Being Blameless Is Not Safety the circumstances which produced yesterday's fatal crash of trucks on Center Street. But, at the moment, one of the theories possible is that neither of the drivers directly involved had much choice or chance.

Certainly the driver who became the instant fatality could not, unless he were contributing some excessive speed of his own to the situation, be considered to have contributed anything to the accident except his life. He was on his own side of the road. Suddenly, another truck hurtled into his path.

The driver of the second truck may not have had chance or choice, either. He may have been proceeding normally, and he may have found himself confronted with some sudden emergency on the road, perhaps in the conduct of some other vehicle in front of him. And his effort to maneuver may have thrown his truck out of control, and into trag-

Is there, in such an accident in which it almost seems possible that no one is to blame, any moral for people who spend more and more of their time on

There is such a moral; and it points to the one kind of caution which might conceivably have altered events on Center Street vesterday morning. This is that kind of excessive caution which proadens the definition of safe driving until it includes plenty of room for the mistakes of other drivers. It is getting to be so that driving is not reasonable rood driving unless it does do a little more than make sure it itself isn't heading into or creating an accident. In order to be completely good driving, it has to assure itself time and space to escape the accident being created by somebody else.

This, although it can be set up as a goal, nevertheless has to be considered a goal almost impossible of attainment all the time. But some of us can, perhaps, manage to drive that way some of the time, and that will inevitably eliminate some of the tragedy. You can be driving along, minding your own business and the rules of the road, and find yourself dead through no fault of your own. That compounds the depth of the tragedy. The one slight thing that can be done about it is to try to drive, as much of the time as possible, minding what the other fellow is doing, or is likely to do, or might be forced to do,

Law In Search Of A Name

Nobody has yet invented the name for the law which is obviously involved and working in the situations we are about to designate, but it belongs, whatever its name is going to be, in the same category as other famous laws, like Gresham's on money, Parkinson's on efficiency, and Newton's on gravity. What happens under the as yet quite

nameless law is this: that the heavier the force which is introduced into a situation like that in Vietnam, the weaker the side it joins. It doesn't go quite so far as to say this new law, that the way to lose a

war is to have too many troops fighting in it. But it comes close to suggesting something like it, and there happen to be three quite serious illustrations of how this strange law may be operating

in Vietnam. In one illustration the law concerns us, the American outsiders. In the second, it concerns the South

Vietnamese, in their own terrain. In the third, it concerns the North Vietnamese, the outsiders from the The law of diminishing returns for

American soldiers in Vietnam has read

this way: the more troops we have there, the less the South Vietnamese consider it their own war and the more they leave the fighting to us. Therefore the more troops we send into Vietnam the greater the danger we run of losing the war, if not in the fields, then in the minds of the Vietnamese themselves. Some theorists have also applied law of diminishing success to the size of the South Vietnamese forces in the field to fight the guerrillas and their helpers from the North. The reasoning, this time, goes like this: the more South Vietnamese reliables are put in military uniform, the fewer such are available for

sivilian, agricultural and political activ-

ity of the kind which has a chance of keeping South Vietnam in existence as something to fight for.

This same law, whatever it is to be called eventually, may now be operating on the other side of the struggle, according to some recent ideas of American intelligence officers in South Viet-

What they are beginning to hear is a reaction among the South Vietnamese Vietcong guerrillas who still represent the main strength in the field in South Vietnam-a reaction against conditions created by the infiltration of regular North Vietnamese troops which has increased so much during the year we have been bombing North Vietnam. Now that the estimated 210,000 guerrillas in the field in South Vietnam are

finding themselves assisted by an increasing number of regular troops from North Vietnam-as many as 20,000 are supposed to have come down since the first of this year-it seems that they have begun to resent their allies. It seems the Northerners act as if they were superior beings, coming down to take over. And what our intelligence officers are beginning to hope-withou quite daring really to hope it-is that the traditional differences and jealousies between North and South Vietnam, which existed in the past without any need for special theologies to divide them - are now beginning to reasser

themselves again. Adding these three trends, these three possible operations of that new law together, one could come toward the fantastic conclusion that if we send a little more help to our friends in South Vietnam and North Vietnam sends a little more help to its friends in South Vietnam neither of us will have any friends left in South Vietnam.

What shall we call the new law? How shall we state its premises? It will probably wind up being called after McNamara, on the theory that he, by violating it, first led to its discovery. And it might be stated this way: In helping a friend, never help quite so much he begins to feel you have made his cause your own.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare is reportedly engaged in a nation-wide inspection of hospitals to see if they are practicing segregation-one more manifestation, if you will, of what, can justly be called Government by busybody.

You can't even put all the blame on the Federal authorities; they are simply trying to carry out the provisions of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Starting in July, HEW will be dispensing \$1.9 billion of various kinds of aid to hospitals. That's a lot of taxpayer cash, and the Government has an obligation to require the assisted institutions to comply with its terms.

Some of the nosiness is of course long established. A notable case is the prying, spying and punishing regularly inflicted on farmers by the agricultural planners. Businesses are long accustomed, if not resigned, to the whimsical harassments of the regulatory agencies.

Each new breach of privacy naturally becomes a precedent for further interventions. So it is that the great debate about whether Federal aid to education means Federal control is now These days the control is not a hobgob-If anyone questions that statement,

he need only reflect how radically college curricula have in some cases been redirected to suit Federal plans; sometimes, too, the inevitable inspectors come right to the campus to check up. More subtle but nonetheless persuasive is the way young people are increasingly brought up to think they owe their blessings to Washington. It is an effect which is bound to be

caused by the sheer mass of the Federal establishment and the endless pro liferation of its activities. But it is als caused by conscious design—by the in propagandists that the Governmen does indeed know best and is the for of all that is good in the nation. and the zeal of the controllers the believer in individual dignity, of which the

right to reasonable privacy is a vital part, stands hardly a chance. Indeed, he might well conclude that few of his compatriots even share the belief, or care what is happening to the individual, To some extent, we grant, the fan-

tastic growth of the nosy-parker business is one of the penalties of the development of a mass society: If people accept what the Government implies that the lowest common human denominator is the ideal, then they pervert democracy and invite inspection and control. Certainly it is true that the spy mania has infected not only the Federal Government but other levels of officialdom and private organizations as

At the national level, however, the inquisitive fervor is obviously a prime symptom of budding authoritarianism. What chiefly, distinguishes that type of society is precisely the inability of the individual to protect himself against authorized meddlers and worse.

It is always easy to say that the United States has a long way to go before it can be described in those terms and we hope the optimism is justified The troubling thought still remains: A central State bent on underwriting everything from painting to medic training must and will demand a rigorous accounting, no matter whose pri vacy is sacrificed. - WALL STREET
