**PANAMANIAN PROTEST**—Panamanian troops burst into gas Thursday night to break up a demonstration by students who accused the government of killing a leftist Panamanian student shortly after he returned from Moscow.

Extremist student leaders charged that government investigators best Juan Nava's father, 20, to death after he returned to Panama Sunday. They said Nava was found early Wednesday near Colon, 80 miles northwest of Panama City. A coroner said he was killed by a blow on the head.

Minister of Government J.D. Buzant met with student leaders today and asked the attorney general to investigate the death.

The government spokesman denied that Nava had been in custody since he returned. They said he was hit by a car or killed by a rival student group. His brother Luis is secretary of the Student Federation of Panama.

Nava reportedly spent eight months in the Soviet Union undergoing medical treatment. Student sources said he suffered a head wound in January 1965, when anti-American rioting over the Canal Zone killed 21 Panamanians and four U.S. soldiers.

**NORFOLK, Va. (AP)**—Two English journalists are apparently making some headway in their efforts to row across the Atlantic in a 15-foot rowboat.

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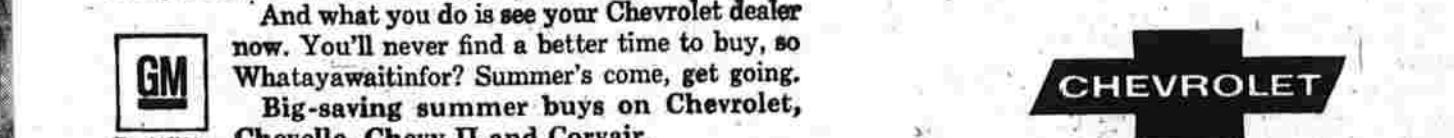

Town to Fete Water Co. On 100th Anniversary

The Vernon Economic Development Commission will hold a luncheon June 16 at Ellington Ridge Country Club to honor the Rockville Water and Aqueduct Co. on its 100th anniversary.

Mayor Thomas J. McCauley will present a plaque to the water company, commending its service to the area. Invited to the luncheon will be Howard Wolfanger, EDC member and president of the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce.

The EDC will meet tonight to hear reports on a proposed water line, to be laid to an industrial park on Foster Road, just south of Rt. 15. Water company representatives and Town Council members are expected to present reports.

The proposed water line will cost more than \$100,000. A preliminary proposal has already been submitted to the board of representatives.

At least one industry has taken steps to locate in the industrial park, but its interest depends upon the water line, Hoesley said.

Hoesley says that the cost of bringing water to the area will be more than offset by tax income to the town. He argues that most towns in the state are ready and willing to invest more to obtain industry.

Howard Wolfanger, EDC member, will report tonight on a letter to be sent to all businesses and industries in town, informing them that the EDC is eager to discuss whatever problems they may have.

Also discussed is a community monograph, describing Vernon, which will be available to representatives of industries or businesses inquiring about the area.

