The birthplace of so many of our liberties, the mother of Presidents, has headed back toward the mainstream of the national life.

The Sky First As the heat wave passes by, and the air changes from its humidity, the advance of the coothis is sometimes slow. It will be releasing heat long after the air has changed. As a result of this experience, the missile is being used in a more limited way in the air war in Vietnam: regular anti-aircraft fire from the ground remains the most effective hunter of planes. Missiles, when used, are usually carried by other aircraft, and are being equipped with cannon in order to be able to fight an old-fashioned dog fight if the situation requires it.

Eventually, of course, the missile, and the defense against missiles, will both be improved, so it will be more possible to have a satisfactory air war between rival banks of push buttons.

Waiting For Slide In Rating

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—How long should a television series stay on the air?

"Not long enough so they get tired of you," opines Fred MacMurray.

Audiences show no signs of tiring of Fred on "My Three Sons." Nor, CBS will be happy to learn, is Fred wearying of the series—yet. Next season—who knows?

He was gratified that "My Three Sons" managed to bounce back to the top ranks in audience ratings after a switch-over from ABC. He is likely to remain as long as it stays in the upper reaches. But if it starts to slide—

"Maybe Dick Van Dyke was smart," Fred observed. "Quit while you're ahead. Some of these shows just stay too long and wear out their welcome."

Fred MacMurray appears to be the easiest of performers, but his work is harder than it seems. For example he is now playing the title role of a new Disney musical, "The Happiest Millionaire," in which he is required to dance an Irish jig.

"Pulled a muscle the first day," he reported. "I've managed to avoid dancing most of my career. I never did any on Broadway. And I had only one in a picture before: A Swiss alpine dance with Eddie Foy Jr. in some old musical. I was sore for weeks."

"Every time I go on a TV variety show, I say, 'I don't dance.' I managed to escape except on one Dinah Shore show when they had me do the number 'I Won't Dance.'

"My Three Sons" also has its strenuous aspects. Originally Fred did all his scenes in a three-month period, then the rest of the cast filled out the scripts with their own scenes. Now he does his work in two or three sessions of shooting, a few weeks at a time.

"It's better this way," he said. "But still, it can be tough. I do most of my scenes with no one else around. I address a roomful of kids, and there's not a soul there."

Greer Garson, who plays his wife in "The Happiest Millionaire," was passing by and she commented: "That happened to me in 'Blossoms In the Dust.' I was supposed to deliver my most impassioned speech before the City Council, pleading with them to allow the zoning for an orphanage."

A TV Crew Joins a Hunt Deep in Siberia

A two-day hunt expedition in 31-degree below-zero weather while travelling on Mongolian horses 90 miles into forests 3,000 miles deep in the interior of Siberia.

This provided NBC News producer George Vicas and his nine-man camera crew with their most vivid experience dur-

ing the filming of "Siberia: A Day in Irkutsk."

The program, which NBC says is "designed to humanize a people and a strange country," will be telecast Wednesday 9-10 p.m.

From the outskirts of Irkutsk the forests extend for countless miles—in fact, clear to the North Pole—and from them many hunters never return, usu-

ally the victim of bears. But hunt they must because it is their livelihood. The Vicas crew did return after two days with a hefty stag, 24,000 feet of film, and says Vicas, "a freezing sensation the likes of which you can't even imagine."

The party stayed overnight deep in the forest in a one-room hut which is in permanent

use the year round for hunting expeditions, sleeping on the floor in warm blankets and with logs burning. But during the night the logs burned out, and they all nearly froze to death.

This was the worst weather the Vicas party encountered during the 19 days of shooting in Siberia. Usually the weather hovered between 20 and 30 degrees below zero both in Irkutsk and at Bratsk, site of the world's largest hydroelectric installation, along the shores of the 600-mile-long Lake of Baikal, where considerable shooting also was done.

The cold, dry air had no ill effects in the filming, though, since all the camera equipment had been "winterized." All of the film was brought out intact, unprocessed, with the Soviet authorities abiding by their agreement not to interfere with or censor any of the film.

