

## Cong's Camp Hit by B52s

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—High-flying U.S. B52 bombers plastered a Viet Cong base camp near Saigon today and ground troops sweeping in after the raid uncovered a big cache of arms and ammunition.

The eight-engine giants dropped their bombs 25 miles northwest of Saigon shortly after dawn. The hunderous explosions could be heard in the capital.

Two hours later, helicopters poured infantrymen of the U.S. 25th Division into the area. They found 90,000 rounds of ammunition, mines, booby traps and submachine guns but no enemy bodies. Two U.S. helicopters were hit by ground fire after landing the troops but were repaired and flown out without casualties.

Ground fighting throughout South Viet Nam was generally

light except in the central highlands where other troops of the 25th division came under heavy mortar and automatic weapons attack at dawn.

Helicopters brought reinforcements into the area, 20 miles southwest of Pleiku city. The ground troops, supported by air strikes and artillery, reported killing 26 North Vietnamese soldiers while taking light casualties.

In the intensified air war over North Viet Nam, U.S. planes flew 97 missions Sunday, hitting at nine oil storage areas including a fuel dump 13 miles southwest of Hanoi.

Pilots claimed destruction or damage to 12 bridges, 72 cargo barges, 41 trucks and five anti-aircraft sites. They also touched off numerous secondary explosions and fires, a spokesman said.

Two U.S. planes were lost in the raids. An Air Force RF101 Voodoo reconnaissance plane disappeared on a mission northeast of Hanoi. The pilot is missing.

An Air Force A1E Skyraider was shot down by ground fire. The pilot was rescued.

They brought reported American aircraft losses over North Viet Nam to 316.

During the forays over North Viet Nam Sunday, American pilots sighted three Soviet-made surface to air missiles. Two were spotted north of Hanoi and the other near Vinh. The U.S. command did not disclose whether any scored hits.

U.S. pilots flew 477 sorties over South Viet Nam Sunday and claimed destruction or damage to 561 enemy fortifications, structures and sampans. South Vietnamese pilots flew 130 sorties.

The U.S. command acknowledged that casualties to American Marines and South Vietnamese troops in Operation Hastings were moderate. Previously, casualties in this heavy action near the demilitarized zone had been termed light.

There has been no heavy contact with the North Vietnamese in Operation Hastings for nearly a week. In two weeks of heavy fighting before that the com-

#### NHRR Hits Slowness of Rail Merger

NEW HAVEN (AP)—Trustees of the New Haven Railroad said today that further delay in the merger of the Pennsylvania and New York Central Railroads can lead to "liquidation in whole or in part" of the New Haven.

The trustees made the statement in a brief to be filed today with the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The brief asks that the ICC turn down requests by other railroads for further postponement of the merger.

The ICC already has approved the merger, to include the freight and passenger operations of the bankrupt New Haven. Consummation of the merger has been put off until Sept. 30.

A further delay, the trustees said, "not only postpones the New Haven solution, so clearly in the public interest, but presents, in addition, such grave consequences for the New Haven as to outweigh any of the reasons for further stay advanced by the petitioners."

Postponements to the merger have been requested by the Erie-Lackawanna, Boston & Maine and the Delaware & Hudson, all three of which seek inclusion in a PennCentral merger.

