Johnson Outlines Policy for Peace

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson has outlined a four-point policy for peace in Asia combining U.S. commitment against aggression there with a continuing effort for improved relations with Red China.

“The peace we seek in Asia is a peace of conciliation,” Johnson said in a speech Tuesday night at the American Alumni Council.

“Communists in Asia will be in force to achieve their goals” and the United States is not retreating from the obligations of freedom and security in Asia, he said.

But lasting peace depends on international trade, the free flow of people and ideas, the full participation of all nations in an international community and a common dedication to human progress and development, he said.

Declaring that “a peaceful mainland China is central to a peaceful Asia,” he said Peking must be discouraged from aggression hostility and encouraged toward peaceful cooperation with others.

“It is U.S. efforts—so far unsuccessful—to open up travel between the United States and mainland China.

Such U.S. initiatives will continue, he said “because we believe that cooperation, not hostility, is really the way of the future” toward a Pacific era in

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Navy Bombers Hit Haiphong Oil Depot

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Navy bombers hit an oil depot in North Viet Nam today.

Three of the Army's armed helicopters, called gunships, were lost in combat operations Tuesday, lowering the number of helicopters downed by enemy ground fire in the war to 182.

Official figures exclude those destroyed on the ground in Viet Cong attacks on airfields and those wrecked by mechanical failures, of the three, a spokesman said.

One crashed near midnight four miles south of Saigon. The crewmen is missing and another, injured, was rescued.

Four Americans were injured in a gunship shot down by ground fire six miles northwest of Saigon.

With the Designer at Home

NEW YORK—Designers have been making at-home clothes with a vengeance for the past years. But what does a designer wear home? The fashion editors gathered here by the American Designer Series to see the fall styles went outside Danton's, the headquarters of the show, to visit the apartments of some of the designers whose clothes they have been seeing.

Since the designers themselves prudently stayed away, no one can say what their own at-home clothes look like.

But Bill Blasz, who has been showing big bat wings on his at-home clothes for Maurice Restier, revealed by his apartment that it's natural for him to like bat wings. He is fond of horned things and things that go back in the night and that growl. A collection of owls stares from one of the bookshelves in his book-filled bedroom. Great antlers curve around a shaving mirror on his bedside table, and there are other horns used as decoration here and there. Passing the desk in a corner of his living room, one is shaken by the sight of a tiger ready to spring; this is a stone tiger from a temple in Korea, about 200 years old.

On his big terrace a leopard (pedigree unknown) crouches beside one of the tables, with long red clothes.

Earth tones obviously appeal to Bill Blasz, who has his home in browns and earthy greens, and he obviously likes to be comfortable because he has low cushion sofa, loveseat and chairs in his living room, with the hole of books piled on low tables. His small dining room is covered in a cotton fabric printed with small figures on a brown background, and "covered" in shades the ceiling as well as the walls. But you can tell he is a bachelor for he has paid absolutely no attention to the kitchen, and when he calls in to deliver dinner, he must have the food sent in.

Among the designers who are reverting their privacy for the evening, only Bill Blasz has a terrace or seems aware of the great outdoors. The others shield their windows with some kind of grills or blind—and one announces that each sleep place has a view of something besides an air shaft.

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Minister Bids To Succeed French Chief

PARIS (AP)—Valery Giscard d'Estaing, President Charles de Gaulle's former finance minister, has made his first open bid to lead France after the 75-year-old president is sworn.

Giscard d'Estaing, leader of the Independent Republican party which still supports de Gaulle, won France's 26,000 mayors Tuesday saying their bid in defining "new rules" for the nation's program.

He said France has accumulated great crises since de Gaulle returned to power in 1958. But the time has come for the nation to become "an organized and stable democracy."

The financial expert said that the Independent Republicans are part of the Gaullist majority in the National Assembly, but "they are above all concerned with the preparation of the future."

To do this, he said, it is necessary "to provide an organized and liberal framework for the institutions of the Fifth Republic, to continue economic and social progress and to protect individual rights and monetary stability, and to contribute to the economic and political organization of Europe."

Giscard d'Estaing, 49, one of France's most prominent political leaders, has for some time been considered an aspirant for the premiership. It was the son of a prominent financier who won a seat in the assembly at the age of 20. He was named finance minister in 1961.

