License Fix Pleadings Are Stalled NEW HAVEN (AP) — Legal snarls put off the scheduled pleadings today of five men accused of perjury in connection with an investigation of alleged payoffs for suspended drivers' licenses.

One of the defendants, Chester Orneli of Meriden, actually pleaded innocent to the charge. His lawyer was unsuccessful in two motions to have the charge dismissed.

Another defense counsel, William L. Hadden Sr., sought to present a memorandum to show that the constitutional rights of the men arrested were violated. Judge Sidney Johnson set June 2 to hear Hadden's motion.

KoC Sued BRIDGEPORT (AP) — A \$200,000 suit has been filed against the Knights of Columbus by a man who claims he suffered a disabling injury during his initiation.

Heavy Rains Flood Texas

MIDLAND, Tex. (AP)—Cloudbursts and violent electrical storms left heavy flood and fire damage in parts of west Texas today.

Water turned streets into small rivers and lapped over the doorsteps into some homes at Midland, an oil field center of 70,000 people, as an estimated 3 inches of rain poured down.

At Andrews, 40 miles northwest of Midland, muddy torrents flowed six feet deeper after 2.75 inches of rain descended in 30 minutes.

Fire started by lightning destroyed a warehouse containing about 2,000 bales of cotton farthest west at Poyte.

Small blazes also broke out in at least two houses at Midland as lightning flickered on all sides.

State Police received an unconfirmed report a tornado funnel whirled through the air just south of Odessa. They found no evidence it touched ground.

Flooding was widespread on the west side of Midland and some cars washed off U.S. 80. Police said all motorists were able to wade safely.

Some witnesses estimated at least 2 inches of rain fell within an hour at Midland. It was accompanied by hail up to three-fourths of an inch thick.

Lightning split trees at Andrews, where both electrical and telephone service were disrupted temporarily.

The storms reached their height shortly before midnight while a wide stretch of west Texas was under a severe weather alert.

Heavy rains fell at many points. A 2.3-inch downpour drenched the area around Hunt, 18 miles west of Kerrville in the southern Texas hill country.

The U.S. Weather Bureau said the resulting runoff would cause a rise of 10 to 16 feet on the upper Guadalupe River.

The rain splashed across the southland from western Texas to the Carolinas and Florida. Nearly four inches of rain doused Florence, S.C., in a 12-hour period.

Ky, Rebel Chief Meet Under U.S. Auspices

ALAMOGORDO, N.M. (AP) — School trained chimpanzees, pioneers in exposure to the airless void of space, are helping the space agency define safety limits for space walking astronauts.

Navy Lt. Cmdr. Eugene A. Corman is scheduled for a 2-hour, 20-minute space walk during the Gemini 9 flight. Data from the chimp tests to date indicate Corman could be rescued if suddenly exposed directly to the vacuum of space.

The animals are part of the Chimp College at Holloman Air Force Base near Alamogordo. Enos and Ham, astrochimps who rode rockets into space, were trained at the school.

Since 1964 the 6671st Aerospace Medical Research Laboratory at Holloman has been conducting tests for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in which the chimps are exposed in rapid decompression chambers to simulated altitudes of 150,000 feet.

An astronaut would encounter such an altitude should his space suit rip or his face plate break during a space walk.

Alfred G. Koester, director of the tests, said results are revealing a little of a physiology textbook. Previously scientists believed direct exposure to space vacuum would result in death, with the blood boiling and the lack of atmospheric pressure possibly leading to the body expanding and even bursting.

Koester reports more optimistic results with the chimps, generally regarded as the animal physiologically closest to man.

All our healthy chimps have survived in excellent physical health," Koester said in an interview.

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Dodd Cuts Amount of Label Suit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Thomas J. Dodd has revised his compromise and label suit against cosmetics Drew Pearsall and Jack Anderson, shortening the term of the suit from 10 years to six months, and asking for a speedy trial.

Dodd's original suit, filed May 4, asked for a \$6 million judgment against the cosmetics, whose charges of improper conduct against the Connecticut Democrat are being investigated by the Senate Ethics Committee. Dodd requested the committee investigate the charges against him, saying he had nothing to conceal.

The revised complaint reduces from 10 to three the specific claims of libel and asks that the case be assigned to a single federal judge and also asks that preliminary proceedings be held.

