### Renewal and College Road Hearings Stated Tuesday

A public hearing on a proposed referendum on the board of directors for the renewal of downtown renewal project and \$1,000,000 appropriation for a proposed ordinance. The second is for an additional \$1,000,000 appropriation to the Manchester College access road sewer department account, to be for Tuesday night's meeting. The meeting will be held at 8 p.m. at the Buckley School on Vernon St.

The college access road, which would take the town about six acres of Globe Hollow land, is tied in with an eminent domain proceeding in Gloucester county, adjacent to town water shed land of the Globe Hollow tract—the latter for expansion purposes.

Tuesday's agenda will include two other public hearings. The first is for a \$1,000 ap-

### Music Festival Final Program Well Received

An "All-American" program brought the Hartford Festival of Music series to a close last evening as Robert Brawley conducted a well-planned program of music generally unfamiliar to his audience. Nevertheless, it was greeted with an enthusiasm not too generally encountered when all the offerings are new works.

Charles Ives' Third Symphony was the opener, heard here for the first time. Written when the Danbury composer was only 20, it is a thoroughly original work, but scarcely music destined to become memorable. I find it the least objectionable of Ives' particular works with which I am familiar, which is certainly music worth listening to.

The performance, however, was fine, almost exemplary. Mr. Brawley showed a definite feeling for the composer, and his penchant for using old-fashioned gospel lyrics as thematic material, if you happen to like Ives, you were probably enchanted, for Leonard Bernstein, who sparked the interest in this composer's work, could not have done any better.

Judith Alexander Harsen, who recently took up residence here, also was heard in an excellent performance of Walter Piston's "Concerto for Piano and Chamber Music." She had thorough technical command of the piece but was hardly illuminating in her interpretation of it. However, there were moments when the ensemble was not exactly precise, but the general effect was much as to elicit great enthusiasm from the audience.

"Quiet City" by Aaron Copland was probably the only number on the program with which the listeners were all familiar. It was beautifully played, with fine sensitivity to mood. The trumpet solos were played with really fine tone and nuance by Roger Murtha. The English horn parts, with which the work begins, were equally well played by Patricia Marsh.

Finally we were treated to Samuel Barber's "Travlers of Kierkegaard," which featured Katherine Hines, soprano, and the Festival Chorus. Mr. Brawley almost invariably effective in his conducting of choral works, and last night was no exception. He must inevitably have been thoroughly well pleased with this performance.

The work itself is effective as a concert offering, but is too overblown and too self-conscious to be considered great religious music. To me it seemed Pharaonic, and, like the Pharaonic Mr. Barber undoubtedly "had his reward."

Mrs. Hines has a voice of too small proportions to be the best objective of this particular work. Moreover one cannot have wished for better than the performance given here, admitting that the composer wrote a vocal line which makes it difficult to understand. It is just because of this that more pains should have been taken to make it more clearly articulated.

It was an interesting program, thoroughly well played and quite in keeping with the intentions of these concerts, which purpose to offer music generally impractical of performance elsewhere in the city during the year. My congratulations go to Mr. Brawley, the chorus, and the orchestra.

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### Caution Urged In Sales Appeal Using Sympathy

The Manchester Chamber of Commerce announced today that it will not stand behind the use of "sympathy appeals" for selling merchandise.

The chamber refers specifically to the practice of some business firms which employ handicapped persons to solicit orders by telephone, using a sympathetic appeal.

The firms, the chamber said, are not to be commended for their efforts to employ handicapped persons, but the chamber said it is concerned that the use of such appeals is being used to circumvent the law.

The chamber recommends that such appeals be used only for the sale of merchandise that is sold only on its own merits.

In some cases, the chamber notes, "rarely profit-making friends, and the product because of the charity or sympathetic appeal, to say whether he owned an auto does not go to the charity or to the individual" who is selling.

