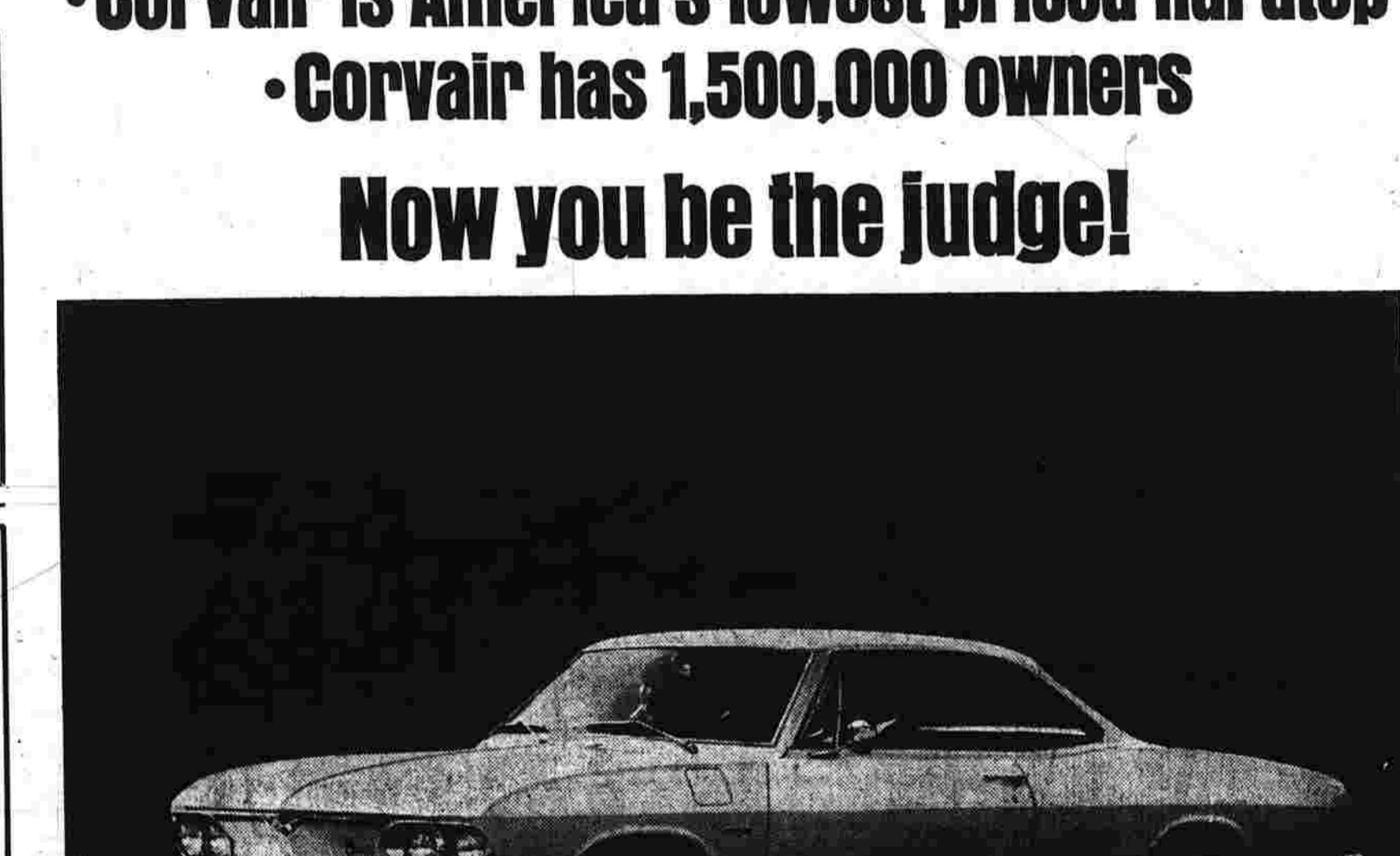

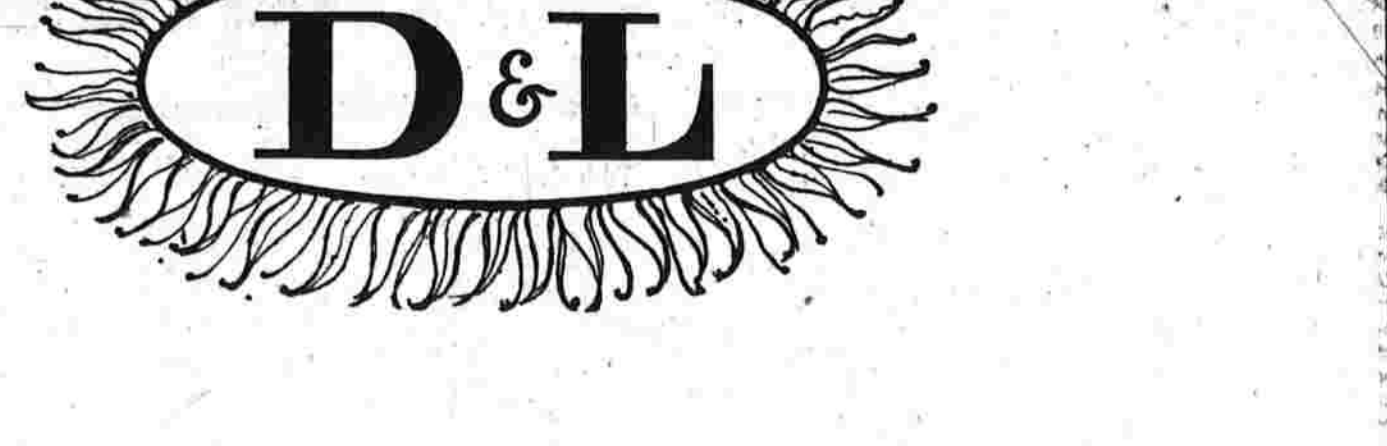

The Statistic Speaks

Sometimes blunt facts are more rational in their nakedness than when they are balanced into reasoned appraisal and analysis and judgment.

There were, in this latest week, 966 American casualties, which is of course, statistically short of 1,000 by a total of 44.

Of these 966, a total of 148 were killed. There were, this week, relatively few casualties among our South Vietnam allies.

When one gets into the realm of appraisal and analysis, one can experiment with various considerations. In view of the fact that we now have 260,000 Americans in uniform in Vietnam, with a larger proportion of them than ever before ready for action in the field, a casualty toll of 966 for the week may be rated "light."

In comparison with the number of enemy Vietnam we claim killed during this same week—1,245—our 148 killed can also be rated light—very light.

In comparison with the number of South Vietnam casualties that same week—almost none apparently, not at least in action against the Vietcong—the American figure would have to be analyzed as heavy, very heavy.

But, all such comparative evaluating considerations aside, the statistic—966 American casualties in a week—speaks very loudly and eloquently all by itself.

What it says over and over again, is too many, too many.

What it says, sharply and emphatically, is that this has ceased altogether being a minor or limiting factor, and has become one of the major conflicts in our national history.

What it asks, with its brutal insistence, is whether we really know why.

And the sandwich itself has been a gamble ever since.

