VENEZUELAN EXPERT DISPLAYS MASTERFULY BY ALFRED SHEINWOLD

In the 1966 world championships, held in Italy three months ago, the Venezuelan team took third place, beating Holland and Thailand. It was the first time a South American team had won a world championship play, and much of the credit was due to the fine card play of Renato Straziota and Mario Ornat.

Opening lead — King of Hearts. One of the best hands of the tournament came in the match between Thailand and Venezuela. Bombro, Nandahivat opened with one heart, which his partner, Benno Glinkiewicz, passed.

Straziota reopened with a double, and Ornat responded with a cue-bid of two hearts to show his game. Ornat's last card raised to game in spades.

Nandahivat then shifted to the four of clubs. Straziota resisted the temptation to finesse, and Straziota's dummy with the king. East's eight of clubs indicated that the club finesse would not work.

Trump Finesse
Straziota led a spade from dummy to win a finesse with the queen, ruffed a heart in dummy and repeated the spade finesse. When West showed out, declarer knew that East had started with the king of spades as well as the presumed queen of clubs. Since East had passed the opening bid he could not have the queen of diamonds as well as the king of spades and the queen of clubs. Declarer therefore cashed the ace of spades, led the jack of diamonds for a finesse and continued with the king and ace of diamonds.

Declarer then led his last trump, throwing the lead to East. Glinkiewicz had to lead from his queen-ten of clubs to dummy's ace-jack, thus giving Straziota a well-earned game contract.

Daily Question
As dealer, you hold: Spades, A-Q-J; Hearts, 10-6-2; Diamonds, A-J-8; Clubs, 7-6-3. What is your best play?
Answer: Pass. You have 12 points in high cards, but nothing at all for distribution. This is not quite enough for an opening bid in most games. Some experts would open with one spade, but most would consider the hand not quite worth an opening bid.