Dodd said he hoped this would permit all preliminary proceedings to be completed in June so that trial could begin in July.

Among the complaints dropped were allegations that Pearsall had libeled Dodd by falsely and maliciously stating: he had unlawfully diverted campaign contributions to his personal use without reporting the funds as taxable income, and he had sought and secured government contracts for a Connecticut firm that loaded him a car.

The principal cause of action left in the suit are based on the "columnists" charges that Dodd, in return for expensive gifts and other favors, used his position to help a Chicago public relations man retain his West German clients, and that he had tried to upset U.S. policy for a unified Congo by cooperating in 1961 with an agent of the breakaway Katanga Province.

The suit also retains the charge that Pearsall and Anderson had conspired to injure and destroy Dodd's "business and occupation" and had induced employees of the senator to remove documents from his files.

Dodd said the revised suit was designed to insure trial of the case at the earliest possible date.

"This team must be kept together for the solution of problems that have not yet developed against the Apollo missions," he said.

Chinese Militarists Clash with Politburo

The November date pegs the clash between the Chinese Communist Party Politburo and the Chinese army's top brass, which has been in the making for six months. Producing a deep internal crisis which has persisted for six months, the Politburo and the army's top brass are seen to be losing out, but the struggle may be far from ended.

The crisis evidently has been one of the first magnitude upon which the party press indicates, has been the future of both party and state.

Among the dissidents appearing were the Politburo members but who considered the Chinese military backward in a period of time, and who regretted the loss of Soviet technological help in 1960. Such dissidents may have wanted to find a road to ideological and state-level peace with the Moscow leadership.

A clue to all this turned up this week in a Chinese account of an air force political organization's conference.

The armed forces paper, Liberation Army Daily, said in a meeting was held: "The first problem we military men must solve is whether we want to carry out the revolution or whether we should let revisionism prevail in our country."

"Revisionism" is the Chinese party term for Soviet ideology. The meeting criticized "some people" who have embraced the dissidents — for asking, for example, what good an air force is if its planes are not flying. Those who complained said the weak link in the armed forces was technology.

This was considered wrong thinking, the paper found. Technology was important to the armed forces. It indicated the dissidents were losing the struggle.

"The mentality of the armed forces," it said, "has undergone a great change since Comrade Lin Biao's instructions about giving prominence to politics and the armed forces, and were carried out. However, some people are not yet fully aware of the seriousness of the class struggle."

Defense Minister Lin Biao, a powerful, doctrinaire member of the Politburo with an anti-Soviet outlook, evidently shared the theory that Soviet technology was important to the Chinese armed forces.

In those "instructions" he said: "What is the best weapon? Not artillery, nor airplanes, nor tanks, nor atom bombs. The best weapon is Mao Tse-tung's thinking."

The "instructions" were issued Nov. 15. The date is important. Before then, the press now says, certain plotters used prominent writers to spread "poisonous weeds" and an anti-party line.

Said the Peking People's Daily (AP): "Earthquakes are continuing at the rate of three a day in the Ben area of North China. A new repeating battle broke out, and Wu Han, the collaborator of Teng To, was brought to light."

Wu Han is Peking's deputy mayor and a member of its party secretariat. Teng To is a party secretary and former editor. Both now can be linked with a purge drive in the armed forces.