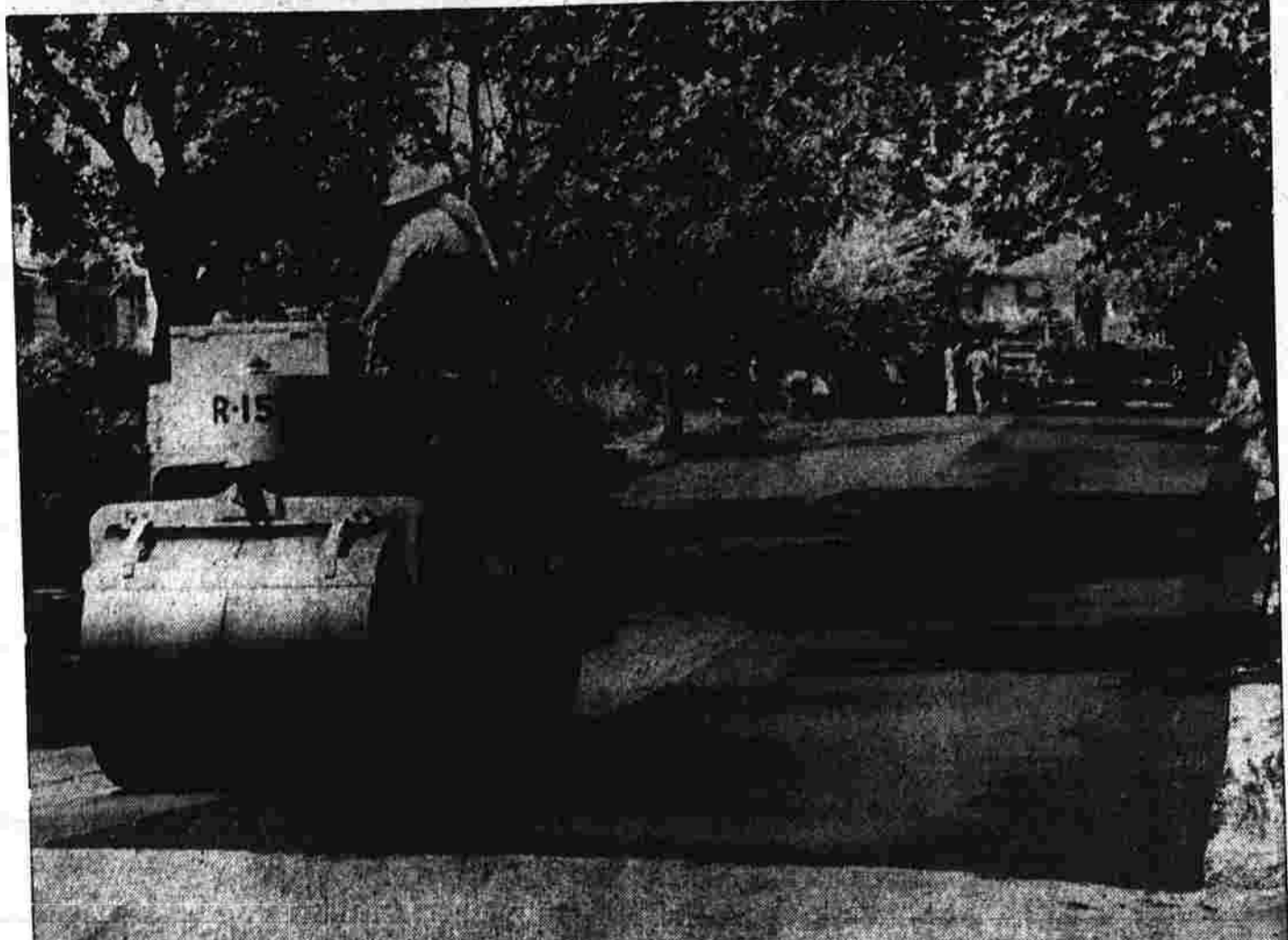

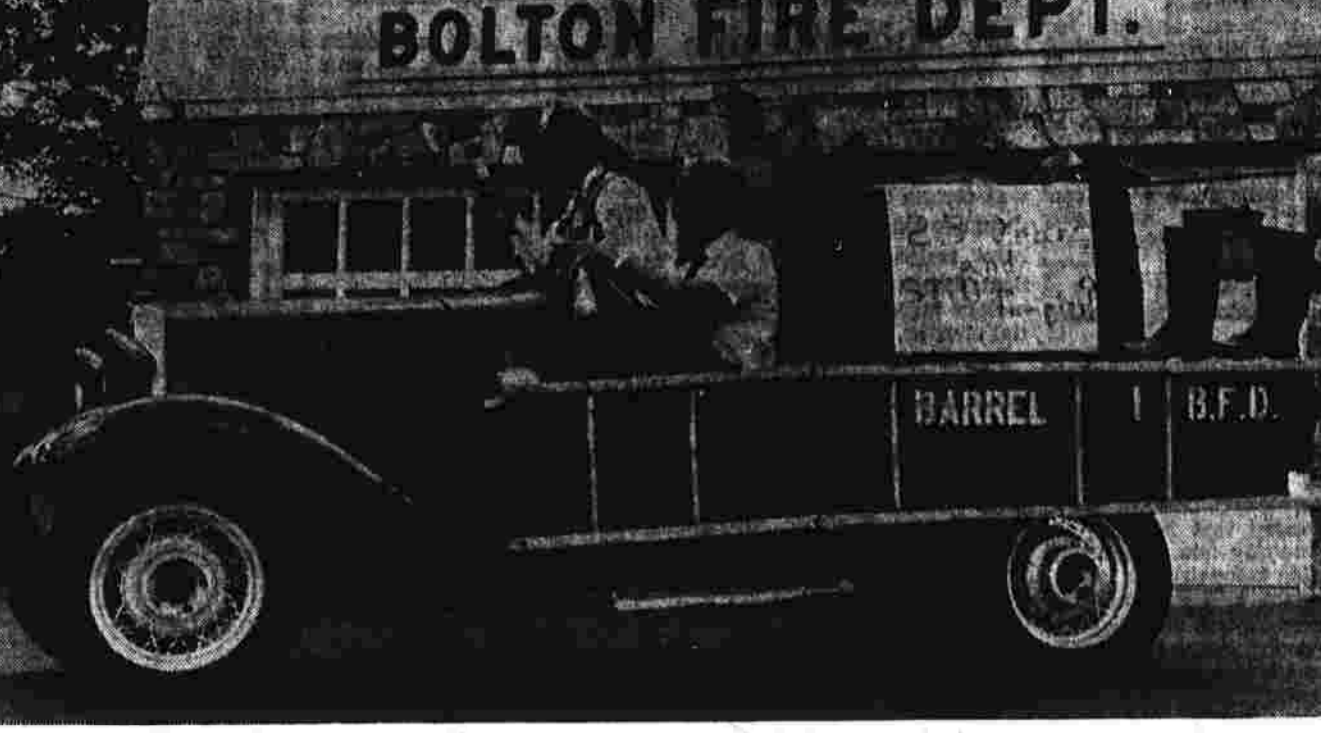

### Many Have Interest In Senate Elections

WASHINGTON (AP) — A convention July 26. The expectation is that the nomination will go to John G. Tower of Birmingham, former executive of the Republican National Committee in Virginia, Alabama and Illinois.

Involved in the contest are the three top Democrats on the Senate Banking Committee. All appear to have hard re-election fights.

Sen. A. Willis Robertson, 73, chairman of the committee, is engaged in Virginia in a slugging primary campaign with William B. Spong, 46, a state senator from Portsmouth, Va. The primary is July 12.

Sen. John J. Sparkman, 65, who is next in line for the chairmanship, already has won the Democratic nomination in Alabama. But in the cross-currents of emotion that state, the Democratic nomination is not the assurance of election that it has been for years. Four years ago, Democrat Lister Hill of Alabama won re-election by only about 4,000 votes.

The chairman of the committee, however, has chosen his Senate candidate in great power. Particularly, he can expedite or delay consideration of specific bills.

### \$7,000 for Sewer Study Up for Directors' Action

The board of directors, Tuesday night, will consider authorizing a \$7,000 allocation from the Sewer Department Reserve Fund, to pay the town's share of a \$9,500 Northeast Trunk Sewer Study.

The other \$2,500 of the cost may be paid by the 8th District, if its taxpayers, at a meeting called for later this month, approve the allocation.

The original cost split was \$5,000 for the town and \$4,500 for the district, but the 8th District directors, in April, lobbied any action on their allocation. The new cost split is a compromise, agreed to by officials of the town and district.