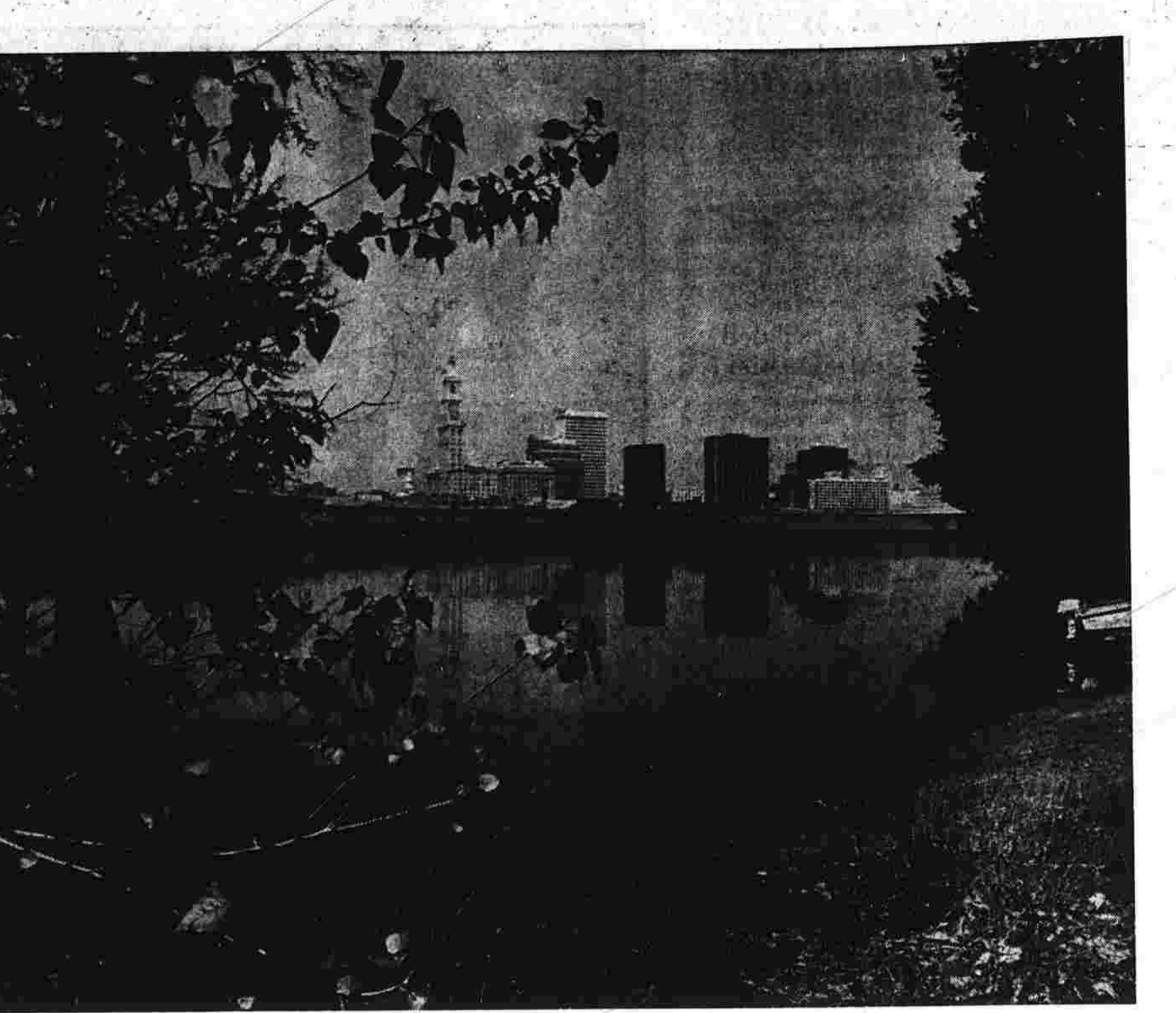
This moves us to commiserate with the Japanese, who are now reported to be taking their hitherto cultured and refined civilization forward (?) into the age of the sandwich.

To attempt to compress between two flat statements—the sandwich is a gamble—the Japanese are nice people—the full extent and variety of our apprehension of the inner content of the modern sandwich is a difficult process for a simple man who lives as he has lived a brief experience behind the modern curtain, concealing blinnets and heroes, we might be better qualified to warn the Japanese what they are to expect when they meet our original selection of potential ingredients than we relatively unimagineable occidentals—should expect.

But, aside from the gastronomic perils involved, it is the psychological aspect of the sandwich which concerns us most and which seems least desirable to the Japanese or for any other people.

