Sheinwold on Bridge

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD The late Edward Fricshauer, one of the greatest card players in the history of the game, would have won everything in sight if he had been a disciplined bidder. Today a hand, one of his defensive gems, was played in Los Angeles Bridge Week a few years ago.

Declarer discarded his remaining spades on the king and jack of clubs and then led the queen of hearts from the dummy. Fricshauer naturally played ... well, the "normal" play would have been to lead with the ace of hearts and leads a third round of spades. South's hand and lead suits, your partner, losing the jack to East's king.

First Time It's easy to see the right play now. We're looking at all four hands and have already seen how the "normal" defense goes. Fricshauer got it right the first time, looking only at his own hand and the dummy. When the queen of hearts was led from dummy, Fricshauer stepped up with the king of hearts and led his last spade. South ruffed in his own hand and led another trump.

Dangerous Intersection Claims No Lives - Yet

The recent, widely-publicized Congressional hearings on auto safety have resulted in wide-spread discussion of the whole problem of automobile accidents.

While the focus of the public inquiry has most recently been on mechanical causes of accidents, the layout of the highway at the place the accident occurs can not be ignored.

Such seems particularly to be the case at the intersection of Rts. 6 and 87 in the southeast section of town.

Within the last two years, at least eight serious accidents have been logged in the immediate area of the intersection, and all except one have involved a collision of two motor vehicles.

After viewing the mangled vehicles, one wonders why no fatalities resulted.

The fact that all eight accidents occurred between the hours of 6 and 8 p.m., most of them in the fall and winter months, suggests inadequate overhead lighting.

The pattern for most of the accidents is the same—car pulls out from Rt. 87 and collides with vehicle traveling on Rt. 6.

There is no blinker or stop light to warn the Rt. 87 cars that they are approaching a dangerous major highway.

Many people who live in the vicinity of this accident-prone corner, and know it well, believe that the many entrances and exits into Rt. 6 make it inherently dangerous.

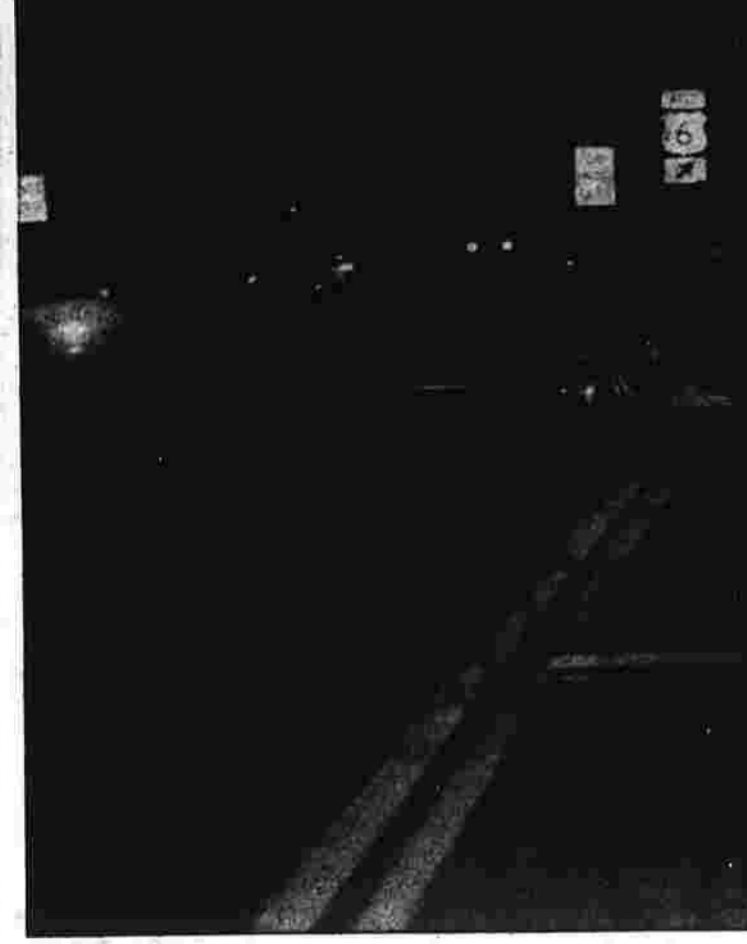
There are five entries to Rt. 6 from Rt. 87, and three entries to Rt. 87 from Rt. 6.

