Volkswagen Recalls Cars For Checks

NEW YORK (AP)—About 197,000 Volkswagen automobiles were recalled today for inspection of possible defects.

The sedan and Karmann-Ghia were manufactured between Aug. 11, 1965, and mid-February of this year.