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Tour Spurs Backing for New Jails

HARTFORD (AP)—After taking a look at four of Connecticut's eight state jails, three legislators indicated Tuesday that they've already seen enough to justify a considerable building program.

A job building program of some magnitude is justified on the basis of the four jails we saw today," said Rep. Robert D. King, Hartford.

Referring to the jails in Torrington and Brookfield, Rep. Dominic J. Bucalo, D-New Britain, commented: "They're tearing down better buildings than that in New Britain and Hartford and New Haven."

Rep. John W. Boyd, co-chairman of the Legislative Committee studying the jail problem, said the tour of east-jail-camp, announced earlier, ended the committee in its determination to do something "radical" to correct the "jail problem."

The committee members plan to visit the jails in Hartford, New Haven, Bridgeport and Waterbury.

CHICAGO (AP)—Bands of Negro youths ran rioting through a near Southwest Side neighborhood Tuesday night, breaking windows, looting stores and hurling rocks and home-made bombs.

The disturbance was ignited during the late afternoon when police turned off a fire hydrant in the Negro neighborhood during hot, muggy weather.

It was the second major disturbance in Chicago this summer, following the riotous withdrawal of the airline on company-owned quarters.

U. S. military position is greatly improved but the war's end remains a long way off. Most of the 14 set no time limit, but some said U. S. commanders believe victory possible in one or two years.

Roving Ambassador W. Averell Harriman said Hanoi has refused offers to give U. S. captives protection under the Geneva prisoners of war agreement. He said it still is possible North Viet Nam might not try the captives as war criminals despite her threats. A vigorous protest has been made to Hanoi over the public parading of U. S. prisoners, he said.

Johnson delivered his speech from the White House theater after a three-hour session of his plans to fly to the summit meeting at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va. The speech was carried by radio and television networks.

In what appeared to be part of an administration effort to hold down excessive optimism from reports of recent successes in Viet Nam, the President kept stressing that the war "may last a long time."

He advised Hanoi leaders that "victory for your armies is impossible" but "the minute you realize that a military victory is out of the question, and turn from the use of force, you will find us ready to reciprocate."

Johnson's reference to the U. S. effort in Viet Nam was not a threat, he said. He said the U. S. is fighting on the frontier of freedom so that we here in the United States can enjoy it more fully.

Door Opens Just a Little For Poverty Stricken Kids

RICHMOND, Ky. (AP) — My parents have always told me I'd have to go to college and get an education if I wanted to make anything of myself and get out of that hollow, said 15-year-old Sherry Brashear.

But college for Sherry was a dream in about the same category as inheriting a fortune or becoming a movie star: not impossible, but a million miles away from her home in Mason's Creek, Ky.

Then Sherry was selected to attend a federally-financed program at Eastern Kentucky University here.

The program, called "Project Upward Bound," is one of 200 across the nation this summer. The idea is to show youngsters how to get to college, and convince them that they ought to go.

One hundred and fifty teenagers, 75 girls and 75 boys, are visiting Eastern Kentucky, which got a government grant of \$120,074 to finance the project.

Each youngster is given a \$100 allowance to live on while here. Each is told about grants and loans available to help them. Each is introduced to work study programs that can help pay for their education.

"I'd like to attend college here at Eastern," Sherry said, "after the third week of her eight-week visit. 'I think I'd like to take languages, really like to take languages, drama and maybe some creative writing, but I just don't know. My parents have always told me not to look at the world through rose colored glasses. I have to be realistic. I'll prob-

Opponents See Chance to Trim Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — Opponents claimed today they have a fighting chance to trim the administration's \$3.3 billion multi-year foreign aid authorization bill.

Rep. E. Ross Adair, R-Ind., said attempts would be made to cut dollar amounts in some programs and also shorten the length of installment payments on loans.

"We've got a fighting chance to cut it back to a single year," Adair asserted. He predicted the same chance for success on other amendments.

Supporters braced for a fight over the amendments. A final vote on the bill was expected late today.

"There isn't any part of the world we can ignore," Rep. Thomas E. Morgan, D-Fa., chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, declared as debate opened Tuesday.

The bill would authorize for the first time across-the-board multi-year programs. All sections would be for two years except the Alliance for Progress program for Latin America and economic development loans, which would be for five years.

The bill contains no military funds for Viet Nam, but does include \$500 million for Viet Nam economic assistance. Viet Nam military funds are included in the regular defense appropriations bill.

