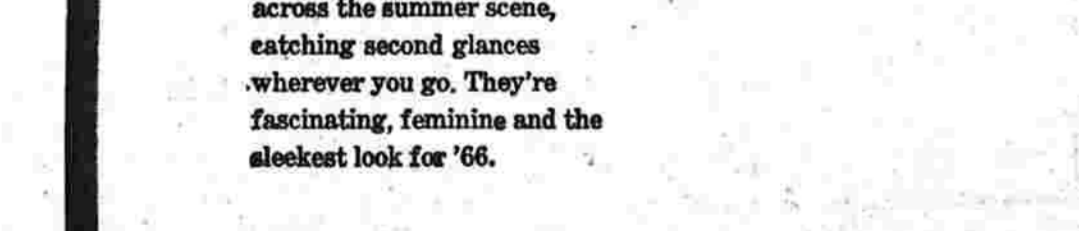

BIEN HOA, Viet Nam (NPA)—Enough is enough. It wasn't so astonishing when Erwin Davis was shot in the leg the first time. One might even shrug off the second wound and the third, well, stretching the proposition that, too, could conceivably be accepted as simply the way this bullet bounces.

But how about the next? This time the sergeant dropped a 30-caliber bullet through the fleshy part of his upper leg... not far from the first hole.

It all started last year when Davis, a 24-year-old sergeant from Pisco, Tex., was crawling through a war zone, slipping and stumbling and gasping at the pain.

The order that day was for Davis to be alone. He was a major, graduate of a military academy, and his superior officer had been reluctant to accept his assignment.

It's not difficult to guess what happened then. He was shot in the leg.

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Duvalier Firms Grip On His Haiti Fiefdom

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (AP) - Papa Doc is putting financial teeth into what he calls his "revolution" - the Duvalierian look over in 1967. The Duvalierian look over in 1967.

Papa Doc, as he is known to all in the Caribbean, is president for life of what poses as a 20th-century nation.

He has demolished the old and must consolidate his position at home and now feels that he can, if nothing else, last out his term.

This means money is needed to pay for the security that keeps him in power. Every source is being tapped - and new sources created. Quietly, in the last eight months, the dictator has created an export-import monopoly that milks revenue out of every product coming in and going out of the country, from nails to fish.

To attract tourist dollars, Papa Doc is trying to give Haiti the look of a scenic spot at peace and at work. This isn't hard to do where all political resistance has been crushed. Ironically, the country where poverty has been nearly institutionalized is rich in a soft, fragrant tropical beauty.

Port au prince and environs have undergone a dramatic change from the eerie days of the 1963 crisis. Gone from the streets are the military checkpoints and the sight of armed men. The atmosphere is thick with resignation to the fact of Papa Doc's control. Exile radio broadcasts, originating in New York, seem to provide more conversation material than hope.

The exile broadcasts sometimes are accurate about what is going on inside the country. Often they are not. The speed with which some information gets to the New York station "Cat Walks" according to the suspicious that U.S. government agencies may be involved.

Papa Doc, in an effort to maintain what looks like a new pro-U.S. line, says only: "I have no comment to make on the exile radio."

The city seems far more peaceful, more attractive than Santo Domingo in the neighboring Dominican Republic. Prices are half here of what they are in the Dominican capital. The inflow of tourism is increasing, especially from French Canada. Haiti hasn't been abandoned to its fate. France, Germany and Spain are providing scholarship programs for Haitian students. The Swiss have sent a sort of educational Peace Corps with teachers working for only room and board. The minimum American effort is concentrated in a program to eradicate malaria.

The consolidation effort has been officially labeled the "administrative" phase of the so-called Duvalier Revolution. He said in a Jan. 3 speech the "repressive phase" had been completed - which was taken to mean he felt the opposition had been eliminated.

With unchallenged control, Duvalier can afford to relax the repressive measures that gave him his dictatorship a bad name abroad. It is believed the two primary objectives of the new policy are:

1. To attract possible U.S. assistance, even with the conditions he imposed in the past. Washington is interested in seeing that aid goes down somehow to the peasant - about 80 per cent of the population - who manages to subsist on eight cents a day.

