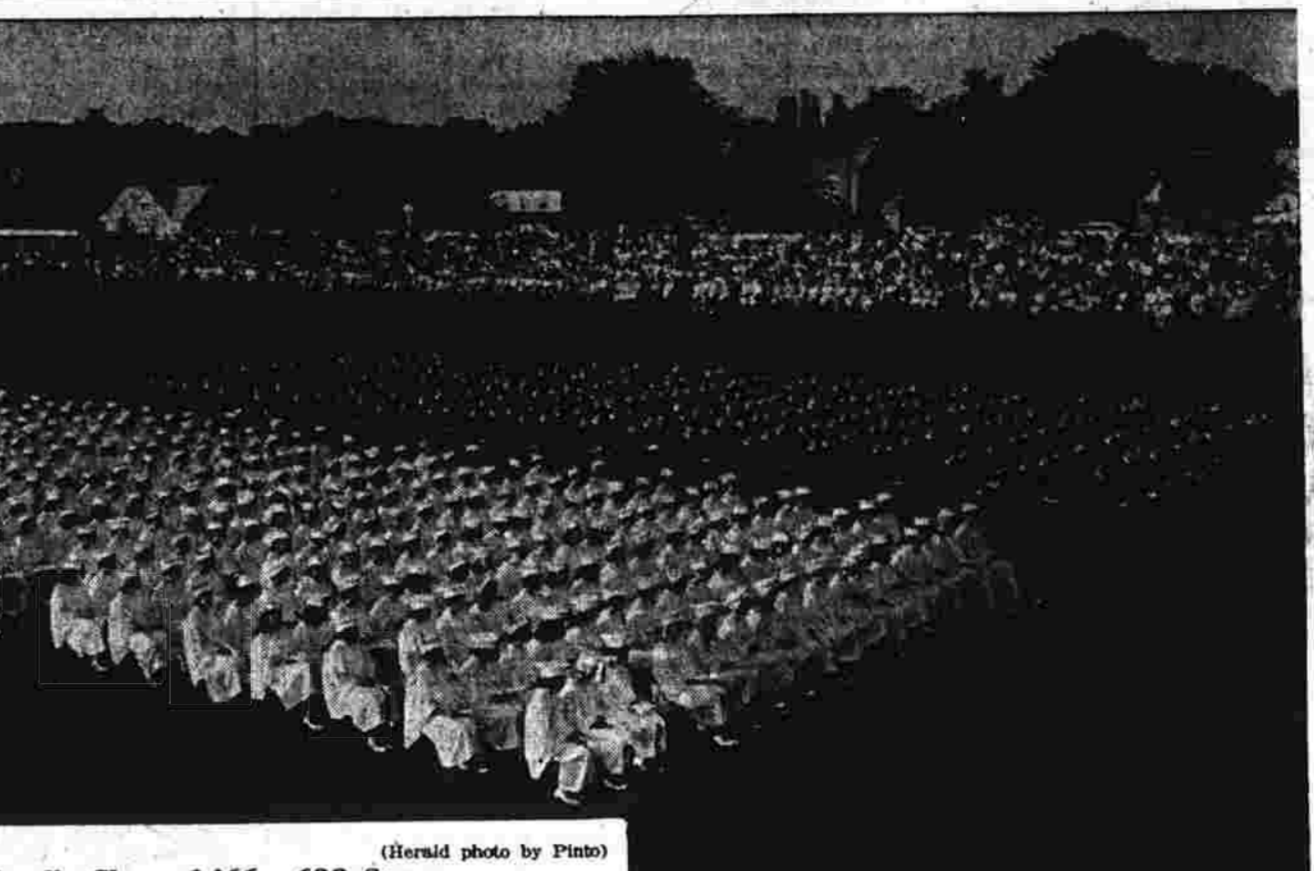

Boyd Says Dodd Mishandled Fund

WASHINGTON (AP)—James P. Boyd Jr. accused his former boss, Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, today of "misappropriation of hundreds of thousands of dollars in campaign funds."

Bill Russell Hits Hate in Boston Talk

BOSTON (AP)—Bill Russell, Boston Celtics basketball coach, says a "poisoned atmosphere" of "hate, distrust, and ignorance" hangs over Boston.

