Hobbies sometimes get started in odd ways.

Three years ago, Peter Dario and his wife, Bernice, shopping in an antique store, were waiting on a "little one lady" who tried terribly hard to please them.

"I felt guilty walking out without purchasing anything," Dario said. "The cheapest thing she had was a sheep bell, and I bought it."

"She was so nice . . . we didn't know what we were getting into."

Today, the Darios, who live on Bolton Rd. in Vernon, have expanded their sheep bell into a collection of more than 200 different types of bells.

The smallest bell they own will fit nicely on an adult's thumb nail.

The largest was purchased recently from a Springfield man who bought it from the LaPointe Industries factory in Rockville. It weighs an estimated 1,200 pounds.

Most of the bells have a history, but the LaPointe bell is the closest to the Darios.

Mrs. Dario says that her great grandfather may regularly have rung the bell.

"He was a watchman at the old Springville (fabric) mill now occupied by LaPointe," she says. "It is quite possible that he rang the bell as part of his duties there."

Factories used bells to summon workers to work, to begin and end lunch periods, and to signal the close of the work day.

Bells in all kinds of shapes and sizes occupy the Darios' home. Among the odd shapes are bells like a fish, a crane, a windmill, an antique horse-drawn cart (which thinks as it is rolled), men, women, crosses, and one shaped like a goblet.

There are rows of bells, layers of bells; there are bells with clappers inside and bells with clappers outside, and there are bells without any clappers at all, which must be struck with a mallet.

The bells come from many countries—the Darios' count 20, including such romantic spots as Java, Bali, Pakistan, Persia and Wales—and from many parts of the United States.

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Rules Out Bitterness Scranton Reveals Reasons For Political Retirement

EDITOR'S NOTE — A week ago, Gov. William W. Scranton of Pennsylvania announced his permanent retirement from elective office. In this revealing interview, he details his reasons and sheds some fresh light on his fight for the Republican presidential nomination in 1964.

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Gov. William W. Scranton has slammed the door on active politics more tightly than any man since Sherman but not, he insists, because of any knife wounds in his back.

Many observers thought they detected a hint of bitterness in the absolute language used by the Pennsylvania governor last week: "I can't see myself ever again for any public office under any circumstances."

But Scranton, in an interview with The Associated Press, denied any feeling of bitterness or sense of having been stabbed in the alley by following his own lead in 1964. That was the year, when after a spectacular comedy of errors, the governor sought Barry Goldwater for the presidential nomination.

Had former President Dwight D. Eisenhower pulled the rug out from under him, Scranton never said he never put the rug there in the first place. Scranton now says this: "The general never said he'd support me but he certainly gave me a lot of encouragement. I never would have thought of going ahead if he hadn't. I'm not blaming him. It was my own decision not his."

Scranton, at 46, still young-looking and lithe, in his button-down shirt and tie, sat in a room suggesting the Ivy League and the Republican version of John F. Kennedy's followers and had hoped to project in 1964, said he is quitting active politics to spend more time with his family.

He said he had never intended to make political a career, never had presidential ambitions and thought seven "intensive" years in public service — two as a congressman, one as the State Department and four as governor — were enough. As governor, he leaves his life heavily indebted to the state, he said, and he said he would like to see the state's present mental state be with a successful himself.

As to the events of 1964, where he was in the game he became the last hope of the anti-Goldwater Republicans against the conservative Goldwater and now appears resigned to becoming an historical footnote. Scranton expressed a reluctance to "re-haul" them. But at the press conference, he did discuss those events and, during the interview, said much he has never said before.

He said the only lingering regret he had about 1964 was that he failed to go through with a planned statement in April completely withdrawing from the presidential race.

"It would," he said, "have been a more honest approach about it. Another moderate might have surprised although that remains doubtful."

On June 6 he was invited to Gettysburg for a conference with Eisenhower in which Scranton thought he was being encouraged to run. The next day he went to Cleveland for the now-famous governor's conference. He was all set to announce his candidacy on a television show that day.

"But then I got that famous telephone call" from Scranton. "In which Gen. Eisenhower said he was not part of any cabal against Goldwater. I knew then he would not come to Cleveland to endorse me. I knew then that I was dead."

"I figured I'd have to die fast. So I did on that TV show that day. I wish I hadn't all over the place and said things like I didn't really differ so much with Goldwater. Anyway, I got dead."

"At the moment, the Republican governors in Cleveland thought the cause of the moderate was dead. So did Rockefeller. But then suddenly George Gov. George C. Romney of Michigan — denounced Goldwater and said his nomination would be disastrous for the party. We spent the next two days trying to persuade George to

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Vernon Town Discussing with Ellington Swap of Dump, Sewer Services

Town officials in Vernon and Ellington have reached an agreement that promises to solve one of each of the town's biggest headaches—refuse disposal in Vernon and sewerage treatment in Ellington.