Tarzan on the Art of Swinging

NEW YORK—Ron Ely has become, perhaps, the world's greatest authority on swinging through the trees the hard way.

He stars this fall as the 15th Tarzan and television's first on NBC's "Tarzan" color series which premieres Friday, Sept. 16 from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m.

Ely has no formal training for the long swings he makes on the vines from tree to tree. He just climbed a tree on a location near Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, grabbed a vine and went! (The production company has since moved to Mexico City.)

"All athletic things have a similarity," says Ely. "You learn the swing by associating it with movements in other sports."

A good athlete all his life, he firmly believes he can rise to any athletic skill needed. "I just had to learn quicker," he says.

His first time up in the trees required a long swing into a moving jeep. "I would think twice about it now. Swings are not easy to make look good—they have to be graceful."

And the swings haven't all been free from accident. Recently he suffered a shoulder separation and rib fracture requiring surgery and hospitalization when a vine broke. He was filming a "Tarzan" episode titled "The Prisoner" in the heart of Mexico City's Chapul-

tepec Park. The script has been rewritten to show a "heavy" shooting a rifle at Tarzan and then the fall. He will wear a bandaged shoulder in the remainder of the episode. The color footage of the fall will be left in the final version.

In the first few episodes filmed in Brazil, Ely twisted an ankle, pulled a leg muscle, slipped a disc and sustained multiple scratches and bruises in falls during the swings.

An actor of determination, he says, "I've always done everything myself and I've always wanted to. Until I got hurt badly, or feel a swing or stunt will hurt me seriously enough to hold up production—I'll keep right on swinging through the trees."

In the first episode it was suggested Ely use a professional "flyer" or trapeze specialist. But, Ely feels it wouldn't look right. "It would be too well schooled, a thoroughly professional look," he says. "I feel after five months and hundreds of swings, I can do them as well as, or even better, than a stuntman."

Ely's desire to do heroics goes back to childhood. He feels he's going back to the days of Errol Flynn—"do-it-yourself" school of acting. "I used to watch Douglas Fairbanks on the screen as a boy,"

he says. "I could visualize myself doing his fights. I imagine he did his fights like I do my swings—just do them."

"I can look at a rigging, at the drop to the ground, and I know in advance how it's going to feel by seeing it," he points out. "I take the vine and swing it a couple of times and see where it goes. I know exactly how fast the swing will be and how much it will turn on me."

He feels the hardest part of the swing is to control the turning motion of the body. He has found by experience that by adjusting his weight on his left arm he can correct a turning swing and "fly straight." He also places great confidence in his special effects man, Ira Anderson: "I have so many things to concentrate on—the jump off, the swing itself, the drop and the landing—I depend on Ira to look for trouble spots."

"It's funny how the swings attract people," he adds. "I can see it in their eyes—they'd love to try it. But, when you do it over and over again and your arms are getting tired, your grip is getting weaker, and your blisters are beginning to open on your hand—the thrill is gone. Actually, I hope my swings look easy. If they look hard, we haven't done the job."

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Shortly before Lassie and I were to leave on a three-week location in the spring, a representative of the airline that was to take us to Louisiana on the first leg of the trip called me. She wanted to know how Lassie would like to have her steak cooked for our in-flight meal.

It didn't surprise me a bit. That's typical of the attention Lassie has received over the

years. As for the airlines, they seem to be happy to welcome her aboard. Hotels, often compete with each other for the privilege of housing Lassie. I've even had officers of a suite for Lassie and me on the house — if I'd let them publicize the fact that Lassie was their guest.

I always buy tickets for two seats — one for me and one for Lassie — but she never uses hers. She prefers sleeping on the floor at my feet, in a front seat where there's room out of the aisle.

Lassie and I do a lot of traveling in a year's time — sometimes as much as 100,000 miles. I like to make personal appearances so that Lassie's fans can get a chance to see her in person.

So far we've visited 46 of the 50 states. We've missed Alaska and Hawaii. We've never gone beyond the borders of the United States. Animal quarantine regulations in foreign countries are too strict, so we've always skipped them.