Of especially doubtful need is the case into Rt. 4 from Merritt Valley Rd. The concrete abutment of a railroad overpass to the driver's left limits the view of oncoming eastbound traffic to about 70 feet.

The design of the intersection of the two highways is one which was perhaps good in its day. Now, with many times the traffic and much higher speeds, the design seems to have become dangerous.

The highway department certainly can not make up for human failings which have and continue to contribute to the accidents there.

However, improved highway engineering, traffic controls and overhead lighting can reduce the probability of accidents.



The intersection of Rts. 6 and 87, about 9 p.m., May 12, looked like this. Six people were treated for injuries and one was hospitalized after the driver of the car (center) pulled out from Rt. 87 into Rt. 6 and rammed into a truck.

The most severe hazard occurs when fast-moving cars come through the flat curve just before the railroad overpass. Too often they meet up with cars lingering too long in the left-hand lane of Rt. 6 after leaving Rt. 87.

Residents of the area petitioned the First selectman on April 14, 1964, to take the matter up with the State Highway Department.

He did so, and the department said it would investigate. A letter from the chairman of the board of fire commissioners on Nov. 17, 1965, to the highway department brought the same response.

In recent months the highway department has stated it has intentions in installing a warning light at the intersection. A department spokesman says that the department is working with town officials to "reach some kind of satisfactory solution" to the problem.

But, so far at least, nothing has been done.

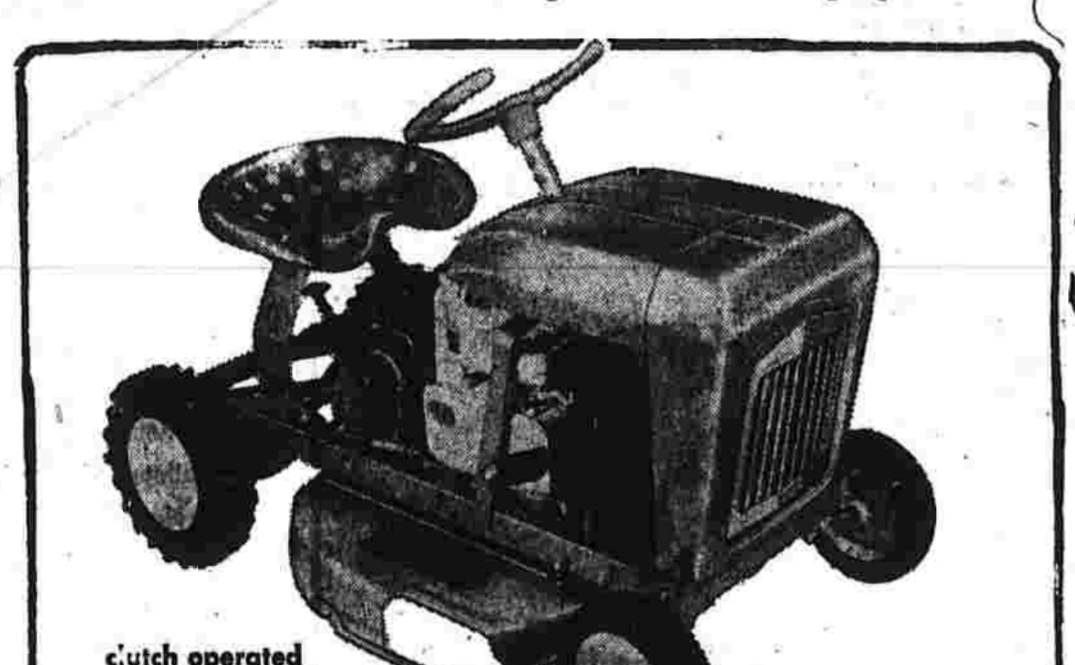

Charter Change Hearing Brings Much Discussion

About 20 persons attended a public hearing conducted last night by the town charter revision commission and appeared to enjoy the informal and informative session.