Who, but Edem, the Earl of Avon—thinks the creation and guarantee of such a meal could be as firm and reliable a thing as anything else in this world of ours.

SANTO DOMINGO — President Johnson's new opportunity here, in contrast to the quicksand he has entangled himself in, is the Presidential election today (June 1).

But the challenge does not end with the election. Already skeptics are murmuring that the man who wins, either Juan Bosch or rightist Joaquin Balaguer—will be the real loser.

But these are hopes, not certainties. If Balaguer wins the election, the far left will take to the streets at the first pretext. Bosch's party, the Dominican Revolutionary Party, will hold the key to whether the far left can really make political life impossible for Balaguer. It is the only well-disciplined party in the country. Without its support, the far left could make trouble, but not catastrophe.

But now consider what happens if Bosch is elected. No matter how much he may hate the far left and no matter how many reactionary armed forces generals have been kicked out of power, Bosch remains an aversion for Bosch that borders on fanaticism.

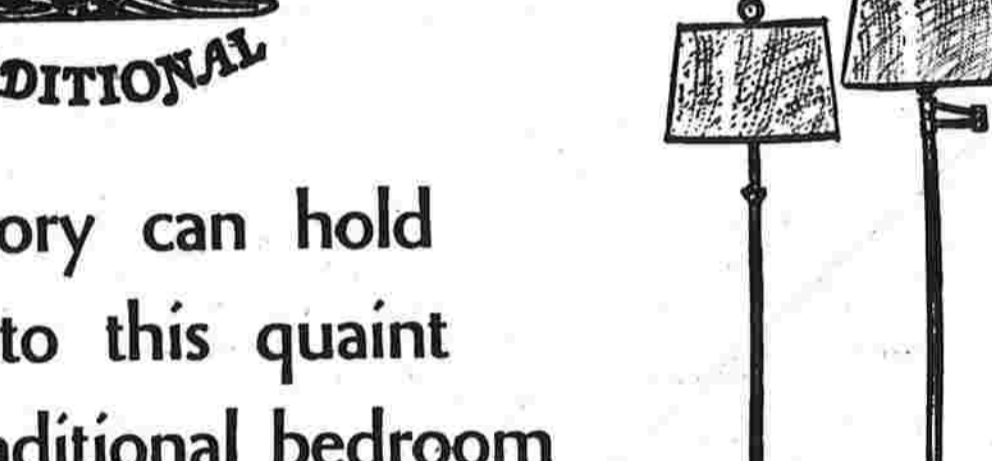

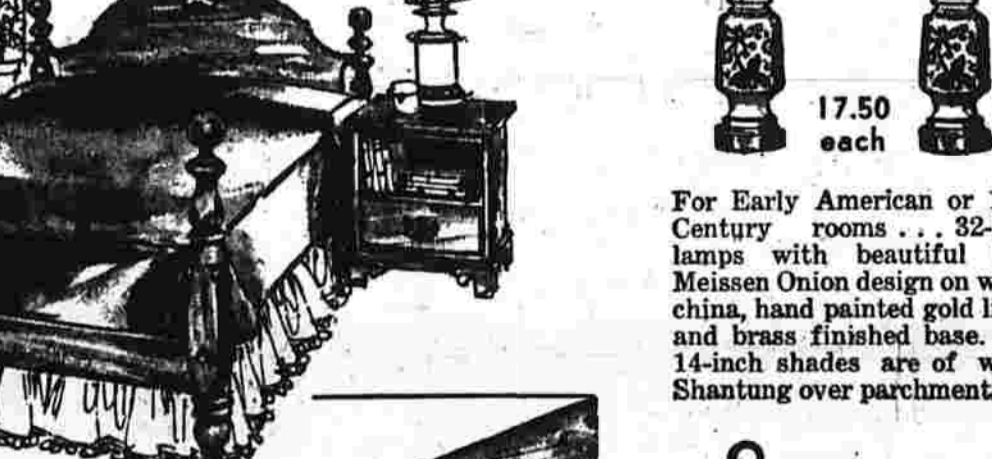

Neither man is bitter about his forthcoming service. "It's my turn and I don't intend to burn my draft card in any sort of a protest," says Cunningham.