Russell, coach and center of the champion Celtics of the National Basketball Association, addressed about 700 persons Wednesday night at a "freedom graduation" for junior high school pupils whose regular graduation was disrupted by a racial incident.

He was greeted with a foot-stomping, cheering ovation. Russell is the first Negro to be named coach of a major professional sports team.

He said demands are made on residents of the predominantly Negro Roxbury section to be "good citizens, civic-minded citizens that are proud of their city," but, he added, they are "not treated as citizens of our city."

Instead, he said, "certain members of the city government" have "used the people of Roxbury for whipping boys, and who will they use for whipping boys next year, or the year after that? The fire will spread."

Russell said he would "advise all citizens of Boston to take a long hard look at the schools in Boston."

Ross said the reason why the number of high school graduates in Connecticut is lower this year than last is because the crest of the post-war bumper crop of babies has passed.

The 186 total of 38,818 graduates is the all-time record.

As might be expected, the percentage of graduates who intend to get more schooling is rising. Two years ago, only 60.5 per cent of the public school graduates continued their formal education compared to an estimated 67 per cent this year, Ross said.

A much higher percentage of private and parochial school students—67 per cent this year—go on to institutions of higher learning. Sixty-seven per cent are entering four-year colleges.

This is the first year that Ross' office is keeping such statistics on private and parochial students.

Williams took command of his detachment after his commanding officer was wounded during a fierce night-long battle here during that long night last year in South Viet Nam.

"I had a mission to perform and I did it," recalled Charles O. Williams, a wearer of the green beret of the Army's Special Forces. "The thought that I was being a hero didn't

to hold out against the attack. At the time, he was executive officer of the A detachment, 5th Special Forces Group.

He was ordered back to the United States last February after a year's service in Viet Nam.

In an exclusive interview in advance of being awarded the nation's highest honor today by President Johnson at a White House ceremony, Williams said some signs of that night in Viet Nam are still with him.

"I still have some nerve damage," he said, "and a machine gun bullet caught me here" — he pointed to a neatly sutured eight-inch scar on his right forearm. "I was lucky though. Williams added with a grimace. "It

only grazed my arm. Otherwise I might have lost it."

There are other signs, too, of that night in Viet Nam.

Sticky and self-declared, Williams looks older than his 32 years. He doesn't like talking about his battle experiences. He doesn't smile much. He doesn't want to go back to Viet Nam.

"I'll probably be going back some day," the professional soldier said. "I can't say I want to go — I've got a family and a life back here — but if I'm told to go I will."

President Johnson will make the presentation of the award at a White House ceremony today. Williams, his wife Anita, and his four children and his

mother, Mrs. Inera Hill Vance, S.C., are expected to be on hand.

The citation reads: "Despite several wounds sustained throughout the 14-hour battle, Lt. Williams braved hostile gunfire many times, directing operations, stabilizing the defenders' positions, and encouraging the troops to hold out against the attacking forces."

REGAN VEToes Goldwater Aid

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Ronald Reagan last night helped Barry Goldwater, his 1964 presidential choice, and today welcomed some vigorous primary foes aboard his campaign for governor of California.

Reagan, who became a political figure with a 1964 televised fund-raising appeal for Goldwater, said Wednesday that he plans a California-wide campaign.

He said he'll do without the assistance of Goldwater or former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, the leading GOP candidate for governor of California in 1962.

However, Nixon said in Reno, Nev., that he will campaign actively for Reagan, beginning with a Republican victory dinner in Los Angeles tonight.

Reagan appeared full of confidence at a news conference following talks with some of the state legislators who opposed him in the primary.

The lawmakers unanimously voted their support for Reagan and the entire GOP ticket, including Gov. Edmund G. Brown, Democrat.

Reagan said "people are hungry for a campaign on the issues."

Bolton Finance Unit Asks Surplus Go Back to Summer Pupils

The board of finance decided at its meeting last night that the board of education should return the \$244,16 balance from last year's summer school to the students who attended, no matter where it came from. It will notify the school board of its decision.

