The viewpoint of the tire industry in the current controversy over tire quality and government control was expressed recently by Edwin H. Sonnecken, director of corporate planning for the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co., ene of

to pay for safety and performance cannot be sure he is getting it under the present system of semantic obfuscation. Two things must be done, either volentarily or by government control. There should be a higher minimum standard of safety below which no tire will be built no matter what the rationalization about the market for it or the limited use to which it is expected to be put. Beyond that a labeling system should be devised that can be understood for comparison purpose by anyone who will take the trouble to learn it.