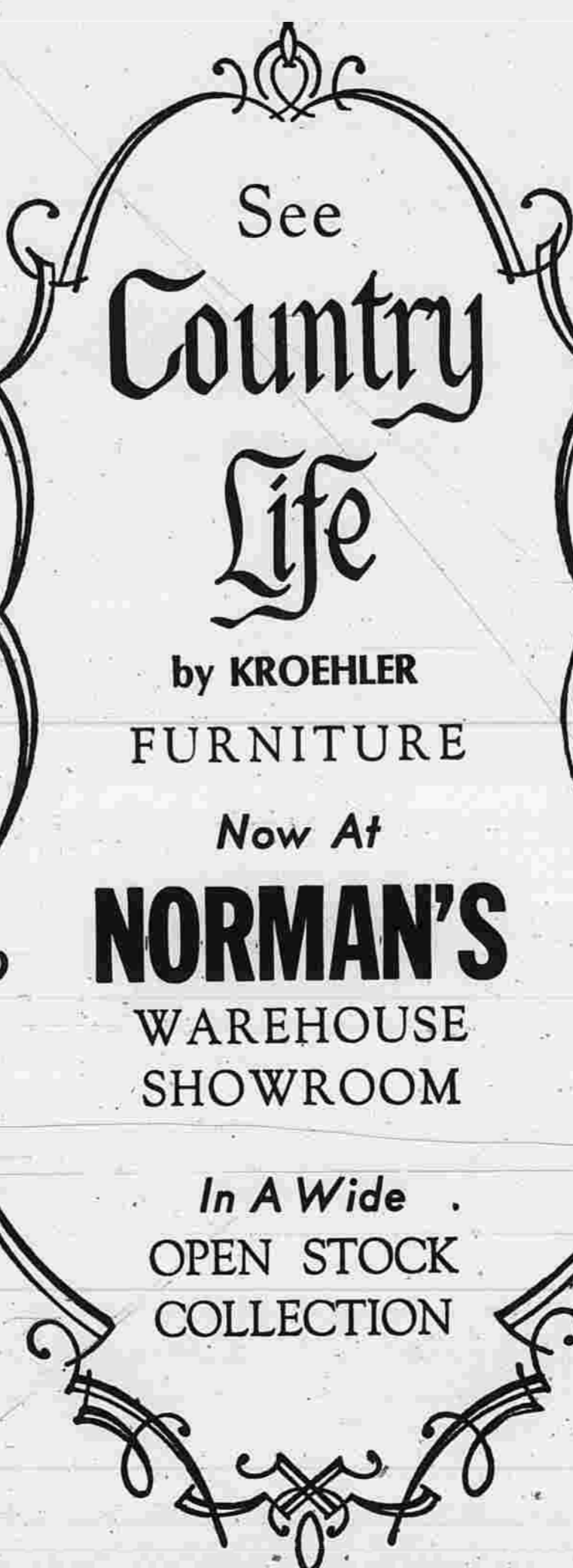

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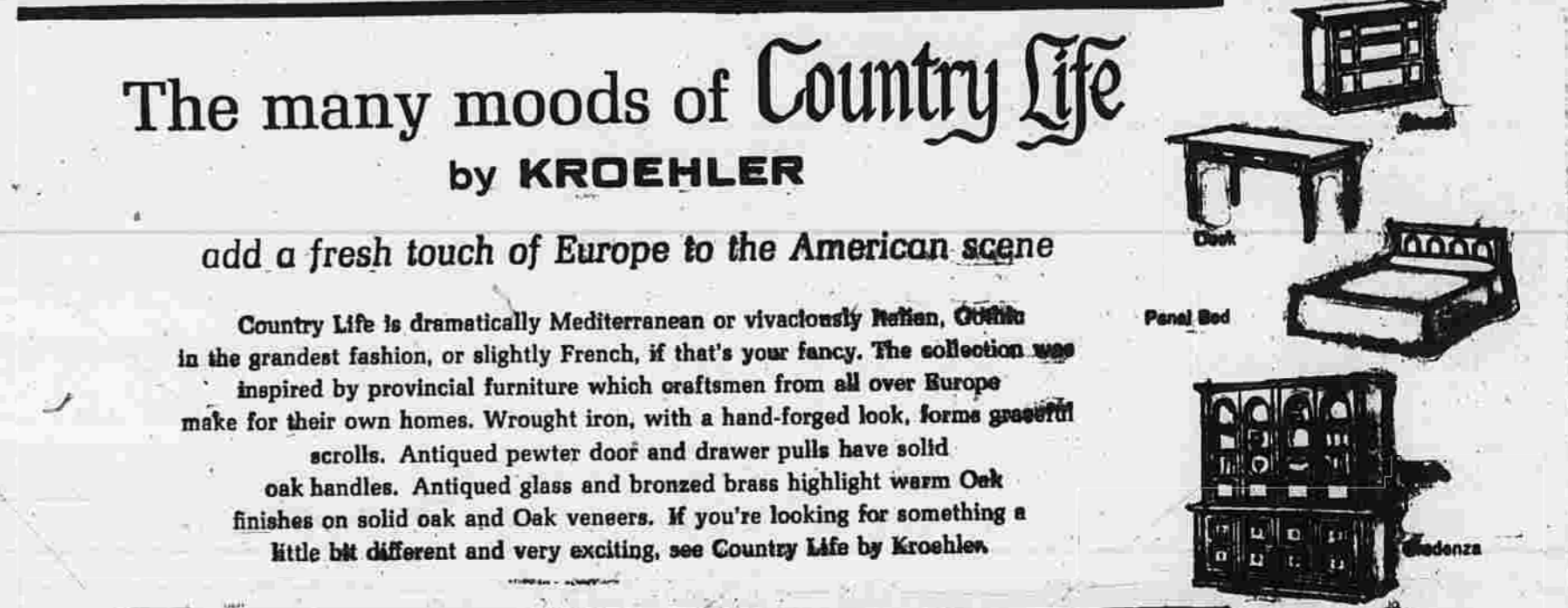

which that system has recently been inaugurating its people.
Such an amnesty program is a rare and courageous thing, coming from a non-conservative government. We in this country, live in hope that we won't need anything similar to deal with what may be the excess of our own economy. The necessity for such hope is intensified by our doubts that we have a Washington regime which would be capable of similar honesty and courage.

Always An Unsolved Portion?

To this day, Hartford County monuments can get themselves into an argument over whether Gerald Chapman really committed the particular murder for which he was executed.
There are some who would still like to be convinced that Gerhard Hauptmann, if he committed the Lindbergh kidnaping, did so without accomplices. We know Alger Hiss was convicted of perjury, but we obviously never heard the whole story and perhaps never will. Likewise, we would give our fascinated attention to anybody who claimed to have any of the gaps filled in.

Every now and then somebody tries to revive the idea that some of the Lincoln's own Cabinet plotted his assassination. The point we are on the verge of believing is this: take almost any famous crime and it is almost impossible to shut off speculation that the thing which has become the official version can be improved upon, or even disproved.