2. To give less justification for exile agitation and plotting from the Dominican Republic.

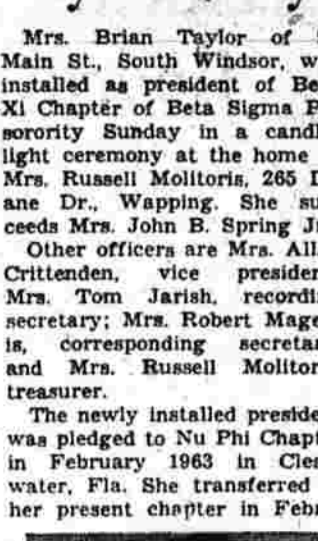

More Funds Asked To Run Colleges

The State Board for Regional Community Colleges yesterday voted to apply for a \$819,664 additional appropriation to operate its 5 two-year colleges next year, approved a new two-year restaurant-hotel management course for Manchester Community College and appointed a director for Manchester's Mid-dletown branch.

The \$819,664 additional appropriation would be added to the \$361,870 currently allotted to the community colleges for 1966-67 operation, raising the total to \$1,281,534. The state board's request results from expected enrollment increases, which anticipate 413 students could be served during the coming year at schools in Manchester, North Stratford, an increase of 1,260 students over previous estimates for 2,877 students.

According to Fred Ramsey, director of the University of Maryland's European Division since 1961. The board also accepted student enrollment projections prepared by a University of Connecticut analyst predicting that the number of students in state community colleges by 1975, instead of the 17,000 previously projected, will be the first of the projected increase in the state and will add 275 students from throughout Connecticut.

Shapp, Shafer Winners In Pennsylvania Primary

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Court, the state's second highest tribunal, Shapp, the first Jew ever nominated by a major party for governor in this state, carried most of the 67 counties. He spent money lavishly in his campaign.

Shapp's victory was of particular significance to Gov. William W. Scranton, who is ineligible to succeed himself. If Scranton has 1968 presidential aspirations, as most Pennsylvania men believe he has, he would need a Republican administration in Pennsylvania as a campaign base.

Both parties nominated a Negro for statewide office for the first time: Democrat Juanita Kidd Stout and Republican Theodore O. Spaulding. They seek a 10-year term on Superior Court.

