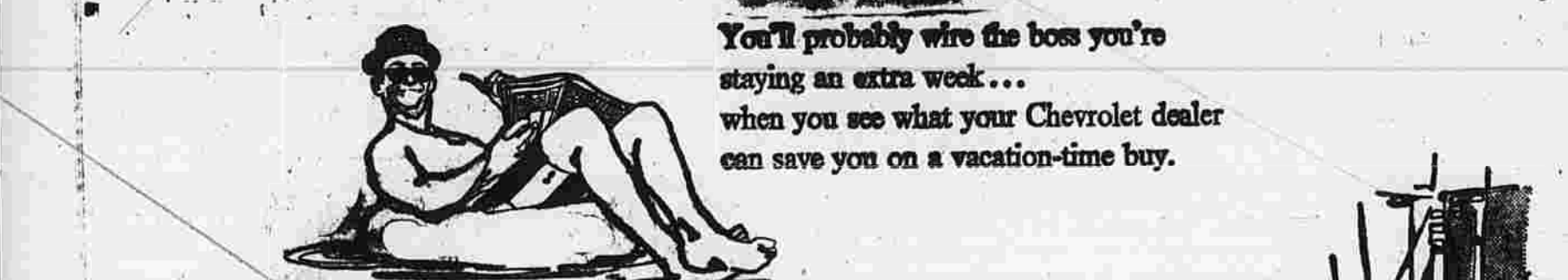

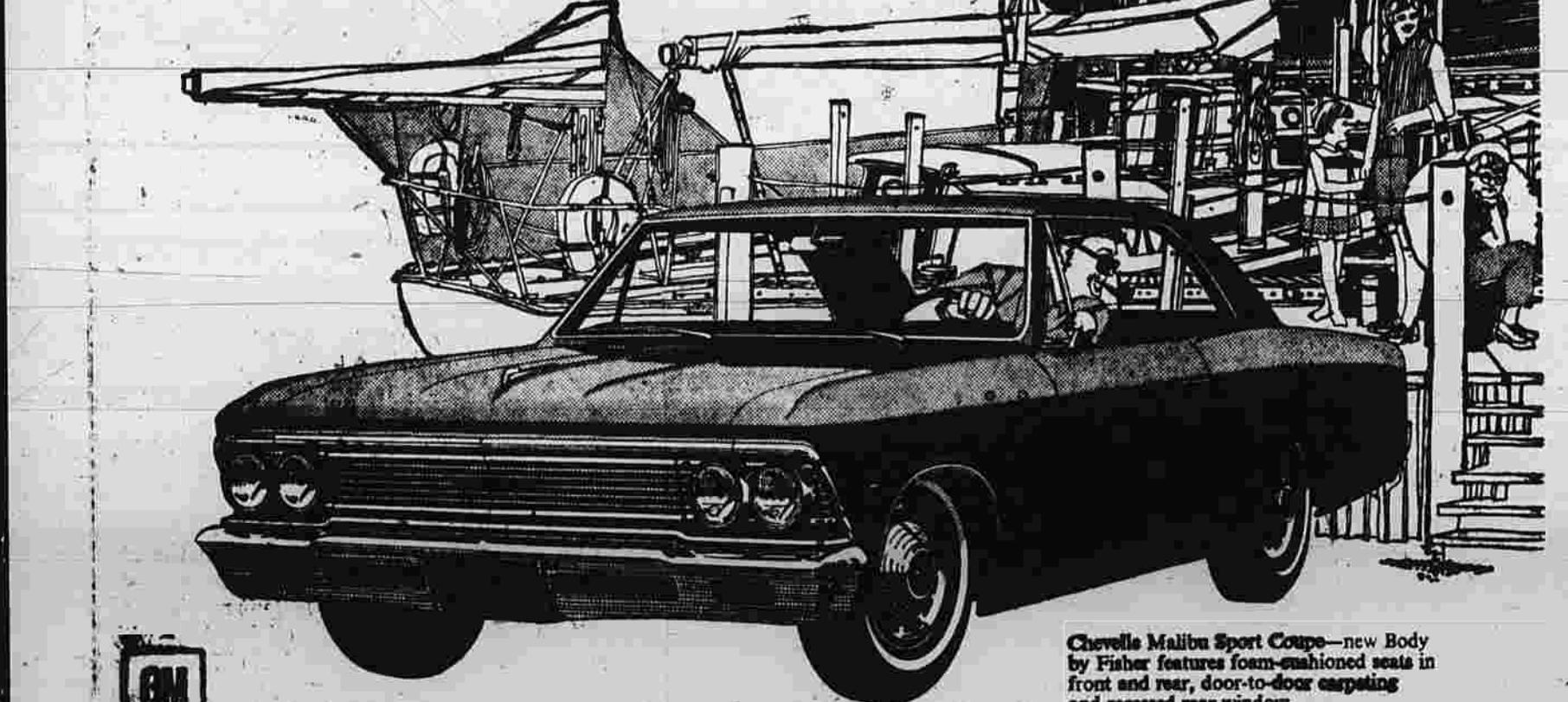

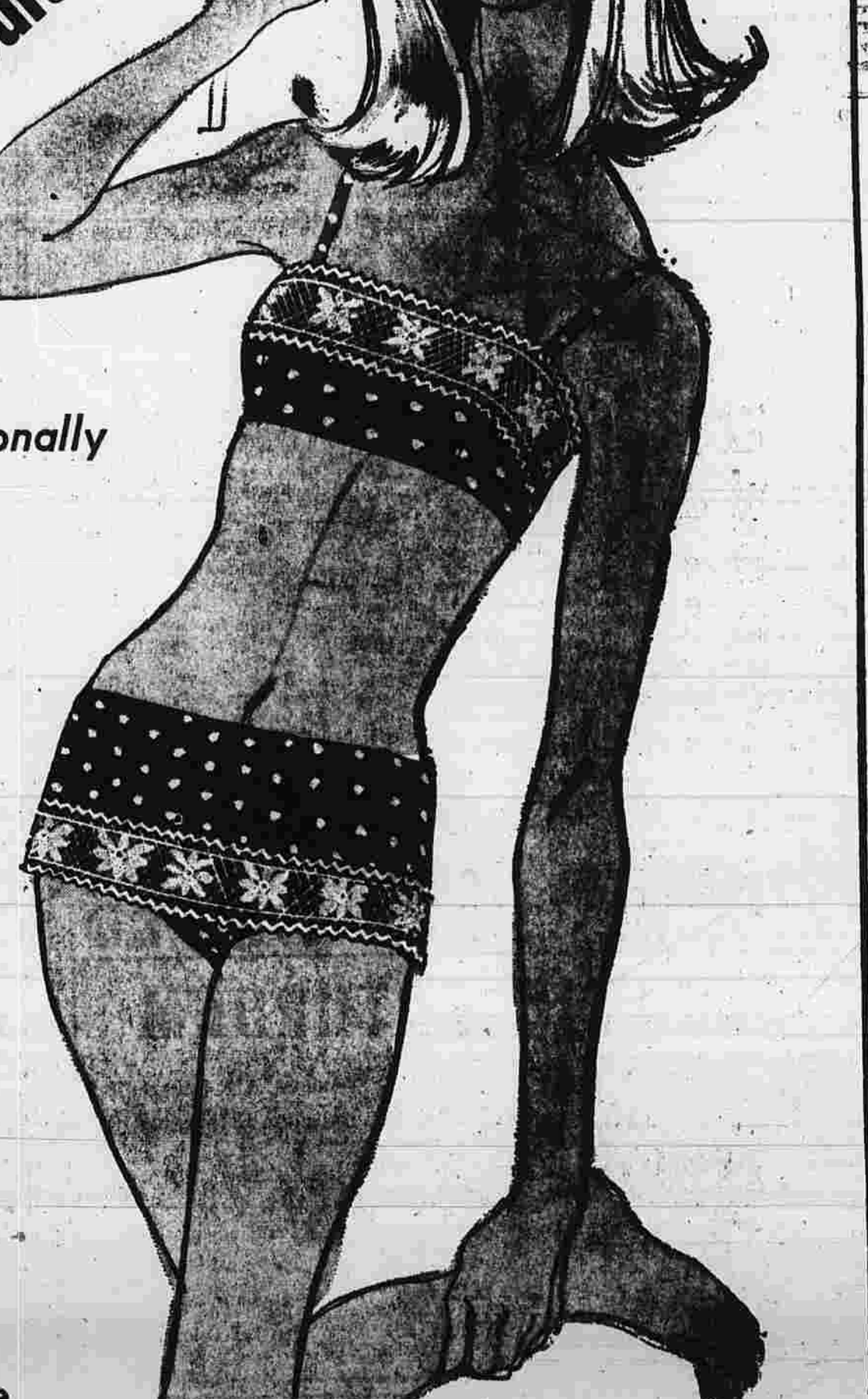

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Alfred Hitchcock Is Terrorized by Ketchup's Sound

By Hal Boyle NEW YORK (AP) — As a lifelong dealer in nightmares, Alfred Hitchcock has a private terror of his own. It isn't the sight of blood. It's the sound of ketchup.

"I want you to take this down carefully because it is of the utmost significance," says the portly master of filmed suspense as he forked the slender lamb chop huddled like a victim on his luncheon plate.

"The reason I hate ketchup is that it is connected with the most unpleasant sound in the world—the sound of a hand smashing the bottom of a ketchup bottle."

