Another Chapter Unfolds In Strange Murder Case

LETCHFIELD (AP)—Another home was a pink piggybank. The next day the warrant against Mrs. Thompson was withdrawn. On April 18, Guion opened another inquest, and one week later he found Solberg criminally responsible for the death of Dorothy Thompson. The grand jury heard testimony for 8 1/2 hours and deliberated for 40 minutes before returning the first degree murder indictment Tuesday night. Solberg had been married only six months when Mrs. Thompson was slain. He had helped Thompson build the house. Thompson and his daughter now live in Northboro, Mass. On March 15, state police arrested Solberg, who lived down the road in East Hartland, a few miles from the Thompsons and accused him of the slaying. The missing pink piggy bank was what led them to Solberg, state police said.

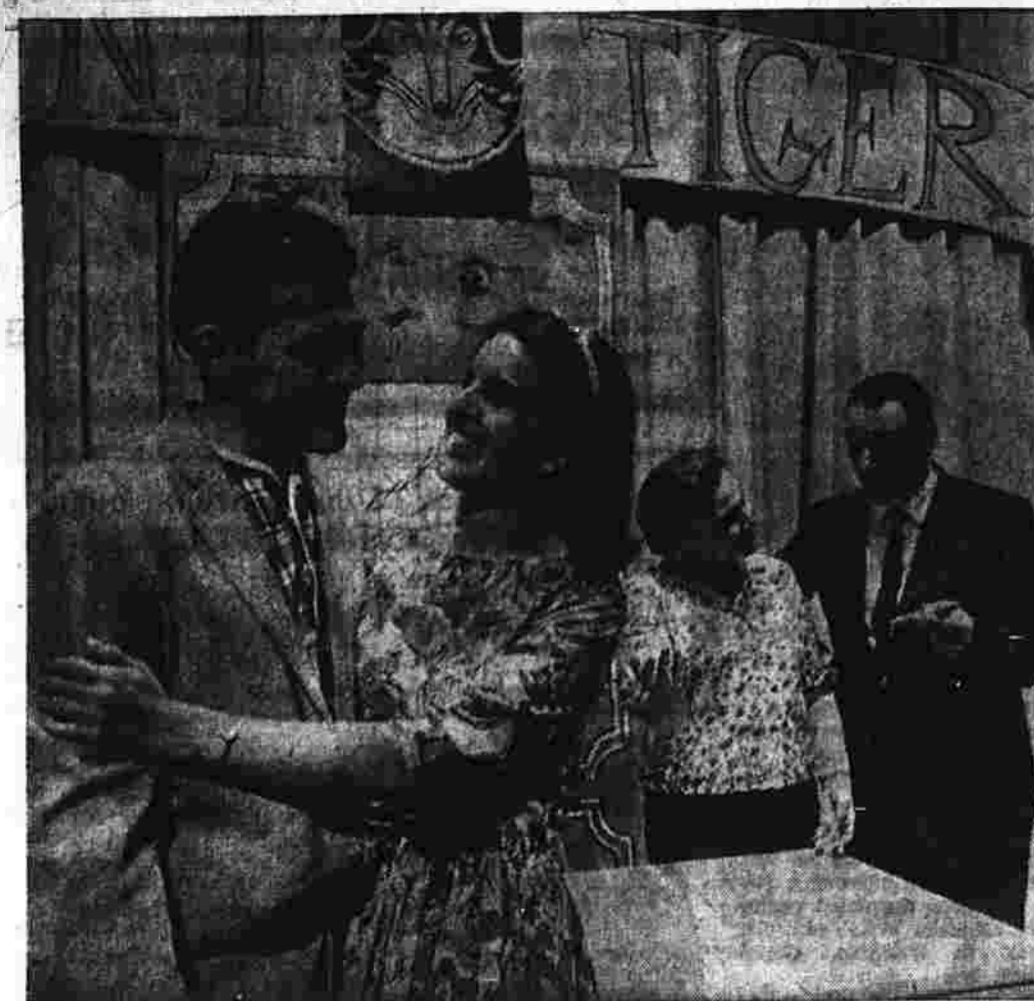

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something like a general alarm to confusion, squabble, and violence, not a vain, last-ditch shot against inevitable progress, but the shot that begins the war.

We Are Not Alone

Simply because misery loves company, and because we young and relatively barbarian Americans shouldn't really think that we are the only rough and immature civilization in the world, we quote the fact that, the other day, in a certain city, inhabited by certain people, regular police had to call out military police to help them cope with a situation in which cars and trucks were being overturned and burned in the center of the city, windows being smashed, and general violence being let loose.

The military police arrived on the scene and used tear gas to disperse the rioters. In the course of this action, the police injured at least 11 people. The people leading the rioting were angry because they thought one of their number, a participant in a demonstration, had been killed by rough police action.

That was the circumstances. The city was the ancient city of Amsterdam, in the state and solid country of the Netherlands, and the people were the patient, industrious, common sense Dutch.

We are not criticizing the city, the country, or the people. We are just noticing that violence in the street is not just a purely American activity.

Agony Without Ecstasy

One of the most striking things to any eavesdropper in the great debate over Vietnam is the awareness that it really isn't about Vietnam at all. . . . To borrow some showman phrases, it's a debate about manifest destiny and the nation's place in the sun.

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Every debater, hawk or dove, argues a view about the manifest destiny of the nation as a world power. Vietnam has forced us to think again of these things, and the process is an agony.

When some future historian comes to write of the decline of the United States as a world power, hopefully yet many years away, he will peruse deals with many complexities. He should have no trouble putting a date to its zenith.

That day was September 2, 1945. At that moment of history, when the surrender of the Japanese Empire was accepted on the deck of the USS Missouri, the United States stood alone on a pinnacle of power. No nation anywhere, in the world could say nay.

From that day onward everything has been downhill for U.S. power, at first imperceptibly and then with increasing speed.

Other nations became atomic powers. Europe recovered both its economy and its spirit. Russia, freed from the worst deadening effects of Stalinism, sprang forward. The Red Chinese, for good or ill, awoke that sleeping giant to make the beginnings of a nation. All over the world revolutions erupted, and new nations emerged, often a violence to tax the forces of order.

Twenty years later no one can pretend that the United States, though possibly still the greatest of world powers, can any longer act without reckoning with the power of others. Today we must cut our cloth to fit a smaller ball.

You may weep or sigh at the change, but it is a simple statement of fact. Yet the self-image of VJ Day bit deep into our consciousness and has affected every foreign policy attitude since then. . . .