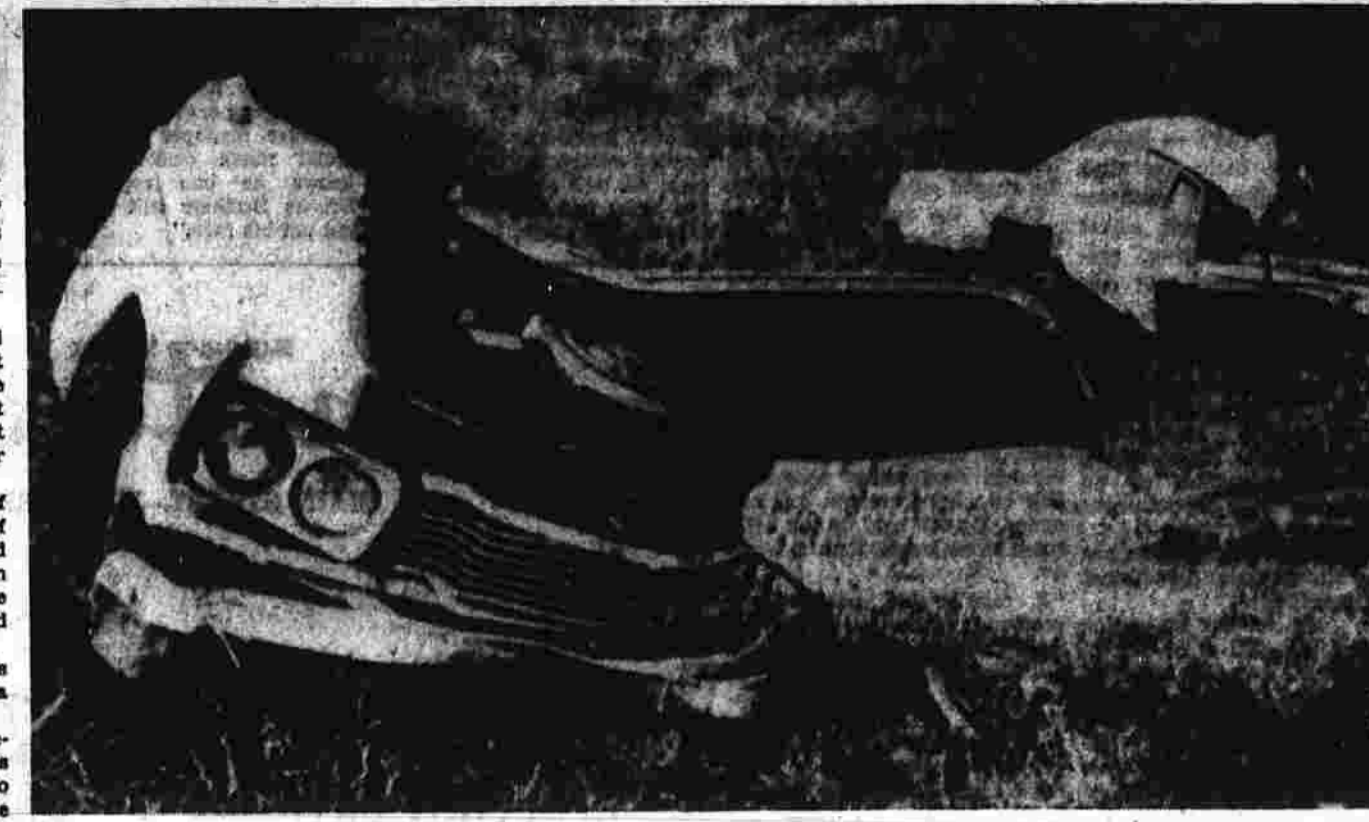

Legislator Dies After Fire Hits Michigan Hotel

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — State Sen. William Romano, a Democrat from the Detroit suburb of Warren, collapsed and died from a heart attack minutes after fire raged 16 legislators and scores of other guests from a Lansing hotel today.

Romano, 55, who had been in the legislature since 1944, had emerged onto the sidewalk in front of the Roosevelt Hotel when he suddenly collapsed. An ambulance crew standing by administered oxygen.

So there are busy days for the 24 Capitol guides, says their captain, Calvin Kimbrough. He's 46, a Texan who became a guide 11 years ago with the help of the late House Speaker Sam Rayburn.

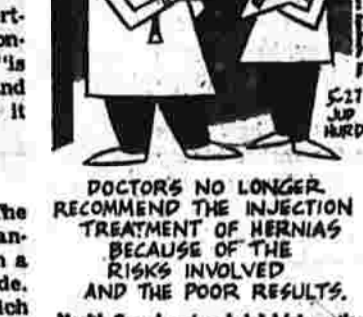
VAUGHAN, Ontario (AP) — The Soviet Union vaguely accused Western powers today of intrigue and aggression in the Middle East and said equally vaguely that Moscow cannot remain indifferent.

A semi-official statement supported complaints to the United Nations by the new leftist regime in Syria. The Soviet government has recently been strengthening its ties with Syria.

The statement, distributed by the official Soviet news agency Tass, referred to a number of events as alleged evidence of Western subversive activity and intrigue in the Middle East. These included the recent meeting in Turkey of the Central Treaty Organization; a conference of American ambassadors in Beirut, Lebanon; visits by U.S. warships to Lebanon; and an alleged meeting of high-ranking American officials with a bus on a highway west of Israel.

