## U.S. Bombers Attack Hanoi Depots Again



### New Raids Seven Miles From Capital

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — American bombers attacked Communist fuel depots in the vicinity of Hanoi for the second straight day today, the U.S. command announced. Both Navy and Air Force planes participated in the raids, which hit fuel dumps around the capital of Communist North Viet Nam. The closest raid today to Hanoi was seven and a half miles from the capital, a U. S. spokesman said. Wednesday, in their closest penetration to Hanoi, Air Force bombers smashed a big fuel depot only three miles from the heart of the city. There was no immediate estimate of the damage done by the raiders. An Air Force spokesman said no Communist MIG jets were sighted and no surface-to-air missiles were fired before the American planes roared away. The raids continued the American strategy designed to deprive the North Vietnamese army of its vital fuel supplies and thus hamper its movement of men and supplies to the Viet Cong in South Viet Nam. Earlier U.S. military officials proclaimed the attacks Wednesday on the fuel depots at Hanoi and Haiphong a spectacular success, and an Air Force general termed them the "most important strikes of the war."

## War Escalation Dispute Continues Around World

WASHINGTON (AP) — The worldwide dispute over U.S. bombing of oil installations on the outskirts of Hanoi and Haiphong flared anew on Capitol Hill today with a call from Sen. J.W. Fulbright, D-Ark., for an explanation of why the United States "drastically escalated" the Viet Nam war. Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and a persistent critic of administration policy in the Orient, addressed his demand to Undersecretary of State George W. Bush, a witness before the committee in what was scheduled as an inquiry into problems of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Fulbright said he was only proposing that the administration discuss "the consequences" of the U.S. actions. "I respectfully say to you that you are proposing nothing," Bush retorted. Fulbright explained his introduction of the issue by arguing that the war in Southeast Asia has such a worldwide impact it would be "astute" to discuss NATO without considering Viet Nam. ## New CIA Director Sworn into Office

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard M. Helms was sworn in today as director of the nation's most secret operation — the Central Intelligence Agency — in a ceremony at the White House. ## Storm Delays Lunar Launch

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Heavy rains from a tropical disturbance today forced the space agency to postpone an attempt to launch a Lunar Explorer satellite toward an orbit around the moon to investigate radiation and other potential dangers to astronauts. The launching tentatively was rescheduled for 12:08 p.m. EDT Friday. Wind-driven rains from a tropical disturbance centered in the Gulf of Mexico fell on Cape Kennedy throughout the night. But the launch crew proceeded with the countdown on the Delta booster rocket, hoping for a break in the weather. The weather was acceptable at 11:00 a.m. but the range safety officer declared it "no go" just three minutes before the intended 11:08 a.m. lift-off. The rain would have prevented radars from effectively tracking the rocket during the early moments of flight. The crew had only a three-minute period in which to launch the Lunar Explorer to put it on a precise course to intercept the moon after a 16-hour, 240,000-mile flight.

### State News

#### Government Prepares to Close Books

HARTFORD (AP) — The state spent \$30 million from its General Fund and \$6 million in highway funds during the fiscal year that ends at midnight tonight, Finance Commissioner George J. Conking said today. Conking said the figures were preliminary. The state's books will not be closed on the fiscal year for several weeks, he said. The state's surplus at the end of the biennium next June 30 will probably top \$21 million, Conking said. The estimate is based in part on the fact that tax income for the year just ending exceeded General Fund spending by \$27 million. The surplus for the fiscal year that begins July 1 will be some \$40 million, with anti-cyclical tax revenue figure at \$44 million. Gasoline taxes go directly into the highway fund. The total income this year was \$66 million.

### Still Smoking

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite warnings, including those now printed on packages, Americans continue to smoke those cigarettes. During the fiscal year which ends today, the Department of Agriculture says Americans, including military forces overseas, consumed a record \$34 billion more than last year's record. There were slight declines, the department reported, in consumption of cigars and pipe tobacco during the past 12 months.

