Dyer Says Four Obstacles In Path of War on Poverty

Four reasons for the nation's failure to cope with poverty and despair at home were listed by Joseph Dyer, state director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, yesterday.

Dyer, a Manchester resident, spoke before about 140 at the May Fellowship service, sponsored by the United Church Women of 14 churches. The service was held in the sanctuary of Second Congregational Church.

As obstacles to action against poverty, Dyer gave (1) apathy (2) belligerence, (3) control (4) discrimination, which he called the most serious since he said economic and educational progress perpetuates intolerable living conditions, human despair, crushed spirits and lost hope.

Dyer began his talk by saying that the people of the United States after World War II, were concerned with the destruction and want in other lands while at home, Negroes were neglected, the Indians left to their own salvation, thousands of Southern Negroes automated out of jobs and the jobless of Appalachia sunk deeper into poverty and despair.

"Now, at last," Dyer said, "we have stopped overlooking the poor on our own threshold. We can cope with men and rockets to the moon, but seem unable to work and plan to help men created in the image of God."

"In my opinion," Dyer said, "the spirit of the Opportunity Act of 1964 means more than any amount of money appropriated by Congress, as it took to people of every area, black and white, and how some of your neighbors are living."

With that, the director turned his attention to Manchester and its 758 adults and children on relief. He paid tribute to Miss Mary DellaFera, welfare director, describing her as a dedicated worker whose understanding and help are so essential.

LEAVE ONE DOOR OPEN TO THE SURE OF ENTRY BY ALFRED SHEINWOLD One of my friends locks one door of his car, just in case he has lost the keys to the car. That same man laughed himself sick when his son mis-played one of the hands in the recent Intercollegiate Championships.

Opening lead — Three of Clubs The young man took the king of clubs and led the three of diamonds to dummy's queen. East discarded a spade, and South gulped painfully.

South got to his hand with the ace of hearts and led the ten of diamonds. West covered with the jack, and dummy's king won. Declarer got back with the ace of spades and led the eight of diamonds. This time West played low. South could let the eight of diamonds ride, but he couldn't get to dummy for the rest of the diamonds. Down two a few.

Because of his experience with locked cars, the father would have left one door open to dummy. That is, he would lead the ten of diamonds at the second trick (instead of the three of diamonds).

West would play low, and declarer would win with dummy's ace, not suspecting the play of the ten of diamonds.

South gets back with the ace of hearts to lead the eight of diamonds. West covers with the nine, and dummy's king wins. South gets back with the other ten of diamonds. East leads the three of diamonds.

No matter what West plays, declarer can win a finesse in dummy with the ace or seven. Then he plays 10 dummy to take the rest of the diamonds.

Few people realize how much they can learn about cards from a bridge column, and vice versa.

Daily Question Partner opens with one diamond, and the next player passes.

Tolland Ex-PTA Heads Question Bid for Disaffiliation

Four former presidents of the Tolland Parents-Teachers Association today questioned the legality of the organization's April vote to withdraw from the state and national PTA organizations.

Mrs. Stephen Small speaking for herself and the other three former presidents, Mrs. Howard Horvath, Mrs. Richard LaBrie and Mrs. Chester Jedrowski said in a statement that only 30 members were present and voting at the April meeting.

A final vote on the action will be taken at Tuesday's meeting at 8 p.m. in the Hicks Memorial School gym.

Today's statement urges all members to be present at Tuesday's meeting to insure that the important issue of the former president's disaffiliation is properly handled.

Berkeley Campus Status Becomes Campaign Issue

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — A State Senate committee's report charging widespread Communist and homosexual activity at the University of California's Berkeley campus became a campaign issue in the state's gubernatorial race.

Ronald Reagan, the actor who is seeking the Republican nomination for governor, demanded the man he hopes to unseat — Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown — take immediate action "to restore the university to its once high standing."

A Reagan aide, who declined identification, said Reagan "definitely will make the UC issue a campaign issue."

Brown and George Christopher, former San Francisco mayor and Reagan's chief rival for the GOP nomination, both said they would have to read the report thoroughly before commenting on it.

Los Angeles Mayor Samuel Yorty, campaigning against Brown for the Democratic nomination, was in Boston and could not be reached for comment.

The report of the Un-American Activities Committee, submitted to the Senate Friday, alleged that UC President Clark Kerr was the man whose "unconventional attitudes" of leadership allowed a left-wing section of the campus scene.

Kerr called the report "inaccurate" and "distorted" and challenged the senators to produce evidence there are Communists connected with the Berkeley campus.