This attitude was dramatically in evidence in Vietnam. At each stage of the involvement, from Eisenhower to Johnson, there were disagreements over how much we ought to intervene. But right up to the moment when President Johnson, on an all-out military effort, hardly anyone doubted that the mighty U.S. could, once it decided to throw its weight in the balance, do what it wanted to.

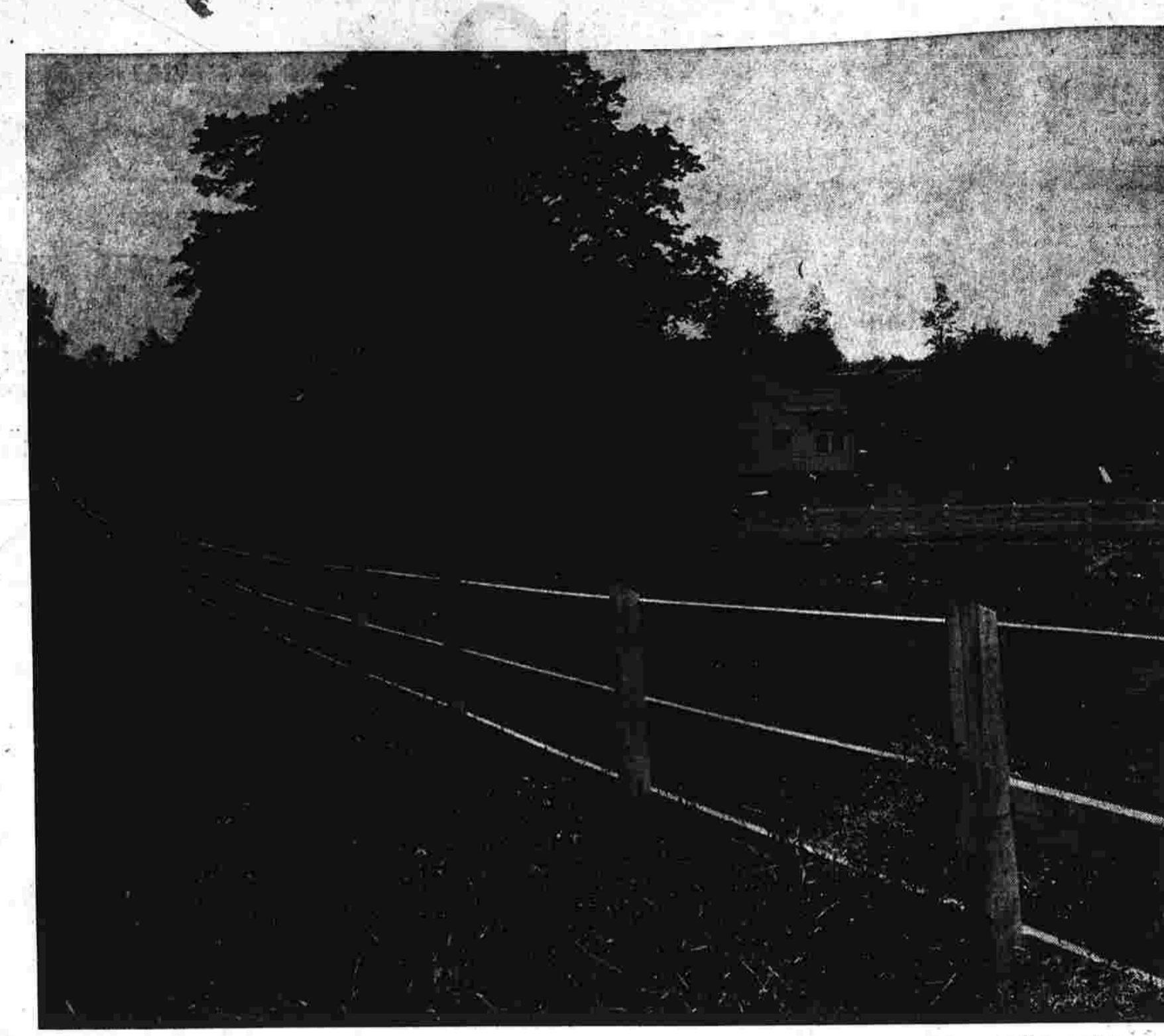
Today not even the hawks are quite so confident. The military men speak less boldly of victory. The political experts are not as cocky as they were when they equipped in the Dien Bien Phu. And all around us the diplomats have become more conscious of our isolation in this affair; we stand in Vietnam almost alone.

All this accounts for the nation's great sense of frustration. Senator Fulbright depresses people with his gloom; former Senator Goldwater frightens them with rashness. In general the nation has little enthusiasm for any of the proposed courses.

This is what sets Vietnam apart from the agonies of other wartime debates. As late as Korea, certainly in the two World Wars, the agony of war was at least made bearable by an enthusiasm for what was being done. The Chinese are willing to spend money at a wasteful rate to become a thermionic power as quickly as possible. That could be in 1968.

Not in the Chinese problem is finding a delivery system as difficult as most politicians here still believe. True, China has only medium-range bombers and doesn't have an operational intercontinental missile for another decade. But the little-known fact is that the Chinese are well on the road toward developing medium-range missiles which, when fired from a submarine, can hit the American West Coast.

One such missile-firing submarine (classified by U.S. intelligence as the "D" class) is now operational and is usually based at the Chinese naval base of Hainan.

WASHINGTON—A steeply rising, but still unpalatable concern among top U.S. policymakers is the possibility that Communist China will have the capacity to hit the North American continent with a hydrogen bomb before the Viet Nam war can be resolved.

China's early emergence as a full nuclear power, ominous in any event, would dangerously upset the power equation affecting Viet Nam.

The fact that the volatile and adventurous Peking regime might have nuclear weapons aimed at American cities by 1969—three years hence—would subject Washington to enormous pressure certain to affect its decision in Viet Nam.

But the U.S. can no longer be comforted by ten years of breathing room. Some intelligence analysts now believe it entirely possible that the Chinese are well on the road toward developing medium-range missiles which, when fired from a submarine, can hit the American West Coast.

many county hospitals will now be freed of chronic disease loads because of the paid nursing home care.

In Michigan, administrators also expressed concern about the shortage of qualified nursing beds.

J. Henry Irwin, head of Reed City Hospital, said: "The thing we are concerned about is that many cases that were being treated at a care of a semichronic nature will be admitted because they now feel it is their right and the obligation and duty of the doctor to admit them."