The board of finance recently recovered the "surplus" in the auditor's report and wrote the school board about it. School board members became somewhat indignant and suggested that the board of finance could have straightened the matter out with phone calls. That a letter from Philip L. Light, superintendent of schools, to the finance board had never been answered.

The board of education further explained that the "surplus" was considered a gift, left to the account by the former school chairman, who refused his salary.

But the board of finance is standing fast in its belief a summer school should not show any profit. It also says it is sorry that it did not reply to the letter.

The board of finance is asking that summer school money go in and out of the town's General Fund this year, rather than handled as a special account by the school.

This was the question in L. Light's unexplained letter. General Fund or not? The school used a special account last year and last year a school board meeting earlier this month that he favored this method.

The finance board will suggest in its letter to the school board that checks for summer school tuition be made out to the town of Bolton.

The finance board reviewed the list of encumbrances made by the board of education in preparing to close out its 1965-66 budget. The total amount to be encumbered is \$13,321.99.

Money that is unencumbered is committed for some specific purpose although not yet actually paid out. Encumbrances are claims on funds left over at the end of the fiscal year.

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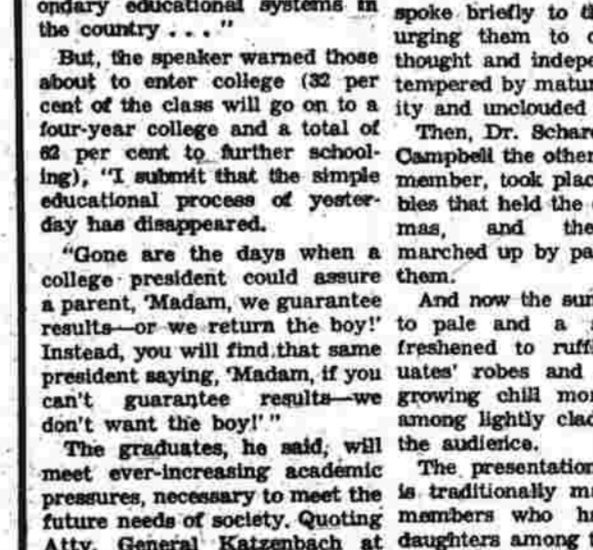


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Rockville Class of 1966 Gets Its Diplomas