### Directors Good As Sootysayers Of Fund Surplus

The board of directors came remarkably close last May when it estimated the town's 1965-66 General Fund surplus. It was within \$2,108 of the actual figure.

A report, issued today by Acting Controller Thomas S. Moore, shows the surplus at \$162,087. The directors had estimated it at \$159,979.

The surplus is included in estimated 1966-67 revenue, to finance the current dog house fund, leaving the unexpected \$2,108 to be put to some new use.

The directors were much further off when they estimated the Special Fire District surplus for 1965-66, however. Their estimate was \$17,334. The actual surplus is \$17,334. The additional \$1,200,000 will replenish the district's reserve fund.

The following other 1965-66 surpluses reported today: Water department, \$79,644; sewer department, \$33,552; dog house fund, \$1,993; and Special Downtown Taxing District, \$7,920.

The board of education wound up the year with a \$502 surplus. Among the largest departmental surpluses reported are those of the recreation department, \$12,111; highway department, \$11,159; cemeteries, \$5,797; street lighting, \$5,142; board of directors, \$4,979; engineering, \$4,858; general manager, \$4,093; and municipal building, \$4,482.

Elmshower suffered a heart attack in 1965 while he was president, and a second attack last year while he was in August, Ga. He underwent surgery for letta in 1966, had a minor stroke in 1967, and spent three weeks in Walter Reed last May for an arthritic condition.

Brig. Gen. Robert L. Schulz, an Elmshower aide who first confirmed Wednesday night that the general was in the hospital, pointed out that he has visited Walter Reed at intervals over the years and that he has been in the hospital several times the hospital stays have been announced, sometimes not.

Like the hospital, Schulz said the visit is for "routine tests," and he did not know how long Elmshower would be in the hospital.

He said the former president was driven to Walter Reed in a private car from his home in Gettysburg, Conn. Gettysburg, Pa., near the Elmshower home.

Word that Elmshower was again in the hospital came to light after an anonymous telephone caller told Washington radio station WWDC that he had seen him there.

School Board Okays Busing Plan Contract

The South Windsor board of education has authorized its chairman, Mrs. Jane Romney, to enter into a contract with the Hartford board of education to participate in the regional de-segregation plan.

The board, which met Tuesday night, accepted the contract with certain amendments as outlined by Town Attorney Donald Wask.

The plan provides for the busing of children from Hartford elementary schools to participating suburban communities. Under the plan, effective for the school years 1966-67, 25 children will be bused to South Windsor.

Roberte Everaols, vice chairman of the board, was the only dissenting member. Certain attachments were made part of the contract. Atty. Wask noted the goals and objectives of the plan, the steps used to implement the program, and the summer workshop sessions are stated, as well as a summary of the Hartford report, information concerning the evaluation team, the percentage of non-white elementary school population in Hartford and the Capital Planning Region, a design for evaluation and the probable assignments in the participating towns.

The contract had been studied, discussed with Mrs. Romney, Dr. Alexander Plante of the State Board of Education, and Atty. Richard Cowgry, an attorney for the Hartford Board of Education.

Seventeen specific conditions were included in the contract: "participating boards of education are in no way committed to the plan or any contractual arrangements beyond the 1967-68 school year."

"Participation in the study by cooperating boards of education in no way indicates interest in a regional or metropolitan education system."

"The right to withdraw from the study is a privilege maintained by each participating board of education. Intention of withdrawal must be presented to the Board of Education of the City of Hartford 30 days prior to the actual date of withdrawal."

"Each participating board of education reserves the right to withdraw from the program at any time, in the judgment of its superintendent of schools, should a severe problem which cannot be solved in any other way."

"The City of Hartford reserves the right to retain in its schools pupils who are not educationally suited for this particular project."

"If white pupils are identified in the random procedure used in the selection process, these pupils will participate in the study."

"Busing of suburban pupils under this plan will not be allowed under any circumstances. "Administrative services to operate the activities of the project must be efficient and paid from project funds."