In Albany, N.Y., Dr. Thomas Hale, administrative vice president and director of the Albany Medical Center hospital, said: "As more people discover what benefits are available, they will start taking advantage of the program. This probably will mean an acute shortage of hospital and nursing home beds."

The three-day hospitalization requirement, he said, will "swamp hospitals with large numbers of patients who do not need to be there, but who want hospitalization to qualify for nursing home care at government expense."

Much the same fear was voiced by Dr. Tomaso D. Curcio, a Los Angeles surgeon. "I can see that all of the people in nursing homes will want to go into hospitals to conform with these regulations, and that will be a terrific load that the hospitals will have to carry for a while," he said.

Not all the hospitals nor the doctors expressed this kind of fear.

Some said in fact that the change would be for the good. Municipal and county hospitals in the more populous, wealthier states like California and New York saw a shift in patient admittance, with many patients seeking private hospitals rather than government-operated institutions because of the Medicare bill would now pay their way in the smaller, often more expensive facilities.

In some areas nursing home provisions were not expected to have an adverse impact, but actually a good one.

Reality Overtakes 'Spirit' But Mystery Is Unresolved

A couple of Sundays ago — June 5, to be exact — a horse was killed by a motorist in the early morning hours near the MAM Oil Station on Rt. 6 in Bolton. The accident is still under investigation — no one knows whose horse it was.

The accident took place about 2:30 a.m., according to the state police report.

Peter G. Thompson, 38, of Bolton, was driving east on along Juruvarty Rd. in Andover at about 1 a.m. June 5. Thinking it was one of his own horses, he suddenly realized it was a horse, he said, but the horse must not have realized it was a car, because it made an about-face and ran right into it.

Trooper Carl Charvat of Colchester was called to the scene. Thompson said his car was okay, but the horse, a chestnut gelding estimated to be about four years old, was killed.

The following morning, the state highway department took a look at the scene. Two trucks were used to remove the body, and a front-end loader dug the grave at the West Wilmington highway department garage where the horse now rests in peace.

Survivors cannot be listed, however, because no one has come forward to say, "That horse was mine."

And Charvat and Bolton Trooper Robert Peterson aren't about to believe theories about any phantoms, at least, not this far from Halloween.

One question continues to haunt the unofficial mind, however—Just where was that horse going in all that hurry in the wretched hours before dawn?

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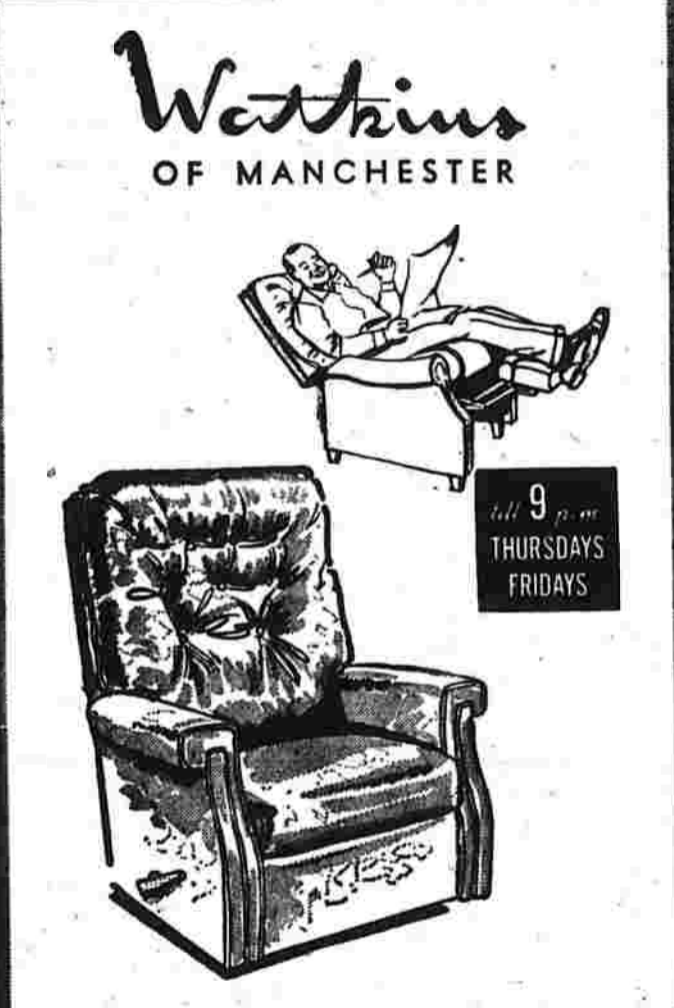
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South Windsor School Board Feels Hartford Has Met Busing Plan Criteria

The board of education last night generally agreed that 24 conditions it cited as essential before it agrees to a proposed contract for busing students from Hartford have been met in a contract proposed by the Hartford school board last week.

The proposed contract, called a "Plan for Contractual Relationships" with Hartford, was drawn up after a series of meetings over the last few weeks between representatives of the State Board of Education, Hartford and the four towns which have agreed to consider participation in the plan.

The points of agreement over the conditions for acceptance of the plan by all four towns are Manchester, West Hartford and Farmington. The next step toward implementation of the plan in South Windsor is for the Hartford board to draw a written contract between South Windsor and Hartford.

Mrs. Jane Romeyn, chairman of the board, requested last night that a letter be written to Dr. Alexander Flante, one of the authors of the plan, with a copy to the president of the Hartford board, requesting confirmation that as many as six staff members from Hartford will be able to participate in a proposed "summer workshop," with reimbursement from some source outside South Windsor.

The letter will also request an addition to the contract proposal, that notice of the town's intention to withdraw from the plan be given to the Hartford board of education; the proposal now calls for notice to be given 30 days before withdrawal to the State Department of Education.

Mrs. Romeyn read a letter received from Hook expressing appreciation for the board's decision on the plan and requesting a board member be appointed to represent the town in subsequent joint meetings.

Mrs. Romeyn was appointed to the advisory committee that will be formed by members of the towns participating in the plan along with members of the Negro community in Hartford and Farmington.

One of the conditions set by the board was that the Hartford board should provide the best opportunity for disadvantaged children, and, as a condition of the plan, that it has a list of names of children to one of the best schools (such as the Jamie High school), or show that this has already been accomplished.

Mrs. Romeyn read a communication from Hook stating that more than 100 pupils are being bused to the Amble Flamingo School from the northeast section of the city.