This brings us down to the most dramatic crime of our time, the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, and to the latest and most fully argued revolutionary theory about that crime—that it was participated in and committed by two Catholics, the one the Oswald who died in Dallas, the other an Oswald who posed as the first real Oswald during the events of the crime, and then accompanied the disappearing body.

Such a theory, which leans heavily on the presumption that there had to be two men doing the shooting in order to get off the required number of shots within the time employed, will probably find a delighted audience in Europe, which never has been able to buy the American version of the assassination which was the work of a single crackpot.

And it will obviously find an audience in this country too, an audience comprised mainly, perhaps, of the millions of amateur detectives who like to give their own weight to the chase offered them. And this domestic appetite for a theory to be believed by the number of chases and bits of evidence which the Warren Commission was not able to resolve to its own satisfaction or fit into any coherent explanation of the crime, and which the Commission therefore eventually discarded without ever being able really to explain them.

It is that way with almost every famous crime, and sometimes within the testimony of human beings who have been witnesses to identical events and still never quite agree just how the crime occurred.

When Principle Loses Nobility

"Fair housing" seems such a fine principle. But putting it into law, especially a far-ranging Federal law, poses a big bundle of problems that the least of which is whether the law would do more harm than good.
The good that proposed law would accomplish is easy to describe. Black-men would allow any person, Negro or white, to have a chance at buying a house anywhere. A bigoted homeowner couldn't refuse another man the right to buy the house, assuming the house was for sale and the buyer had the price. But beyond this simple assertion lies a promise, not often acted but sometimes applied. Enforcement of a fair-housing law would broaden residential integration and, somehow, make a big dent in the nation's inbred-segregation ghettos.

Not so, if you listen to at least one of the bill's backers, Sen. Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania.
Senator Scott argues that a man ought to be able to seek housing wherever he wishes. Therefore, he has to be credited with something more than professional competence for having done what he has done. He has shown remarkable courage.

What he has done is issue strict orders on diet and activity for the fat man economy kept on going. It is, kept on trying to follow its natural appetite. It would, within a very short space of time, find its own, almost insatiable, need to keep up with the demands being placed upon it, and it would suffer a devastating financial coronary, followed by a long and delicate recovery.

Having read the platform of the two parties, and having witnessed their rivalry in good works over the past few years, we now feel constrained to say that here we are, waiting to be shown what appreciable or significant difference in principle or policy suggests that we choose, next November, one party over the other.

We are suggesting, may the gods of politics forgive us, that there seems to be no great issue of substance or principle to be determined by the outcome of the forthcoming election.

At the same time, we are determined to be sporting about it. We shall be waiting here, from now until November, waiting to be shown that there is indeed some important specific issue we should decide one way or the other by voting one ticket or the other.

But, although we are waiting, we expect that we and a few hundred thousand other Connecticut voters are making up our minds, next November, on something other than issues and principles.

This is an almost inevitable result, as we see it, of the fact that both parties already name party candidates for every office, and that both parties are likely to try to get on the ballot just about everything for the people.

In fact, we cannot conceive of anything we could possibly vote for or against which it would not joyously grant to us.

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Tolland Zoners Okay Valley View, A 49-Home Subdivision

The planning and zoning commission gave final approval to the 49-home subdivision, known as Valley View, at its meeting last night.

The new subdivision will be built off Rt. 30 in the Mountain Spring Rd. A 600-foot road performance bond was posted by the developer, Onasac Development Corp. The bond was issued by Aetna Casualty and Surety Co. The commission will forward the bond to the board of selectmen.

The subdivision will utilize a community water supply, and the lots are all in excess of the minimum zoning requirements. A recreation area of about five to six acres will be a "usable land" will be provided. A brook flows through the recreation area.

Preliminary approval has been granted the subdivision in March, pending approval of the road bond. The developer had agreed to alter the road grades to comply with the town's eight per cent maximum grade allowance.

Country Hills extension of the approval date for the proposed 24-home Country Hills development was granted as of June 28.

Other business The commission discussed various situations that had been brought up at the recent multi-board meeting which was held to afford all town boards and commissions the opportunity to discuss common problems and lines of communication between the boards.

As a result of the meeting, the planning commission agreed last night to provide the board of selectmen with a copy of all the subdivisions as they are approved by the commission.

The school board stated that the school board is in the process of new subdivisions as they are of "major concern" to the board for future planning and will give the board information which will also be beneficial in school bus scheduling.

The commission also discussed the possibility of assessing registered motor vehicles as was suggested at the combined board meeting which was held last night.