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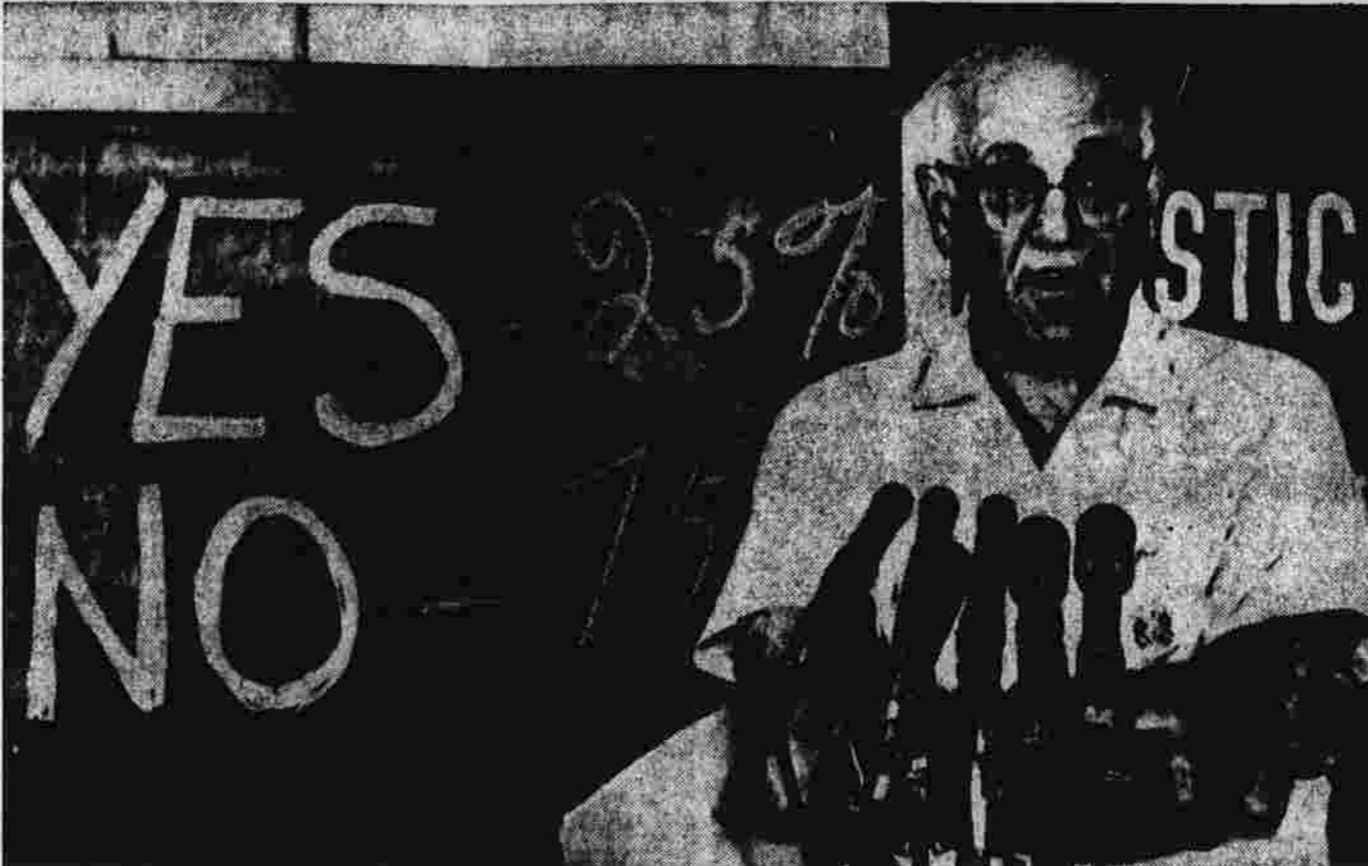

### No Stand On Strike Legislation

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz told the Senate Labor Committee today the Johnson administration is not advocating legislation to end the airline strike—but is not opposing it, either.

Wirtz told the committee he could not hold out any prospect of an early negotiated end to the 25-day walk-out.

Wirtz was called to Capitol Hill after the AFL-CIO machinists union voted down settlement terms hammered out Friday night at White House instance. That action came Sunday night. Wirtz said there has not been sufficient time for an administration decision on the proper course to follow.

Wirtz added that if Congress acts, it should adopt Sen. Wayne Morse's strike ending plan, flatly ordering a six-month end to the walkout in preference to legislation which would empower President Johnson to issue as many as three 60-day strike ending orders.

Wirtz said he and Assistant Labor Secretary James J. Reynolds will meet as soon as possible with representatives of the airlines and the unions.

"The administration shares a feeling of resentment, a feeling that there cannot be an indefinite continuation of this strike," Wirtz said.

"Does the administration now seek legislation?" asked Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y.

"I'm not here seeking legislation at this moment," Wirtz said. "I said that collecting bargaining should be given a last clear chance. If it had a chance, it almost worked the way it's supposed to work."

Javits pressed for a statement on President Johnson's opinion about legislation.

"He's either asking for it or he isn't or he's neutral or something," Javits said. "I'm not prepared at this moment to make a recommendation for the administration," Wirtz said.

Morse asked whether it would be fair to say the administration is not opposing legislation.

"That is entirely true," Wirtz said.

"You're not telling us not to do it and you're not telling us to do it," said Javits.

Wirtz said that was a fair assessment.

Wirtz testified last Wednesday that Congress should forgo immediate legislation, saying the

### Town Beach Restrictions Challenged

NEW HAVEN (AP)—The wives of three New Haven city officials claim they were "illegally denied admittance to the town beach parks of Madison, Branford and East Haven."

"Our goal," they said in a statement issued Sunday, "is to establish that every Connecticut resident can exercise his legal right to use every municipal park in the state."

The statement, signed by Mrs. Sarah Cogen, Mrs. Ruth Hollis, and Mrs. Barbara Louise, said: "Exclusion from public beaches is illegal. We are prepared to confirm this in court if it should become necessary."

All three women are residents of New Haven. Mrs. Cogen said they and their children were not allowed to use East Wharf Beach in Madison, Parker Memorial Beach in Branford and the East Haven Town Beach. All three beaches are municipally owned.

Mrs. Cogen's husband, Joe, is executive director of the New Haven Redevelopment Agency. Mrs. Louise's husband, Charles, is field representative for the same agency. Mrs. Hollis's husband, Robert, is chief design engineer for the New Haven Bureau of Engineering.

