Experiences at the bridge table should teach you two valuable lessons. First, discuss the bidding quickly when you have made a mistake in the play of the cards. Second, be modest when you are praised for acrobatic brilliance.

Opening lead—King of hearts. West paused after taking the king of hearts. Then he shifted to the singleton diamond. Hoping his partner would get the king and give him a ruff.

South won with the king of diamonds and drew two rounds of trumps with the ace and ten. The bid break was disappointing, since it meant that South could not draw trumps and stay in dummy to cash the rest of the diamonds.

Dealer led the ace of diamonds, discarding a club. West ruffed, cashed the ace of hearts and led a third heart to make dummy ruff with the queen of spades.

North still had a trump, and declarer was in the dummy for the last time. He managed to go down two without any trouble at all.

"We were told for three no-trumps," South quickly complained. "I can't blame you, he added graciously. "Only an expert would bid it with your hand."

North was too busy defending his bidding to think of a heart, rather than a club, on the ace of diamonds. Then he can ruff the third heart in his own hand and lead a trump to dummy's queen. That draws trumps, and

It looked like election eve on Downtown Main St. last night and E. Clayton Gengras, GOP candidate for governor and the cause of it all, obviously enjoyed every minute of it.

Gengras arrived in Manchester at 8 p.m. and was met by a throng of supporters. He walked down Main St. and entered stores and shook hands with everyone he met, tapped his feet to the music of a "reviving" group, rode the bus to the Shopping Parkade to greet more people, smoked innumerable cigarettes.

Used as a touring office, the bus includes a coffee bar and was that of Mayor Joseph P. Mahoney, a Democrat. The two ran into each other on Main St. near Oak St.

Gengras was accompanied by his personal staff and some trainees for his town chairman Francis Dalton, Sen. Atty. John L. Bonee, candidate for U.S. Congress, George J. LaBonne Jr., candidate for the State Senate, elected town officials and candidates.

It was while on his tour that Gengras asked an aide to put in a call to "The Frantic Four" to rush out from Hartford and play for the crowd assembled in front of the 606 Main St. American Center. The call was placed by radio-telephone from the mobile headquarters.

The mobile headquarters, a converted Connecticut Co. bus, drew much interest, as it, indeed, a thing of beauty. The number 1968, the year of Gengras' birth, two-thirds of it is equipped with facings and tables between and ashtrays affixed. The rear third is a lounge, with soft arm chairs

Rainfall Slight, But Has Benefits

Wittkofake said that Manchester, to date, has experienced 3.19 inches of rain in July. The monthly average is 4.09 inches. The deficit in rainfall so far this year, he said, is 7.94 inches.

Tolland Town Okays Pond Purchase, To Be 'Lily Crandall Park'

The 125 residents attending last night's town meeting agreed in an overwhelming majority to purchase the Crandall property for \$85,000 plus interest.

The authorization of funds for the purchase was approved; as was an item calling for the transfer of \$5,000 from the high school building committee's contingency fund to defray the costs of preparing working drawings of the arts and sciences wing of the new high school.

Unanimous approval was given to the motion to provide Blue Cross coverage and one week's paid vacation to all full-time town employees who have been employed by the town for at least one year.

The proposal was made by selectman Stuart Danforth at the conclusion of the meeting. He cited Miss Crandall's "27 years of service to the town, adding that many times the trials and tribulations which have caused her to leave town to close the swimming area, we all know so well."

Members of the board of recreation later informally agreed to work on the suggestion. The board of recreation presented a progress report at the outset of the meeting.

They recommended that another town meeting be called to give townpeople the opportunity to vote whether they wish to proceed with application for federal and state open space grants to be used in the purchase of the property at this time, does not jeopardize the town's prospect of receiving open space grants.

The state letter of consent was received on May 27. Following this William Holley, chairman, and First Selectman Carmelo Zanghi hand carried the federal applications to the representative in New York City.

New England Share of GNP Seen Dropping

New England's total output of goods and services appears to make up a declining share of the nation's Gross National Product, according to an analysis just completed by the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston.