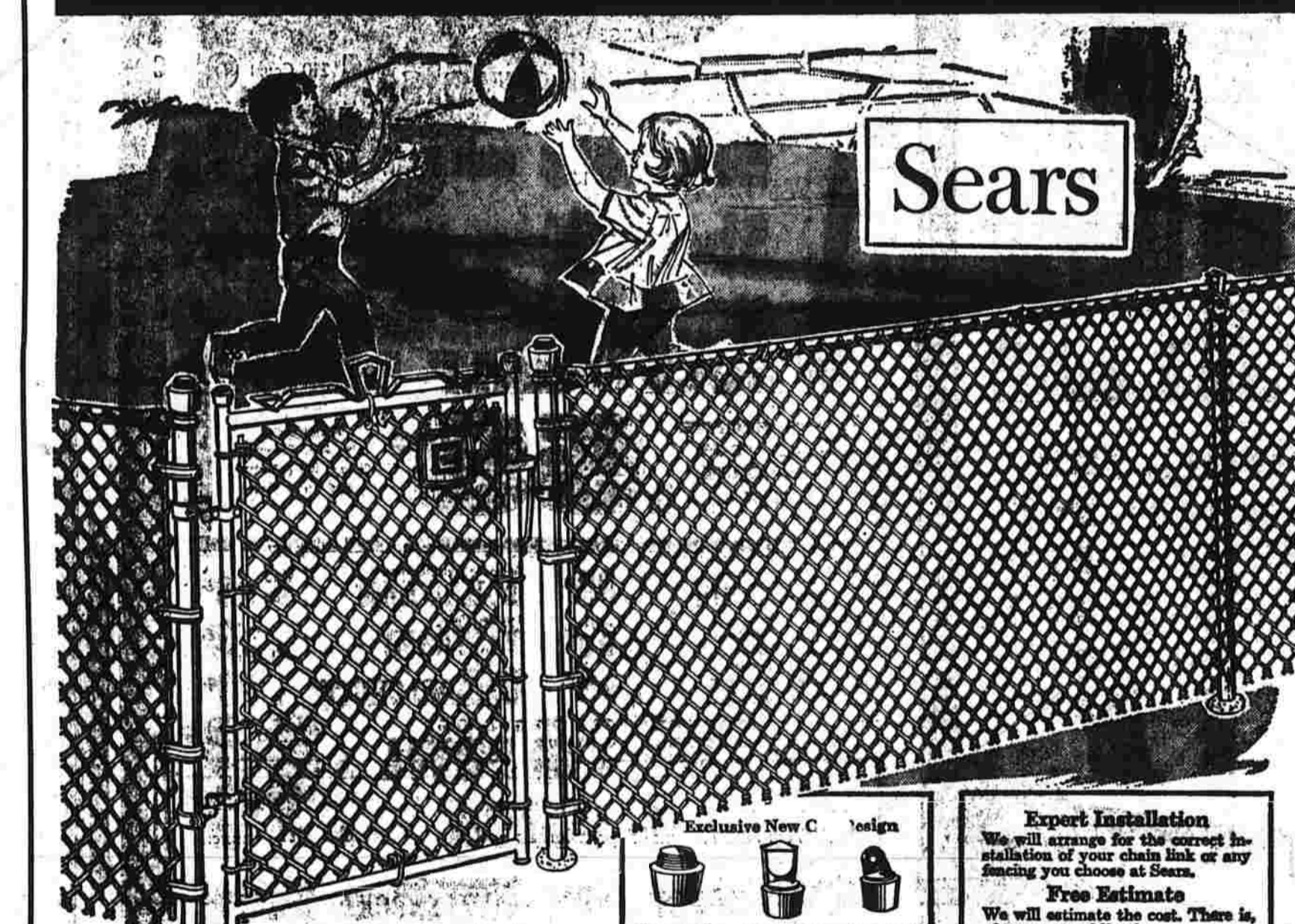

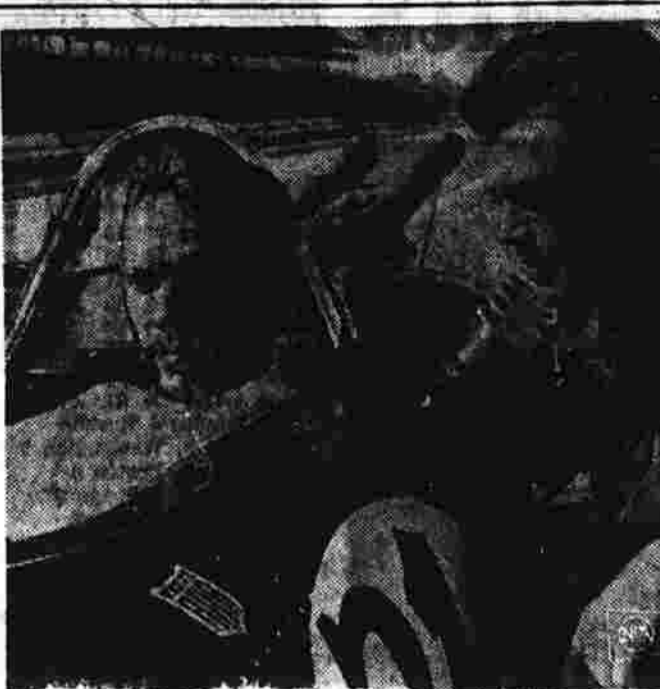

Marichal stopped the Dodgers as the 18th inning when he pitched a hit in the 11th. He earned run average only slightly higher at 3.79.