Dr. Robert Laurie, a board member, commented that the information is worthy of note because it was one of the conditions set by South Windsor. No reference is made to this point in the formal contract proposal.

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


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School Board Balances Budget; Thanks Manchester for Its Help

The board of education announced last night to close the fiscal year with a balanced budget and adopted a resolution bidding adieu to Manchester High School and thanking it for its help in the years of educating Bolton youth.

The board will meet again Thursday night to discuss the monthly business. Because of a town meeting last night, it didn't settle down to its agenda until about 9 p.m. and then went into executive session on a personnel matter shortly before 11 p.m.

In preparing to balance its budget for the (current) 1965-66 fiscal year, which ends June 30, the board found it was able to offset some of the accounts which had been frozen at the beginning of the year, in September.

After going over its policies on bidding procedures and the waiving of bids, the board decided that the items should be let out for sealed bids, even though Liguori had obtained three quotes on price.

The board also approved the purchase of a new bus for the elementary school walk-along which will be let out to bid. Bids are to be received by the board of education with the elementary school walk-along by June 15.

Board Chairman Walter Waddell remarked that, because of "judicious handling" of the budget this year, the board will be able to take care of some of the "badly needed repairs" at the elementary school. Paint has been purchased for all exterior windows and some interior walls, he said.

Some capital outlay instructional equipment will also be purchased, by sealed bids or by invitation bids, at the discretion of the superintendent and the board chairman. The list includes a motion picture projector for the elementary school, storage cabinets, bulletin boards, and library shelving.

Many of the items have been listed in the 1966-67 budget, which took an even larger cut than this year's. The board also adopted transfers within the budget, as recommended by Liguori. It also gave him authority to make

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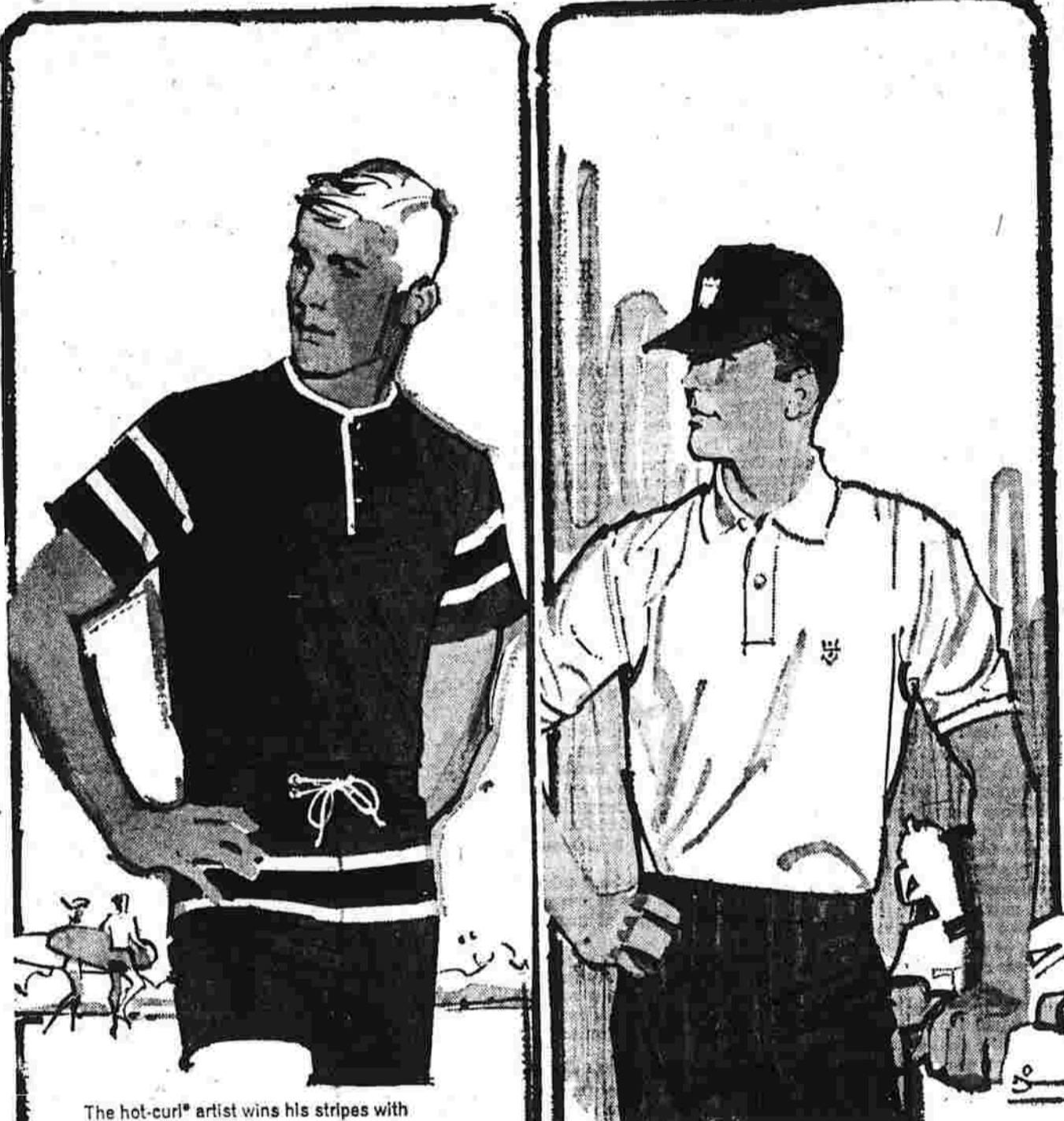

