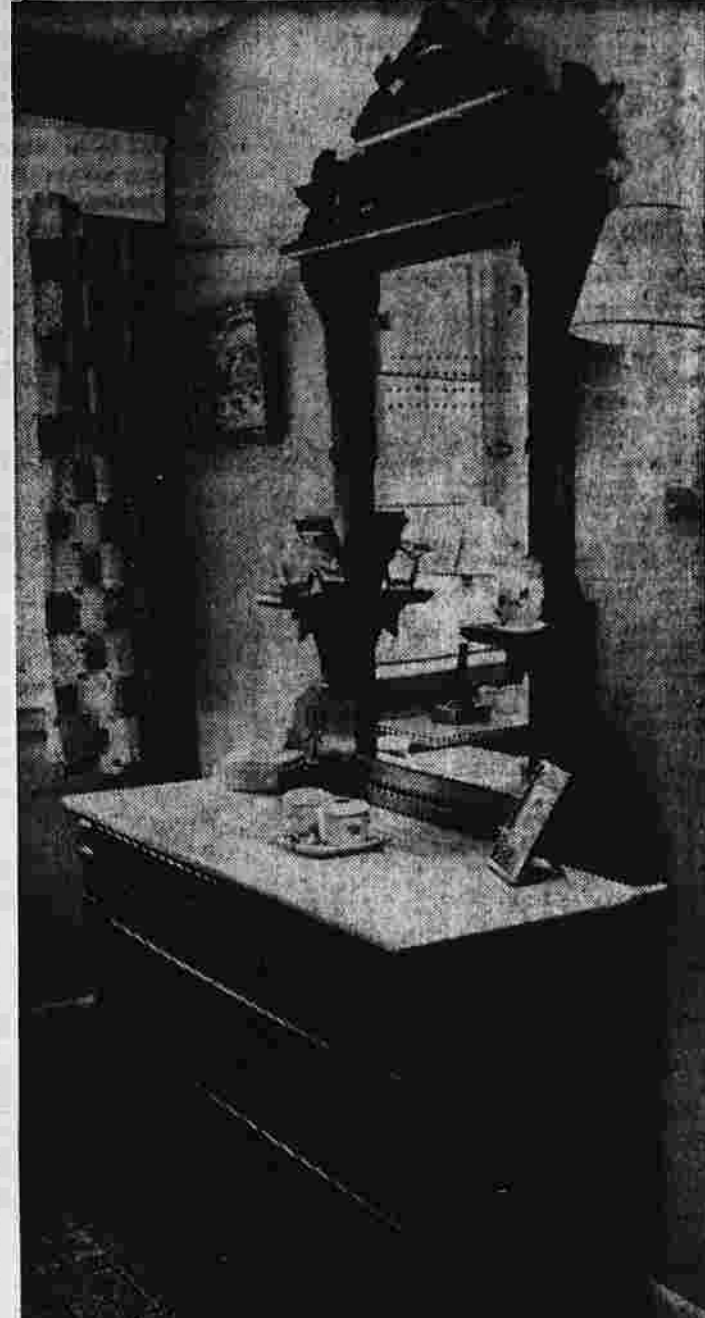

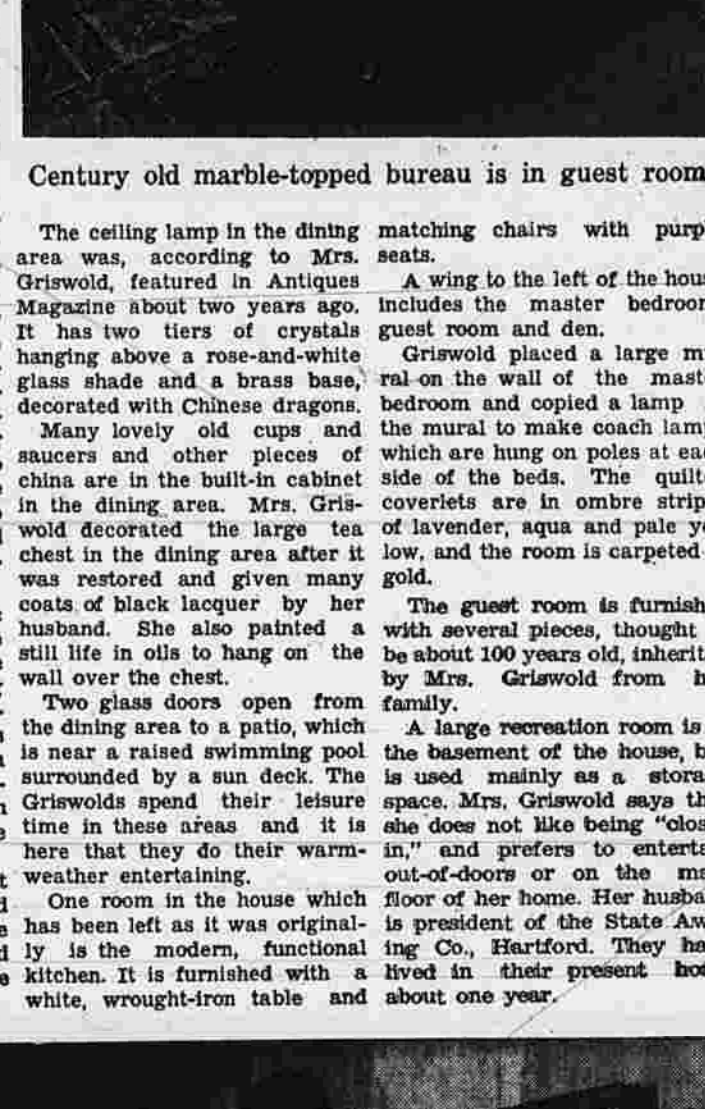

Alerted by Explosions

Teen-ager Discovers Fire, Leads Occupants to Safety

Alerted by the sound of exploding bottles and cans, 17-year-old Bonnie M. DelGreco rescued an elderly man, her uncle's family, two cats and a dog from the apartments above her father's grocery store at 83 Charter Oak St. which was swept by fire last night.

Dashing into the building about five times, Bonnie roused Walter Metcof, about 75, from his apartment on the second floor of the wooden two-story building, and her uncle's family, which lives on the first floor.

She then collapsed on her way to a neighbor's house. Firemen and police treated her for smoke inhalation, and she was taken to Manchester Memorial Hospital and later released.

Bonnie and her father, Marco, were playing cards in their second-floor apartment over the store when she heard sounds of explosions about 8 p.m. The store had been closed an hour earlier.

Asst. Fire Chief Ernie Sherman was unable to estimate damage, but said it would be heavy. DelGreco said today that the town health inspector has condemned most of the goods in the store. He said the store and the goods are covered by insurance.

Sherman said he has been unable to determine the cause of the fire.

The fire alarm was turned in by John F. Vojciet, of 95 Charter Oak St., a neighbor and a volunteer fireman. Another neighbor, Mrs. Walter Hicking of 91 Charter Oak St., said the barking of her dog caused her to look out the window. She saw flames leaping out of one of the windows on the east side of the building.

She then attempted to hook

up a garden hose and turn it on the blaze.

Bonnie, who thought at first the noises she heard were made by someone trying to break into the store, said today she "didn't think about anything" while she was running into the burning store. "I was scared," she said. Her mother said today that Bonnie was feeling all right.

Mrs. DelGreco noted the store had been broken into a couple of months ago.

The DelGreco's, who are staying with the Hickings temporarily, said a pet, a talking cockatiel, suffocated in its cage in the fire.

More than 1,000 feet of hose was laid from nearby hydrants to fight the blaze. About 20 town firemen from Companies 3 and 4 battled to confine the blaze to the storeroom in the east side of the combined store and residence, and the bathroom and pantry of the DelGreco apartment.

