Threatened Nurse Strike Added to New York Woes

NEW YORK (AP) — New York's troubles today are compounded by the threat of a nurse strike which would add to the city's already heavy burden of unemployment, housing and other social ills.

The Nurses Association of New York City announced today that it is preparing to call a strike of its 15,000 members on Monday.

The strike would be the first in the city since the 1955-56 walkout of the city's 15,000 police officers.

The nurses' union is demanding a 10 percent raise in wages and a new pension plan.

The city health department spokesman said that the strike would be a "major disaster" for the city.

South Windsor \$2.6 Million Sewer Project Facing Electorate Tomorrow

Town voters will go to the polls tomorrow to vote on a \$2.6 million dollar question—whether or not the town will construct sanitary sewers to serve the Rt. 5 industrial area.

The polling places are the Pleasant Valley School, for district 1, and the South Windsor High School for District 2. The polls will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Virtually all town agencies and boards, including Mayor James Thrope, are on record in favor of the project.

It is approved about six miles of sewers will be constructed, through the major portion of the town's industrial area, and primary treatment plant will be built to process sewage before it is disposed in the Connecticut River.

The project would require an initial increase in the tax rate of about 2.2 mills, decrease to a low of one-half mill at the end of 20 years.

Federal assistance of \$627,000 was cited by Mayor Thrope as being available, following a trip to Washington last week to discuss the project with government officials. Together with anticipated income tax revenues, the total cost would be realized from sewer assessments to be paid by beneficiaries of the project.

Operational and maintenance costs will be raised through an annual sewer-use charge levied upon those actually using the sewer. No contribution from general tax revenues is contemplated toward plant operation and maintenance.

The sewer authority says that construction will be less than at some future date, when building costs will be up, Reeves notes that construction costs are rising at 6 per cent annually.

If approved at the polls, construction of the sewers is slated to begin in the spring of 1966, with completion scheduled for the spring of 1968.

The primary treatment plant is estimated at \$1.5 million. The plant will be designed eventually to handle sewage collected from the entire town. The initial treatment facility cost \$900,000 to be paid by beneficiaries of the primary treatment plant. Federal aid would probably be available when such legislation is passed.

Young John Garfield Tall Edition of Dad

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The young man's name is John Garfield Jr., and you recognize his name immediately. You see the same deep-brown eyes, the easily-rumpled hair, the square cheekbones. School — "Strong as an Eagle." You also catch glimpses of the Swift, as a "Vulture" flaring note in his height — a tower 6-feet-2 vs. his father's 5-10. Young Garfield has come to Hollywood at age 22 — his father was 20 before he made the journey. John Sr. was already a Broadway star when he made his film debut in "Four Daughters" in 1938.

His son has a year of stage experience behind him and is starting with a two-page bit in "The Warning Shot," starring David Janssen. He is replacing Dodge pitcher Don Drysdale, who has gone on to other things.

Like all second generation performers, Garfield is aware of the assets and liabilities of bearing a famous name.

"It used to be a hang-up with me, but I've learned to live with it," he remarked. "Listen, it can be a real advantage in getting to see people who can help you. But of course that's all it does for you; then you're on your own."

Young John was born here during his father's tenure as Warner Bros. star — "as in a sense I'm coming home." He moved to New York when he was 8, and his father died when the boy was 6. So his memories of his father are dim, but his son's image has been refreshed, a member of the actor's union, and he is possible to help them.

But Larry Joel damn near did. Shouting encouragement as he moved from the wounded to the leg, slapped on bandages, injected needles, wiped blood to the broken bones, applied tourniquets, transmitted plasma, down out of the line of fire. "Medic, a man would yell, 'please, medic!'"

One, for example, had a gaping oozing hole in his chest before the medic improved a piece of plastic to seal the cavity.

He worked for hours, moving a dozen times across the bitterest, bloodiest stretches of activity. Helping, hauling, running, falling; he used a stick for support and where there was no fresh wounded to care for, he rechecked the dressing and conditions of the existing wounds.

But when the activity broke away he rushed to the center of it. And when the enemy began charging in human waves, blasting their way with shot and explosion, Joel stood resolutely in the middle of the holocaust, training plasma into dying men.

He continued a full day like this, walking when possible, crawling when not. . . until, finally, his legs would maneuver no more. Then, near collapse, he was carried from the battle.

Kidnap Sentences
PARIS (AP) — Three men were sentenced Thursday night to prison terms ranging from five to 20 years for the kidnap of two-year-old child of Mrs. Marcel Dassault, wife of a multimillionaire builder of French planes.

Jean-Jacques Cassanova, 38, received the maximum sentence of 20 years.

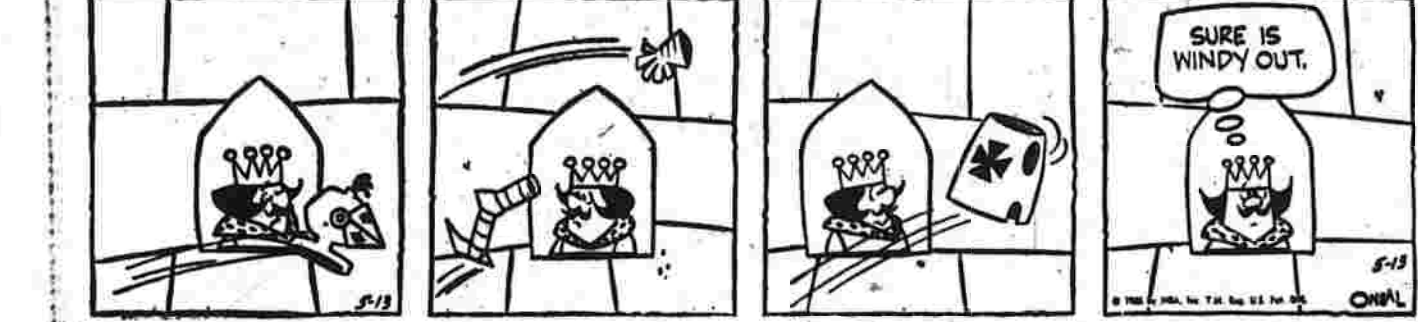

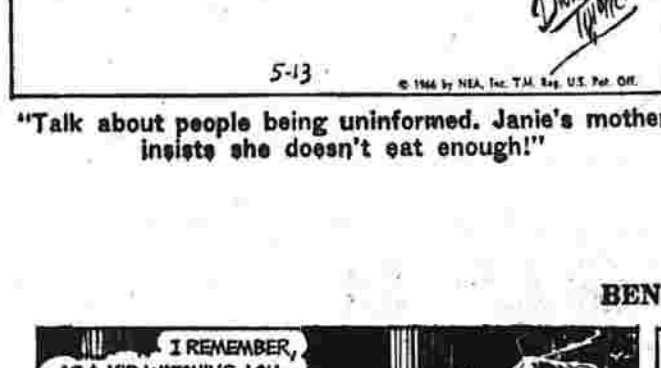

She's a very talented young woman, and so good to look at, too! Mrs. Newirth heads an outstanding cast of accomplished actors which includes newcomer Julian Brownstein, Fred Bligh, Noel Kleiza and Willis Jay. Mr. Brownstein makes his bow as a very agitated Bob McKellaway, husband of Mary. Bob is a real "square" who finds that he can afford neither divorce nor remarriage. Bob's fiancée, Tiffany Richards, is played with wide-eyed earnestness by Miss Kleiza, who bounces about touting health foods like yogurt and wheat germ; and Fred Bligh is completely charming and very amusing as movie star, Dirk Winston.