The meeting, held on the second Tuesday in June, is considered by proponents of the recommendation to be unproductive.

Several residents argued for retaining the town meeting. "It's the only chance a resident has to voice his feelings on the town budget," one person said.

Under the present charter, a public hearing is held on the late April, which is then considered and passed by the board of representatives and then presented at the town meeting for adoption.

Two representatives, Atty. Frank McCoy and Thomas G. Carruthers, said they were opposed to abolishing the town meeting.

"The town meeting serves as a check on the board of representatives," McCoy said. He said that its abolition would take initiative away from the people.

Carruthers said that the town meeting makes the board of representatives "more responsive to the people's wishes."

Peter Humphry, a member of the charter revision commission, noted that the town meeting is very undemocratic.

Another man noted that, at Tuesday's public hearing on the budget, about 200 persons, or about one per cent of the town's population, attended. He suggested that the public hearing be expanded, and that one evening be given over to general government budget and one to school systems.

Mayor Thomas J. McCusker noted that residents at the hearing were upset over the tax increase.

"I'm not defending the board of education," the mayor said, "but you'd have to tell the board to pare another \$200,000 from its budget (to effectively reduce the tax increase)."

This would mean that the new Vernon Center Junior High School would be put in mothballs and not used.

"The most difficult thing to explain to people is the rising cost of education," Mayor McCusker said.

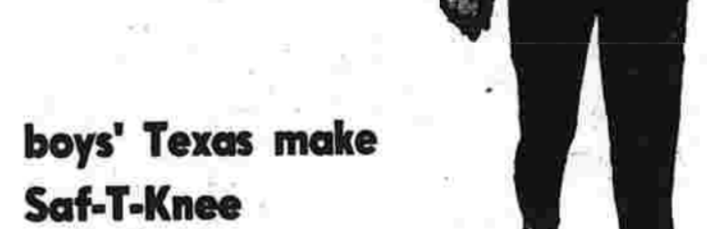

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Again The Mephistophelean Advice

It grows almost inimitable, how, when an young man, he looks more and more like some Mephistopheles, former Secretary of State Dean Acheson continues to preach evil among the good with his disarming boldness and disdainful charm.

It is now over a year and a half ago that, in a prelude to the way the Johnson administration was subsequently to behave in using its power in the world, Mr. Acheson went up to Amherst and made a clever, persuasive speech in which he argued that it would be immoral to use force to try to bring about a great power to try to be moral.

It is a spirit free of moral responsibility, and in accordance with the dictates of a philosophy which says that the end always justifies any means, that the United States has, in the past year and a half, been demonstrating its masterful leadership and lowering its prestige in the world.

Now Mr. Acheson has made another of his famous speeches, and this time, with that famous intellectual superiority of his, he has again all but convinced him he puts the case of law in the same doghouse to which he has already relegated morality.

Down at the University of Virginia on May 7, Mr. Acheson set forth his conclusion that the world was suffering a withdrawal of the legal order, and that the conclusion seems plain that in the search for ways to maintain our values and pursue them in an orderly way, we must look beyond the resources of law.

This is the subtle sanctimony of the Mephistophelean approach, that it offers us the excuse that it is in our "best interests" that we must "look beyond the law" but never reminds us that law itself is one of the greatest and most fundamental values of our civilization, and not only the one chief thing we have clambered out of the jungle to get, but also the only thing that has a chance of keeping us in a state of advance for civilization, and away from a return to that jungle.

We must look beyond the law if we are to protect the law, says Mr. Acheson, and we can see all the havoc of the world swirling agreement. But it is to be noticed, with some interest, that Mr. Acheson has, in this instance, drawn an answer, which comes, perhaps fittingly, from inside that very hope of law which Mr. Acheson now discounts and discards.

It was Arthur J. Goldberg, our Ambassador to the United Nations, who, confronted with an occasion on which he was to deliver a lecture in memory of Adlai Stevenson, his predecessor as Ambassador, at least provided the beginning of a disagreement with Mr. Acheson.

And Ambassador Goldberg went on to say, of us, that "our nation derives its great influence in the world not only from great physical power, but also from the fact that our basic law and our national outlook are premised on the quality and dignity of all men."