Airlines require that their passenger lists contain the full name, or at least the first and last name, of everyone on every flight. Most dog owners never give their pets more than just a single name, but it didn't take much thought to give Lassie a last name to make her acceptable to the airlines.

On the passenger list she is listed Lassie Weatherwax. Why not?

Once, on a short flight from Los Angeles while Lassie and I were heading for a personal appearance, the plane's captain announced over the loudspeaker that there were two important Hollywood personalities aboard. First he named a well-known film star, and the announcement caused a mild ripple throughout the cabin. Then he noted that Lassie was also on the plane. It seemed to me that everyone in the cabin stood up in excitement trying to find Lassie. Lassie was asleep and never even heard the announcement.

I learned a lesson late last year I'll never forget — nor repeat. I took a tour of Europe during a break in our filming schedule, and for the first time I left Lassie at home. As the days passed I got more and more restless. Then suddenly I realized what my trouble was; I was lonesome for Lassie. I cut my trip short by several weeks and hurried back home.

I'll never leave her again.

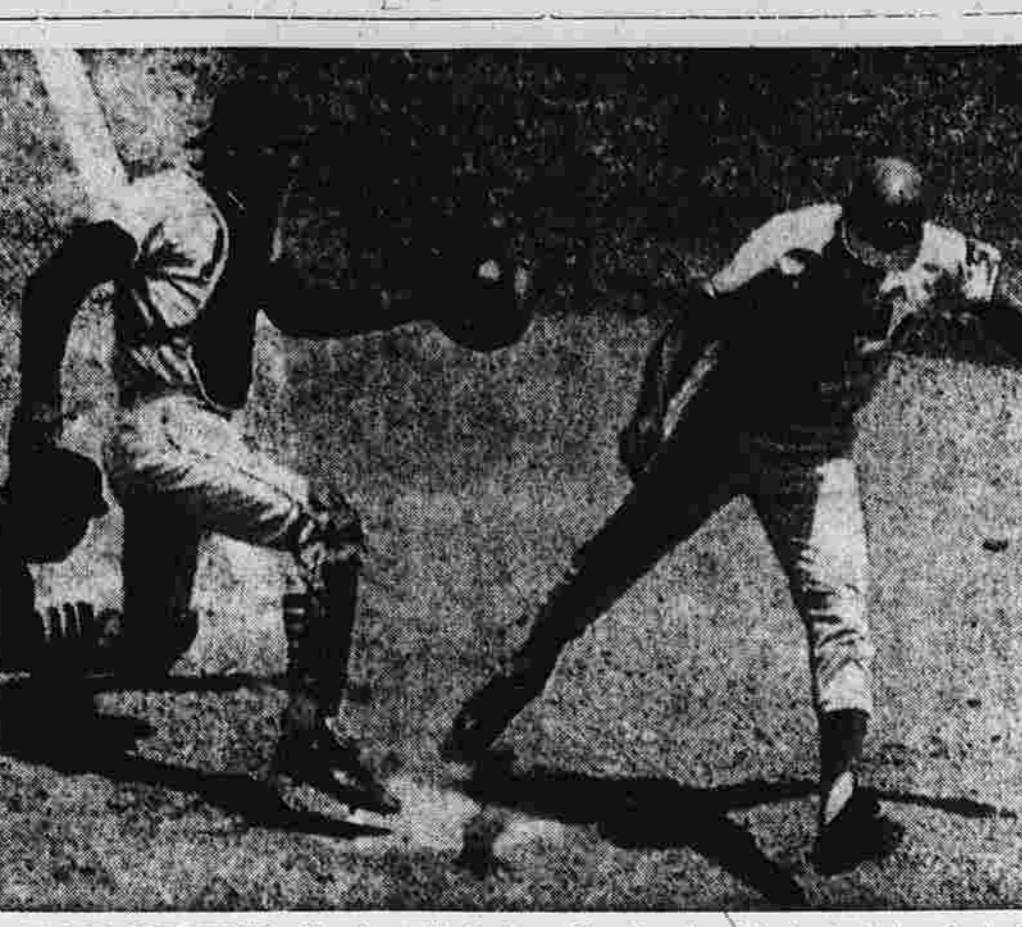
