Tax Receipts Up, Deficit May Shrink

WASHINGTON (AP) — The tax collector has good news for Uncle Sam's budget balancer. Net tax receipts for April were 16 per cent above those of the same month last year. And if the trend continues as government experts expect it will — the anticipated budget deficit for the fiscal year ending June 30 could shrink by \$1-billion to \$2 billion.

Government experts won't discuss the prospects of a drop in the estimated \$4.4 billion deficit. But it's no secret that receipts have exceeded expectations since the beginning of the year.

It's all tied in with the booming economy, higher personal income, bigger profits and consequently, bigger tax receipts. The Treasury's monthly report showed net tax receipts for the first 10 months of this fiscal year totaled \$19.1 billion. May and June, historically the best tax months, are still to come.

The \$9.9 billion in net receipts during April compares with \$8.5 billion for April of last year. Last January, the administration estimated net receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30 at \$19.1 billion. They forecast a budget deficit of \$4.4 billion. Since then, there have been several revisions.

NEW YORK — Odds are that the elusive formula which creates an atmosphere of excitement and suspense will be evident in large measure in this year's awards presentation of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

The 18th annual event, "The Emmy Awards Program" will be broadcast in color tomorrow from 10 to 11:30 p.m. on CBS, from the Palladium in Hollywood and the Americana Hotel in New York.

"Emmy" is the coveted gold statuette symbolic of television excellence presented each year by the Television Academy.

The excitement and suspense have been set up by re-instituting categories of television programs, with three to five programs or performers nominated in each of the 38 different categories.

This and the intimate "center staging" with the podium and the stage placed in the middle of the Hollywood Palladium, West Coast scene of the Awards broadcast, are the format devised by Julio DiBenedetto, producer of "The Emmy Awards Program."

DiBenedetto explains: "The excitement and suspense come out of the competition — and the emergence of a winner. That is the main feature of this show. All else is secondary."

DiBenedetto points out that, unlike past years, this time around there will be no comedy sketches or musical numbers. He reasons that an awards program must be presented as such; the competition for the awards being more than enough to keep both nominees and home audiences on the edges of their chairs.

## The Boy Wonder 'Puts on the World'

NEW YORK — (NEA) — He didn't put up in the Batmobile, he didn't climb up the outside of the building, and he wasn't masked, but you could tell by the red patches of excitement on the cheeks of 10-year-old Bobby King that the good-looking, slight young man who got off the elevator was the Boy Wonder himself, Robin.

In an effort to learn what the fans of Batman, the ABC series (in case you didn't know), really want to know, young Master King was recruited to conduct the interview.

"What kind of shoes do you and Batman wear when you climb up a wall?" he asked 20-year-old Burt Ward, who plays Robin.

"We don't really climb up the walls," Burt explained. "The walls are built at a 45-degree angle and the cameras tilted at a 45-degree angle, and it looks as if we are climbing straight up."

"What do you do in the Batmobile if it rains?" Bobby asked.

"We slide a glass shield forward," Burt said.

Ward came to New York to work out a recording deal, to appear on The Merv Griffin Show (for which his father-in-law, Mort Lindsey, is musical director) and to rush from one interview to another.

"Holy Heart Attack," he was heard to exclaim, as he rushed out of his in-laws' New Jersey home.

"Our hours in Hollywood are unbelievable," Burt said. "We are ridiculous and unbearable, to 9 or 10 at night. The hours are ridiculous and unbearable, but the work is fun. I tell people that we get up in the morning, go to the studio and put on our clothes to put on the world."

Burt, who is doing his first professional acting as Robin, and who is much better looking than he appears in his tights and mask, was raised in "the slums of Beverly Hills," and is really something of a Boy Wonder himself. He is a fine athlete who has pitched several no-hit games in a Los Angeles Municipal League. He planned at first to be a professional golfer. In scholastic tests given at UCLA, he ranked in the top 30 per cent

in the country in math and science. He is a speed reader with an authenticated record of reading 30,000 words a minute with 90 per cent retention.

Burt does his own stunts on Batman, he told Bobby, now fallen into silent adoration, and has nearly been killed five times. He has grown so blasé about the dangers he could only remember four of the times.

"On the first day of shooting when we were racing the Bat-

mobile out of the bat cave, we were zooming around a corner and the door on my side flew open. I didn't have a seat belt on and those tights slip on leather. I just caught my finger on the gear shift in time to keep from being thrown out.

"Then in that show with the Catwoman, I was really strapped only 13 feet over the tigers — and tigers can jump 20 feet. They had meat over my head to see that they were jumping, too.

"One that really scared me was when they had us tied on gigantic wheels which were supposed to go around faster and faster. Well, on a movie set no one can do anyone else's job, and when the time came to turn off the wheels, the guy whose job it was couldn't be found. We kept going faster and faster and I started yelling and I was almost knocked out before they turned the wheels off.

"Every week I worry about the next show, wondering what they will do to me.

"Hey," Burt said to Bobby. "I bet you want to know how Bruce Wayne and Dick Grayson change into Batman and Robin in the time it takes them to slide down the Batpoles. Well, it's easy. The wardrobe man slides down between us and helps."

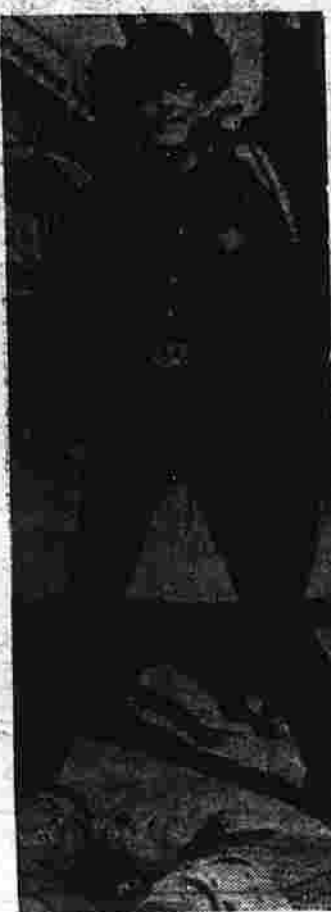
## The Gang Joins Last Show

## Test of Drivers Is on Tuesday

The program, based on the book of the same name by the famous children's author, will include three songs, with lyrics by Dr. Seuss.

Dr. Seuss is a pseudonym for Theodor Seuss Geisel, who has written more than two dozen whimsical stories for children. He illustrated his own books with equally whimsical drawings.

### HAMILTON HOST

Actor George Hamilton will be the host of "Class of '67," a one-hour variety special to be shown in September, on NBC. The program will feature college fads and interests. If it is successful, the network said it may turn it into a series.