Mayor Thomas J. McCusker and Ellington Selectmen agreed to swap the use of Vernon's sewage treatment plant for use of Ellington's new land-fill dump.

Vernon has been bouncing around between dumps in various areas towns ever since a court order closed a West Hill dump several years ago.

Ellington, faced with generally rising costs, apparently prefers not to construct its own sewage treatment plant.

Mayor McCusker noted that the Ellington dump, although privately owned, will be under the control of the town government. The selectmen say that the dump will last 20 to 25 years if used by 50,000 to 75,000 people, he says. The figures were supplied by state officials, who have approved the proposed dump.

One of the remaining bar-

riers to the two-town agreement is expected to be overcome by councils for the two towns.

The mayor says that members of the Vernon Board of Representatives are concerned that once sewer lines are laid to Ellington (some parts of the town are already hooked into the filtration plant), Ellington could renege on its part of the exchange.

Mayor McCusker says that Vernon Town Council Robert Baum and Ellington corporation counsel Robert King have been instructed to draft a permanent agreement between the towns.

The mayor noted that Ellington must present the proposal for approval at a town meeting. Additional discussions are expected Monday night between Ellington selectmen and the board of representatives.

The board is meeting in special session to consider installing a water line to an industrial area of an agreement provisions between the two towns will also be on the agenda.

Mayor McCusker noted that "if anything happens and we are required to expand our fil-

tration plant, Ellington is willing to pay its share of the costs.

"I am delighted that we have been able to meet on this mutually beneficial project," McCusker said. "The agreement will very nicely solve a burden that has long bothered concerned citizens of both towns."

"The problems we are resolving through this agreement have been very expensive to both towns, both in terms of dollars and in terms of time spent by officials."

If the agreement is approved, the costs of a proposed plan for two-town-wide refuse collection will be reduced, because of a decrease in the mileage refuse trucks must travel to the disposal area now a considerable distance off. (It's location is undisclosed.)

More than \$90,000 has been earmarked for the town refuse and garbage collection. The low bidder, a Massachusetts refuse contractor, will reduce the cost of the program by a nickel a piece of an agreement provisions between the two towns will also be on the agenda.

'Wolfhounds' in Viet Nam Sponsor Orphanage

CUI CHI, Viet Nam (AP) — "Dear soldier, the letter reads, 'Are you tired? I am tired. Soldiers, win the war. Goodbye.'"

The letter was from a 6-year-old Japanese boy.

Another letter, this one from a 9-year-old Japanese girl, said: "Dear soldiers, 'How are? I am fine. War is more frightening than anything else, don't you think? There must be many poor people. I will never forget all you have done for me. I am praying for you, Bayonara.'"

These letters, and scores like them, come from Japanese orphans. There are 160 of them in the Catholic-run Holy Family orphanage in Osaka.

They are addressed to soldiers of the 1st and 2nd Infantry Divisions, 27th U.S. Infantry, better known as "The Wolfhounds" and since January in combat in Viet Nam.

For more than 17 years, the Wolfhounds have supported the orphanage in Osaka. Since 1949, they have contributed \$460,000. And, apportioning their monthly contributions have more than doubled since they went into combat here.

"It's amazing," says Lt. Col. Harlan Mooney, Ravenwood, 1st Battalion, 8th Artillery, uncles poured foam on the underside of the plane. There were no injuries. Here at last, then, is the final confession that all our original hopes about resolving the situation in Vietnam through all the possibilities short of open and full land warfare have limited numbers of American troops have now gone by the board.

Against such a prospect, the only American policy we have is President Johnson's grim resolve to "see it through" no matter how many men or how many years it is going to take.

But he does happen to be the one who had more to do than all the rest of us with getting us into the position of involvement in Vietnam.

The situation still is, as it has been ever since the moment the President took the plunge, that only some outside, third or party can save us.

Encore, Le Deluge. It is hard to tell when it came—the precise moment when it began to rain, once again, that "things had got ahead of us" to such an extent that there was slight chance of catching up.

But it, on the other hand, it should be suspected that only such earnings off now could accomplish the miracle of guaranteeing us all that the general prosperity would still be with us next year, and the year after, a little less pushy and glamorous, perhaps, but still solid and substantial and growing, even if more modestly—then we could say that such bad news, in such proportions, might be the best good news we could possibly have for.

There Must Be Hope, Somewhere. We civilians, when we see it reported that our military experts are estimating that it may take five to 10 years to fight the war in Vietnam as we might consider a satisfactory conclusion, tend to resist, very properly, something will have to happen long before then, we think, either to end the war, unacceptably, but end it, or to widen it into a full world war for which nobody will have any time table, and which might not, if it went nuclear immediately, have time for a time table.