Unfortunately, Ambassador Goldberg, who thus speaks with some balance and sanity, has high official position but little influence with the Johnson administration, while Mr. Acheson, victim of the naive illusions which have enabled men to keep on indulging and honoring the worst in themselves, has been wielding high influence with the administration without holding any official position personally.

More And More Like Us

More and more, the supposedly Communist system of life in Russia is getting more and more like ours. The latest capitalist blessing to be identified inside Russia is that of unemployment. It is the Russian, nowadays, who has been celebrating in recent weeks.

As often happens when an ideology borrows a blessing from one of its supposed rivals, the Russian Communists try to disguise the connection or the parallel.

So Russia doesn't have "unemployment" but by that name. What it has is merely a situation in which a certain percentage of the population is busy "selecting work." It is not working because it isn't deciding what particular line of endeavor it prefers at the moment. There may be a background situation, consisting of the profit system, the psychology of a certain human economic condition more tastefully than we do, even though the reason for it—that they don't want us to know how easily they can do it—is not there is no such thing as joblessness.

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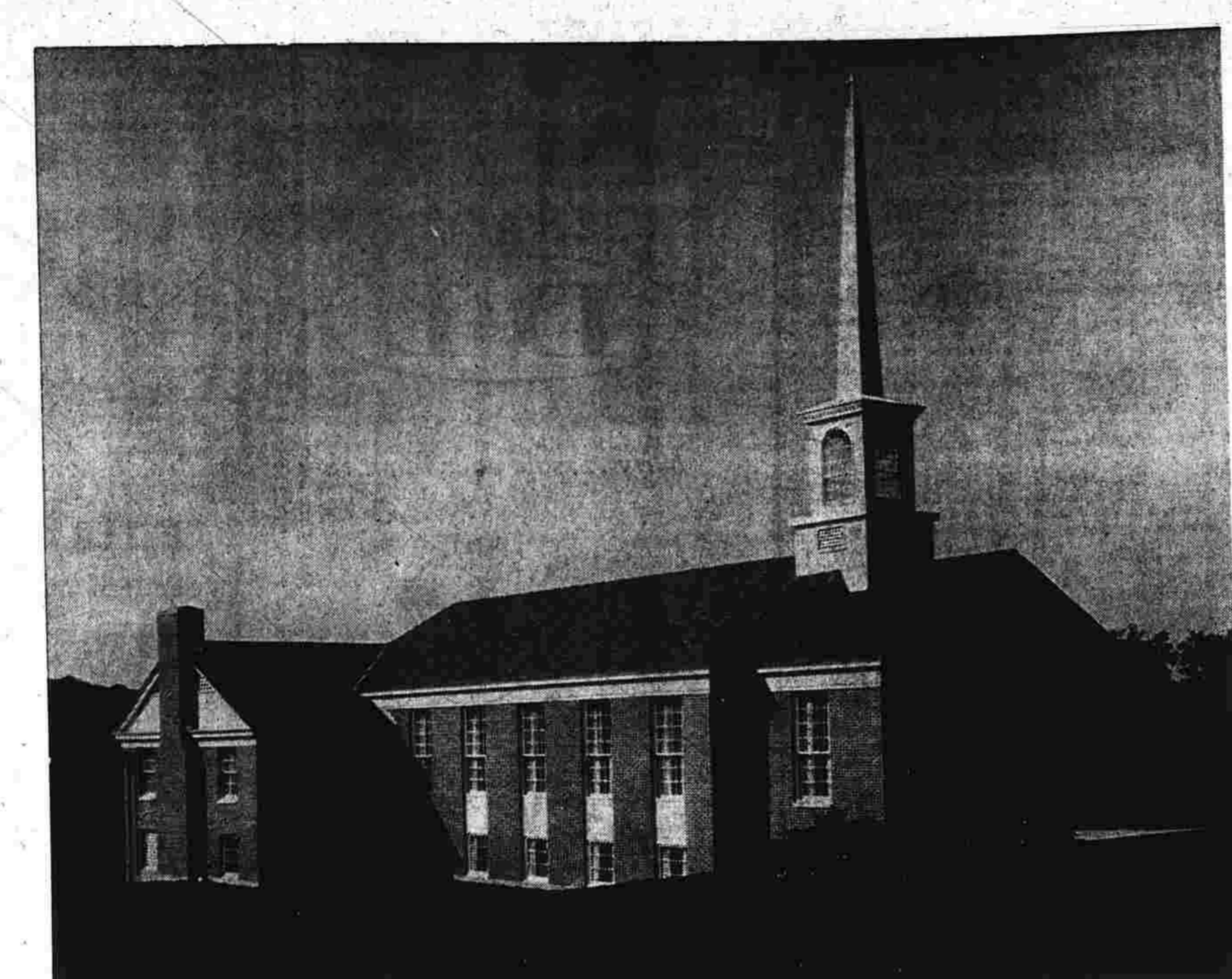