Ship Sinks, Crew Saved

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) — A leaking Italian freighter trying to reach shore this early today after she had been abandoned by her 32-man crew. The crewmen were rescued unharmed.

The 441-foot, 14,105-ton Paestum, a World War II Liberty ship, went down about 23 miles south southeast of Hatteras, N.C. She was headed for Norfolk, Va.

She sank at 1:10 a.m. about 10 hours after her crew had left in lifeboats. A Coast Guard patrol vessel landed there this morning.

The Paestum's master, Capt. Miro Calochira, 44, of Trieste, said he had given the abandon-ship order after one hold had been flooded and the engine room was taking water.

"There was no panic," he said. "The crew followed my orders very well. Nobody was injured."

Capt. Calochira said the leak first had been discovered July 2, shortly after the ship had sailed from Boca Grande, Fla., for Catania, Italy, with 8,000 tons of granulated phosphate rock.

He said the ship had put in at Charleston, S.C., July 5 for temporary repairs. There, he said, skin divers had examined the ship's bottom and found no leak. But as soon as the vessel left Charleston Saturday, the leak began again.

"It got worse Sunday morning," Calochira said. "We heard a big noise like a 'pop.' The ship was croaking, and water began flooding the hold. The pumps could not keep up with the water. The engine room began taking water. I stopped the engines."

"The ship got lower and lower in the water. We sent a 2 1/2 about 10 minutes to 3 Sunday afternoon. At 3 o'clock, I ordered the ship abandoned. My first thought was to save my 32 men."

Calochira, interviewed here today after his men had arrived at the Little Creek Coast Guard Station, said they had spent about an hour and a half in the lifeboats.

They were picked up by the cutter Hose Petrol, then transferred to the Coast Guard patrol vessel Falcon off Cape Henry, Va.

The Paestum was built at Baltimore in 1944 as the Liberty ship Sampson, later renamed Cape York. She was sold to an Italian company of Neptunia, Seta di Sicilia in 1952.

Postwar Babies Flabby Youths

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The postwar babies have grown into a flabby generation of Americans, padded by the easy life, and scouted by lengthy television vigils.

That's the opinion of athletic trainers George Sullivan of the University of Nebraska and William Newell of Purdue University, at the 3rd annual American Physical Therapy Association meeting here.

"They're too fat," Sullivan said Monday of Americans born in 1945, 1946 and 1947.

"Youngsters use power mowers to mow the lawn, ride bicycles almost as soon as they've learned to walk, and then, of course, graduate to cars and motor bikes," Newell said.

Both men said television was the single largest factor in the bad posture, called "TV slump."

"They get round shoulders and curvature of the spine from sitting in front of television like this," Sullivan said, demonstrating a slumped position with most of the body weight on the back of the neck.

Both men estimated only about five per cent of America's newest generation are in good physical condition.

Cambodia Trip Likely

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield says he believes a Senate delegation will accept an invitation from Cambodia's National Assembly to visit that Far Eastern country this fall.

The Senate was invited to send three members on a fact-finding trip to Cambodia, which has been accused of serving as a refuge for North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops.

Although Cambodia broke relations with the United States after leaving toward Peking's orbit, the U.S. administration reportedly is encouraging the congressional visit.

Risk of All-Out War Nips Viet Nam Effort

By BOB HOUSTON
WASHINGTON (AP) — Why doesn't the United States go for an all-out, total military victory in Viet Nam?

This answer emerges from the words of U.S. statesmen and military leaders:

1. The United States stops short of seeking all-out victory because of the inherent risk of becoming embroiled in all-out war, with Communist China, Russia, or both.

2. President Johnson has laid down the guidelines here: "We seek no wider war," he has declared, and he says that the U.S. build-up in Viet Nam, and the bombing of North Viet Nam, are merely "measured responses" to military pressures from the North.

3. The United States isn't using all its prodigious military might which could be brought to bear in Viet Nam because it does not seek a military victory in the ordinary sense.

As Secretary of State Dean Rusk has put it: "The United States seeks no territorial ag-

beyond that, short of destruction of the North Vietnamese nation, which is not likely to make a significant military difference so long as Hanoi believes that in South Viet Nam the war can be won."