But examination of the latest scheduling and planning for the war in Vietnam as it is, and as it would be if it continued along present lines, does suggest that we could easily spend 10 years doing it.

The next big phase of our operation in Vietnam is scheduled to begin early next year. It awaits, for one thing, the arrival and deployment of at least 100,000 American troops in addition to the 260,000 now on the scene.

"We'll never persuade the South Vietnamese to present us other hope for the future while we continue to hop

riding on America's orbiting Ogo 3 satellite were successfully commanded Thursday and have begun beaming back data on secrets of the sun's relations to earth.

The other four experiments will be turned on later.

Ogo-for orbiting geophysical observatory - was launched Monday in an orbit ranging from 170 to 75,788 miles above the earth. Ogo 3 is to study solar wind, solar flares, cosmic field disturbances, radiation and chemistry in space.

An eighth spacecraft - called a gravity gradient satellite - will also ride on Wednesday's Titan 3 to test the concept of using the earth's gravity pull to stabilize a spacecraft in orbit.

clation upheld a decision by U.S. Dist. Judge Carl A. Weinman of Dayton on July 15, 1964. But Sheppard's constitutional rights were violated in his trial and that he should be freed of \$10,000 bond pending a decision within 60 days by Cuyahoga County on whether to retry him.

Sheppard was freed on bond the next day, having served nine years in Ohio Penitentiary and Marion Correction Institution. The state appealed from Judge Weinman's decision.

On May 4, 1966, the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati reversed Judge Weinman and ordered Sheppard back to prison. Sheppard appealed and the ruling reversed Monday by the Supreme Court.