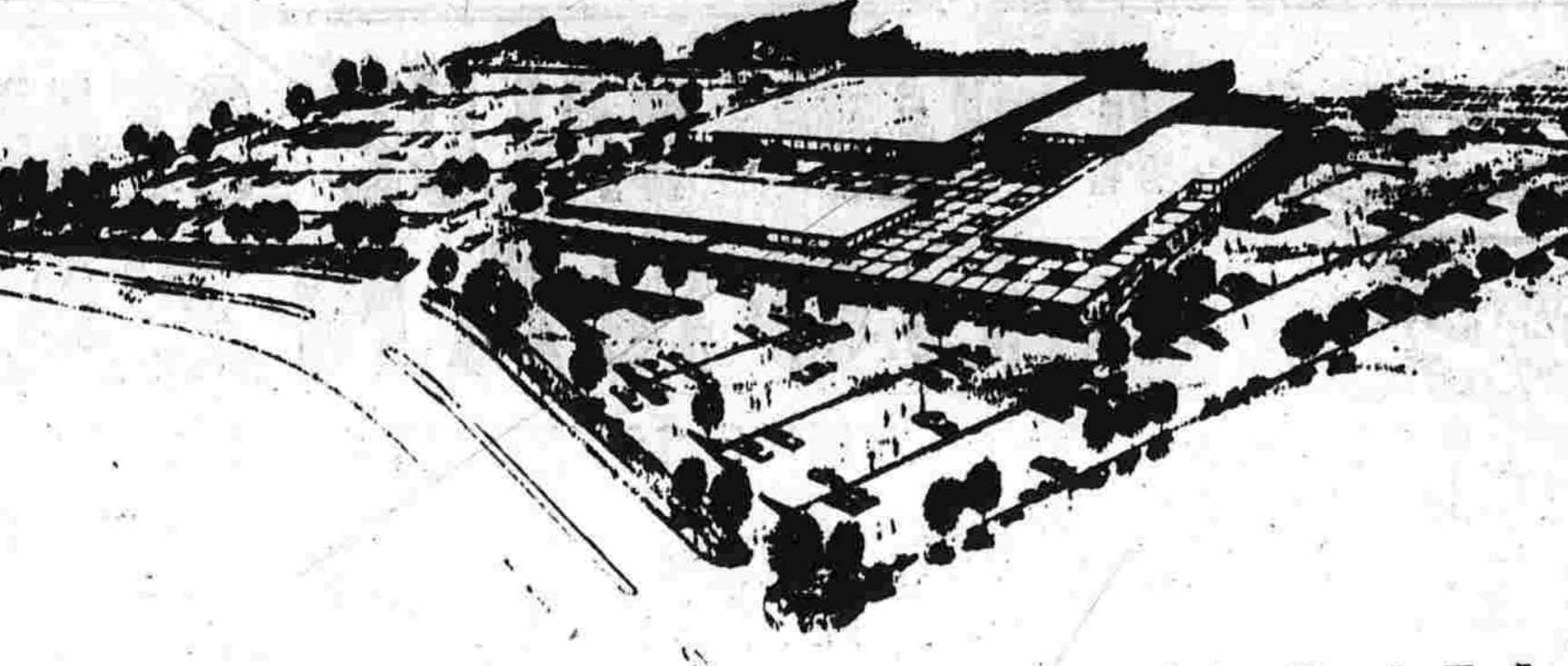
A Selective Service System spokesman said the call went out to draft male nurses because there weren't enough female nurses volunteering and "we can't draft women."

Garvan and Cunningham expect they'll receive eight weeks of orientation at an Army medical center in Texas before they're commissioned.