So the United States has held back from bombing the North Vietnamese capital of Hanoi, missing the harbor of Haiphong where military goods and fuel are imported, or using nuclear weapons, which probably would have doubtful military significance.

Whatever military advantages such actions might bring, according to current thinking, are outweighed by the risk of forcing Communist China to the aid of the Hanoi regime, or pulling Russia, which does a small amount of shipping into Haiphong, into the conflict.

The United States tread lightly, anticipating what might happen if military strikes were stepped up beyond the current pattern in North Viet Nam.

"Their spokesmen," Gen. Curtis G. Wheeler, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said recently, "have uttered many words of violence, hostility, and threats about making any move of armed aggression against us. The Chinese government gives very substantial material support to North Viet Nam. But as for engaging in any combat action, they appear, as has been said, ready to fight to the last."

Latest Pentagon figures show that North Viet Nam continues to infiltrate into South Viet Nam at the rate of 4,500 men a month, sometimes more.

Officials estimate there are more than 240,000 Viet Cong spread over the country either in lightly armed, loose bands, or in well-organized, well-equipped units. They possess the advantage of choosing when and where to strike.

To aid South Vietnamese troops, the United States has dispatched more than 200,000 men, not including about 60,000 naval personnel involved in offshore fleet operations.

The basic plan for preventing a Communist takeover in South Viet Nam involves three phases:

—Bringing the enemy offensive to a halt.

—Second, taking the offensive: Finding and destroying the main Viet Cong and North Vietnamese army units and establishing government control over selected areas of South Viet Nam.

—Third, helping South Viet Nam extend government control over its entire country.

In recent weeks, the enemy has played a shifty and deceptive game of avoiding large-scale battles. U.S. officials attribute this to allied military successes earlier in the year. The Communists suffered significant losses of men and material.

Whatever the name of this deadly game — graduated escalation, strategic persuasion or flexible response — U.S. plans have not been altered, these officials say. The buildup will continue, presumably to the 400,000-man level mentioned around the Pentagon.

In the meantime, the inevitable questions will be repeated — why are we there? Why don't we go all-out to win the war?

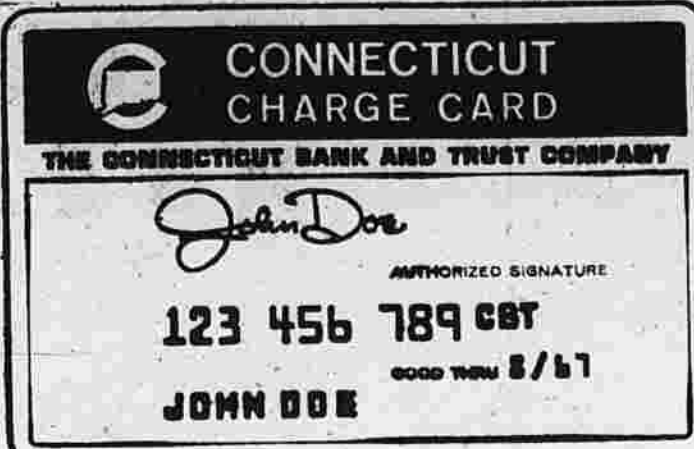
Balloon Launch Slated Monday

ALAMOOGORDO, N.M. (AP) — The launching of the largest gas-filled balloon in history, prevented five times last month by unfavorable weather, has been rescheduled tentatively for next Monday.

The 515-foot-tall balloon which holds 38 million cubic feet of gas is to be launched at Holman Air Force Base. It is a prelude to flights later this summer which will test the Voyager spacecraft for unmanned landings on Mars.

The balloon is to lift a dummy payload simulating the Voyager spacecraft to an altitude of about 130,000 feet (24.6 miles), with the flight ending near Phoenix, Ariz.

BADON (AP)—A U.S. read: French colonizers before the or ask: "How can democracy 1964 independence, giving the develop in Viet Nam?"

Four thousand years ago, the bride of a fairy-tale prince laid 100 eggs and hatched the key concept of democracy, ap- plied only to some. Elections held in this century were in- variably rigged. In modern American democracies are work- ing hard to inoculate them with the concept of western democ- racy. The past struggle for the average Vietnamese as the legend of the 100 eggs is to the American mind.

This is a situation you must keep in mind in surveying the prospect for democracy in Viet Nam.

