We can suggest, however, how we think the necessary new concept might be arrived at. They might pretend, these mighty executives of existing systems, that part of their systems do not really exist at all, and that it is up to them to devise and invent some new system for transporting people into cities and between cities—some system which will free them from their slavery to the automobile, and the terror of the

superhighways.

If they began the task of inventing some new way to travel into and between cities they would soon reach some rather elemental conclusions. It would e best, the new system of transportation, if it could be something that would run on tracks, over rights of way proected from interference from or with other kinds of traffic. It would be necessary, if it were to be a system which toped to make itself profitable, that it offer a ride which was fairly swift. But primarily other aspects of the ride would be much more important. It would have to be safe. It would have to be spotlessly clean. It would have to be

If it could be safe, spotlessly clean, and comfortably, luxuriously pleasant, the questions of speed and cost would become relatively minor. This would be what management of