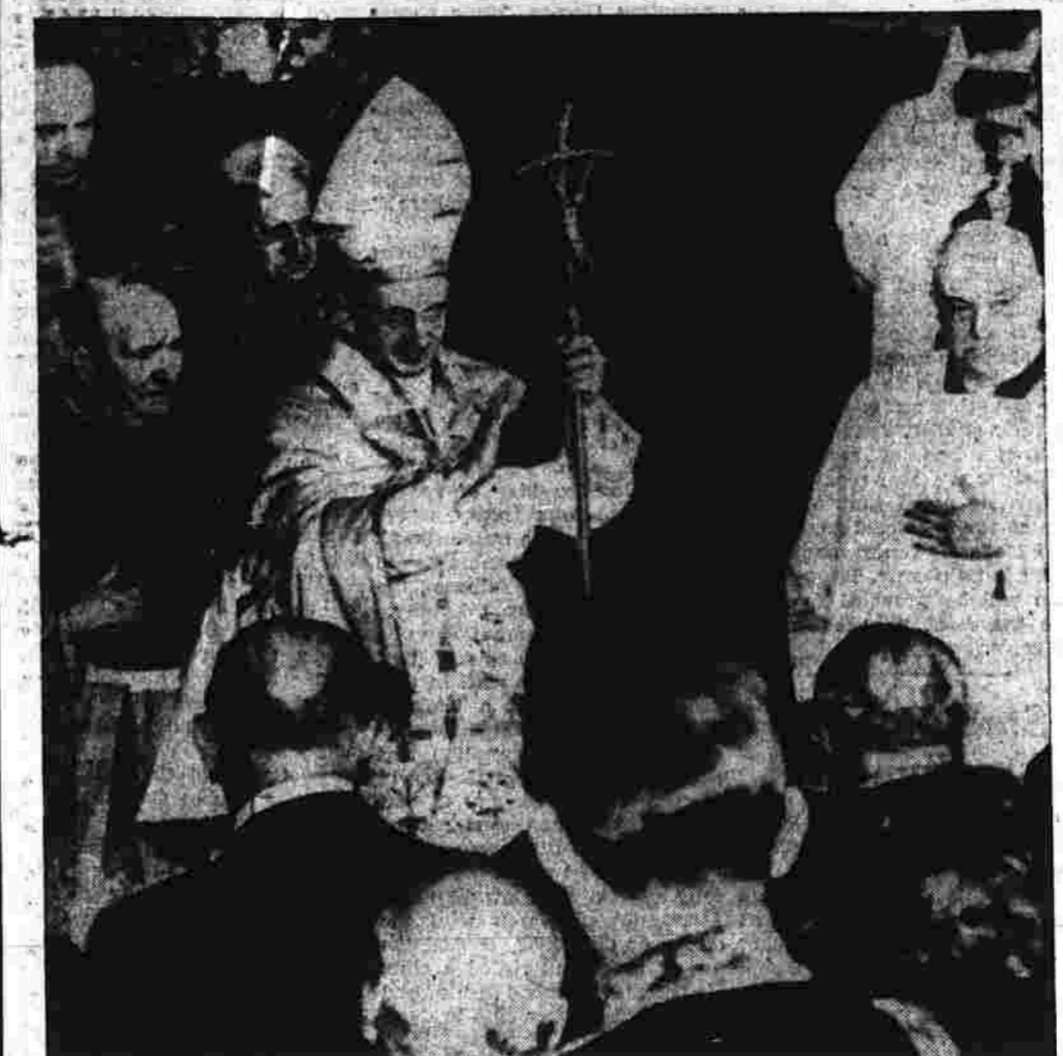

### Pentagon Says

#### Draft Should Take Younger Men First

WASHINGTON (AP) — A long-awaited Defense Department study concluded today that the draft should be redesigned to induct the youngest eligible men first and not men nearest 26 — those who are the most settled in their careers. The change would shift the emphasis to the 19-20 age bracket. "Combat commanders prefer the younger age group," the study said, "and about eight of 10 volunteers are in the group under 20." The study, presented to the House Armed Services Committee by Asst. Secretary of Defense Thomas D. Morris, made these other principal points: —The United States cannot look forward to discontinuing the draft in the next decade unless changing world conditions reduce needs substantially below the force levels required since Korea. —An all-volunteer force cannot be justified because it would cost anywhere between \$4 billion and \$14 billion to increase military pay enough to attract the volunteers needed even for a pro-Viet Nam force of 2.1 million. More than three million are in service now. —The present deferment system is "basically sound." —Morris, in charge of manpower for the Defense Department, testified at the committee hearing on its hearings into the operations of the Selective Service System. —The Pentagon study was ordered by President Johnson two years ago but had not been made public, despite some grounding from Congress. —Morris told the committee the report indicated that volunteer service should continue to be emphasized and civilians should replace military men wherever possible. —In addition, he said, the nation should "perfect" techniques of retraining and physical rehabilitation so as to make military service available to

NEW YORK (AP) — The Hotel Astor, which has stood along Grand Central Station since a maiden aunt for nearly 62 years, calls it quits today. # Belguer to Be Inaugurated Dominicans Trying Again For Economic Stability

MANITO DOMINGUEZ, Dominican Republic (AP) — A frail, middle-aged lawyer, Joaquín Belguer, on Friday became the 70th president of this little political volcano that has had constitutional government for only seven months in the past 36 years.