In a report published in the bank's monthly Business Review, the six states' "Gross Regional Product" amounted to an estimated \$41.6 billion in 1964—some 4.8 per cent of the \$628.7 billion Gross National Product that year.

The bank's study indicated New England's average annual growth in real output—that is, gross product adjusted for changes in the price level—has been at a rate of about 2.8 per cent, compared to a 3.5 annual growth rate for the Gross National Product.

Two sectors of the region's economy registered declines in total output over the 34-year study period: Farming was down 10 per cent; railroad operations, 15 per cent.

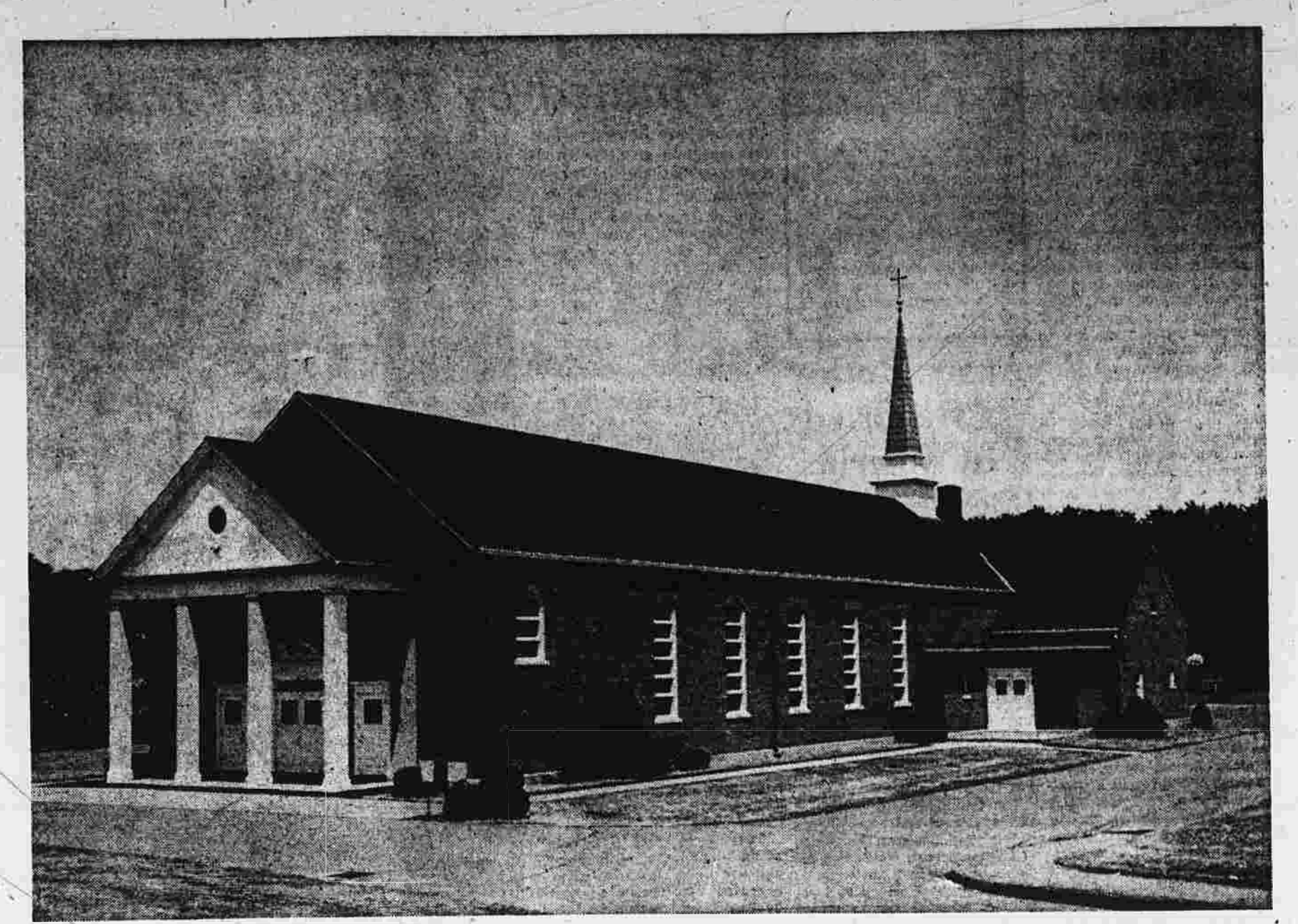

Lengthening Air Strike Cuts Deep into Economy

NEW YORK (AP) — The 21-day-old airline strike is making a deepening cut into the economy, bringing daily losses in the millions to tourism, industry and many small businesses.