The study to be conducted by Metcalf & Eddy, engineers of Boston, would determine the mechanics of combining town and District sewerage facilities, for treating primary and secondary sewage wastes.

In other items of business on Tuesday night's agenda, the board will:

1. Set a date for a public hearing on a proposal to install sanitary sewers on Oak Grove St., to serve property owners and a shelter which the Luz Museum is constructing on the Oak Grove Nature Preserve.
2. Correct a \$30 typographical error in its 1966-67 budget resolution, adopted May 5. The error appears in the "Transfer to Water Department Reserve Fund" item.
3. Approve a \$40,000 additional appropriation to the fund of education budget for the current year, to be financed from unused 1965-66 funds of Manchester Community College. The directors, on Jan. 4, had approved the appropriation informally, pending a final audit and release of the college funds by state auditors.
4. Consider approving an amendment to the rules and regulations of the water and sewer departments, to permit a \$5 charge for turning water back on after it has been shut off for nonpayment of water organization counted more "deductions for Chris."
5. Consider the transfer of \$2,700 from the Highway Division account to the Garbage Collection and Disposal account, to pay for repairs to a bulldozer.

The directors have already signed a waiver of bids for the repairs.

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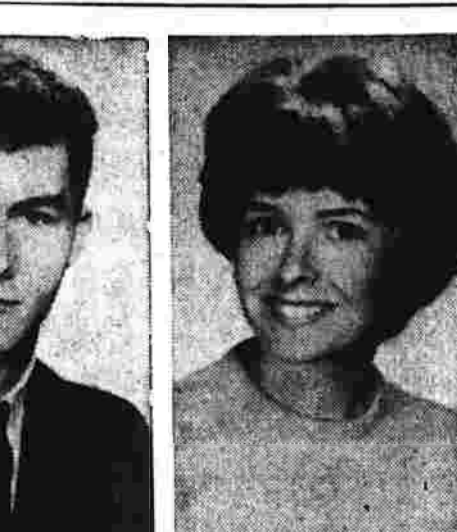
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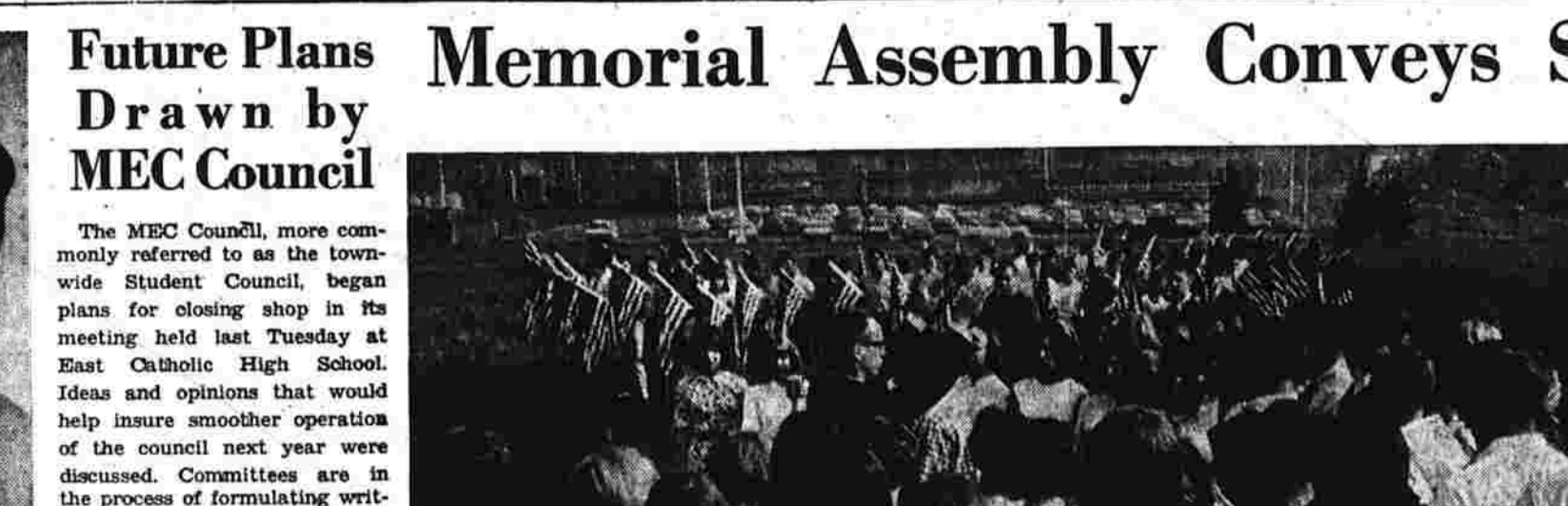