Percy then went on to read off a lengthy indictment of President Johnson in Viet Nam: "Palmer goes to the United Nations before the resumption of bombing in North Viet Nam; in three previous Senate campaigns he has refused to support the right-wing Bourbon Republicans who allowed the war; spread and escalation of the war; convening of the 'unimpeachable and ill-advised' Honolulu conference; inability to get us allies to send troops to Viet Nam; the reputation of such charges throughout the state as the long campaign begins to erode the support of the highly popular Douglas, the best Democratic vote-getter in this state's history to no better than an even bet against Percy. One secret survey delivered to Percy recently by an Eastern pollster shows the race at this early stage to be a virtual dead heat."

This is particularly noteworthy because Douglas, a staunch anti-Communist, has been one of the Senate's most dependable supporters of Mr. Johnson's Viet Nam policy. Consequently any feeling that this stance could cost Douglas his seat might start a nationwide search for Democratic candidates away from the President's support.

Coping with College Beatniks, Activists?

The freedom openness and relative ambiguity one faces in college is a shock and that shock derives from the very thing that most college students most seek — independence. The first shock of independence often occurs with the realization that the college faculty is making some large, generous assumptions about the new student's maturity. For example, the professor addresses his first session of the first class "Ladies and gentlemen, this morning we shall examine..."

Some argue that a college is a separate and special community. As such, college students should not participate in the life of the larger community. In short, college is an ivory tower. Intellectual activities on an abstract level are essential. It is essentially a form of exercise preparing the student for existence after college.

The contrasting viewpoint is that college is a laboratory for self-discovery. This cannot be done in isolation or in a social vacuum. The evolution of one's values is only possible in the context of real problems. The student must be fully engaged in the life of the larger community. In short, college is an ivory tower.

Unhappily, these normless "beatniks" are not only a threat to their own artistic achievement, they are a threat to the moral, form and values are essential in art — as well as all other human activities. "Beatniks," real and fancied, have been a boon to those people who find fault with campus life. But, if it were not for that, it would be something else.

Nimbus in Orbit GREENBELT, Md. (AP) - The first of the new large class of weather satellites, is in an almost perfect orbit and operating in all respects as nearly perfectly as could be, scientists of the Goddard Space Flight Center said today.

The spacecraft, launched into a near polar orbit May 15, for the first time offers instant weather pictures from space, around the clock.

The man who was down was swallowed. The plane who was down was his friend. Quickly, Flesner banked his single plane into a turn toward the crash area. He knew the site well . . . an acre of opening burned off of a hill but southsome jungle.

The opening was no man's land. The jungle belonged entirely to the enemy. Flesner glided in at 1,500 feet for a first, frightening look. The plane was crouched on a crumpled wing and entangled in rice straw. Close by were dozens of panicky people in pajamas filling the air with automatic and recoilless weapons fire.

The captain's craft took punctures immediately. Off to his right a wave of rescue helicopters were already making a landing. Limping retreat in the face of the awesome groundbait. Flesner, however, did not retreat.

It was his friend down there. He had to determine the plane's condition. He knew the guy too well to believe he would surrender. If the crash hadn't killed him, he might still be holding the Cong at pistol distance from inside his mangled machine.

Flesner made a swooping dive into the holocaust, slid over the wreckage, made a futile observation, took an altitude turned and decided to go it again. . . . even lower.