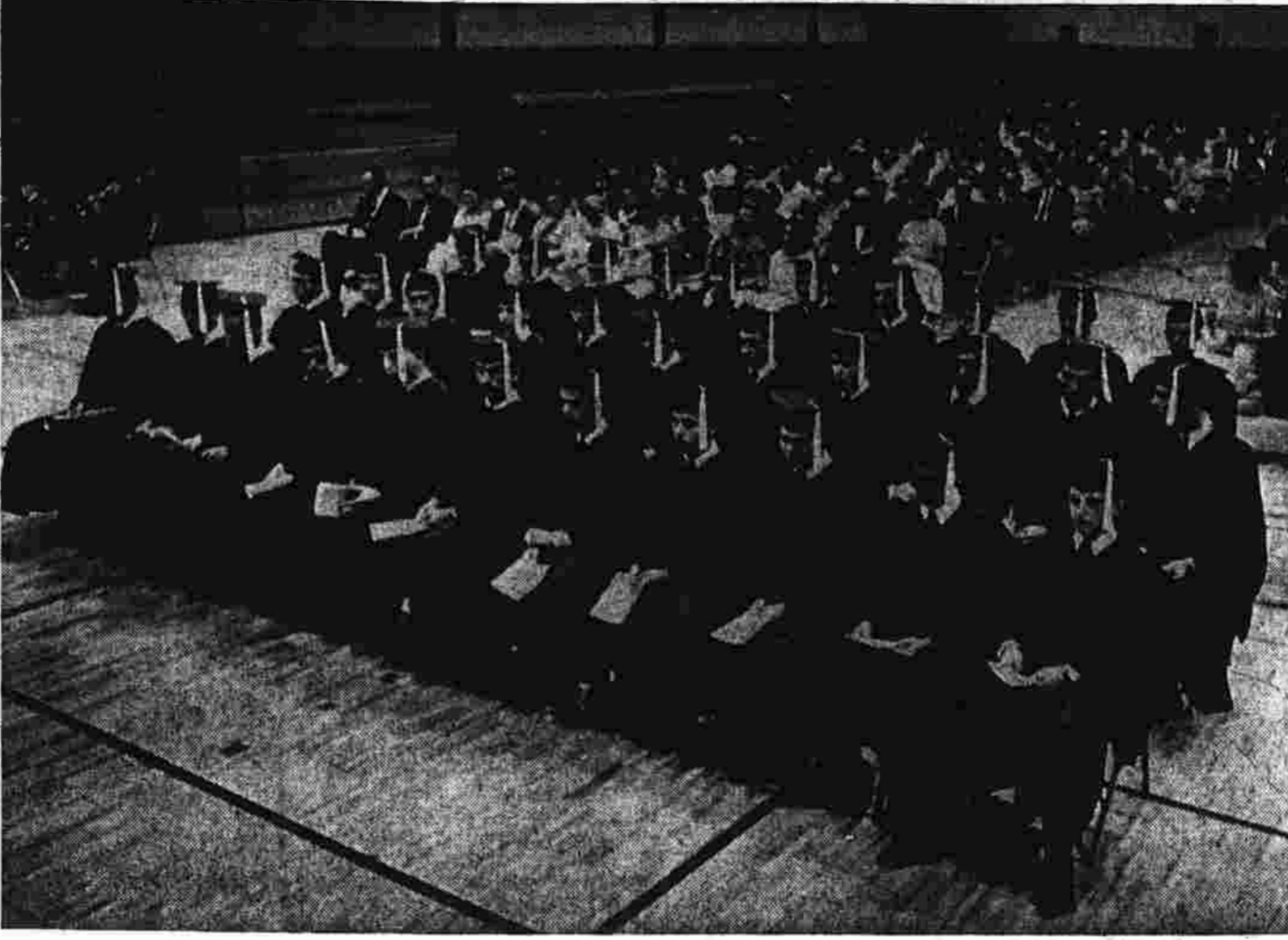

Army Wins Battle Against Malaria

WASHINGTON (AP)—Army medical researchers reported today a major breakthrough in the fight against malaria, next to the Viet Cong, the most savage enemy American troops face in Viet Nam.

A spokesman for the surgeon general's office said diaminodiphenylsulfone (DDS), a drug long used in treating leprosy, was found in Viet Nam field tests to cut in half the number of men who are stricken by malaria.

Soldiers who receive the drug but still come down with the disease should be able to return to duty in two or three weeks, instead of the present six to eight weeks. Chances of a relapse should be slashed from 40 per cent to 4 per cent.

Last year 1,000 U.S. troops were stricken by malaria with 85,000 man days lost. The latest complete monthly figures which fluctuate widely show that one of every 20 men could expect to be stricken during their one year tour.

The drug has been approved by the armed forces epidemic control board and the Food and Drug Administration, the spokesman said. Use of the drug by all U.S. troops in danger areas is expected soon. Stockpiles of DDS already are on hand in Viet Nam.

The drug is aimed specifically at falciparum, which is common in use are virtually helpless to prevent. Falciparum, a severe form of malaria, is restricted to the Vietnamese highlands.

A less serious strain of malaria, vivax, is widespread in Viet Nam, with presently used drugs.

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Tea Is Staple Drink For Moslem Traveler

pot and glasses; the tea break is well-observed here. In Isfahan, the most charming city of Iran, we visited a tea house where the backs to the tower on the outskirts, built in the third century by Sassanian kings as a combination residence and watch tower. Climbing up the rocky hill to the ruins of the circular mud tower was a difficult adventure. A water storage tank was being built on the same hill, and the workmen watched our ascent. When we reached the top, we found they had spread a rug for us to sit on and soon one of the young workmen approached, offering us tea. Water must have been valued on that hilltop, for it had to be brought up by donkeys from below, but they shared it with strangers.

At a mosque in Shiraz, Iran, we were seated by the caretaker who was seated by his visitors from the West. So serious other men; we don't know if they were officially consecrated or not, for an Iranian mosque is the center of social life as a public square. In other countries, and we never knew the number of men with nothing particular to do, they were properly haughty as befitting their status as invited guests. NEW CAVE-IN OPENS
KANSAS CITY, Kan. (AP) — Another hole opened up Wednesday night in a residential district here where five houses already have disappeared into an abandoned underground quarry.