The conditions and traditions which make for political democ- racy, evolved through centuries in Europe and are absent in Viet Nam. The fact that, on occasion, a desire for democratic processes has been visible in Viet Nam, and that the American example may prove infectious.

Perhaps the conditions of peace and stability, the spirit of de- mocracy eventually could grow in Viet Nam.

The continuing war, lack of faith in the regimes in power, the presence of "krogers" with their long noses and strange habits, seem to discourage some of the most valuable elements in modern Viet Nam have been eliminated. About 4,000 government officials—dis- trict, village and hamlet chief— have been killed by the Commu- nist Viet Cong.

There are still men who are willing to sacrifice a lot so their nation can prosper. They are becoming fewer as the war goes on.

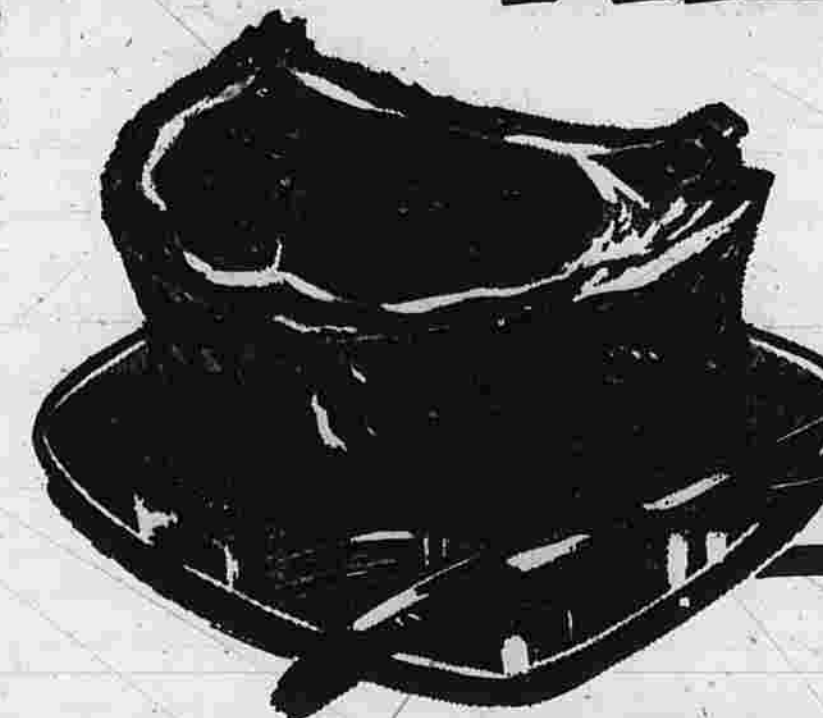

turned home in February 1960 and Shumay, former first secretary, returned in September 1963, the department said.

Whalen, who had been awarded the Legion of Merit and Army Commendation Medal, served in Europe and Japan before being assigned in 1955 to the Army Intelligence branch of the foreign liaison office in Washington.

He later was assigned to the staff of the office of the Joint Chiefs of Staff at the Pentagon where he served until Feb. 3, 1961, when he was retired on a physical disability after more than 30 years of active duty.

The best way to measure the government tax take is in relation to the value of all goods and services produced. Today, Treasury experts say, the total tax take — federal, state and local — amounts to about 28 per cent of gross national product. Many free-world nations have a higher take. In 1963 citizens of West Germany, France and Sweden were taxed at 35 per cent of their gross national product while in the Netherlands the figure was 32 per cent, in the United Kingdom, Italy and Austria 30 per cent, and Luxembourg 31.

One reason, a Treasury source said, is the higher share of gross national product now taken by state and local governments. But the federal tax level is still greater than the other two combined. Of the 28 per cent of gross national product now going to federal taxes, the federal share runs somewhere around 18 per cent, and most of that is raised through personal and corporate income taxes.

It wasn't always that way. A tax study by the Senate Economic Committee noted that customs collections — which now account for only 1 per cent of total federal tax revenues — exceeded all other federal taxes combined during most of the years between the founding of the republic and World War I.

The first income tax was levied during the Civil War and raised \$376 million between 1863 and 1872 when it expired. A second income tax was adopted in 1894 but was declared unconstitutional the following year after raising only \$7,000.

The modern income tax — initiated with the 16th Amendment to the Constitution — began with a maximum individual rate of 7 per cent in 1913, increased to a maximum of 71 per cent by 1918 because of World War I.

