Young CBS Man Recalls the War

NEW YORK—When John Laurence was made a CBS News correspondent last December, for "the superb quality of his work in the field" in covering the Vietnam war, the announcement said: "A reporter gets no medals for covering a war; his reward for courage and skill is the recognition of his colleagues. Our appointment of John Laurence as a CBS News correspondent is the best recognition that we have to offer."

Laurence went to Vietnam in August 1965 as a radio-television reporter and remained there through May 1966. He went on 42 combat operations, including four air strikes, during his 10 months in Vietnam. He now is assigned to CBS News headquarters in New York City.

"Fewer than 10 of the operations had substantial combat or action," Laurence says. "Most were the daily routine grind of searching for the elusive enemy—what the G.I.'s call long, hot walks in the sun."

"Laurence had the good newsman's luck to run into an exclusive news story soon after his arrival. He and cameraman Jim Wilson went on a secret mission with an advance party of the 1st Cavalry (Airmobile) Division which was to secure An Khe as a base for the full division of some 15,000 men, coming in with almost 450 helicopters.

"Wilson had to shoot the story without showing any revealing characteristics of the terrain, so that the area couldn't be identified by the enemy," Laurence recalls. "We shot the story—scenes of a little Special Forces camp in the process of being massively transformed into an air base—totally without censorship (carefully avoiding an old French fort which would have been a dead giveaway). I ended the piece with the date-

line, 'somewhere in Vietnam.' Laurence found that often he had to be his own censor. Servicemen, who couldn't be expected to know the ground rules for news coverage, would divulge classified information on camera.

"They might mention the number of casualties in a battle—figures that can only be given out in weekly summaries—or they might say something about a future operation," Laurence says. "I'd explain that this wasn't allowed. I'm only 26 years old, but that is older than most of the troops. At times I felt like an old man, especially when I was talking to a 24-year-old captain."

According to Laurence, there was tremendous competition between reporters about what combat missions to cover and debates about which unit was most likely to meet resistance. One operation involved some 12,000 American and South Vietnamese troops, with 25 correspondents covering the battle.

"We had carefully chosen the unit we were to go with," Laurence recalls. "We went out at dawn. The company I was with was immediately engaged with enemy snipers, while no other contact was made by any of the other 12,000 troops."

In the midst of the action, Laurence saw a Medevac helicopter shot down and his colleagues Morley Safer, Jim Wilson and soundman Bob Funk jump out and run for the tree line. Safer, had narrowly escaped being hit by a bullet which entered through the chopper's plexiglass and smashed past his shoulder.

"The behavior of the three men was extraordinary," Laurence recalls. "Safer went right on reporting the battle; Wilson defied enemy guns to get shots during heavy firing and went in with Funk for closeups of sold-

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Descriptive labels seem to be a part of the entertainment business. They include "cool," "hip," "far out," "corny," "square," "far out," "Corny," "square."

"Square" is the word most frequently applied to me. Now, how could I possibly resent that? It's no secret that our music appeals to the more mature audience.

The rating services show that

mothers are our most loyal fans, fathers are the next most numerous group, followed by the smaller children, then the teen-agers.

It is difficult to please everyone, even members of the same family. Teen-agers are in frequent disagreement with their elders, not only in the matter of music. Often the very fact that something is enjoyed by the parents is enough to have it branded "corny" by the youngsters. It works both ways.

Actually we very much want to add more teen-agers to our audience, and are making every effort to accomplish this without alienating our loyal older fans.

On this year's spring tour, more teen-agers came to see us than ever before. Several times I was told, "Mr. Welk, I'm one teen-ager who enjoys your music." I'm sure that our young entertainers, Barbara Boylan and Bobby Burgess, the Lennon Sisters and the Blanders, have contributed to this.

I also believe that recordings have increased our popularity with young people. The jazz album recently made by our orchestra, and featuring Johnny Hodges of Duke Ellington fame, has had good play with deejays all around the country.

We watch the charts for what

the kids like and are including some of the modern beat in our music. We now use two guitars on our show, and as many as three on recordings. The kids like guitars.

Back to that appellation, "Square."

In the reading Aladdin has done several times on our show "The Square," by Charles S. Brooker—the term means loving your country, honoring your father and mother and following the rules of fair play—the principles that made our country great. Under this definition, I'm proud to be called a "square."

There are times when I make an effort to stay "square." In the matter of hair styles, for instance. Since "page-boy" haircuts have been favored by certain rock 'n roll groups, I find I visit my barber about twice as frequently as I used to.

I've probably been kidded as much as any figure in the entertainment business. This sort of thing is part of America. Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and John F. Kennedy were the targets of some very witty satire and accepted it in good spirit.

A few years ago the very talented Stan Freberg put out a popular record, an extremely funny take-off on me and on our orchestra. I enjoyed it.

Mitch Miller Crusades For Mitch Miller

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Mitch Miller is on a crusade to give the American television public the kind of show it wants. And what it wants, according to Miller, is "Sing Along With Mitch."

Interest in the show never died down, he insists, and its present run of reruns on NBC for the summer, is adding stimulus to his bring-us-back campaign.

"We have always snuck in," he said. "Nobody ever wanted the show. Yet there is no better-produced show on television, and none with a better sound. Most people producing musical shows don't care any more, unless we except an occasional special."

"We were budgeted at \$100,000, which is very reasonable for an hour in color, and we could still do the series at that budget. It's easy. Just prepare. Rehearse in a practice studio instead of having panic in the television studio."

The trouble with television, Miller feels, is "that a bunch of businessmen are making decisions about entertainment. Businessmen can make business decisions, but they don't know talent and they are afraid to take a risk if they don't."

"If 'The Man From U.N.C.L.E.' were not NBC's own show it would have been dropped before it caught on. But it caught on, so now what do we have? Nothing but spy shows."

"On top of that, someone has come up with a great new idea for next season, 'The Girl From U.N.C.L.E.' which will delete the effort of 'The Man at the Top' and at worst destroy it."
