Justice Brennan's Long Journey The arguments which determine any five to four division in a conscientious court are likely to be arguments along

very fine and narrow lines. There have been fine, narrow line arguments in both of the most important recent rulings of the United States Supreme Court—the ruling regarding the andling of suspects by police, particularly with regard to the obtaining of confessions and the ruling concerning the taking of blood samples for evisence as to drunkenness.

These two rulings happen to have contradicted one another not only so far as any snap judgment by the public is concerned, but also so far as eight o the Court's nine members voted. Only one Justice thought the two rulings consistent.

The first ruling, that of June 13, laid down extensive and detailed new rules concerning the handling of suspects by police, carrying the doctrine of the right of the individual not to be involved in the incrimination of himself, or not to be left under any kind of pressures to noriminate himself, forward to more extreme and police-strategy-limiting definition than ever before.

Five Justices voted for this June spinion, written by Chief Justice Earl Warren. They were Justices Warren, Hugo Black, William G. Douglas, Abe Fortas and William J. Brennan. Four voted against the June 13 opinion. They were Justices Tom C. Clark, John M. Harlan, Potter Stewart and

The second ruling, that of June 20, one week later, allowed police to have blood taken from the veins of a suspect in order to obtain evidence that sould be used to convict him of drunk-

Five Justices voted for this June 20 ppinion. The Justices voting in favor of his June 20 opinion, allowing the takng of blood from a suspect, included he same four Justices, Clark, Harlan, Stewart, and White, who had voted against the June 13 opinion restricting police powers. These four, then, were consistent. They were joined, on June 20, by Justice Brennan, who had been in the majority of June 13. that the law has to act fast if it is to get its analysis before the alcoholic content of the blood begins to diminish; he argued that the blood test is considered an accurate method of testing the degree to which a person is under the influence; and he argued that the taking of blood is not a process which hurts wery much, mentally or physically. He was, therefore, in this instance, the whole Court. We don't think much of either of the opinions he made possible-neither what seems to us the lightly over-zealous restriction of police privileges in the June 13 opinion, nor the strangely-reasoned accord to the police of the blood-taking privilege in the opinion of June 20. Our respect for Justice Brennan as the Court would have been higher if he had remained consistent, and protected the prisoner's body as well as his mind from self-in-

And, of course, when we hear it, there is something else it means, too, and the mere uttering of the slogan tells us all The slogan means that those using

"The spokesman said the buffalos were heavily laden with what was suspected to be enemy ammunition. The animals died under fire from F-105 Thunderchief jets. The spokesman said 'there were no secondary explosions.' "United States Marine pilots also strafed a column of 11 pack elephants in the mountains 35 miles southwest of

Danang in South Vietnam yesterday. Five of the animals were killed and five others seen to fall. Again there were no econdary explosions."