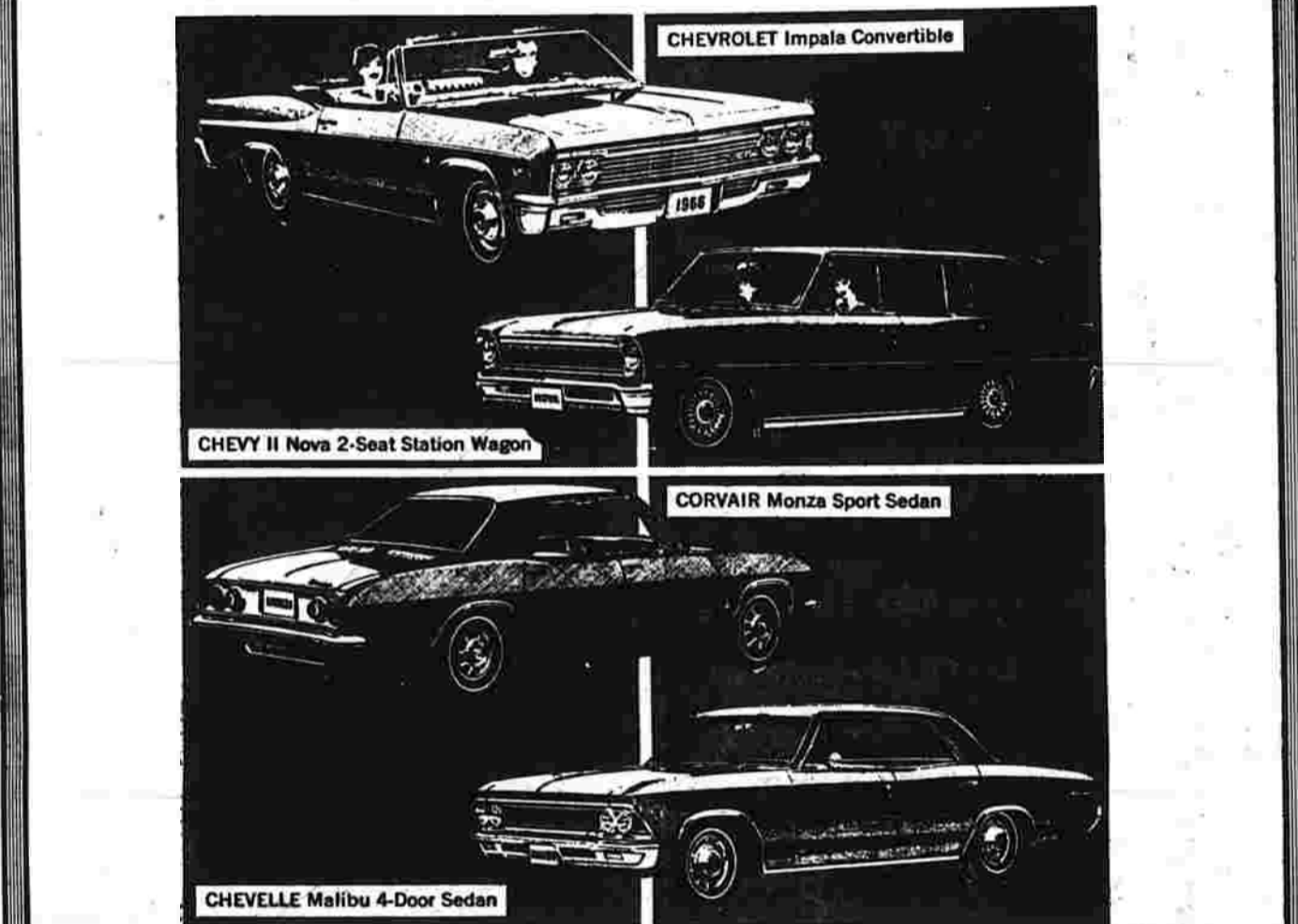

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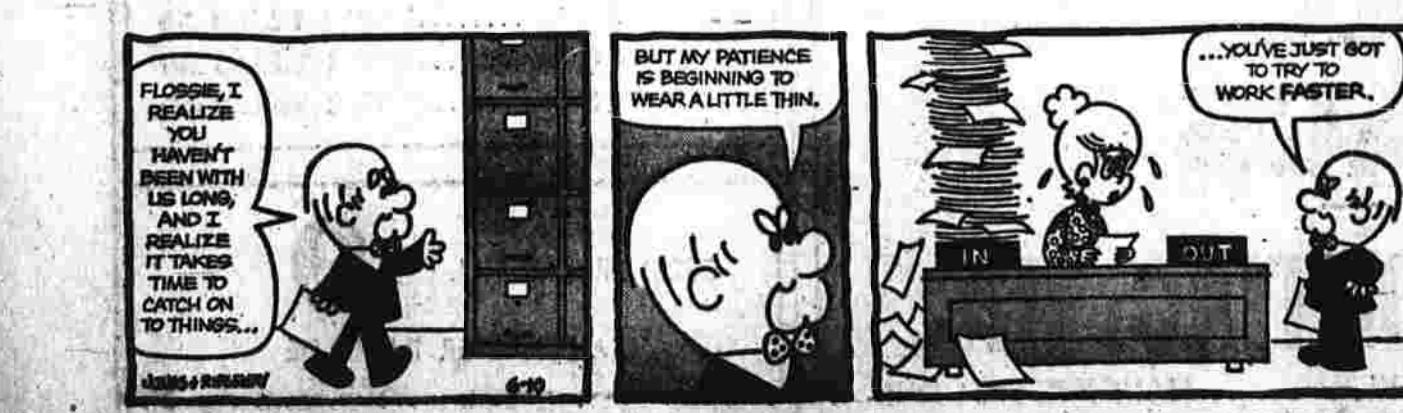
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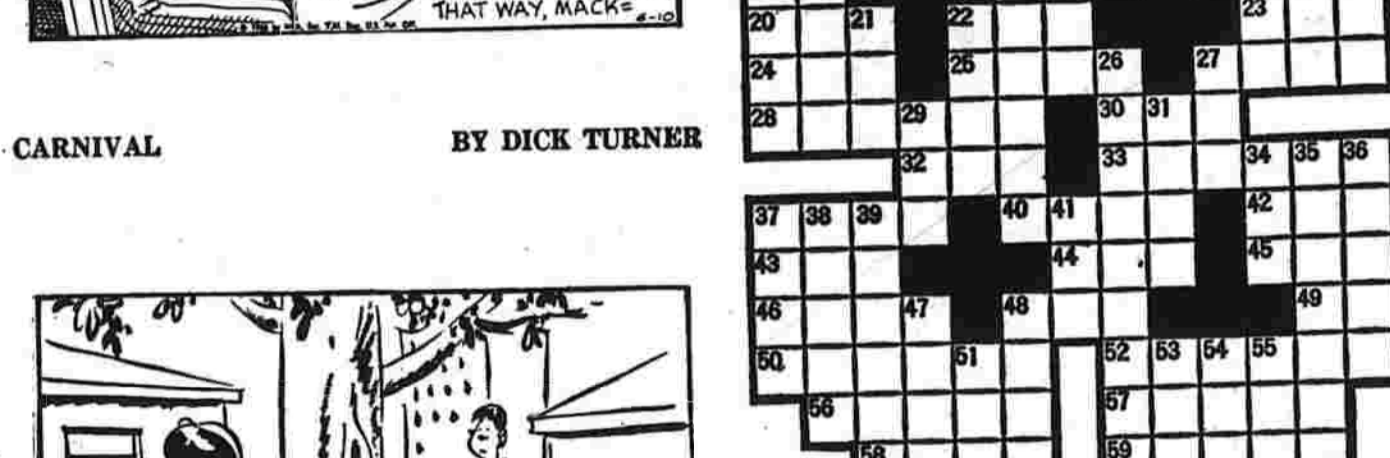