The inauguration came a month and a half after a 14-month effort by the Organization of American States to restore a measure of political and economic stability to the country.

Actually, it was the second collective attempt by the hemisphere nations to bring democratic rule to the Dominican Republic since April 24, 1965. The first attempt was made in 1964, when Belguer was elected second man in a two-man race, but he was ousted in 1965 by a military coup.

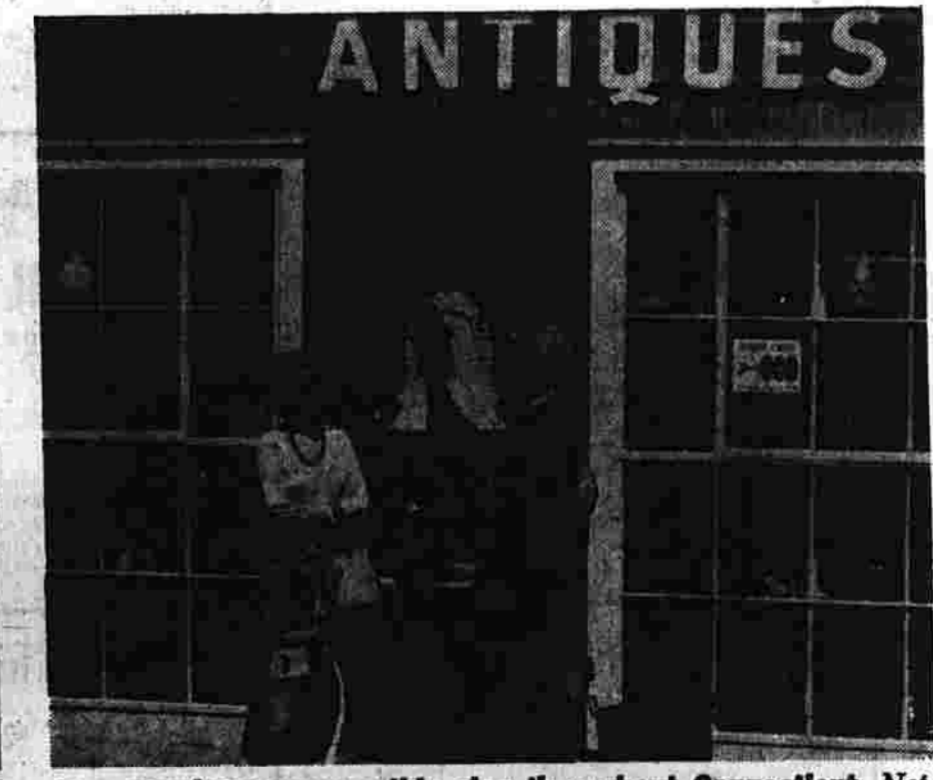

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Once a slumbering giant loath to make changes, the American steel industry now is slugging it out in the market place with all the technical know-how at its command.

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The Fatal Illusion

The worst disease the world today... along with some of the most superlatively evil people in it—suffers from the illusion that there are different kinds and degrees of war.

Court, and the very political parties themselves—off the board. And, doing as it didn't say a word about scheduling free elections and being willing and anxious to turn the country over to the result of such elections.

The military in Argentina are, it might appear from this, tired of lip service to the institutions and procedures of democracy.

They seemed tired of the business of holding elections to put regimes in power or only to lose them to get out of office. They seemed tired of trying to get some civilian to run the country the way they think it should be run.

They tossed the famed Juan Peron out of power in 1955. Two months later, they forced his provisional successor out of office. Finally, in 1958, an election was held and Arturo Frondisi was elected president. In 1962, the military forced him out. Four months later, there was another election, which put Arturo Illia in as president. Now, four years later, the military has tossed him out.

Four years ago, in the last coup, the United States recognized the new regime almost the very same day it had thrown the elected president out of office. This time, because of OAS procedures, and because the Johnson administration was actually using all its possible influence to try to keep President Illia in office, recognition of the new military junta is apparently not going to be so swift. But one of this American's most apparent envies is the way the current military dictatorship in Brazil has been able to choke down undesirable politics in that country, and the dictatorship in Brazil enjoys a cordial United States blessing, and so the eventual outcome seems likely to be acceptance, by Washington, of one more military dictatorship in a world where democracy has to fight continually to retain its slim footholds.