North Viet Receives Worst Pounding Yet

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—American pilots gave North Viet Nam its heaviest pounding of the war Thursday with more than 375 strike sorties against targets along the 17th Parallel.

The previous high was about 315 sorties flown July 15. The figure in recent weeks has averaged 200 to 300 daily.

The targets hit Thursday included a missile site only four miles from Hai Phong, deep inland what pilots call the "missile envelope" around the vital site near Hai Phong.

The cost was a Navy jet shot down by ground fire, the Reds fired only three of their Soviet-built surface to air missiles, and all missed.

An Air Force F100 Super Sabre jet fighter was shot down on a strafing run 35 miles southwest of Saigon this afternoon.

The classes would upgrade reading, writing and speaking skills of adults with less than eight years of schooling.

According to Cohen, there are more than 8,000 adults in town who would qualify for the course.

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LBJ Assumes Control Of Air Strike Talks

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson took over the air strike negotiations today and told both sides he wants them to reach agreement through collective bargaining.

After a White House meeting with Johnson, 21 men from the management side and 11 from the union side marched across a street in Washington.

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Army Mutiny Is Reported In Nigeria

LONDON (AP)—Official reports reaching the British government today said units of the Nigerian army have mutinied in the Lagos area, with some fighting under way.

A plot to topple the military regime of Gen. Johnson Aguiyi Ironsi was prematurely exposed, according to first dispatches.

This was said to have touched off clashes at the garrison of Abeokuta, where pro-Ironsi troops moved in against the mutineers.

Disturbances, nevertheless, spread widely toward the capital of Lagos, 60 miles southeast, and mutinied accounts later indicated that the airport on the outskirts fell to the disidents.

British Overseas Airways Corp. announced in London it had heard all planes were grounded at Lagos Airport.

First word of the trouble reached the Commonwealth Relations Office from the British high commission in Lagos, few details were available.

Signs of simmering opposition to the regime of 41-year-old Ironsi developed soon after his ousting of junior officers seized power earlier this year, killing, among other leaders, Nigerian Prime Minister Sir Abubakar Tafawa Balewa.

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Dodd Claims Trial Papers Are Tainted

WASHINGTON (AP)—Premier proceedings in a \$2 million libel suit brought by Sen. Thomas J. Dodd against two columnists centered today on documents which Dodd's attorney charged were tainted.

At a deposition hearing, the Connecticut Democrat's attorney, John F. Bennett, reported he objected Thursday to the introduction of documents bearing on dealings between Dodd and Chicago public relations man Julius Klein, a registered agent for West German business interests.

The columnists named in the suit, Drew Pearson and Jack Anderson, have accused Dodd of misconduct in office. Newsman are not allowed at pretrial hearings under a ruling by U.S. District Judge Alexander Holtzoff and Anderson, who was present as a principal in the case, he had given an account of what took place.

Anderson quoted Bennett as saying the documents were tainted, a charge which Anderson denied.

Bennett told newsmen the documents were taken from Dodd's office in an "unlawful search and seizure," and that under the law those who do such things

are liable to criminal prosecution.

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Gun Scare Delays LBJ-Wilson Talks

WASHINGTON (AP)—British Prime Minister Harold Wilson said today that the unidentified U2 reconnaissance plane was apparently seen from Florida when something went wrong with its equipment high over the Florida area.

The U2, with Capt. Robert D. Hawkins, 32, of Alexandria, La., at the controls, was spotted by a group of about 100 people on the ground.

The U2 was believed to have been on automatic pilot, and thus flew a straight line course from Florida to Panama.

It was estimated that the plane's fuel was exhausted by mid-afternoon.

The last radio contact with the pilot was made on a southerly course off the coast of Florida. He was supposed to drop.

When Wilson did arrive at the White House he was met by Johnson and Secretary of State Dean Rusk.

In addition to discussions about the plane, Wilson and Johnson discussed the U2 reconnaissance plane.