An Associated Press survey of San Francisco's Downtown Association, said a survey he conducted showed a daily loss of about \$1 million.

In Los Angeles, where the Chamber of Commerce estimates the loss per day at \$617,000, flower growers were said to be hardest hit, with half their normal market falling away.

The owner of a florist shop in Philadelphia, Pa., said flowers that usually arrived from the West Coast in 19 hours now were getting to him in five days.

Philadelphia business sources pegged their losses at about \$6 million per week while the Association of Commerce and Industry in Chicago said the strike is costing that city about \$600,000 a day.

Suppliers of food and fuel to the five struck lines were reported losing \$1 million a day and a spokesman for the lines — Eastern, Trans World, United Northwest and National — said their total daily revenue loss was \$1 million.

The cost of the walkout so far to striking machinist union workers and laid off employees has been set at \$80 million. Union members are receiving \$25 weekly benefit checks and furloughed workers can collect unemployment insurance.

Talks toward ending the strike resumed in Washington today while a Senate committee studies proposed legislation to limit the walkout.

With the big losers, are many small businesses. In Minneapolis an importer of Hawaiian orchids was forced to close down. A Wilmington, Del., supplier of mice to laboratories doubled his normal operating costs to charter a World War II bomber to ship a load of 7,000 mice.

At Boston's Logan Airport, newsstands and shoe shine parlors have closed. California airport barbers, travel agents and florists have been so hard hit that the State Utility Commission has ordered a study of conditions.

In Miami, however, the whole community was reported feeling the effects of an estimated \$40 million loss.

Winston Wynn, president of the Chamber of Commerce, said as the base of our economy is eaten away, the whole community suffers. The shock will be felt for many months to come."

Wynn gave these figures on losses: Tourist expenditures \$28 million; Airline salaries, \$6.6 million; Airline expenditures for services and supplies, \$5.4 million.

Jobless Claims Jump Sharply

Unemployment compensation claims filed in Manchester last week rose by 83 (or 23 per cent) to a total of 42.

The rise was attributed to seasonal factory vacation shutdown claims almost entirely from commuters to Hartford.

Statewide claims rose by 8.3 per cent to 40 per cent. In total 24,615. Claims filed throughout the state during the corresponding period last year totaled 30,624.

Waterbury, for the first time in years, led the state in total claims, with 3,902, followed by Bridgeport with 3,002, Hartford with 2,863, and New Haven with 2,570.

Waterbury showed a 147 per cent increase last week, but Bristol topped that with a 286 per cent increase.

Other high increases were Danbury, 182 per cent; Albany, 115 per cent; New Britain, 108 per cent; and Meriden, 85 per cent.

Only Torrington, down 42 per cent, and Willimantic, down 33 per cent, reported decreases.

Manchester retained its 17th ranking among the state's 20 offices for number of claims.

CIA Head Apologizes For Fulbright Letter

WASHINGTON (AP) — The paper's policy of "printing the news impartially, supporting what he believes to be wrong without regard to party politics" was the editorial concern of the Senate's action addressing an effort by the Foreign Relations Committee to gain a role in Senate supervision of the CIA.

"Sen. J. W. Fulbright has been given his companionship by the Senate," the editorial began.

The agency's activities now are overseen by a special Senate committee composed of members of the Armed Services and Appropriations Committees.

Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, D-Minn., who led the effort to give members of Fulbright's committee spots on the CIA watchdog panel, brought the letter to the Senate's attention. He said it was "entirely out of order" and said Helms "owes an apology to every member of the Senate."

