
HARTFORD (AP) - A connecticut rule which allowed a judge to comment to a jury on a defendant's refusal to testify in his own behalf in a criminal trial was-scrapped by the State Supreme Court today.

The unanimous opinion is a reflection of a U.S. Supreme Court ruling handed down in 1965. The state court's action makes the ruling retroactive to any Connecticut case which has not been exhausted in the ap-

Soviet Bloc **Nations Seen** In Discord

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP A summit meeting of Soviet bloc leaders continued today amid indications of a new clash between the Soviet Union and little Romania over control of the Warsaw Pact's military

Romania's official press gave no progress report on the meeting of the Communist counterpart to the North Atlantic Trea-Organization. The Soviet press made no mention of dissension and treated the meeting

as a reaffirmation of solidarity. seven-nation meeting opened Monday at the former royal palace and continued there today but there apparently was a delay. At 9 a.m. and again at 10, spokesmen said the meeting had resumed. But it was 11 a.m. before the delegations arrived.

There were strong indications that a compromise over control of the member nations' armies had broken down.

The Soviet Union has been trying to obtain tighter control over approximately a million troops committed to the alliance. Romania has insisted that small pact members have a louder voice.

Official spokesmen reported Monday that the first meeting had lasted about 45 minutes. Actually, it dissolved into a three-hour confrontatin between the Russians and the

Romanians. Some 45 minutes after it pened in the old throne room of the palace the first delegations

Drownings **Nearly Twice** 1965 Total

CHICAGO (AP) - The worst Fourth of July traffic fatality toll on record was reached over this

holiday weekend. With last minute figures com ing in slowly today, the toll stood at 559 traffic deaths on the nation's highways to surpass in a three-day period the four-day record set in 1963.

Drownings with 203 were sharply higher than last year's

Boating accidents accounted for 47 deaths. The National Safety Council had estimated that between 510 and 610 persons would die in traffic accidents this holiday

But there was an optimistic word from Howard Pyle. council president, even as the death toll mounted.

Said Pyle: "After years of inadequate official attention to the traffic problem, Congress is in the process of enacting major legislation that will provide funds for a number of vital safe-

"In all our 50-odd years of accident prevention work, we at the council have never been more confident than we are today that the years ahead will see increasingly greater safety on our reads."

The worst single accident of the period took 10 lives Sunday 30 miles west of Topson, Aris, Two cars collided head on and all of the occupants, Avizons, Indians, were killed.

Several other multiple death crashes swelled the court. In Arkansas two separa eldents within five hours Sunday killed III persons. The first accident, a three-car crash near Blytheville, killed six. A head-on crash five hours later near Ben-








One-just one of the mammoth Unitder way in Vietnam-calls for the construction of a new port for Saigon and a new American military city outside Saigon. The new American military city is to be a thing of 30 square miles. The port is to make it possible for American ships to unload at Saigon without having to wait four weeks in the river. The new military city is to give American personnel stationed at Saigon a place to live where they will be safe from street troubles and out of sight of the native population. The new port' is being rushed toward condition for use in the very near future. Progress on the new city is a little slower. But the estimate is that by five years from now at least 10,000 military men and 5.000 dependents will have been moved out of Saigon to the new city. The two projects together are to cost some \$120

which may have caught the reader's attention-like the vastness and semipermanence of the work being done, or the calm, matter of fact way in which It is assumed that the American milltary population around Saigon will still be growing and expanding and needing more room five years from now-such items may be psychological warfare, designed to convince Asia that we really mean business in Vietnam. Or they may, of course, be an indication of thorough American military and logistical planning, in which we are willing to waste money just to be pre-

And there is a third possibility, which will be the possibility which automatically suggests itself to most Americawatchers in the world. It is the possibility that we are staking out for ourselves another permanent military posltion on the mainland of Asia. While this is one of several immense

projects going on in Vietnam, there is more and more news of what is going on in Thailand, our one truly enthusiastic ally in Southeast Asia, and already the tacitly acknowledged base for most of the bombing of Vietnam we do with land-based aircraft. Our military construction project in

Thailand is a \$200 million affair, with one of the chief items being the construction of a giant new air base to supplement several bases we have already constructed and have in use. The value of the new base will be that it is located so that ocean vessels can sail-up and discharge fuel to it directly. We nowhave about 25,000 American troops in Thailand, which represents a rapid increase in recent months, only half that number having been stationed there six months ago.

Technically, we are building these faellities for Thailand, and it is supposed to be an official secret that they will be for us to use.

And, once again, there will be the choices as to what this massive estabishment of the American presence in Thailand really means. And, once again, most America watchers around the world, who are used to the age-old laws of power politics, will expect America to get out of Thailand, and out of Vietnam, as soon as it gets out of Okinawa, for instance, Okinawa being the territory we conquered from Japan in World

The cynics will see no chance that America will ever voluntarily retire from military positions prepared in such massive design and at such tremendous expense. They will say, to the contrary, that these constitute America's footholds on Asia, from which we plan to maintain our containment of Commumist China, and that, in the strategies of power politics, they are so vital to America's national interest no realist should ever expect us to let them go. The world will probably live long enough to find out which interpretation of these great American steps on the islan mainland is accurate.