By 1917, individual and corporate taxes combined during the war surpassed customs revenues and by 1920 accounted for about two-thirds of total federal tax revenues — about today's percentage, one economist says.

Rugged Cross In New Hymnal

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — For the first time in 35 years, the national Methodist hymnal will be able to pick up a hymnal and turn to "The Old Rugged Cross." The old favorite, dropped from the denomination's hymnal when it was revised in 1935, is returned to the new one — just off the press. Shipment of the new hymnal — the product of six years of planning — began Tuesday from the Methodist Publishing House, where advance orders have reached 2,250,000.

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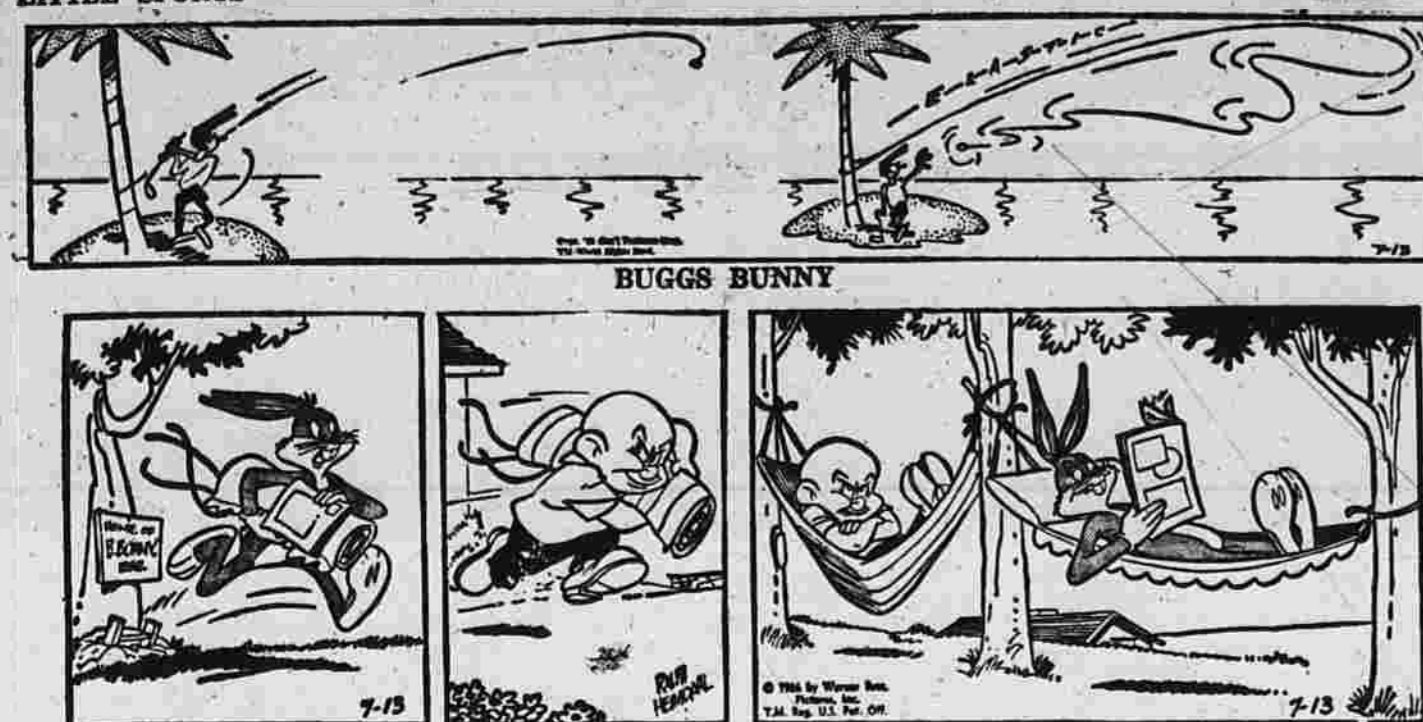