Fulbright's father, a director of the anti-Communist League, was nominated by President Johnson on June 15 to succeed William F. Raborn as director of the CIA.

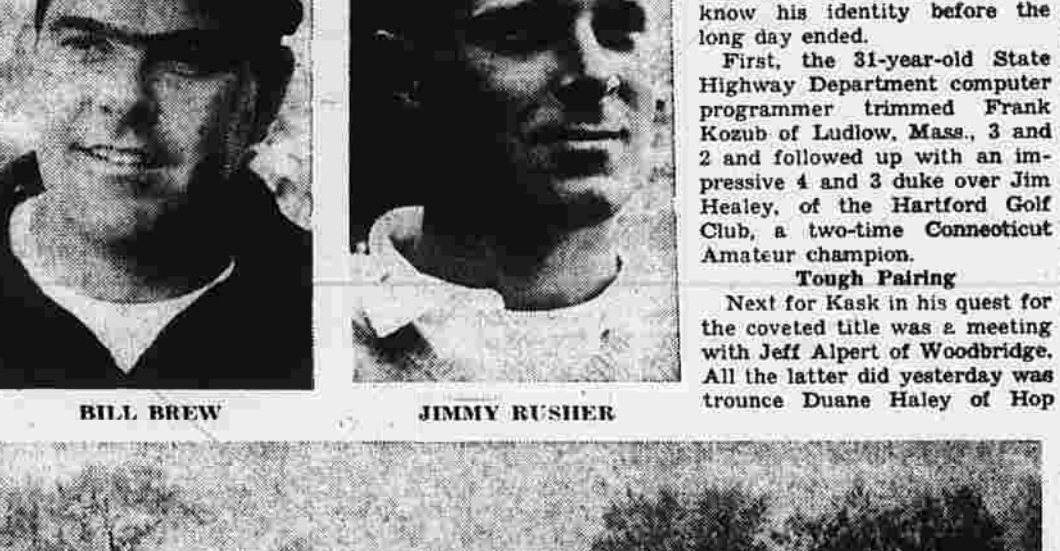

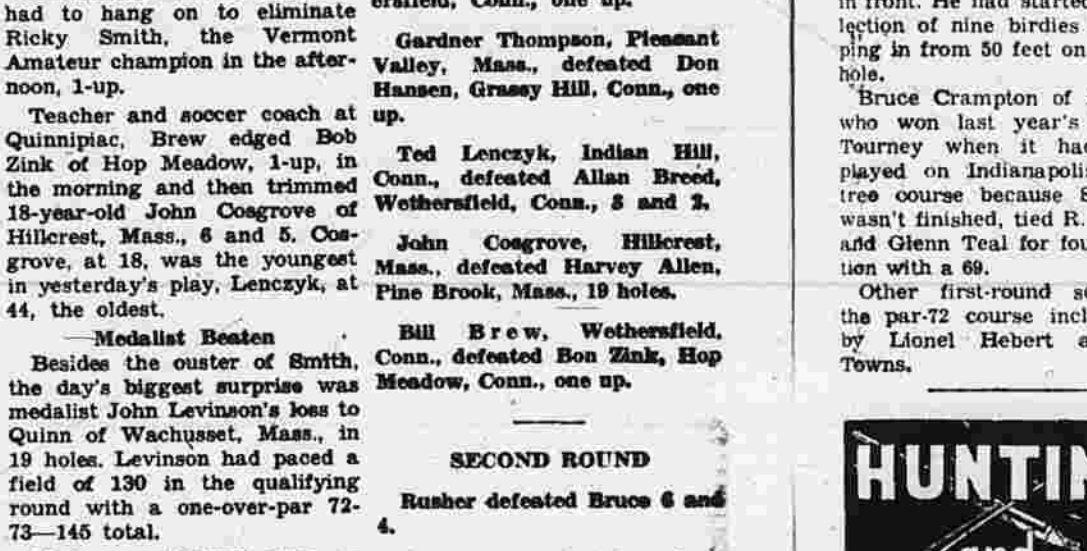