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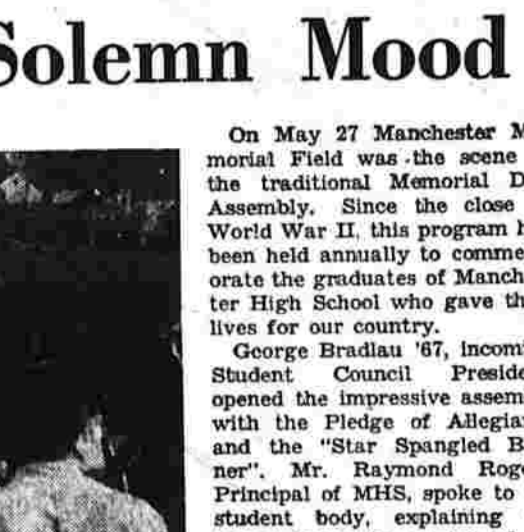

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# Dick Radatz Flop in Debut with Cleveland

## Faces Eight Batters And Sees Five Score

NEW YORK (AP)—Dick Radatz now is doing his latest act for the Cleveland Indians—and it still works like magic.

First he appears. Then he disappears.

Radatz did both in the seventh inning Thursday night. Just hours after the Indians ejected him from Boston. He faced eight batters, retired one, watched five cross the plate and left with the Indians well on their way to a 14-4 loss to Kansas City.

Earlier in the night, Radatz had been frank in expressing his pleasure with the trade that sent him from the struggling Red Sox to the American League leading Indians in exchange for pitchers Lee Stange and Don Mohrman.

"It's like starting life all over again—being born again," said Radatz. "There's nothing wrong with my arm. My trouble is mechanical and if I pitch the way I think I can, the Indians will win the pennant."

The way Radatz thinks he can pitch is the way he pitched from 1962 to 1964 when he was drafted by the Montreal and twice won the Fireman of the Year award as baseball's No. 1 relief pitcher. The way he pitched against the A's is the way he pitched the last two years while breaking in his disappearing act.

The Kansas City victory, coupled with Boston's loss to Washington, tumbled the Red Sox into the AL cellar while the A's climbed into ninth place.

Elsewhere, Baltimore outlasted California 9-4 in 10 innings, Detroit edged Minnesota 7-4 and the New York Yankees defeated the Chicago White Sox 5-3.