N.Y. Takes New Look At L.I. Sound Bridge

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP)—A special study committee appointed today by Gov. Rockefeller is taking a second look at the proposal for building a bridge across Long Island Sound to Connecticut.

Rockefeller's office reported today the committee would re-examine a route it once had rejected, and would look into the possibility of providing a rail-road crossing on the span.

Last January, the Long Island bridge study committee recommended building a \$25-million bridge from East Marion on the eastern end of Long Island to Saybrook, Conn. It would channel highway traffic from New England to Long Island and on toward New York City.

At the same time, the committee rejected two other proposed bridge into Connecticut and tie into the electrified system of the New Haven Railroad, providing continuous highway service.

Rockefeller said the committee had been requested to "give more intensive study to the options" of the Port Jefferson

transportation authority chairman, William J. Ronan, who also is the governor's secretary. Ronan and McGovern are "reviewing all proposals for Long Island Sound crossings with a view to making definitive recommendations for legislative action," the governor said.

At Monday's joint meeting with the public hearing commission, architect Arnold Lawrence said the proposed route would be a rail-road crossing, and would be ready by early next fall.

The Metropolitan Commuter Transportation Authority, which operates the Long Island Railroad, has been considering the possibility of providing service by installing electrically operated equipment on the portion of its line between New York City and Port Jefferson.