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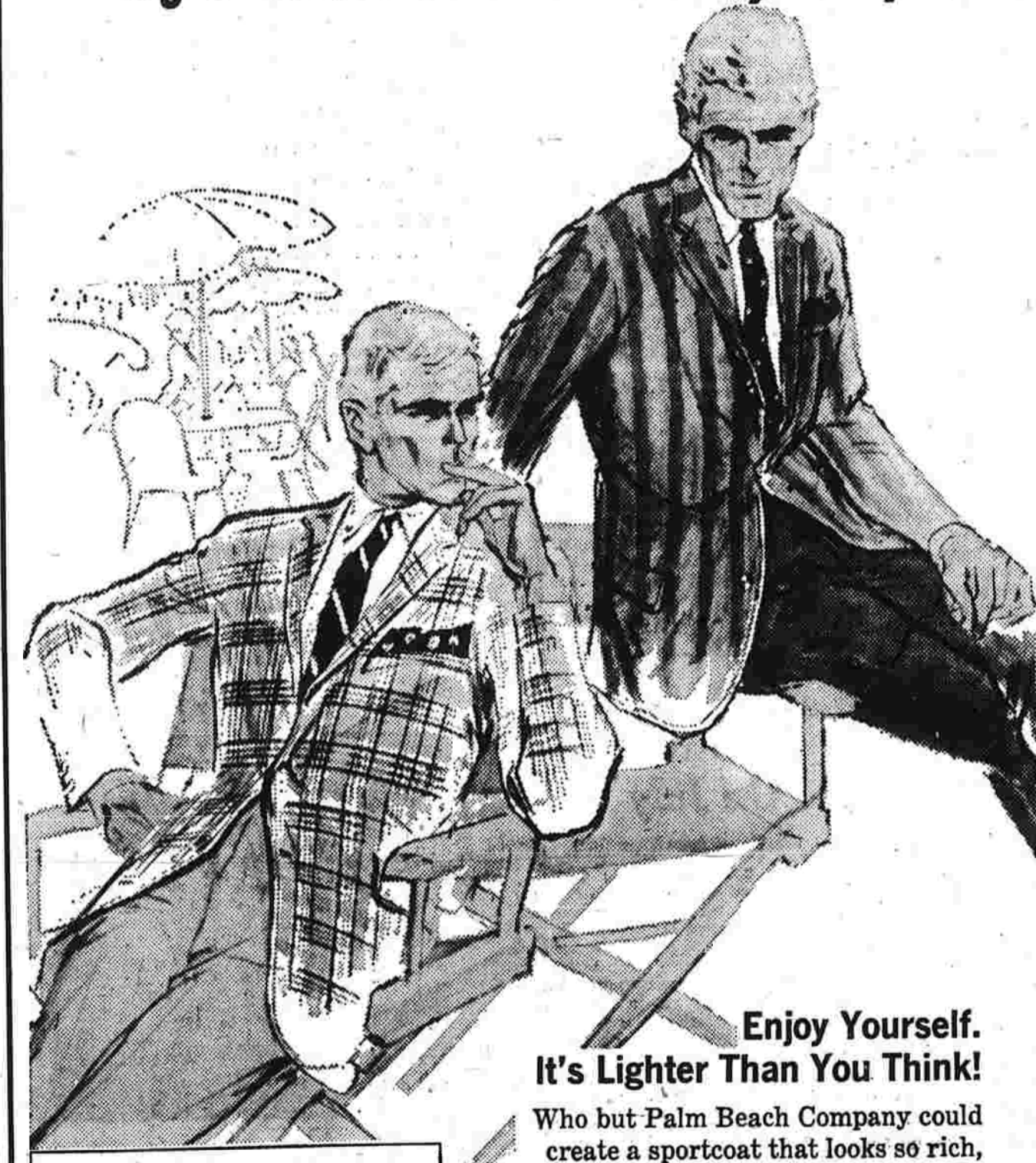

Volpe Promises Hard Campaign For Re-election

BOSTON (AP)—Gov. John A. Volpe promised a fighting campaign today in his bid for re-election to a four-year term as Republican governor of Massachusetts.

The governor's announcement was made in a taped speech for a statewide radio and television audience Tuesday night.

Volpe pledged "to continue to promote the integrity and welfare of our state."

He noted that the governor elected this year will serve a term lasting until January of 1971 and said the task "calls for experience and a proven record of executive responsibility in both business and government."

Previously, the term ran two years.

"I will fight for re-election and I seek your help," Volpe said, "I will need your help to I am to win."

Volpe will present his bid to the Republican State Convention next week. No Republican challenger is in sight.

Democrats have endorsed former Atty. Gen. Edward J. McCormack for governor. He and former presidential aide Kenneth P. O'Donnell will enter the September Democratic primary to seek the right to oppose Volpe in November.

Search Resumes For State Flier

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—A search resumed today for two airmen, one of them from Danbury, Conn., who vanished during a bombing trip on the Yukon River.

Those missing after the 16-foot flat-bottom river boat hit a sandbar or log and capsized were Airman 2.C. James H. Brett Jr., 22, of Danbury, and Airman 2.C. John G. Douglas, 21, of Andover, Wash.

Brett, Dubuque and Airman 2.C. Raymond Hutchinson, 21, of Portland, Maine, left Cannon Air Force Station, about 275 miles west of Fairbanks, at about 1 a.m. Monday.

In the early mid-morning daylight, for night-seeing in the boat.

A spokesman at Elmendorf Air Force Base said the boat capsized on the return trip, and that the three airmen managed to hold on for about 46 minutes.

Hutchinson made it to a small island, and a passing barge picked him up.

But the two others apparently drifted downstream. All three men were wearing life preservers, the Air Force said.

A search by two Air Force helicopters and an Air Force plane was conducted over an area extending 200 miles downstream.

Monagan Poll Favors Continuing in Viet

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. John S. Monagan, D-Conn., reported to the House today that 54.64 per cent of the replies to a questionnaire favor continuing present U.S. policy in South Vietnam.

Results of the 12-part poll were placed by Monagan into the Congressional Record.

He said he broke his question on Viet Nam policy into six categories but excluded a question on the desirability of negotiation in the belief "that all of us would welcome the termination of the conflict by proper negotiation."