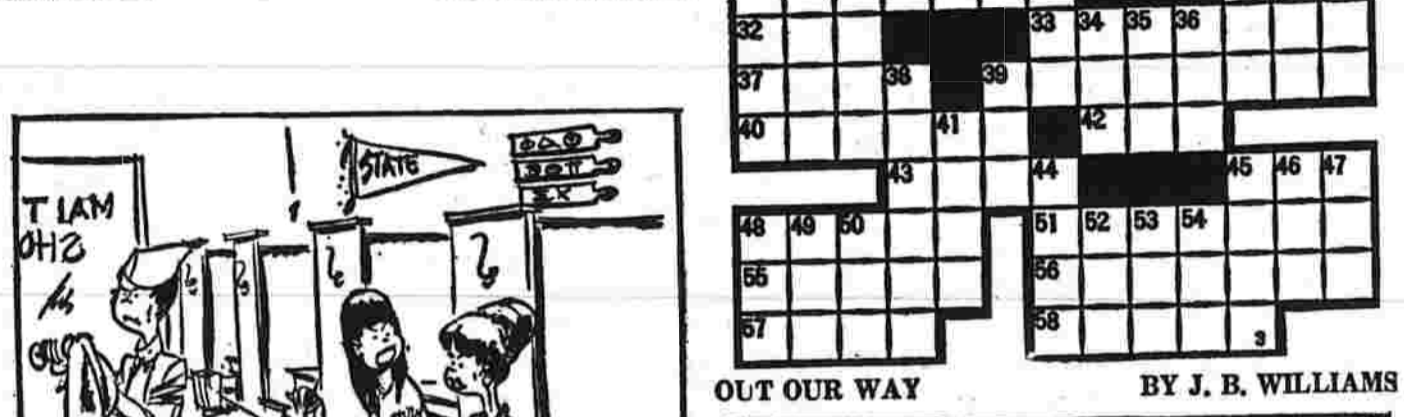

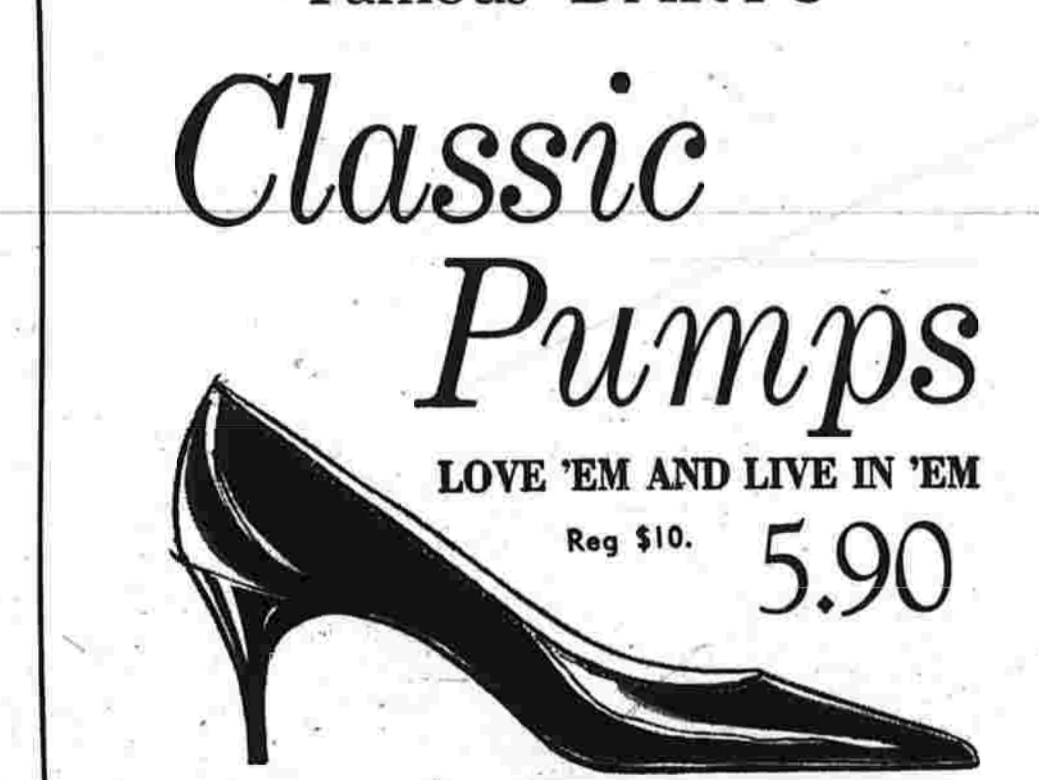