Although Cunningham worked as a male nurse for two years, he is currently superintendent in a local water district. Garvan is assistant supervisor of nursing at Kings Park State Hospital.

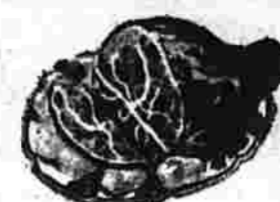

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Negro candidates for sheriff in Mason County, now have a 2-1 voting majority. A split decision today of fair and efficient law enforcement. Despite a split in the ranks of Negro voters, Lucha A. Ameron won the Democratic nomination in Mason County Tuesday in a runoff primary in which three other Negro candidates triumphed over white opponents. Rebel Stronghold Under Ky's Control

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—Premier Nguyen Cao Ky's troops took over the last territorial stronghold of the anti-government forces. Its capture was a major victory for Ky, who has managed to stay in power with the support of his fellow generals and the United States. The anti-government forces, which had held the northern city since the massive campaign mounted against them in March. The junta's forces seized Hui's radio station and other strongholds in the city 400 miles northeast of Saigon a day after the ruling generals offered to a political agreement with the rebels.

Lunar Crust Seen OK For Manned Vehicle

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Surveyor 1, in an amazing first-try success, televised excellent closeups from the moon today after an apparently perfect gentle landing in the Sea of Storms. Scientists, after viewing the first 14 pictures showing the 600-pound craft in good condition on a broad and featureless plain seemingly hard enough to support a manned landing craft, hailed it as a technical and informational triumph. The spyder vehicle, laden with complex and sophisticated instrumentation, climaxed a 43-hour, quarter-million-mile flight from earth by braking to a soft landing at 2:17:37 a.m. — precisely on schedule and within feet of its target. It came to rest nearly vertical and so far as is known, undamaged. At a morning news conference at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, which guided Surveyor's flight, project officials made an attempt to hide their joy. "Extremely excellent" and "I don't expect to see anything like this again in my lifetime" were two of the comments. Dr. Leonard Jaffe, project scientist, said of the pictures: "They show a surface generally level, as expected, with objects that appear to be rocks and boulders, or fragments, from close to the spacecraft as far as the eye can see, apparently to the horizon. Some are much less than an inch. There are craters, one 10 feet across about 20 or 30 feet from the spacecraft."

Gemini 9 Astronaut Team Gets Ready for Third Try

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Dramatically successful with the unmanned Surveyor moon mission, but seemingly fumbled in getting men off the ground, the Gemini 9 space team today was ready for a third try. The target, known as an Argonaut Target Docking Adapter, blasted off a Cape Kennedy launch pad less than two hours before trouble struck Gemini 8. It continued to circle the earth, performing normally. Radio signals from the target satellite to earth indicated the shuttle did not separate from the ATDA. A major factor in the government's reassignment of authority to the ATDA was the fact that the Gemini 9 crew, Thomas F. Stafford and T. Conrad P. White, had done their flighty space suits and climbed aboard their waiting spacecraft; but, before they've gotten into the slow elevator ride back to the ground. They got another chance tomorrow at 9:28 a.m. (EDT) to set out on their 28-hour flight, including satellite rendezvous and 2 1/2-hour space walk after a two-day delay. Engineers pinned the blame for the scrubbed Gemini 9 flight Wednesday on a faulty signal relay system. It kept a guidance command from reaching a black box for electronic transmission to the spacecraft. Faulty parts were replaced Wednesday night in a protective case. With about half the vote counted, Balaguer, candidate of the Reformist party, had 318,474 votes, to 223,770 for Bosch, head of the Dominican Revolutionary party. But a defeat for the Revolutionary party chief seemed apparent from his disappointing showing in the national capital, his main stronghold. With all but four precincts of the national district's 840 counted, Bosch had 80,100 votes to Balaguer's 110,000. A heavy vote piled up in the coastal area for Balaguer, who served as vice president under dictator Rafael Leonidas Trujillo and was president after Trujillo's assassination.