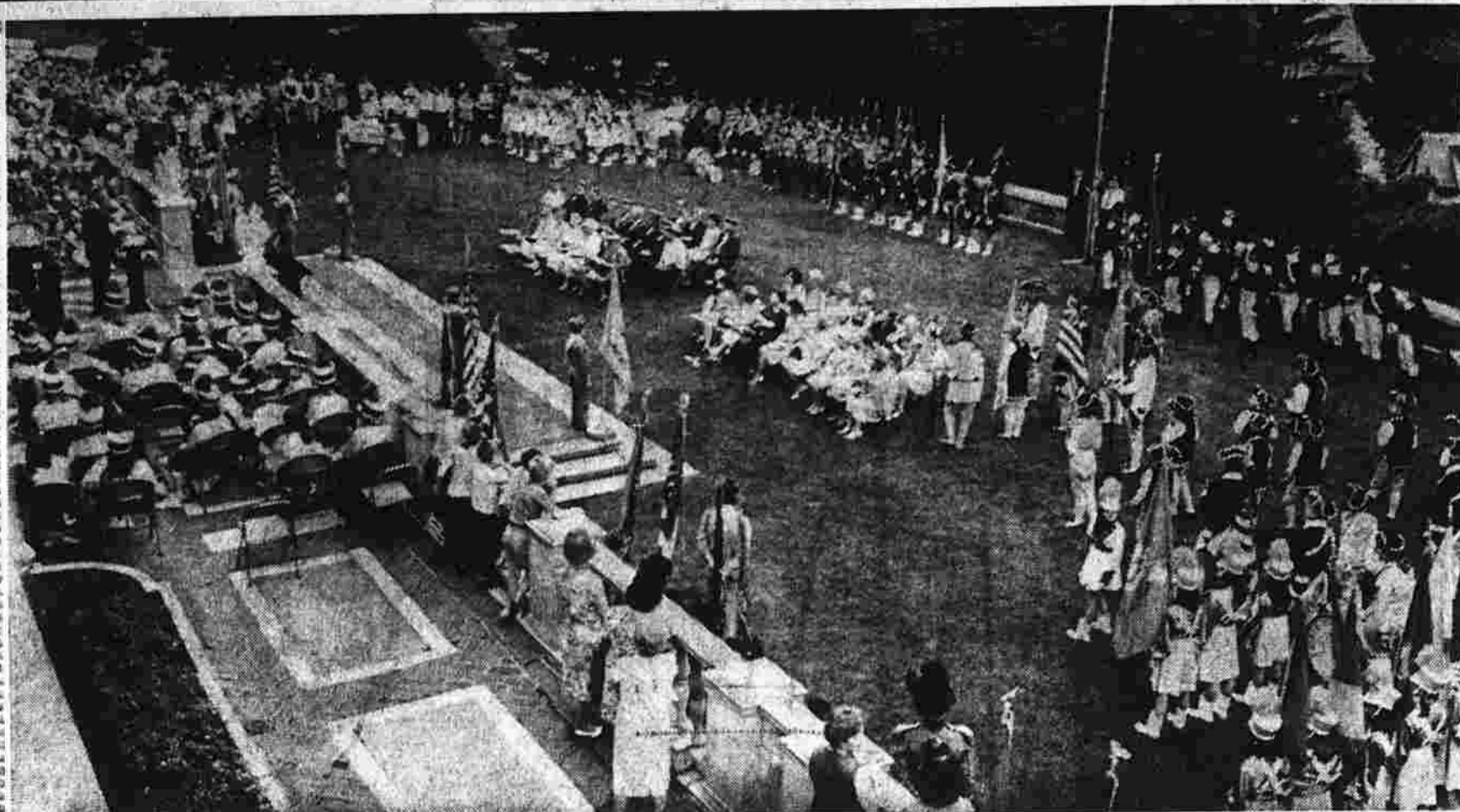

Film Easily Can Exceed Its Budget

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — How does a movie go two or three million dollars over budget? In the case of "The Sand Pebbles," it was easy: Send a cast and crew of 136 across the Pacific Ocean, subject them to the vagaries of orient weather and add plus a scramble of languages. Before long you've got a movie costing \$11 million.

The worry Wise is now back shooting on the Westwood lot after four months of filming in Taiwan and Hong Kong, twice as long as he had expected. The company, which is headed by Steve McQueen, Richard Attenborough, Richard Crenna and Andy Bergin, hopes to finish late next month. Filming started Nov. 22.

"Fifty to 60 per cent of our day was due to weather," explained Wise. "Another element was working with boats; they aren't maneuverable as actors, especially when you're dealing with unpredictable tides."

"And the language barrier inevitably slowed us down. We had good interpreters, but even they couldn't deal with the many dialects. They would give instructions to the junk crews in Mandarin, then we'd wonder why the boats didn't follow directions. We would find out later in the day that the crews could only understand Taiwanese."

Most of the location filming took place at Taiwan, with additional river scenes near Hong Kong. This meant breaking in a new Chinese crew to augment the Hollywood specialists; the changeover brought more delay.

"I must say that the cast and crew came through a very difficult situation admirably," said Wise. "It's not easy for Americans to be dropped into a country that is completely foreign, and then subject them to lengthy delays."

"Realizing that at the outset, we selected the company with a careful eye toward stability. Several actors were rejected because they might develop a drinking problem on a faraway location; we couldn't risk having them fall apart midway through the shooting."

"The ones we chose were thorough professionals. There were only two or three unfortunate incidents, and we quickly sent those involved back to the states."

Wise said he was afraid to ask what the latest cost of "The Sand Pebbles" is, but he suspected the film has gone 2 or 3 million over its original \$8 million budget.

"But I have no regrets," he added. "There is no other place in the world where we could have gotten the numbers of people to reproduce China on screen. This picture is expensive and expensive, but I hope it will all be worth it."

Little Change Expected In Procedure: Reardon

Police Chief James M. Reardon today that the Supreme Court's new decision on the questioning of suspects would make little change in procedure presently followed by police.

"I don't expect it's going to be a dramatic change," Reardon said, making his first public comment on Monday's ruling.

In a 5-4 decision, the Supreme Court ruled that before a suspect can be questioned, he must be informed of his right to remain silent and his right to have counsel. If he waives counsel and cannot afford one, police must provide one.

Reardon said the standard police procedure in Manchester is to bring a suspect to the station and inform him, before any interrogation begins, that he has a right to remain silent, that anything he says may be held against him and that he may call an attorney.

If a suspect wants to call an attorney, he said, police will allow him to do so, even though it may mean no interrogation will take place.

Reardon, reflecting the view of a number of police officials, said the trend toward greater constitutional protection of suspects has been evident for some time. "We saw it coming," he said.

Manchester, like other communities, started making changes—warning suspects and showing caution in the amount of information made public—when the direction of the Supreme Court was clear.

The handwriting on the wall made its most significant impression two years ago when the court, in the landmark Escobedo case, extended the right of counsel to the police station and set protections against coerced confessions.

Some legal observers believe the next and final step may be a Supreme Court requirement that counsel must be present during any interrogation. The latest decision gives a suspect the option to face police interrogators alone.

While Reardon said he pre-announced the court's concern that the Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination not be jeopardized, he expressed his own concern for the victims of crime. He indicated he wanted to see a balance between protection given to a suspect and protection, perhaps in the form of indemnity, given victims.

been proved that regular, intensive physical activity does aid the development of capillaries.

While such physical activity does not counter development of arteriosclerosis with advancing age, he said, the expanded capillary network supplements the blood supply to such vital areas as the heart muscles during exertion. This helps offset the lessening of the supply because of hardening of the arteries.