Three pieces of fire apparatus, two pumps and a ladder truck, responded to the alarm, from alarm box 51.

Mrs. DelGreco said the apartment is "all soot, smoke and water." She said the quarters would have to be completely remodeled.

She praised firemen for "being so helpful and doing everything they could."

The fire attracted hundreds

of spectators. Police directed the heavy motor traffic and kept persons away from the area.

A slight easterly breeze was blowing at the time of the fire. Neighbors' houses are about 50 feet from the store.

Mrs. DelGreco commented it was fortunate the fire didn't happen a few hours later, when the family was asleep. The store is not equipped with a sprinkler system, but is furnished with fire extinguishers, and the building has a fire escape ladder.

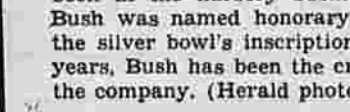

A Personal Survey On the TV Situation

EDITOR'S NOTE — Miss McBride, after more than two decades on the New York broadcasting scene, has withdrawn to a mountain home with a view — but still keeps her eye on her television set — not very happily these days. As inquiring reporter, she found a lot of people who agree with her unhappy reactions.

WEST BROOKFIELD, N.Y. (AP) — This time two years ago I was admitting, with embarrassment, that television had me hooked — that my set was on 40 hours a week, and that I was paying attention to it.

A year later I was declaring disgustedly that television had let me down by doing away with my favorite programs — that I was finished with it forever. From the response, it seemed that a good many people felt as I did then.

Television is still around, however. The manufacturers continue to sell thousands of new sets and so somebody must be watching. Who? And why?

Could I find out? These days everybody makes surveys — from great companies supplied with many kinds of computers to plain householders, like me, who count and identify birds at a window feeding station. So in the past month I have talked to more than a hundred persons — some of the big surveys draw conclusions from less nose-counting. I have asked one question. "What is your present attitude toward television?"

The objects of my inquisition represent 15 states from California to Maine and such occupations as artists, writers, a gardener, secretaries, a cleaning woman, housewives, manufacturers, retired politicians, one liquor dealer, a conductor of a radio program, a storekeeper, a contractor.

A young promotion man said "TV's better than sleeping pills." A housewife, whose husband is happiest in fall and summer because of football and baseball, goes to sleep while husband watches. She likes Marshall Dillon in "Gunsmoke" though, because he takes care of people and "makes every-

thing come out right in the end."

A young manufacturer admitted to looking at television when he has nothing else to do. But he thinks it's wonderful for his two girls, who have learned their ABCs, how to count and even the motions of swimming from what he considers one constructive children's program. ("Romper Room.")

"I don't know why they make such a fuss about returns," protested a housewife. "They all seem fresh and new to me."

A doctor commented, "There's not much difference between summer and winter. Both awful!"

"I got so sick of canned laughter and applause that I decided to forget about television." This came from a housewife with a master's degree.

A retired actress sighed that television is the worst it's ever been. "I watch old friends struggling with it because they're my friends, but it seems to me their talent is totally wasted. Most of what you see isn't even mediocre. It's plain bad!" But the actress had an after-thought. "I'm so ashamed that I forgot to give credit for memorable moments," she wrote penitently. "The Pope's visit, the Kennedy funeral, the moon shots, the young astronauts walking around the world."

A conductor of a radio program said sadly "I'm afraid TV has fallen on bad days. I used to like the live dramatic productions which ran an hour or more. The mistakes now and then were part of the charm and I cringe at some of the dressed-up spiritless revised versions."

"Some of those old motion pictures, the ones you used to pay \$2.50 or \$5.00 to see, are worth staying up for, even if it means the late, late show," insisted a young real estate broker.

"You can have an interesting and informational time with television every day if you select carefully," declared a woman executive for a health group.

A retired couple who for years longed for the luxury of time for
