Strong CD Called for By Odegard

David O. Odegard, GOP candidate for the board of directors and an outspoken advocate of a strong Civil Defense program, has criticized the town CD system and has called on Mayor Francis J. Mahoney to conduct a revaluation of the entire Manchester system.

Odegard states that the recent Saturday morning CD warning tests have revealed that only seven or eight of the town's CD sirens are working, and those not very well, despite the fact that the town has been paying \$1,400 yearly in rental fees for power.

He is also critical of a situation which provides stocked shelter space for only 7 per cent of Manchester's population.

Odegard, while not defending the July 12 action of the GOP minority on the board of directors in voting against acceptance of federal funds for CD use, states that the impetus for an effective CD program must come from the Democratic majority.

The July 12 motion, to accept \$3,650 in matching federal funds, lost because of a 3 to 3 tie vote, with Democrats voting "yes" and Republicans voting "no."

Singer Is Singer on 'I Spy'

NEW YORK (NEA)—Songstress Nancy Wilson is willing to call an episode of "I Spy," which will be shown on NBC early next September her dramatic debut.

She plays a singer in a script in which music is incidental and drama is important. A couple of seasons back she played a part in Burke's Law, but discounts it as an acting vehicle because "I did about three pages, one of which I sang."

Nancy's acting ability has excited those who have seen the "I Spy" episode, and she is hopeful of other roles.

"I would like to do at least two more dramatic parts next fall, along with variety shows. Then the following year shoot for something bigger, like a movie."

She is one of the few people connected with the show who hasn't seen the episode. "I don't know if I want to, because I'm not sure I could stand it. I'm very critical. I seldom listen to my records. I hate it when I go to a party and they are playing my records. I certainly don't want to spend an evening listening to me."

A Capitol recording star, Nancy has made 14 albums since her first one was released in April 1960. She is a top attraction in clubs. Sheldon Leonard, "I Spy's" producer, is a believer in night club performers as actors.

"He feels that club performers have already brought with them a certain amount of confidence. And I believe that if you can sing, you can act. I have never had an acting lesson, but then I have never had a singing lesson either."

"When I was 12 I was taken to a voice teacher who told me I was too young. I was so glad, because by the time I was 15, the age she said I could begin studying, I already had a TV show. So I never went back."

At Home with Secret Agent 99

NEW YORK — Would you believe Barbara Feldon, super-spy Agent 99 on NBC's "Get Smart" (Saturdays, in color) and girl of that well-known commercial in which she urges men of all ages to "sic 'em, tiger," sits at home with her needlepoint and sews?

Whatever you care to believe, Barbara Feldon does indeed sit in her New York apartment and work at her needlepoint. When she tires of that chore, she dons a smock and paints—a new Feldon creative endeavor. She paints flowers, joyous-looking arrays of all types of flora.

Barbara is not quite alone in her residence. First, there is Sasha, Barbara's "fun kid" of a dog who thinks he's Lawrence Welk as his tail incessantly thumps out a middle-age bounce on the hard-wood floors.

And that's not so strange because Barbara's cat, Yang, a temperamental Siamese, thinks she's Maria Callas. From the moment one climbs the six floors to Barbara's lair, the cat raises its voice in song. Actually, it's not so much of a song as a loud screech. Between Sasha's thumping and Yang's screeching, add a bass and there's fodder there for a hit

angle. There's nowhere to turn as Sasha, a rather large dog, seems to be everywhere at once—particularly at your shoes which he loves to nibble.

If life in the Feldon house seems somewhat bizarre to outsiders, it certainly appears to be normal to its occupants. Agent 99, Barbara, comes to New York for its "man-made cultural beauty" and then flees to the coast for "the visual, spiritual God-like beauty." She has, she says, the best of both worlds and she's glad she doesn't have to choose between them.

Her Hollywood existence is, according to Barbara, just that—an existence. She arises before the dawn to be at the studio by six. "And this is beautiful," she says. "When I drive to work, I can still see the remains of the moon and some still-twinkling stars on one side of me and the rising dawn on the other." She doesn't return to her apartment on the Sunset Strip till after eight p.m. Then, she tosses together some vegetables, opens a can of tuna fish and calls it a dinner.