Holliman said because of the inability of medical science to cope with arteriosclerosis, no significant increase in life expectancy can be looked for under present conditions.

"Now we must await some new development to further increase life expectancy," he commented. "I feel sure that a solution to arteriosclerosis will be found and that this will add as the heart muscles during exertion."

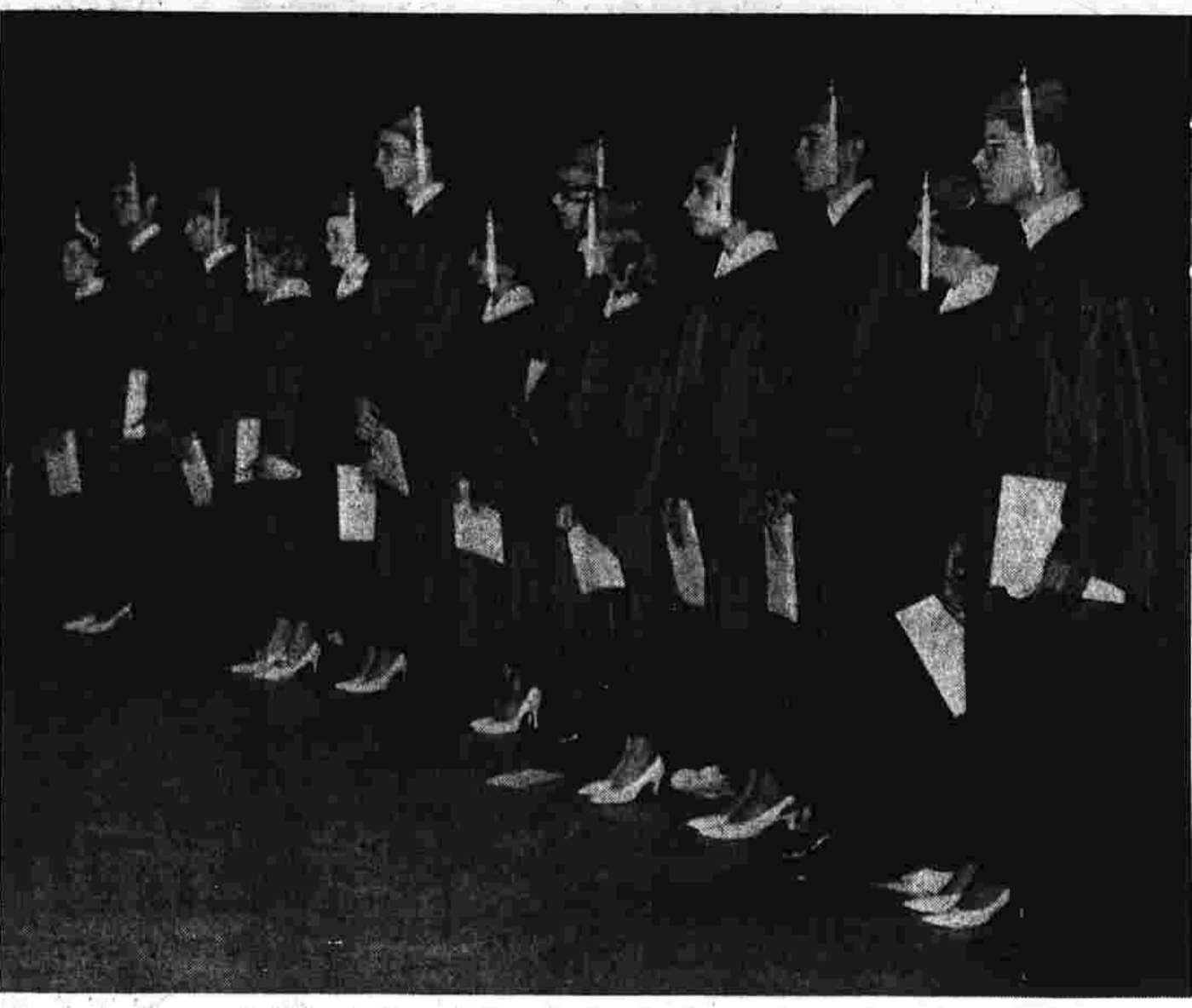

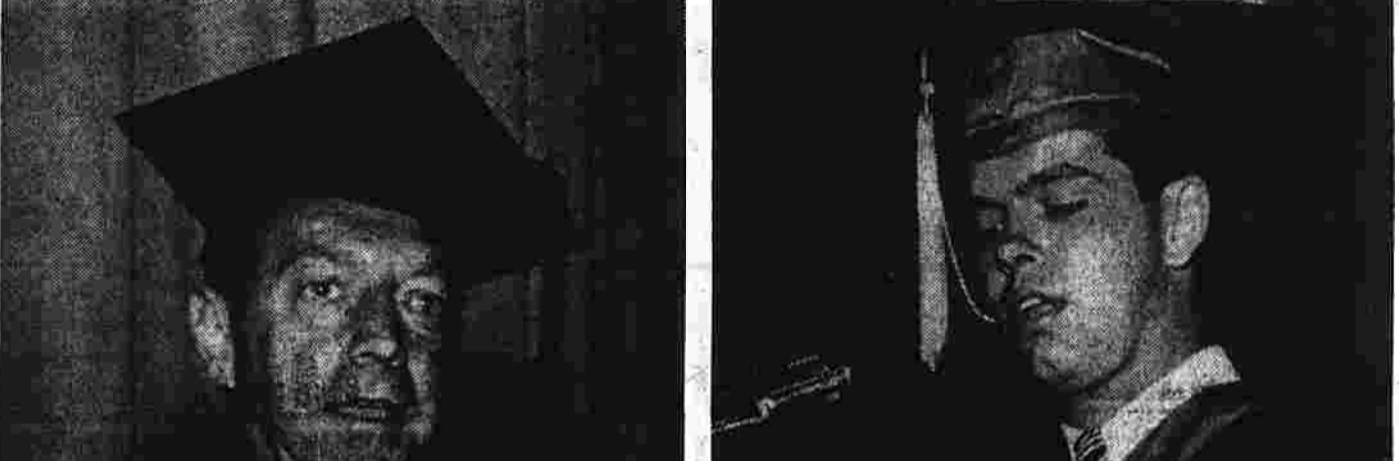

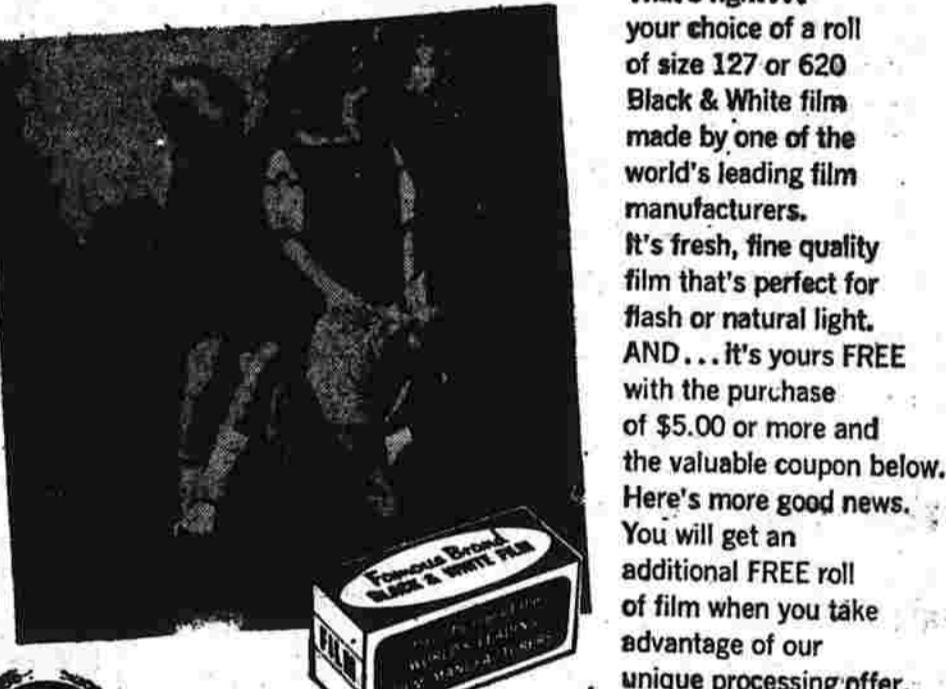

Circuit Rider Stops in State

BRIDGEPORT (AP) — The campus for the five-day session was reminiscent of the days when the Rev. Freeman Garrett rode about the northeastern part of the new United States preaching Methodism in scores of small towns.

