per cent in price since 1960. The U.S. Labor Department's report last Thursday on its consumer price index stood at 112 per cent of the 1957-59 base, or 2.9 per cent above the reading a year ago. Under the department's statistics, indexed goods and services which cost \$10 in 1957 would cost \$112.20.

Many of the figures available to gauge the degree of South Viet Nam inflation are contradictory. The U.S. economist said the price of rice held at almost the same level through the past year with a 7 per cent increase in the category, and they carried a decrease in a second category and virtually no change in the third.

On one given day—April 4—Nang Huong rice, which is the best quality, cost 200 per cent higher than on April 4, 1965. So the rice, for the middle-class farmer, cost 19 per cent more and No. 1 rice, the cheapest, was 29 per cent higher.

The Viet Cong economy is volatile," the economist said. The Viet Cong, employing blackmail and terror, seized rice and other agricultural products from peasants to support their own fighters and also to withhold it from areas loyal to the government. In such areas stocks fell, prices went up. To bring the supply close to the demand, 500,000 metric tons of rice were imported last year together with pork and other foodstuffs. The Viet Cong charcoal could not be found, kerosene was brought in instead.

South Viet Nam stood off the enemy rice offensive "brilliantly," the American advisers said. The first major contingent of U.S. Marines landed in Viet Nam in March 1965, followed by other Marines, soldiers, sailors and airmen until about 40,000 men were in the country.

American military men are now in the country. The military man doesn't produce goods or services, but buys both, once again making the demand outrun the supply and adding another curb in the spiral.

"There was a definite parallel between the escalation of the war and inflation and steps had to be taken," the American economist said.

A major step was the creation of a special currency fund. Since Aug. 31 American troops have been paid in military pay, rather than dollars. An incentive exchange rate for services was established.
