The Fatal Rusion The worst disease the world todayalong with some of the most superfi-

stally civilized people in it—suffers from to the illusion that there are different kinds and different degrees of war. This illusion provides us with certainly our greatest waste of diplomatic energy, which is addressed to the proposition that there is something special about clear war, which ought to be avoided in favor of other kinds of war.

The same illusion also provides us with our excuse and alibi for indulging urselves in what we call restrained or imited varieties of war, as if there were no particular harm in these par-Hoular methods of killing one another. The harsh, realistic truth, which nobody faces, is something quite the op-

It is the intent and philosophy behind the weapon, not the nature of the weapon itself, which is important. The stone ax is as good, or as evil, as the atomic bomb.

And there is no such thing as a limfted war. War is all on one level-the evel of kill. It begins and operates on hat level, and all that ever happens is

that really matters, is the original choice to begin the killing as an instrunent of human, national, or ideological

Our refusal to face these relatively simple truths honestly is the thing that ets the stage for all the transparent elf-deception with which we operate. It makes possible that rationalization y which we describe the use of tear gas as humane when it merely flushes the enemy out of his dugouts so he can sective the direct flame of our napalm.

It makes possible the ornate pretense y which we first concern ourselves with rendering impossible and unusable ne roads the enemy uses, and then ventually concern ourselves with the soline and oil he may be using in raveling over these unusable roads, and still do not realise that our evenual efficiency will consist in killing the enemy before he leaves his home and puts on a uniform and starts out

It is this same unrealistic kind of prense which makes it possible for our ally, Britain, to pretend to go along with us in the war in Vietnam, but to stop, suddenly, when we start bombing large city populations. The time for anybody to have stop-

ed, or to have stopped supporting anyody, was when the first resort to eapons was being made. All this is not to say that war is inwitable, or that the chain of progresion and escalation can't ever be brok-

foward making war inevitable is the msane theory that it can be handled nd kept under control, that it can purne limited objectives with limited respons employed in limited strate-

Some wars perhaps do seem more horble than others. The war in Vietnam sems particularly barbaric and horri-He because it involves one of the greatit military giants in history, with one the greatest arsenals ever dreamed by man, in what ought to be a oneided punishment of a small and relaively unarmed opponent. But, again, and to reiterate, this is not the essential paracteristic of this war, or in itself ny valid reason for rejecting it.