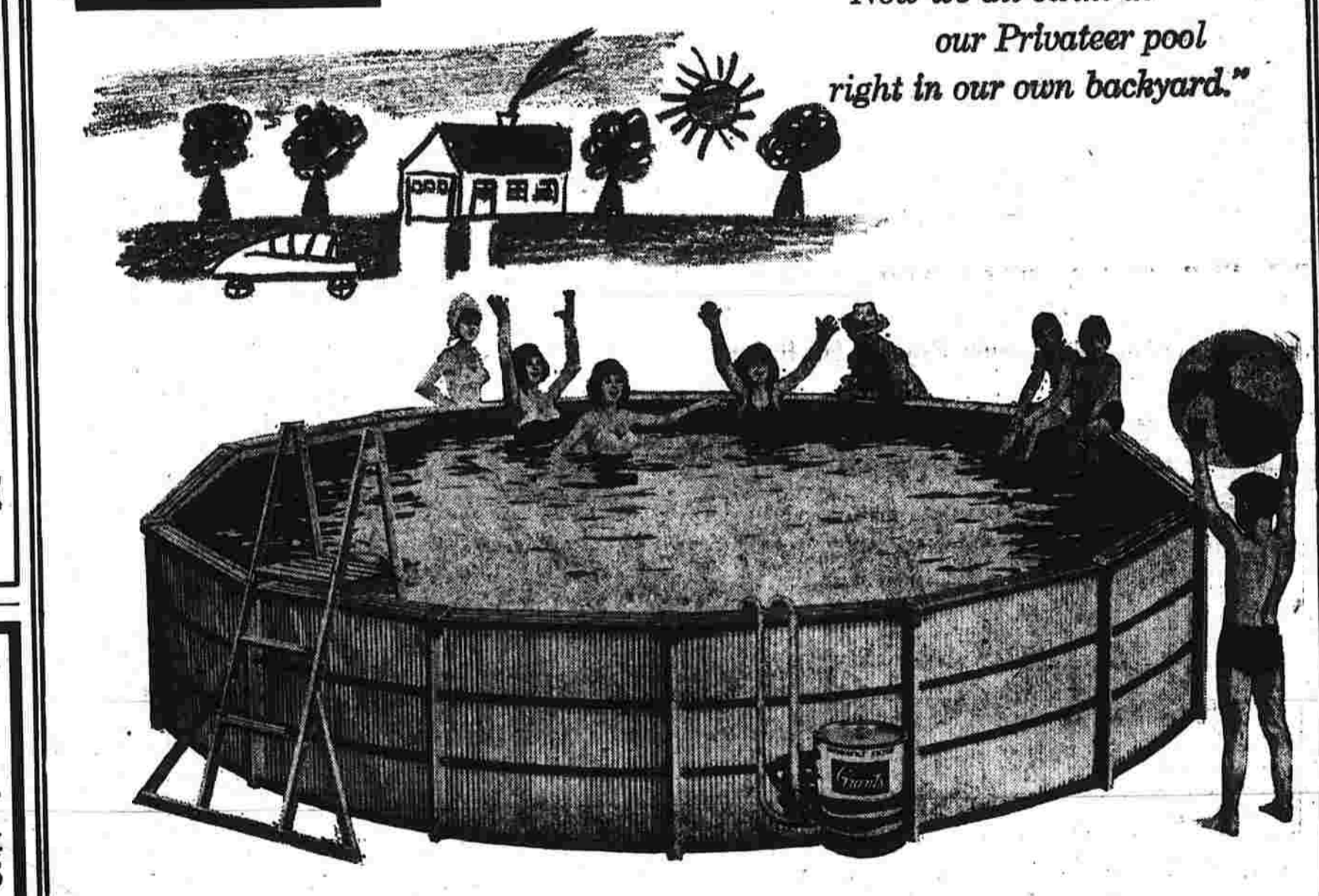

Hearing Set on \$80,000 Main Budget Valid, Town Counsel Rules

Town Counsel Irving Aronson has ruled that the integral parts of the 1966-67 General Fund budget, (departmental appropriations) as adopted by the board of directors on May 5, are valid, and has recommended that a public hearing (scheduled for June 7) be held to validate an \$80,000 Capital Improvement Fund item, which he called "not an integral part of the budget."

Aronson's opinion devotes two paragraphs to the directors' action in adopting the \$80,000 Capital Improvement item.

"The board of directors could have gone along with the manager's recommendation and not have had to make a recommendation to the Reserve Fund at this time. They could have waited until the amount of the surplus and then, upon recommendation of the manager, appropriated a portion of the whole of the surplus to the Capital Improvement Reserve Fund. In any case, this would not have affected the budget."

The fact they chose to make an appropriation now does not affect the budget. The amount that was appropriated was less than the manager recommended to be financed by the bond issue. The amount appropriated was less than the total of the capital improvements requested by the various departments. The total budget adopted by the board of directors (\$9,813,849) including the \$80,000 appropriation to the Capital Improvement Reserve Fund, while it may be slightly more (\$4,822) than the total budget recommended by the manager, exclusive of his capital improvement program, is still less than the total budget (in Manchester's case it is requested by the various departments) to create a reserve fund for capital and non-recurring expenses."

Police Will Use Radar To Cut Speeding in Town

Manchester police will begin an expanded use of radar in an effort to slow down speeders. Police Chief James Reardon said that radar units instantly determine the speed of a passing car and record it for possible violation when speed limits are exceeded. Radar has been used on and off, but police have generally issued warnings in most cases instead of making arrests. The tougher attitude, the chief said, follows a rising number of complaints from townpeople about speeders and motorists on Manchester streets.

Chief Reardon said the police may start using radar tomorrow. He said it will continue to be used as long as it proves its worth.

More Workers 'In' Minimum Wage Bill Gets House Support

WASHINGTON (AP)—The helped consolidate support for the measure. The House voted 228 to 185 to delay one year the second step increase taking the wage floor to \$1.60. The new date will be Feb. 1, 1967. The provision boosting the present \$1.25 an hour figure to \$1.40 next Feb. 1 was left undisturbed.

The 203-92 House vote Thursday sending the bill to the Senate marked a substantial victory for President Johnson and the AFL-CIO, which lobbied for the measure. The bill's backers said they considered the coverage provisions of the measure to be more important in many respects than the wage boost since most workers now covered already receive more than \$1.60.

Coverage would be extended for the first time to employees of farms, laundries, hotels, motels, restaurants, hospitals, transit systems, canneries, logging firms, cotton ginning firms and the federal government.

On Wednesday the House voted tentatively to eliminate proposed coverage of 1.4 million employees of small stores and businesses.

But, on a 200-156 roll call vote Thursday, administration forces succeeded in restoring this provision.

The 485,000 farm workers who would be brought under the act are employed in relatively large-scale operations. It is estimated there were indications this

Finance Board Supported; Tax Rate Set at 49.75 Mills

A tax rate of 49.75 mills was set by the board of finance last night after a town meeting approved a town budget of \$1,800,170 for the 1966-67 fiscal year.