Italy Exports Steel ROME—In 1965 Italy turned from importer to exporter of steel for the first time. The country's 1965 output reached 12.5 million tons, an increase of 29.2 per cent over 1964. About 1 million tons were exported. Pig iron production was up 87 per cent, to 5.5 million tons.

After the April meeting, current president Mrs. Walter James in a statement questioned the PTA's effectiveness since the inception of many other clubs in town as well as community service groups.

Mrs. James said rather than being an "inactive group under national requirements" the present board wants to change to a plan "more realistic under existing circumstances."

Mrs. James is running for re-election as PTA president. Election of officers for the coming year will take place at Tuesday night's meeting.

Meanwhile, in a letter replying to a local resident, the president of the state PTA said the resident had a "right to be concerned about the Hicks Memorial Society or any other ultra-conservative group will be behind a plan to disaffiliate the PTA."

In the letter, received by the resident this week, Ray said the state organization is interested whenever any group considers the withdrawal and said the matter was being referred to the regional vice president, Mrs. Maurice Willey of Manchester.

Bill Shoemaker, aboard Abe's Hope for his 12th Derby ride, had three times the odds of his nearest competitors—Bill Boland on Amberoid and Bill Hartman on Demarc.

But only \$174,154 was dropped in the Derby pot on Friday in advance betting at the track. Quinfa and Blise Skyer, their owners, trainers and jockeys in the pool by the amount expected to be in the pool by the time, 5:30 p.m.

Stupendous Mrs. H.C. Phillips' sixth Derby starter since 1928, wrote before, and only four of the jockeys had won previous Derbies.

Shoemaker, looking for victory No. 4 and his second in a row, led the riding parade. Bill Boland, aboard Amberoid, and Braulio Baza, on Stupendous, and John Sellers, riding Advertiser, won once each in the past.

The real stars of the race, the colts, were making their first Derby starts, of course, because only 2-year-olds are allowed in the stakes. The Derby has had 60 or 200 other races.

Longhorns in the race were Quinfa, an early speed to the front, and Blise Skyer, a more cautious starter with questionable staying powers and little written in New York.

Desi Arnaz Returns—As A Director

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — After a three-year absence, Desi Arnaz is back at work in the studio that bears his name. But there's a difference.

Whereas the onetime bongo drum-pounder once ruled the Desilu empire, he is now a renter of space at Desilu Culver studio. He occupies the suite which David O. Selznick used until his death last year. In honor of Desi's return, the place has been redecorated from "Gone With The Wind" decadent to California casual.

The lady who ordered the redecoration is Lucille Ball, Desi's former wife and costar, and his successor as president of Desilu.

"The prettiest landlady in the world," he said. "And a wonderful woman."

Their connection now is purely as landlady and lessor, since Desi sold Lucille all his Desilu stock when he stepped out of the business three years ago.

Why did he leave? "For a number of reasons," he said. "I found that I was working terribly hard, mostly in things that I wasn't particularly interested in. I was stuck with the managerial end of running three studios with 3,000 employees. That wasn't what I got into the business for.

"I enjoyed the creative end — getting together with some writers on an idea, following through with scripts, casting the project and bringing forth the final product. But I found myself tied up with a factory operation."

And so he quit. His marriage to Lucille had already come to an end. He sold out to her and later married Mrs. Edith Eberich. He looked after his horse breeding farm at Corona, Calif., which he terms a \$3 million enterprise. He raced his horses, kept an eye on his Indian Wells resort at Palm Desert, played golf and fished.

Then he got interested in a book, "With Our Consent," and contracted for a movie script. CBS boss William Paley heard about it and asked if Desi would be interested in a return to TV.

