



Dangerous Intersection Claims No Lives -- Yet

By LAWRENCE MOE

The recent, widely-publicized Congressional hearings on auto have resulted in widespread discussion of the whole problem of automobile accidents.

While the focus of the public inquiry has most recently been on mechanical causes of acci dents, the layout of the highway at the place the accident occurs can not be ignored.

Such seems particularly to be the case at the intersection of Rts. 6 and 87 in the southeast section of town.

Within the last two years, at least eight serious accidents have been logged in the immediate area of the intersection, and all except one have involved a collision of two motor vehicles. After viewing the mangled vehicles, one wonders why no fatalities resulted.

The fact that all eight accidents occured between the hours of 6 and 8 p.m., most of them in the fall and winter month's, suggests inadequate over head







Again The Mephistophelean Advice It grows almost inconceivable, how, even as, graying in years, he looks more and more like some Mephistopheles, former Secretary of State Dean Acheson continues to preach evil among us with his disarming boldness and disdainful charm.

It is now over a year and a half ago that, in a prelude to the way the Johnson administration was subsequently to behave in using its power in the world, Mr. Acheson went up to Amherst and made a clever, persuasive speech in which he argued that it would be immoral for a great power to try to be moral. We say "persuasive" in deference to the prompt way in which the spirit of his speech was followed by sub-

sequent national action. It is in a spirit free of moral responsibility, and in accordance with the dictates of a philosophy which says that the end always justifies any means, that the United States has, in the past year and a half, been demonstrating its masterful leadership and lowering its prestige in the world.

Now Mr. Acheson has made another of his famous speeches, and this time, with that famous intellectual superiority of his, he taunts all lesser beings to sit still and quiet and convinced while he puts the cause of law in the same gated morality.

Down at the University of Virginia on May 7, Mr. Acheson set forth his conclusion that the world was suffering a withdrawal of the legal order, that might was prevailing over law, and that "the conclusion seems plain that in the search for ways to maintain our values and pursue them in an orderly way, we must look beyond the resources of law."

This is the subtle sanctimony of the Mephistophelean approach, that it offers us the excuse that it is in order to "maintain our values" that we must "look beyond the law" but never reminds us that law itself is one of the greatest and most fundamental values of our civilization, and not only the one chief thing we have clambered out of the jungle to get, but also the only thing that has a chance of keeping us in a state of advance for civilization and away from a return to that jungle.

Amhassador Goldberg remembered that Mr. Stevenson believed that the principles of law and ordered freedom were "not to be kept in a glass case and admired by tourists but to be put to work in the real world, where order grows strong by trying its muscles

against disorder." And he remembered that Mr. Stevenson had once said, of the United Nations: "Let none of us mock its weakness, for when we do, we are mocking

And Ambassador Goldberg went on to say, of us, that "our nation derives its great influence in the world not only from great physical power, but also from the fact that our basic law and our national outlook are premised on the quality and dignity of all men.

"The way to peace in this turbulent age," he continued, "is to keep that national wisdom, to work with all our might for the establishment of a structure of law that will be reliable and just to all nations. For though law alone cannot assure world peace, there can be no peace without it. Our national power and all our energies should operate in. the light of that truth.

"In real life, law and power operate together. Power not ruled by law is a menace, but law not served by power

Unfortunately, Ambassador Goldberg who thus speaks with some balance and sanity, has high official position but little influence with the Johnson administration, while Mr. Acheson, victim of the suave illusions which have enabled men to keep on indulging and honoring the worst in themselves, has been wielding high influence with that administration without holding any official position personally.

It is not working because it hasn't decided what particular line of endeavor it prefers at the moment. There may be a ackground situation, consisting of the fact that the particular job the worker once possessed, and liked, has disappeared. But the Russian theory is that there is always a job for everybody some place, and that as long as this is so there is no such thing as joblessness.

Actually, we think the Russians should be given credit for handling the terminology and the psychology of a certain human economic condition more tastefully than we do, even though the reason for it-that they don't want us to know how swiftly they are catching

the Russians had no profit system either, let alone unemployment. Now, just like us, they have both. The day grows near when, without fear of contradiction, one will be able to pronounce the communist system a failure, because it has turned out to be nothing but the capitalist system in disguise. Would that, when it gets to be full reality, have to be labeled a success? Or would the would-be perfectionist have to label both systems failures?

Adults Never Learn