"As a result of this sound, some horrible looking red goo slowly emerges from the neck of the bottle and lays itself over the perfectly innocent french fried potatoes, which never harmed anyone in their life."

"I served blue soup, blue french fries, blue chickens and blue ice cream," he recalled fondly. "It was quite a success."

"I've been through a lot of famous titles since then," he remarked. He turned out England's first all-talking picture, in 1929, and became a top figure in Hollywood in 1938 with his first American-made film, "Rebecca."

"The big problem is to avoid clichés," he said. "I enjoy most of all making my films on paper ahead of time. I know them by heart before I ever go to the studio."

"If he ever tries this, it may pose a difficulty. One of his customs is to play a bit role in each of his pictures, and if 'Hitch' gets into that phony booth, himself there won't be any room left for the hero or heroine in the scene."

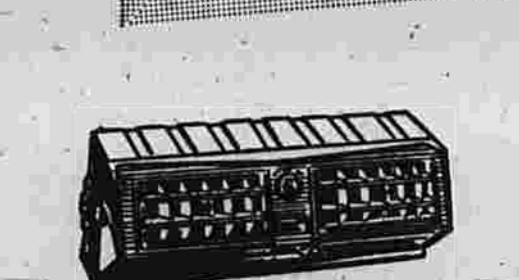

House GOP Leaders Delay Support for Rights Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republican leaders are holding their support of a controversial open housing provision and may end up urging its defeat.

The compromise proposal part of an omnibus civil rights bill now before the House would bar discrimination in the sale of housing but would exempt individual homeowners and agents acting on behalf of individuals.

The House GOP Policy Committee met Tuesday to take a stand on the provision. But it found opinion so divided that it postponed action until it can poll all Republicans in the House.

Roy Wilkins, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, told a news conference Tuesday night that the committee would exempt such a large portion of the available housing that "there would be a grave question as to whether this section on housing would be of much value."

Wilkins acting as chairman of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, a group of civil rights organizations supporting the bill with certain changes, called upon the House to strike the compromise.

The original bill barred discrimination in the sale or rental of all housing. Rep. John J. Rhodes, R-Ariz., chairman of the GOP Policy Committee, said a poll of the members should be completed Thursday.

The Republican coalition that also earned attention for his own put previous civil rights bills through the House without much trouble has failed to develop this year because of opposition to any open housing legislation.

The chance of any wide Republican support was further dimmed Monday in a bruising procedural fight that brought the bill to the House floor.

Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., floor manager for the bill, said anyone who voted against bringing it up Monday was, in fact, voting against the bill.

The Republicans were further upset Tuesday when Ford told the House the Justice Department had been calling some 150,000 Negroes to see how they felt about the bill.

State Certifies Lavitt Petition For Ballot Spot

Atty. Edwin M. Lavitt disclosed today that his primary petition for a place on the ballot as state senator from Tolland County has been certified by the Secretary of State's office.

Lavitt, of Ellington, is opposing Mansfield Atty. Charles S. Tarplin for the senate seat from the 26th district.

Lavitt announced that he will open primary campaign headquarters tomorrow morning on Grove St., Rockville.

Commenting on his choice of Vernon as his headquarters, Lavitt noted that there are more than 2,000 registered Democrats in the town.

Atty. Lavitt tried unsuccessfully to get the senate nomination at a convention held last month. He lost to Tarplin 25 to 16.

Lavitt said that his campaign will be run on a district basis. The county will be divided into five areas. Each area chairman will conduct telephone and door-to-door canvasses, and Lavitt will campaign in all areas.

Lavitt noted that the Democratic State Central Committee primary which will be held Aug. 24. Lavitt charged that his opponent has implied support from the state central committee.

"These releases are, at the very least, inaccurate," Lavitt said. "I know that the committee's official position favors a free and open primary in which all Democrats may vote as they wish."

Lavitt also took issue with a statement by Tarplin that there are no issues in the primary.

"There is one obvious issue in every primary," Lavitt said. "and that is which of the candidates is the better choice."

Sledjeski Leaves Post; Cites Business Duties

Vincent Sledjeski, Republican third selectman, has resigned. The announcement was made by Joseph Saegha, first selectman.

Sledjeski, who has been on the board for about six years, resigned, "because my business has taken me out of town too much and I cannot continue my duties."

He has been a board member and served as second selectman until this past year when he became third selectman, as the Democrats were voted in for the first time in over forty years.

Sledjeski's resignation is expected to take effect by August 15, or as soon as possible. According to Saegha, it is up to the remaining selectmen to fill the vacancy within thirty days. After that date the appointment is turned over to other elected officials of that political party.

If they cannot agree on a choice, a petition from five percent of the party members (the publicans) may call for an election.

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### Immorality, Drink Blamed For Soviet Divorce Rate

MOSCOW (AP) — There is one divorce for every nine marriages in the Soviet Union and the main reason for divorce is immorality, especially hard drinking.