The latest cave-in, 10 to 12 feet in diameter, is in the driveway of a home. When our tour leader, Professor Hinz, told us on our first day in Shiraz that he had arranged for us to take tea with a friend who was an old friend of his, we didn't believe him. We didn't believe him because he had a contradiction in terms: Hinz didn't know his old friend's name.

The post office delivers his mail to "The Dervish at Fan Tan."

What concerned the professor more was that the dervish owns only four glasses. Our party numbered six.

The Dervish at Fan Tan has one of those beautiful leafy gardens that have made Persian gardens a byword of poetry: few flowers, but oppressive and popular and everywhere covered with vines. His garden is also the burial place of some very holy men, but the presence of seven flat tombstones in no way diminished its easy charm. From behind some trees in a corner came the sound of chanting; a few students of the Koran had started their session to have a meeting there.

The Dervish is a gentleman who is probably old, but whose features are strong and rugged, and they are perfect for his profession. He is coming with the universe. He was gracious but seemed apart from the rest of us; despite the fact he was handled by the slightly younger man who shared his home.

That bottle we did not enter, but what we saw had some of the aspects of a mosque. A large platform with no railing, like a stage, overlooked the garden; it was much higher than the vines on which Moslems pray, facing the mihrab that shows them which way is Mecca. The vines were tied with water with a bucket, like those in mosques.

How the dervish's assistant had had the four glasses. While he made tea, an Iranian lady came with a pitcher to draw water from the faucet, which was probably the neighborhood water supply. She was covered with a chador, a curved piece of fabric which pious Moslem women always wear in public, and with which she hid the lower part of her face from men. This poor woman had so much trouble keeping her chador

over the face in the presence of forty men, while drawing water, and seemed so embarrassed, that the men in our party turned their backs to make her feel better.

We had tea on this high platform, sitting on a rug, some of us with our feet dangling over the edge. When four of us had taken tea, the dervish's assistant washed two glasses at the faucet, and two more were served. It was a happy end to a day of sight-seeing, and when a party of tourists came into the garden, from there and how having discovered it, no one knew, because no one spoke to me, we were properly haughty as befitting our status as invited guests. They photographed us, and those photographs will probably be shown in Dubuque as typical Persians enjoying their tea.