But Barbara's existence on the "Get Smart" set is something else. "Breakfast and lunch are served in our cast

A Dolphin Takes His Cue Fast

Editor's Note — Ricou Browning is the man in charge of the underwater photography which is a speciality of NBC's "Flipper" series. Here he describes the way he directs his dolphin star — and the stand-ins and doubles — during performances.

Miami, Fla. (AP) —To me, Flipper is a person.

He has the instincts, the responses, the behavior pattern, the emotions — notably affection — of a human being.

Flipper's head trainer, Ric O'Feldman, contends that "Anybody who can train a child can train a dolphin," and I heartily agree. It takes as long for me to teach Flipper a trick as it takes me to get the idea across to him as to what I want him to do. And he never forgets. If he learns a trick, and uses it once, he'll do it again on the proper signal six months later.

All the signals used to tell Flipper what to do are done with the hand, underwater and topside. For example, the signal for him to squirt water is to push water in his face. The signal to shake hands is — as with a human being — simply to hold out your hand.

The first step in training is to encourage the dolphin to eat while in captivity. This may take several days, and requires patience.

Once the animal knows his source of food, the trainer gets into the tank with him, during and after the three-a-day meals, and establishes physical contact — such as touching, rubbing, petting — so that the dolphin realizes there is no danger.

First, I have the dolphin retrieve various objects thrown into the water. Then I have him retrieve live fish — a rather difficult effort since he naturally is tempted to eat the fish.

Transporting Flipper from Florida to Nassau for underwater shooting is a logistical problem, with one or more trainers in constant attendance upon the star. From his tank Flipper leaps upon a rubber mattress and is lifted into a large lined — to prevent injury — box containing several inches of water. His body is kept wet constantly during the 3½-hour journey, and special care is taken that no gritty matter will injure his eyes. The trip is made via chartered plane.

Incidentally, a dolphin can remain out of water for as long as 77 hours.

A Leisurely Tour Of a Cook's Tour

NEW YORK—"It's Tuesday This Must Be Belgium," a kaleidoscopic look at 35 Americans on a 21-day, tightly organized, high-speed, low-cost bus tour through 11 European coun-

tries, will be broadcast as an hour-long special Tuesday, 10-11 p.m. on CBS.

With newsmen Robert Trout as guide, the special broadcast follows a typical travel agency tour in which 35 Americans on their first trip abroad are sped in the comfort of an air-conditioned bus through England, the Netherlands, Belgium, the duchy of Luxembourg, West Germany, Switzerland, the principality of Liechtenstein, Austria, Italy, Monaco and France.

As Trout notes, last year more than 250,000 Americans with "a lot of stamina" took such tours. Starting a normal day at 6:30 a.m., the tourists are subjected to a carefully chosen mixture of art galleries, beauty spots, historic sites and buildings, churches and "typical" inns, with occasional time off from the fixed schedule for shopping and getting to know the people of the country.

The travelers are seen visiting many of England's and the Continent's most famous sights, among them the Tower of London and Westminster Abbey, old Amsterdam, the Battle of the Bulge Memorial in Belgium, the castles on the Rhine and Heidelberg, the Austrian Tyrol, St. Mark's Square in Venice, the Uffizi Gallery in Florence, the Trevi Fountain and the Sistine Chapel in Rome, the Riviera at Nice, the Casino at Monte Carlo, and the Paris of the Moulin Rouge and Montmartre.

The broadcast also follows the transition of some members of the group from simple tourists to critics of the countries they are speeding through. One traveler restricts himself to taking pictures of used car lots, dumps, transmission lines and other evidence that Europe is not much different from home.

A highlight is a business transaction between a non-Italian speaking Oklahoman and a Roman tailor, who speaks only Italian, over the purchase of a silk suit.

The broadcast concludes with an assessment of the trip by the tourists on their return to the United States while they are passing through customs at Kennedy International Airport in New York City.