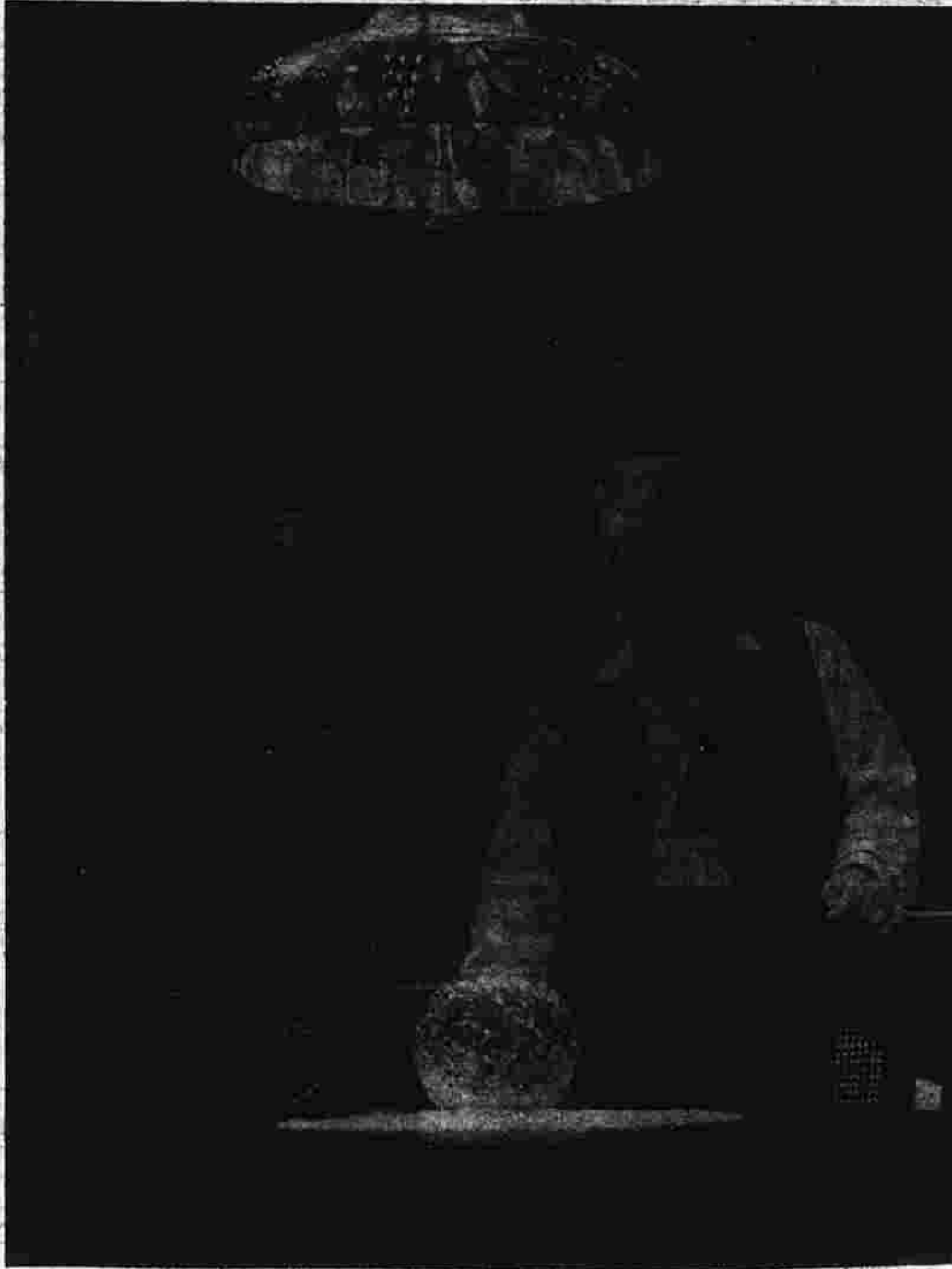
"I've got nothin' against TV," Desi replied. "But I'm not interested in taking over the 20th Century-Fox television department, or MGM's or Screen Gems. If I can operate my own way, without getting involved with executive matters, then I'm interested."

So was Paley, and he made a deal with Desi to develop projects for CBS. Desi went to work and now he has three or four comedy series in various stages of development, plus a special to star Cantinflas.

"I'm operating at my own pace, without pressure," Desi said. "It's tough work to put a series together, tougher than making a picture."

"You have to get a situation that will work — not for just the pilot film, but for show after show. You've got to find the right kind of writers. And you have to cast it properly, not only with the right performers, but with ones who will be able to work together in harmony year after year."

Yet compatibility isn't everything, he said. Vivian Vance and William Frawley never got along on "I Love Lucy" — "But that was all right, because they were always supposed to be fighting anyway."

Cobb as Loman 17 Years Later

NEW YORK (NEA)—Lee J. Cobb admits he is a fortunate man.

He has been allowed to recreate his greatest role in a long and very distinguished acting career at a time when, he says, "very few so-called creative people are doing what they want."

Cobb's heartbreaking performance as Willy Loman in Arthur Miller's "Death of a Salesman" will be seen in a two-hour color special tomorrow.

"In Hollywood, creative people are doing shows that they naturally hope will succeed, but it is very rare to be impelled by

a feeling that 'this is what I want to do. Should it not succeed, still, I tried.'"