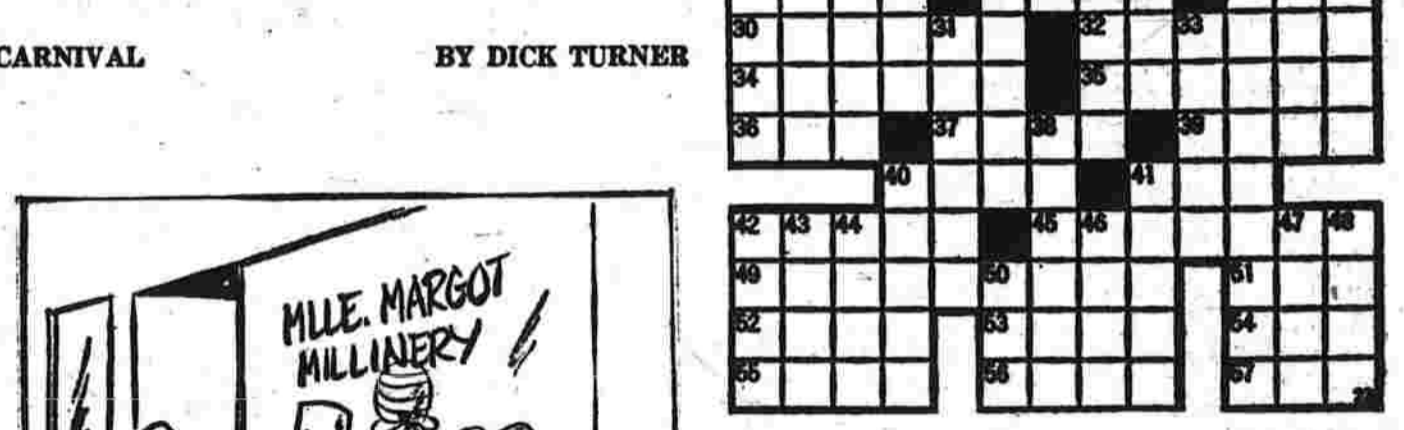

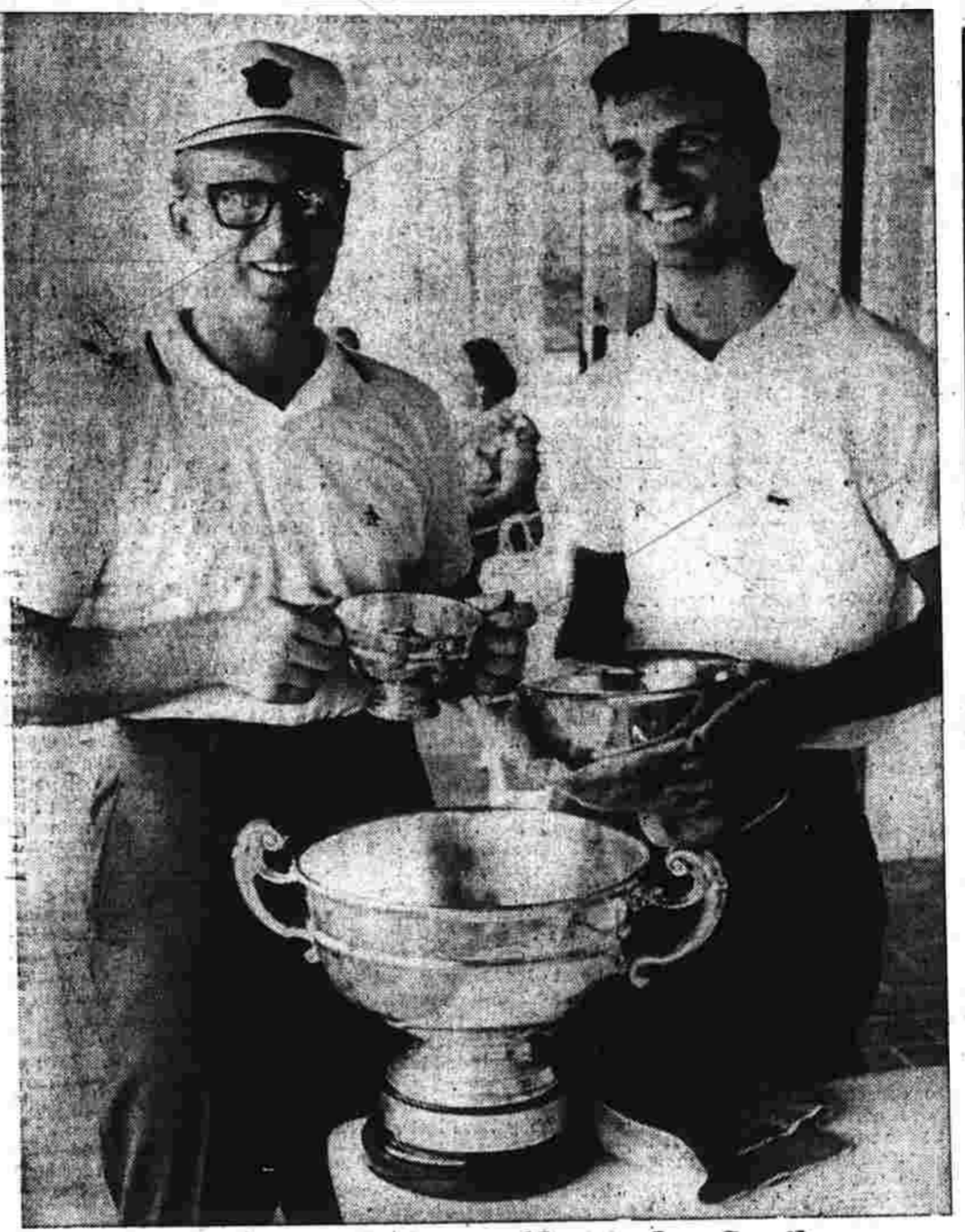