The approved budget is essentially the same as one recommended by the board of finance. The budget request proposed by the finance board to the selectmen's board is \$1,800,000 for the school board (compared to \$1,800,000 the board had requested); \$37,461 for the board of selectmen; \$5,000 for the board of welfare; and \$200,000 in bond principal and interest.

The 49.75 mill tax rate is up \$4 mills from the 45.5 mill rate levied for the last full, 12-month fiscal year, which was 1965-66. The current budget (1966-67) is for a ten-month fiscal period that marks the town's switch to the uniform fiscal year.

The only act approved by the town meeting last night was of \$500 from the selectmen's account. An \$850 allocation for miscellaneous expenses was reduced to \$200. The funds were destined to go to the newly formed Nathan Hale ancient Fife and Drum Corps.

The board of education had asked town residents to oppose the board of finance's proposed school budget of \$1,120,000, and approved, instead, the school board's request of \$1,800,000. No such matter is on the agenda tonight.

The vote on the school budget was taken separately from the vote on the rest of the budget. At the request of the meeting, the voters backed the finance board's recommendations 258 to 90.

Action on the other budgets was taken by voice vote. Little opposition was heard when the vote was called.

Fourteen efforts were made to trim the selectmen's budget. The \$800 cut from the miscellaneous account was the only one to be approved by the voters. Eight other motions, totaling more than \$100,000, were turned down by the meeting, and the remaining five failed to get second.

Although there was considerable interest expressed in the school board's budget request and the reasons for the finance board's cuts, there were few strong reactions from the meeting.

School Board chairman Donald Young and other board members supported the school budget request, and finance board chairman Wesley Lewis explained his board's actions.

With 248 votes cast on the school budget, the meeting was one of the more heavily attended in recent years.

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP)—A man's voice—like a fingerprint—has been used to convict an airman of making obscene telephone calls to women.

Convicted by court martial Thursday was Airman 2.C. James C. Wright, 26, of Chicago.

One of the calls was recorded and sent with a recording of Wright's voice to Voiceprint Laboratories of Somerville, N.J. The laboratory declared both calls were made by the same man.

Lawrence G. Kersta, a member of the laboratory's staff, testified a human voice produces a "print" that can be identified on a photograph. The voiceprint system is 99.99 per cent foolproof, he declared, and as accurate as fingerprinting.

Wright, the court martial found, made the calls to Gray Ladies he met while a patient in the base hospital.

Wright was sentenced to six months hard labor and a bad conduct discharge. There is a military review of all court martials.

Last April a Westchester County court in White Plains, N.Y., allowed a voiceprint to be introduced as evidence in a case. It is believed to be the first time such evidence was allowed in any court.