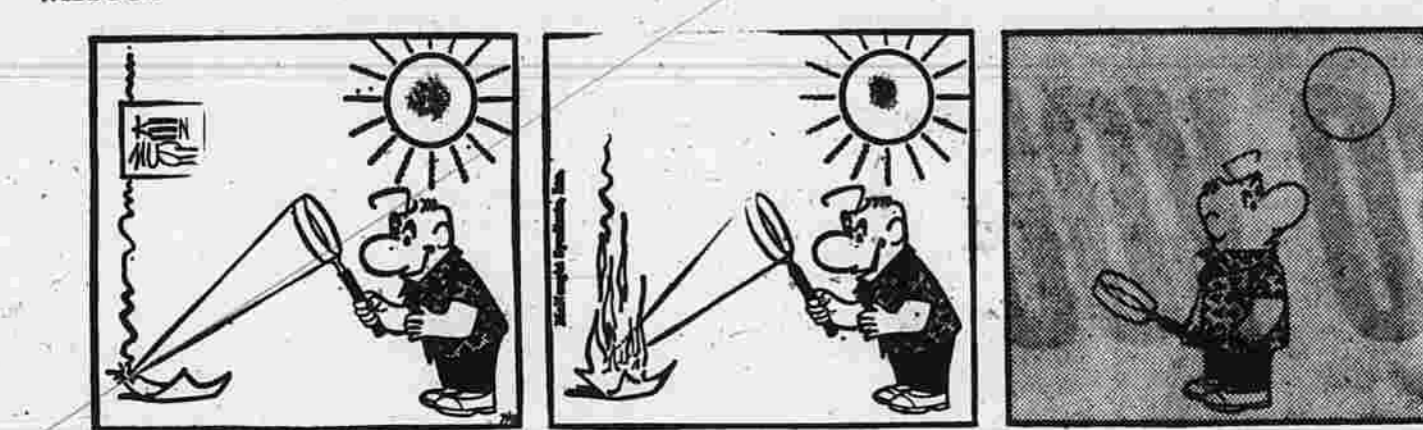

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Eight Nurses Slain, Police Question Man

CHICAGO (AP)—Eight student nurses were strangled and knifed to death in their dormitory early today in what one official called "The Crime of the Century."

One girl escaped to tell the horror.

A man answering the description of the man sought was captured a few hours later in downtown Chicago.

The man, wearing a bloodstained white shirt, reportedly had fled from the Delta Air Lines office where he had tried to buy a ticket to New Orleans.

In what FBI officials termed the worst crime within their recollection, the victims, aged 21 to 23, were killed singly during a 2½-hour slaughter binge.

One young woman was strangled in a downstairs living room of a two-story brick town house at 2319 E. 190th St., used by South Chicago Hospital as a dormitory. The scene is a middle-class neighborhood in the city's Far Southeast section.

The survivor, Miss Carazo Amuroso, 23, an exchange student from the Philippines, said she escaped death by hiding under a bed. Her story to police was semihysterical but she described a lone killer with blond hair, 6 feet 1, and weighing about 170 pounds.

Miss Amuroso said she was one of several girls penned in an upstairs bedroom—one of three bedrooms on the second floor. She said she was upstairs in a house when Miss Gloria Davy, 23, Dyer, Ind., first encountered the killer.

It was first believed that she opened the door to him, but Edward Sheehy, South Chicago police commander, said that it appeared he had entered through a rear kitchen window of the first floor.

Miss Amuroso was quoted as saying she overheard him say that "he only wanted money."

Senate Shuts Door For CIA Debate

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate closed its doors, cleared the speaker galleries and went into an unusual locked-door session today in its struggle over supervision of the Central Intelligence Agency—the nation's spy system.

The closed session began at 12:26 p.m. after some crackling debate.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana decided to clear the galleries after the opening debate so that nothing said in heated exchanges could damage the big national security.

At issue is the Senate Foreign Relations Committee's attempt through a resolution to put three of its members on the Senate's special seven-man CIA panel headed by Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga.

Much of the public debate hinged on the jurisdictional argument between the CIA committee and the Foreign Relations Committee, headed by Sen. J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark.

As the preliminary debate neared its end, Fulbright insisted his committee was entitled to a part in supervising the CIA and asked Russell: "Why do you seek to monopolize?"

Russell broke in: "I'm not trying to muzzle in on the Senate's committee, I'm trying to keep him from muzzling in on my committee."

Mansfield said statements by Fulbright and Russell would be made at a public session before he could move for the closed session.

Mansfield had been in consultation with Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, the Republican leader, on the plan to bring a bill to the floor.

The last such executive session was April 11, 1965, when the Senate discussed funds for an antiballistic missile system, and it was the first since World War II.