The parb was similar, but the "circuit rider" was the Rev. Russell E. Sargent, a modern-day Methodist preacher. His arrival in Bridgeport Tuesday after a nine-day, 200-mile horse-back trip from Rhinebeck, N.Y., signaled the opening of the 167th session of the New York Methodist Conference.

Some 1,200 delegates, 200 more than expected, crowded the University of Bridgeport.

The delegates, clergymen and laymen, represent Methodist churches in Eastern New York and Western Connecticut.

Methodism is observing its 200th year on this side of the Atlantic, and the Rev. Mr. Sargent's "circuit ride" was part of that observance.

The clergymen mounted a big brown and white quarter horse named "Lord Baltimore" on June 8 and began his journey. He stopped to preach at Poughkeepsie, New York City, Yonkers, New Rochelle, Rye, Pleasantville and Armonk, N.Y., and in Greenwich, Stamford and Norwalk, Conn.

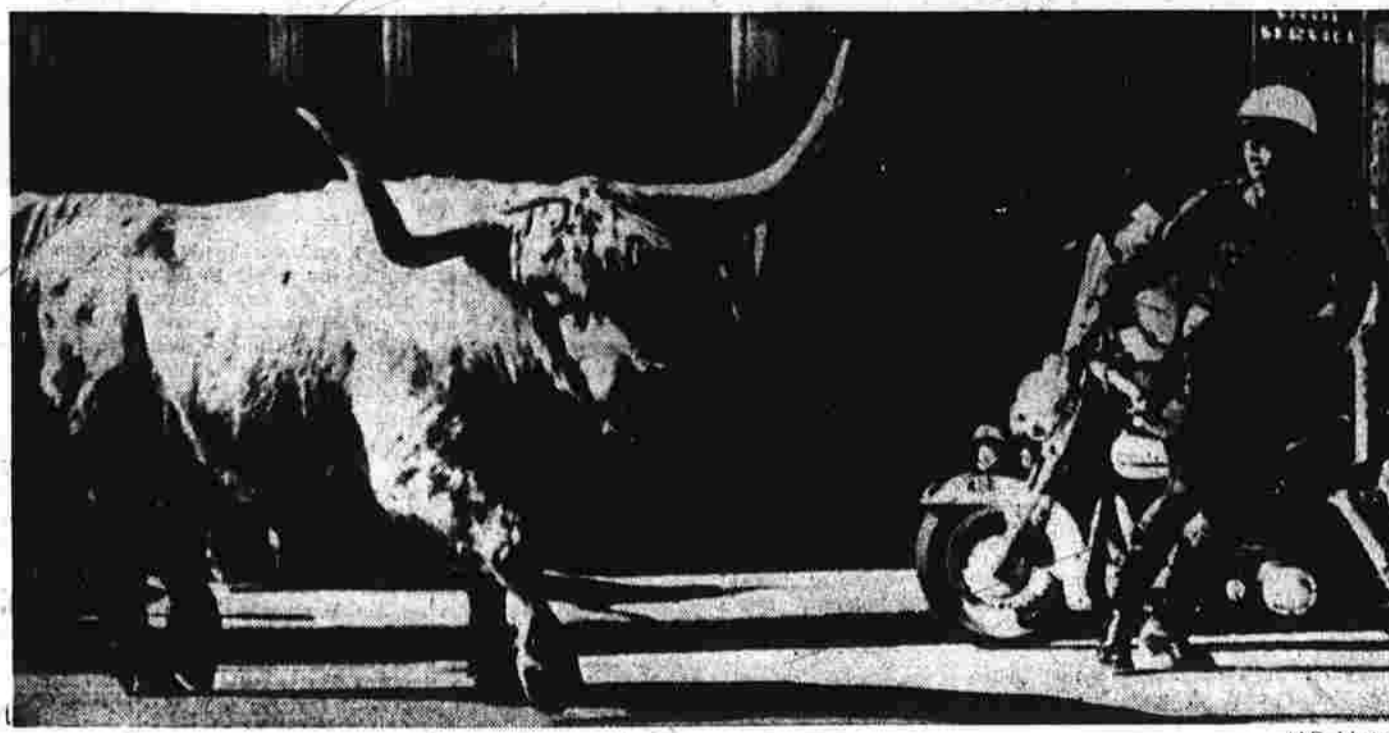
