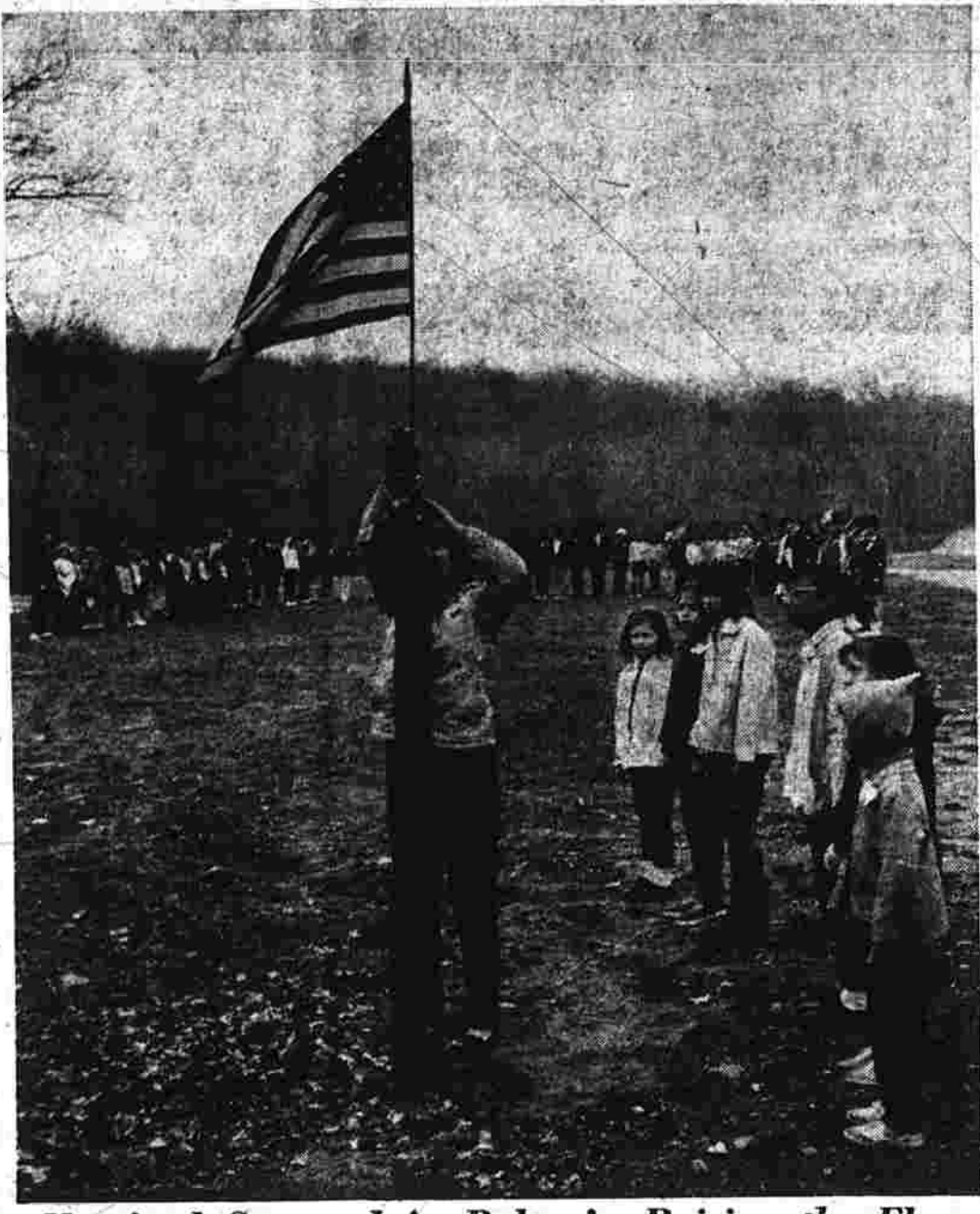

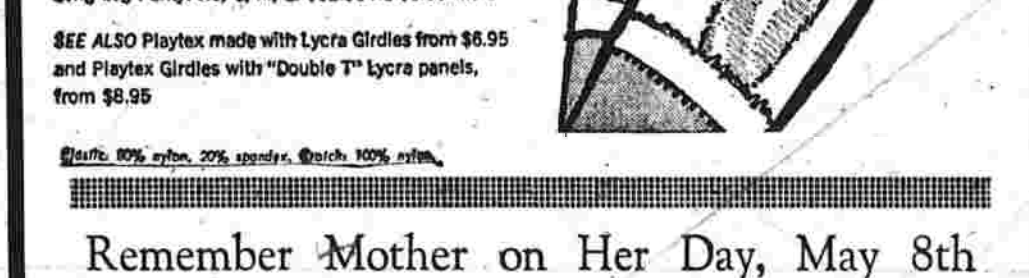

Action Postponed On Brandeis Bid

Concern over the possible creation of a private village of approximately 1,000 persons (about two per cent of the town's population), with private streets, no police protection, on-street parking, its own maintenance and with practically no public services for its residents, has caused the town planning commission (TPC) last night to postpone action on a proposed 100-unit apartment complex opposite Wickham Park. The Brandeis Corp. of Hartford, at a March 11 public hearing, had presented a plan to construct a 10 million, 114-unit complex, in 27 buildings of 10 different types, on the south side of W. Middle Tpk., west of the Wilbur Cross Parkway. Its proposal includes a swimming pool; a play area; tennis courts; a nature walk along the Hookanum River; parking spaces for 475 cars; modern streets; an interior fire hydrant system; water and sewage service provided by the Metropolitan District; private garbage pickup; and private maintenance of its grounds. Taking its cue from veteran member Martin Alvord, the TPC decided to schedule a meeting with the Brandeis Corp. and its architects and engineers, to explore the possibility of a greater public interest within the complex. Alvord, who is retiring from the TPC in the fall, said that he is opposed to the theory of private development control on the basis that it isn't fair to residents. He warned of the possibility of poor snow removal, of on-street parking, of the exclusion of police checks from the area; of the possibility of a traffic jam on the street; of the possible deterioration of the street pavements, because of no public maintenance. Alvord said that it wouldn't be right for two per cent of the town's population to be practically segregated in a village within a town. The present plan calls for about one mile of streets within the complex, all of a 33-foot width. Hebron \$247,429 in School Budget, Hearing Is Slated May 10