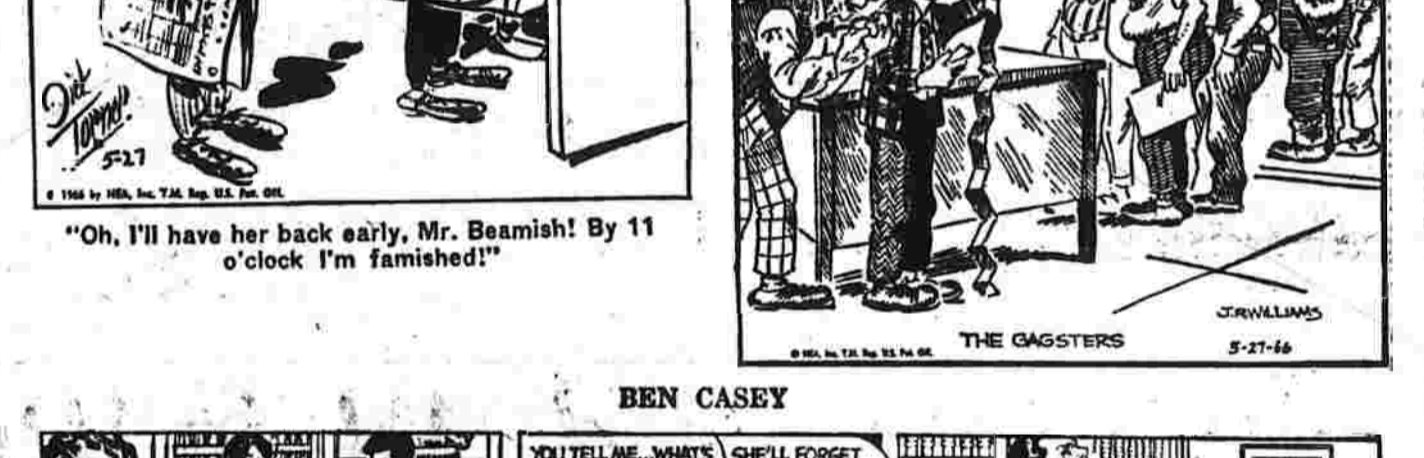
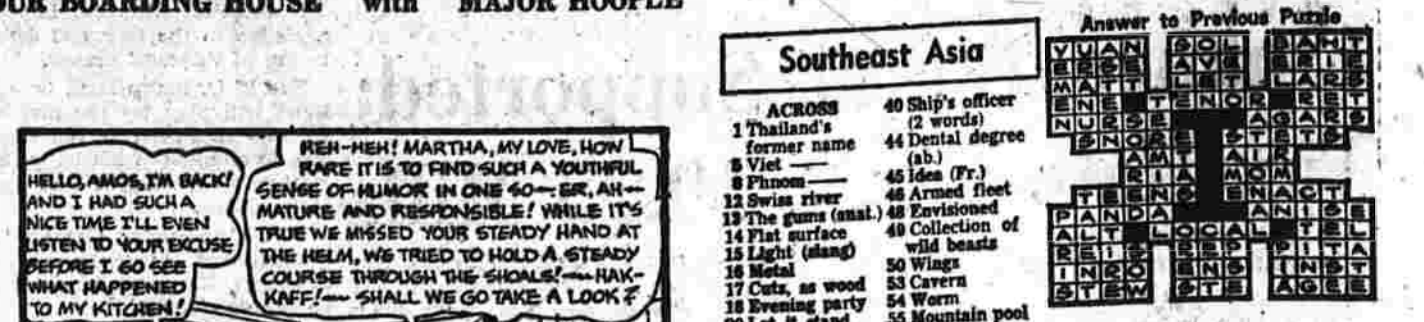
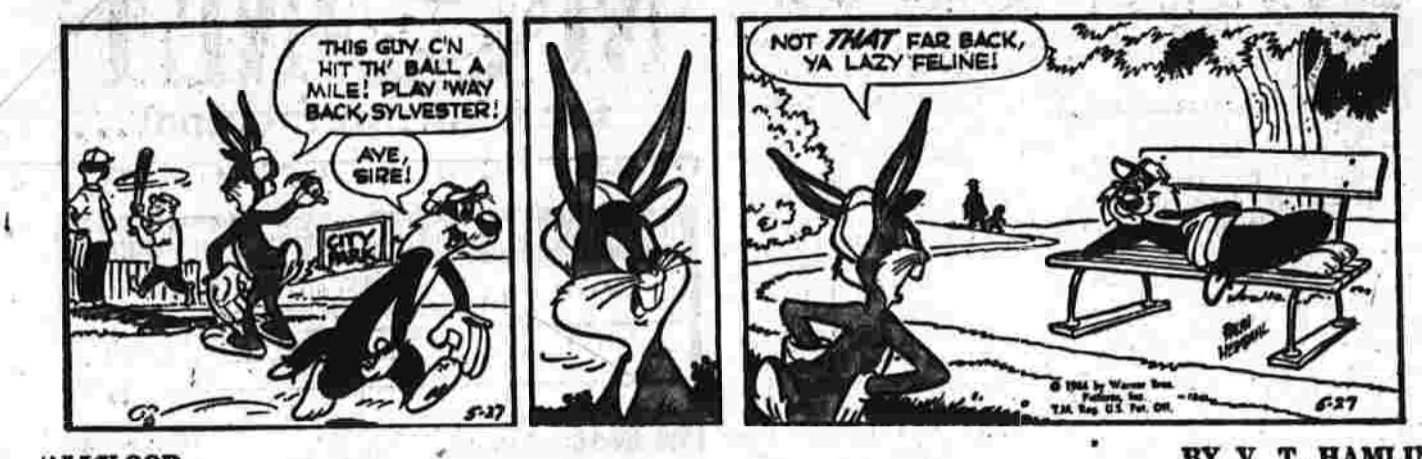