American hemisphere diplomacy has a right to feel pleased, at the moment, because of the impressive demonstration of responsible freedom which has just been held in Guatemala and Dominica, two locations of previous American big power intervention. But part of the gain forward achieved in these two instances has now been balanced by the spectacle of Argentina slipping backward, and without much visible repentance, either.

Under The Silks And Sweeties

We men are indeed the weaker and the more frail than our women. We even protest our long masquerade of supposed superiority against the publication of such devastating testimony as that produced in Johannesburg on the other day, by the South African anthropologist, Dr. Marvyn Jeffrey.

There will be precious little masquerade left, that we can imagine, after full public assimilation of such Jeffrey's scientific testimony as this: Women are 18 times safer than men as drivers of automobiles.

At all ages, they have greater life expectancy. The ratio of brain to body weight is greater in women than in men. Women bear illnesses better than men. They are built for lifting things and carrying weights, while men who try that sort of thing wind up in corsets.

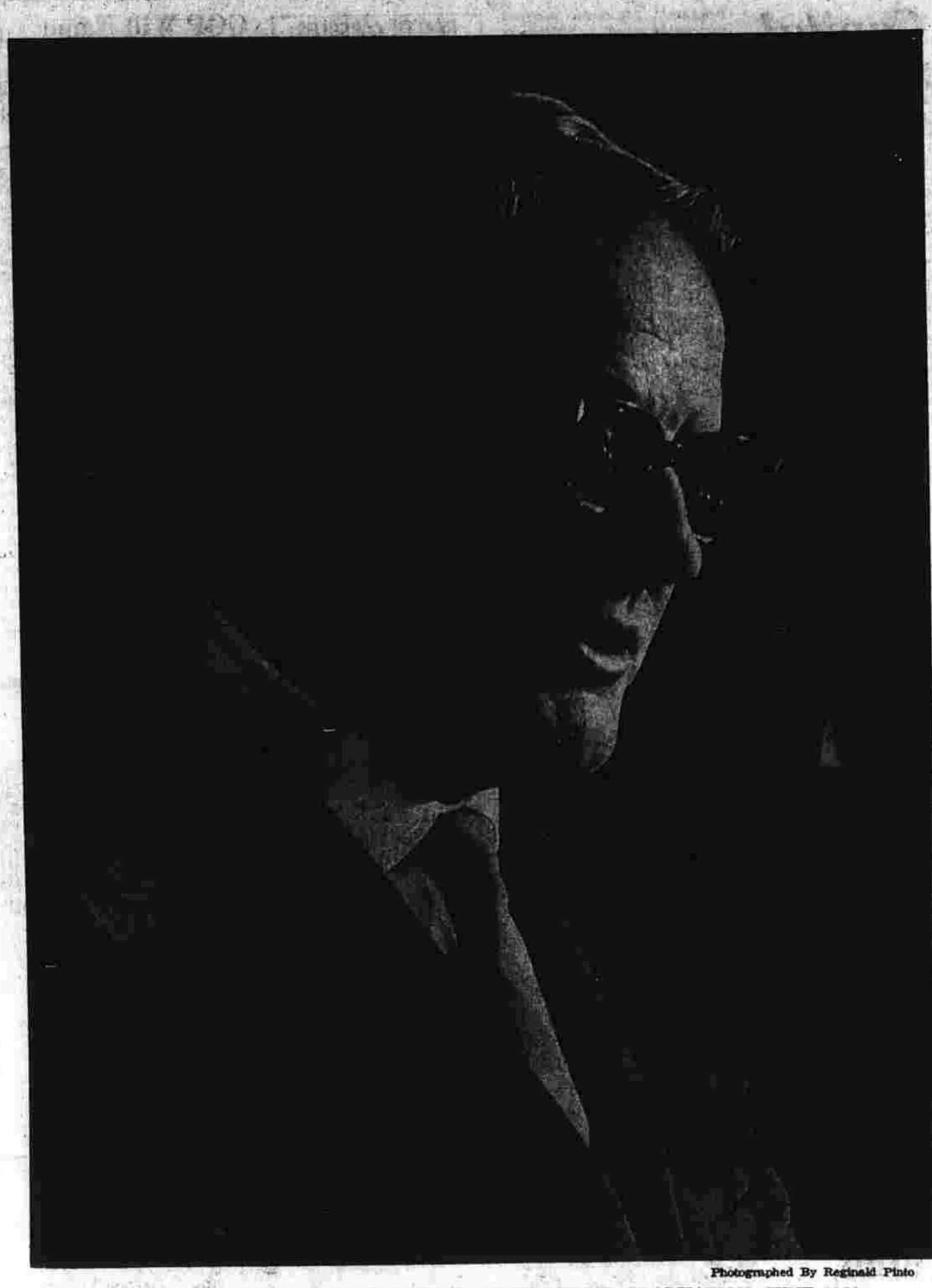
Boys are more prone to psychological disturbances. There are more men in mental hospitals than women, and they go earlier. In fact, according to Dr. Jeffrey, the difference between the two sexes is so sweeping and conclusive that men, the readings, should be retired at 60 while women, hard and tough, ought to be allowed to work until 70.