The Hebron Board of Education will hold a public hearing at 8 p.m. May 10, at the elementary school at 8 p.m. May 10. Copies of the budget request for 1966-67, totaling \$247,429, an amount \$36,450 greater than the budget for the present year, will be available to all interested parties. Some extra expenses in the town budget include: a new truck requested by the assessor at an estimated cost of \$9,500; a request from the selectmen for \$3,000 for a town garage; three requests from the Fire Department, including a new siren; \$2,640 for a quick call alarm system; and \$10,000 for a new tank truck. The Fire Department also asks for \$1,191 for repairs and upkeep of the firehouse and an operating budget of \$4,196, which means \$1,196 more than the present year. All totaling \$32,074. Mrs. Gladys T. Miner, town clerk, is also asking for a salary increase of \$50 and a \$4,000 appropriation for equipment to place the maps filed in her office in order. The selectmen are asking for \$8,000 for the town's resident state trooper, Raymond Andrews, an amount spent in 1965 of \$550 less than previously, the reason for the reduction being that the constables are relieved of considerable duty by the resident state trooper. Other budget items are about the same as those of the present year (except for capital expenditures) will be less than \$3,000, after consideration of reductions in interest and bond payments.

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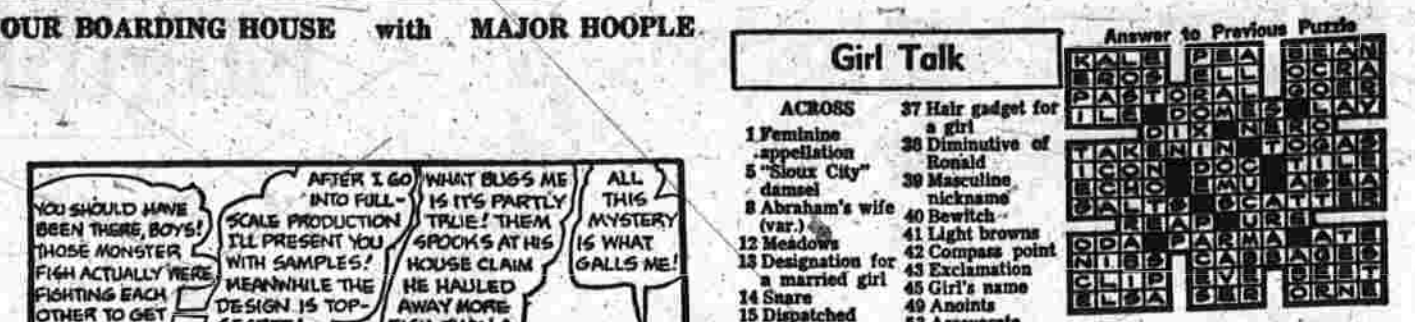