Dr. A. Kharchev, a Leningrad sociologist, added today in an article in the Communist party paper Pravda that perhaps 80 per cent of all teenage law breakers come from broken homes.

In traditional Communist fashion, Kharchev blamed "survivals of bourgeois life" for family difficulties. Soviet theory makes it impossible to admit that discord can exist in a family property Communist society.

But then Kharchev lists a number of causes for family troubles in today's Soviet society.

Young people are not properly prepared for family life, he wrote. The family tries to place the burden of preparation on the school, and schools try to pass it on to public organizations.

As a result of inadequate preparation for marriage, some young people get divorces within weeks or months of marriage.

Many marriages do not last three years, he said. Kharchev did not give details on the figure of one divorce for nine marriages or say what period this covered. The latest available statistics for the United States show one divorce for every four marriages in 1965.

Kharchev said more should be done to establish a Soviet ideal for family life. He complained that Soviet literature sometimes justifies a simplified, light hearted attitude toward marriage.

"The sociologist did not mention that in the first decade after the Bolshevik Revolution official theory was that the family would wither away as an unnecessary bourgeois institution. Divorces were possible by simply registering the fact. But in 1938, the government became worried about juvenile delinquency and began to make divorce very difficult. Kharchev's theory was that the family property Communist society."

It has been abandoned quickly, with reforms last December making divorces easier and cheaper than ever. Family life is difficult because of the shortage of public services such as laundries and nurseries, Kharchev wrote.

Women are burdened with more work at home than men, yet still are expected to hold regular outside jobs. The result is a decreasing birth rate, especially in large cities.

The sociologist noted that Soviet vacation facilities are primitively designed for single people. Families are temporarily disrupted because there are insufficient facilities for couples with children.

### Aviation May Create A World Government

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — An American expert on aviation theorizes that aviation could help bring about world government.

Leslie A. Bryan, director of the Institute of Aviation at the University of Illinois, advances the thought in "Impact of Science on Society," a quarterly of the U.V. Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

"Air transportation," writes Bryan, "tends to hasten the evolution of states into still larger areas unless there are countervailing forces. Certainly the addition of Alaska and Hawaii to the United States reflects this tendency."

"Aviation conceivably could facilitate a single political organization among the peoples of the world. If, through aviation and other forces, there could be developed and maintained the social coherence, along with the necessary political structure, necessary to develop a community-like relationship among nations, progress toward a unified world would be much faster."

"Transportation by air has made personal diplomacy possible in a way that was undreamable 15 years ago."

"Along with the strengthening of national defense by air power has come the use of the airplane to strengthen the bonds of good will among nations. Emergency airlifts have brought relief to areas devastated by floods or earthquakes. Money, medicine and acts of political good will have acquired a new significance through the speed and efficacy of air travel."

Among other effects of aviation, Bryan cites these:

### Both Sides Await Arbiters Decision

A decision is expected shortly from the three arbitrators who yesterday heard five hours of testimony in the salary-control dispute between the board of education and the Manchester Education Association.

The three-man arbitration panel reserved its decision yesterday pending possible further education, besides \$34,610 in non-funded salary increases. The board of directors for the school board, according to former General Manager Richard Martin, "is not taking any action at this time."

The Connecticut Democrat, testifying in connection with his \$2-million libel suit against columnist Drew Pearson and Jack Anderson, said he subsequently became an FBI agent in the Midwest, passed the South Dakota bar examination and served as a lawyer with the Justice Department. Senate Panel Moves Toward Strike Action

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Labor Committee rejected today the proposal that it send airlines strike negotiators back to the bargaining table, and moved on toward action of its own.

Following closely the administration advice offered by Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz, the committee voted to close doors to the bargaining table.

Sen. Lister Hill, D-Ala., said the vote against it was 10 to 7. "It doesn't do anything," Hill said.

With that plan rejected, the committee set another session to consider strike-stopping legislation proposed by Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore.

Morse said the committee had clearly rejected the administration's proposal, but he would not comment on the Democratic's talk of bypassing the committee.

Wilson Comes to U.S., Seeks Pound Backing

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson, flying to Washington today, and high political authorities said he sought friendly American support for the wobbly pound sterling during the next six to nine months.

Wilson was reported confident such a breathing space would provide the time his Labor government needs for its crash program of deflation to pull Britain out of the red.

Wilson will give the President a detailed account of his recent Moscow talks with Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin. The prime minister has claimed privately that these discussions produced a new understanding of the motivations, strains and stresses within the divided Communist world.

Wilson said he was in Moscow during the last moments of his ordeal. Exhausted, hungry, blistered on his feet, the Navy pilot from Pacific, Calif., was hailed aboard the rescue ship after a 26-day trek through the jungle wilderness and flown to a U.S. military hospital in Da Nang.