Most of these things men have always known. But up until now both sexes have managed to keep a tacit agreement that the less said about such matters the better. The women, for their part, usually prefer the coy image of the tender, sensitive flower, whose delicate shape and fragrance comes from steel.

Nothing is written more clearly into the record of history than the inability of men to take the full measure of their situation either as members of a society or as individuals. To see that situation in all its aspects, to comprehend its dynamics, to forecast its future. The great English historian, Herbert Butterfield, has pointed out the irony that invariably marks the relationship between what statesmen—even the best of them—mean to achieve when they take their various actions, and the actual consequences those actions ultimately have.

And the same is true of the individual. Repeatedly, in my own life, occurrences which seemed to me at the time to be personal misfortunes turned out late to have been blessings in disguise. And on those occasions when I have tried to be very clever and far-sighted in my own interests, and to calculate nicely the best approach to the realization of this or that ambition or desire, a wise and beneficent hand has intervened in the current of my affairs, and to make of me the fool that deserved to be made.

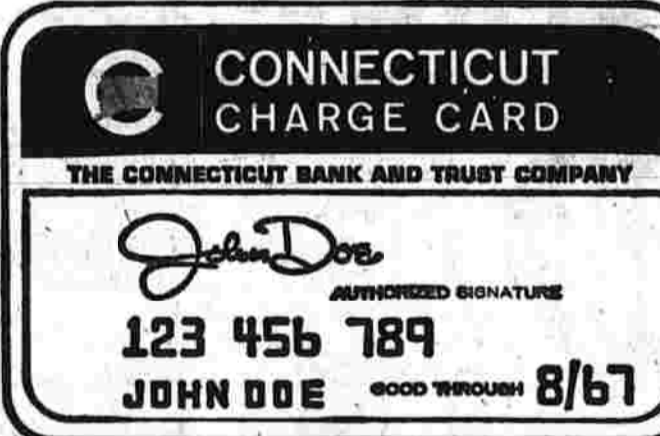

### Bosch Aides In Cabinet Of Balaguer

**SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)**—Two top members of President Juan Bosch's Dominican Revolutionary party have agreed to serve in President-elect Joaquin Balaguer's Cabinet, political sources said today.

The acceptance of Cabinet jobs by the party's secretary-general, Antonio Martinez Francisco, and its finance director, Jose A. Eraz Peña, was regarded as a major victory in Balaguer's efforts to build a government of national unity.

Bosch, after his defeat by Balaguer in the June 1 election, has refused to form a coalition government.

Martinez Francisco is to be minister of industry and Eraz Peña minister of finance. Both men will resign their party posts and are expected to retain their party membership.

Balaguer will be inaugurated Friday, taking over from Provisional President Hector Garcia Godoy.

On his last day in office, Garcia-Godoy ordered the military officers and men who joined the pro-Bosch rebel movement in the April 1965 uprising to return to the regular armed forces. They number about 200.

Some resistance to the dict is expected, but the opposition is not considered strong enough to cause Balaguer any difficulty after he takes over.