Cobb, a delightful and extraordinarily talented actor, says that feeling was his before "Death of a Salesman" opened on Broadway 17 years ago.

Returning to the play was like renewing an acquaintance with an old friend.

"The senses can't be denied. It is an old friend. I remembered it as one remembers an experience. I hadn't played the role since I did it on Broadway. Yes, there was a new approach, but it hasn't been altered basically. It's good to be far enough removed from a role so that you are not tempted to

repeat or, even worse, be tempted to try to do it differently. Both are pitfalls."

Cobb has not admitted to many people that he has seen the television tape of Salesman, but he has. "I am very critical of myself and others, which could be a weakness of vanity," he says. "But I think there are several good things in it and in my book of accounts that places it head and shoulders above good commercial television."

Hollywood where Cobb spends his spare time sailing ("Sailing has overtaken me rather late in life and it means a lot to me"), has improved over the last few years, he feels.

'TV Audiences Are Spoiled Rotten'

NEW YORK (AP) — "Americans today are exposed in one year to more good comedy, superior writing, more vaudeville routines than another generation saw in a lifetime," said producer George Schlatter.

"Audiences know when a show is slow, whether it is derivative, if it is a spoof or a put-on. Think of the people who have seen the Bolshoi Ballet, experienced opera, have their choice every night of comedy or drama."

"Think of the numbers of hours of entertainment, education, culture and comedy available. I say that even 15 years ago

nobody could conceive of an industry that could turn out this enormous quantity of material — and do it easily and, generally speaking, well."

Schlatter, who has had a hand in developing many a Variety series, including a couple that failed to fulfill their promise, is a passionate defender of television.

"I say that the television audiences are spoiled rotten," he said.

The free-lance producer recently taped an NBC special saluting winners of Grammy Awards, given by the record business' Academy. It will be

broadcast May 16, with singing stars repeating award-winning performances and other celebrities introducing them.

This is a one-shot program of a very special nature — a program planned around preselected personalities and well-known music.

"The day of the pure 'personality special' seems to me to be running out," Schlatter said, "and I think we will have to come back to a special program that, in itself and conception, is the big event."

Schlatter may be prejudiced.

Zorro Image Disappears, Star Finds

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — To Adam West's worries that he might become permanently identified as Batman, Guy Williams remarks: Not necessarily.

Williams beat the game. A few years back, it seemed as if he would be stuck forever with the image of Zorro. Yet this season he made a successful return to the home screens as Prof. John Robinson, the man who leads his family through a variety of adventures in CBS' "Lost in Space."

Come to think of it, there is much similarity between Batman and Zorro. Both hark back to the "Scarlet Pimpernel" theme of the young man who poses as a flop while being an undercover do-gooder. Whether on horse or batmobile, both made their entrances out of a cave.

And both Batman and Zorro captured the fancy of the nation. Batman has done so while competing in the same time slot as "Lost in Space," although both are made by 20th Century-Fox.

"If that wasn't bad enough," said Williams, "earlier this season, 'Lost in Space' was on at the same time as 'Zorro' in New York City!"

Yet "Lost in Space" has survived to orbit next season, and Williams with it.

His escape from the Zorro image was managed despite the odds—and an unfortunate circumstance.

"We made two seasons of the series, then Walt Disney got mad over his treatment at the hands of ABC," the actor recalled. "The suit was in court for two years and meanwhile I wasn't allowed to do anything. I felt like a kept man; all I did was collect my ever-increasing salary."

"During that time, I had no chance to prove I could do anything else besides Zorro. But I was fortunate in being able to make 'The Prince and the Pauper' for Disney. Then I made three pictures in Europe that helped establish me as an actor. By the time I returned from Europe after three years, the Zorro image was pretty well dissipated."

"I don't mind the fact that 'Zorro' is playing all over the world on reruns. Those residual checks can be mighty comforting."

Hugh Downs of NBC's "Today Show" also was talking about television practice Wednesday. In a speech prepared for the Advertising Club of New York, he cautioned Madison Avenue about aiming what he called "bad commercials" at viewers.

He decried "too many one-joke commercials repeated to a point of great unfunness — a bite out of a hat may be funny but not the 30th time you've seen it."

He also mentioned "biological distortion" — hammers in the head and fires in the stomach. He warned about diminishing credibility by using fantasy that gets too far out.

Downs, who must have delivered thousands of "sponsors' messages" in his long broadcasting career, did admit that there were some "good commercials" too. But he didn't say which ones he thought they were.