Brigitte Wed To Playboy In Nevada

Bardot, 33, and Sachs, 37, were married in a ceremony at the Flamingo Las Vegas.

She said her marriage was an appropriate way to mark July 14, Bastille Day—France's equivalent of the American Independence Day.

Miss Bardot repeated her marriage vows in French, French-accented English before Nevada District Court Judge John Mowbray in the home of a prominent Las Vegas lawyer.

Sachs turned and kissed her. She gave him a big hug.

Mowbray saluted them with French champagne and a toast from his Irish forehead.

"May the road rise to meet you," he said, "and may the wind be ever at your back."

The students, nine in all, are having to pack, too. The building doubled as a dormitory.

"If we can rent a large house or if someone will supply us with a large place, we'll move there," said Scott. "Falling that, we'll move into my house, which is too small even for my own family."

Scott and his wife, Marie, have five children.

An elder of the church, E. L. Crawford, said that because of Scott's participation in the march "we (the elders) felt that his influence as a minister and preacher and teacher of students had been ruined."

Crawford said Scott originally was given until July 12 to move but the deadline was extended to July 28 because Scott said he needed more time to pack 1,100 books and get his office equipment and furniture out.

CL&P Hit In Ignoring PUC Role

HARTFORD (AP)—The State Public Utilities Commission approved today the application of Connecticut Light & Power Co. for high tension wires over the Thames River near Ledyard but criticized the utility for stringing the cable before a PUC hearing on the matter was held.

The PUC said that CL&P's act of constructing the wires across the river prior to a PUC decision was in "complete disregard of the commission's vital conduct in this matter."

In its opinion, this action constituted a most serious disregard of the legislative intent of the agency said.

The PUC further commented: "While the commission is distressed at the applicant's apparent unconcern for the regulatory process, we do not feel that the electrical consumers should be penalized for it."

Referring to its previous decision on a Hartford Electric Light Co. application to string wires overhead between Middletown, Portland and East Hampton, the PUC said there was insufficient data available to the commission to permit an opinion on the reliability of underground construction of power cables. The utility had promised that it would insure as a reliable service as overhead lines.

The commission said it found that the applicant had not provided the necessary data.

Jets Blast MIG21s Over North Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—American jet fighters blasted two MIG21s out of the sky over North Viet Nam with three minutes today after the 17th Parallel frontier where a slower MIG21 was shot down.

All three MIGs were brought down by heat-seeking Sidewinder missiles.

As U.S. Air Force F4C Phantoms were blasting the MIG21s, U.S. B52 bombers pounded an area just south of the 17th Parallel frontier where an estimated 5,000 infiltrating Communist troops were believed to be massing.

The Air Force said the first MIG kill today was scored at 2:10 p.m. in the Red River Valley about 22 miles northwest of Hanoi.

Three minutes later the second MIG was shot down by a Phantom.

The Air Force made no mention of any U.S. losses in the latest encounter with the MIGs.

FBI Bugged Hotel Room

WASHINGTON—The Justice Department says FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, acting on general authority from the attorney general in 1963, directed agents to "bug" a Washington, D.C., hotel room.

Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., was attorney general at the time the agents savored the room of Fred B. Black Jr., a former associate of Bobby Baker. But the department declined to make clear whether Kennedy personally was involved.

Asked later for clarification, a department spokesman indicated that the FBI had acted under authority delegated by one of more of Kennedy's predecessors. The practice in question which existed for a period of years preceded 1961, the spokesman said.

Kennedy, who served as attorney general from Jan. 21, 1961, to Sept. 1, 1964, was not available for comment. An aide said that the senator "has nothing to say beyond what Solicitor General Thurgood Marshall said in his original memorandum filed in the Black case, which was that Atty. Gen. Kennedy had not been aware of the existence or use of these devices."

Kennedy's predecessor was Republican William F. Rogers, who served in the Eisenhower administration from Nov. 6, 1961, to January 1962.

Rogers was not available immediately for comment.

In an unprecedented memorandum May 24, Marshall indicated the information that the FBI had eavesdropped on Black but for reasons of statecraft, he had not disclosed it to Black's then-appearing attorney, Victor L. Butler.

Butler, who is the attorney in the Black case, was convicted in a federal court in New York in 1964 on the tax charges and (See Page Seven)