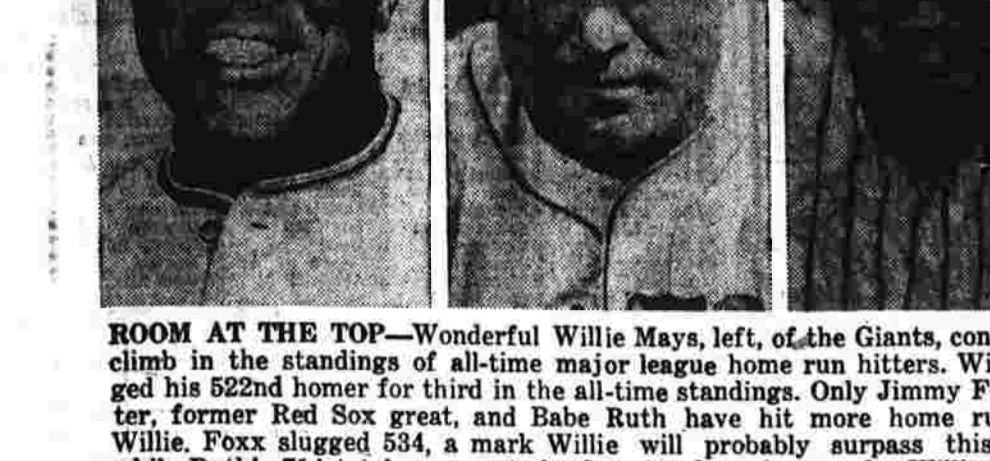

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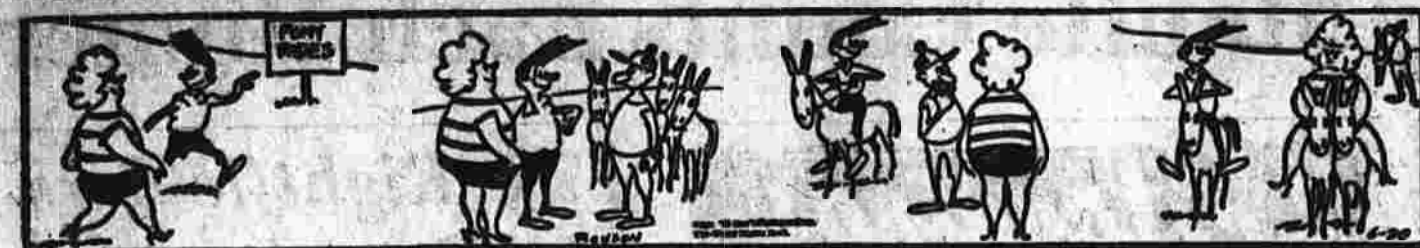
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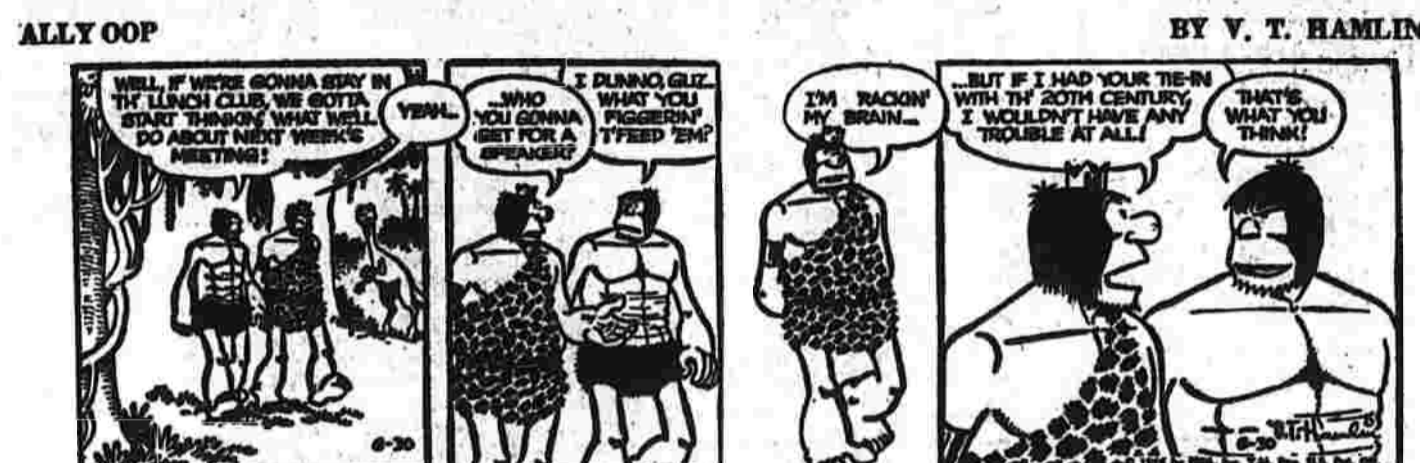