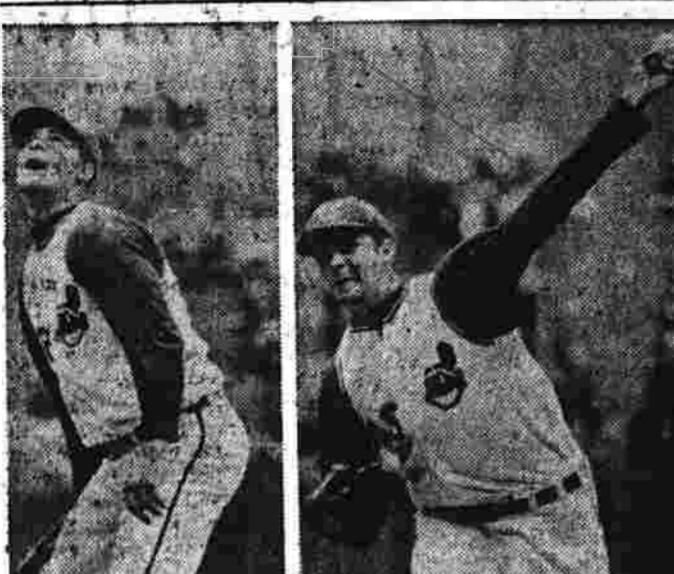

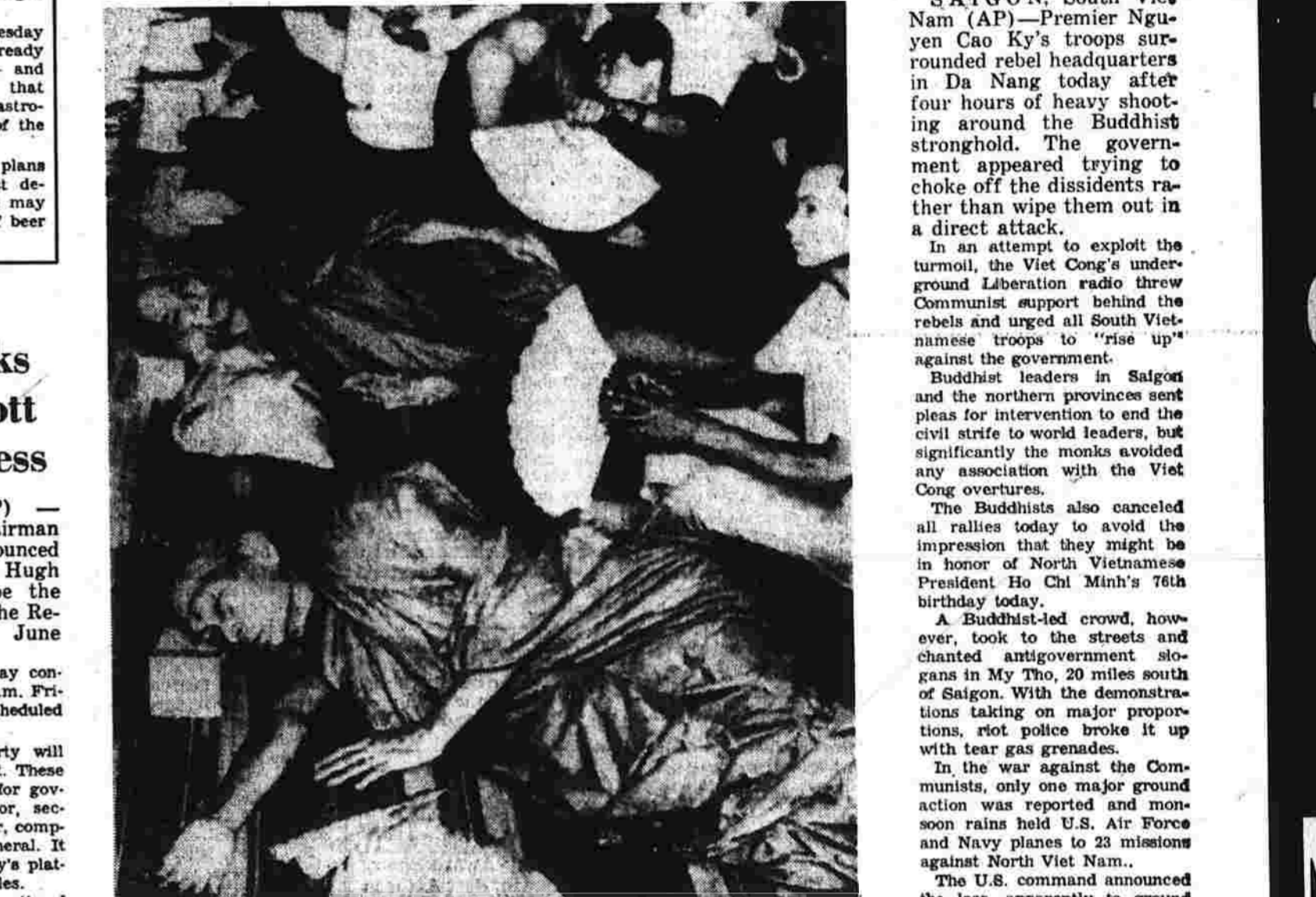