"With most of the shoreline restricted," the women's state-

## Speck Pleads Innocent To 8 Chicago Murders

CHICAGO (AP)—Richard Speck, 24, pleaded innocent today to indictments charging he murdered eight young nursing students.

The rangy, pock-marked drifter stood in crowded Circuit Court of Chief Judge Alexander J. Napoli, surrounded by four sheriff's policemen, in a white shirt.

He was not handcuffed. Judge Napoli asked Speck several questions relating to his ability to pay fees for a lawyer to defend him.

Speck murmured, "No," in a low voice to each question.

Then Napoli approved appointment of Gerald Getty, chief counsel of the public defender's office, as Speck's attorney.

Getty entered Speck's plea of not guilty to all eight indictments returned by the grand jury July 26.

Getty then waived the reading of each indictment.

Judge Napoli assigned the case to Judge Herbert C. Paschen for trial.

He closed the proceeding with the instruction to the sheriff's men, "Present your prisoner to Judge Paschen." Speck was led from the room through a back door by his guards.

All persons in the courtroom had been searched for weapons or cameras by sheriff's deputies. Women spectators were frisked as well as the men, with women deputies assigned to the task.

Judge Napoli had cleared the courtroom after appearance of 18 earlier defendants who were called to plead to indictments.

An order issued two weeks

ago barred taking of photographs in the arraignment court. Previously, picture-taking had been barred in courtrooms where trials were held, but not at the pleadings.

Sixty-five sheriff's policemen were on duty in the courtroom and nearby corridors.

In the courtroom was Jose Valdo, an attaché of the Philippine Embassy, who said he was present as an observer because two of the slaying victims were Philippine exchange nurses.

The other six were senior student nurses from Chicago and the surrounding area. All were employed at South Chicago

Community Hospital which had leased the house at 2319 E. 100th St., a mile from the hospital, for use as nurse quarters.

Naldo told newsmen that he would seek compensation for the families of the two Philippine girls under the Illinois Workmen's Compensation Act. He said that they would qualify as nonresidents, and he estimated that about \$20,000 might be awarded to each of the bereaved families.

The procedure of allowing newsmen and spectators into Judge Paschen's courtroom was the same as that before Judge

An extensive search was launched after the pleasure boat vanished Sunday night.

## New Chicago Violence; Trouble Too in Omaha

CHICAGO (AP)—More than 3,000 angry white persons, shouting "White power!" as they threw rocks and bottles, drove 350 civil rights demonstrators from a mall-white neighborhood yesterday.

Sixty persons — including three policemen and a nun — were injured by rocks and bottles. Scores of persons, mostly white youths, were arrested.

It was the most serious direct clash of Negroes and whites in Chicago in several years, police said.

Earlier this summer, riots wreathed Puerto Rican and Negro areas of the city.

Gangs of white youths burned 30 of the marchers' cars and pushed two into a lagoon. The autos had been left in a park in the normally tranquil middle-class Irish-Lithuanian-Polish neighborhood of new bungalows and homes on Chicago's Southwest Side.

The demonstrators — white and Negro, priests and nuns, men and women and children — moved from the area at a fast walk without returning the violence as 900 policemen attempted to keep the whites away.

They were protesting under the banner of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. against alleged discrimination in housing. Dr. King, chairman of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, organized the march last week. King was not in Chicago Sunday.

It was part of King's direct action program to make Chicago an "open city" in housing.

The demonstrators met in a Negro church after the march and said they would go back to the all-white area. They did not say when.

After the demonstrators left, whites swarmed into Marquette Park in droves of 500 to 1,000. They overturned the marchers'

cars and burned them. Firemen were summoned, and were pelted with rocks and bottles by the whites.

Police estimated about 3,000 white hecklers were present during the evening.

The park was closed off by police so the firemen could work. Firemen counted 20 burned autos bearing the emblem of the "Union to End Slums," with out-of-state license plates or with college insignias.

Two hours later, the youths ran into the park again and burned 10 more cars.

"The police said they would protect the cars. They didn't," said a spokesman for the Coordinating Council of Community Organizations.

The COCO is a federation of civil rights groups. The governor of the federation, Albert C. Raby, was among the injured. The spokesman said Raby was hit four times by bricks.

White residents jeered and chanted as the demonstrators marched.

"White power!" was

### July Recorded As Wet and Hot

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP)—July 1966 went down in the weatherman's books today as a wetter-and-hotter-than-normal month.

In fact, the U.S. Weather Bureau said in its monthly summary, July's precipitation totaled 3.96 inches—or 10 per cent above normal. It was the first time since February that precipitation exceeded the normal.

Temperatures for July averaged 75.8—the mercury reached 90 degrees or more on 18 days—or 2.4 degrees above normal.

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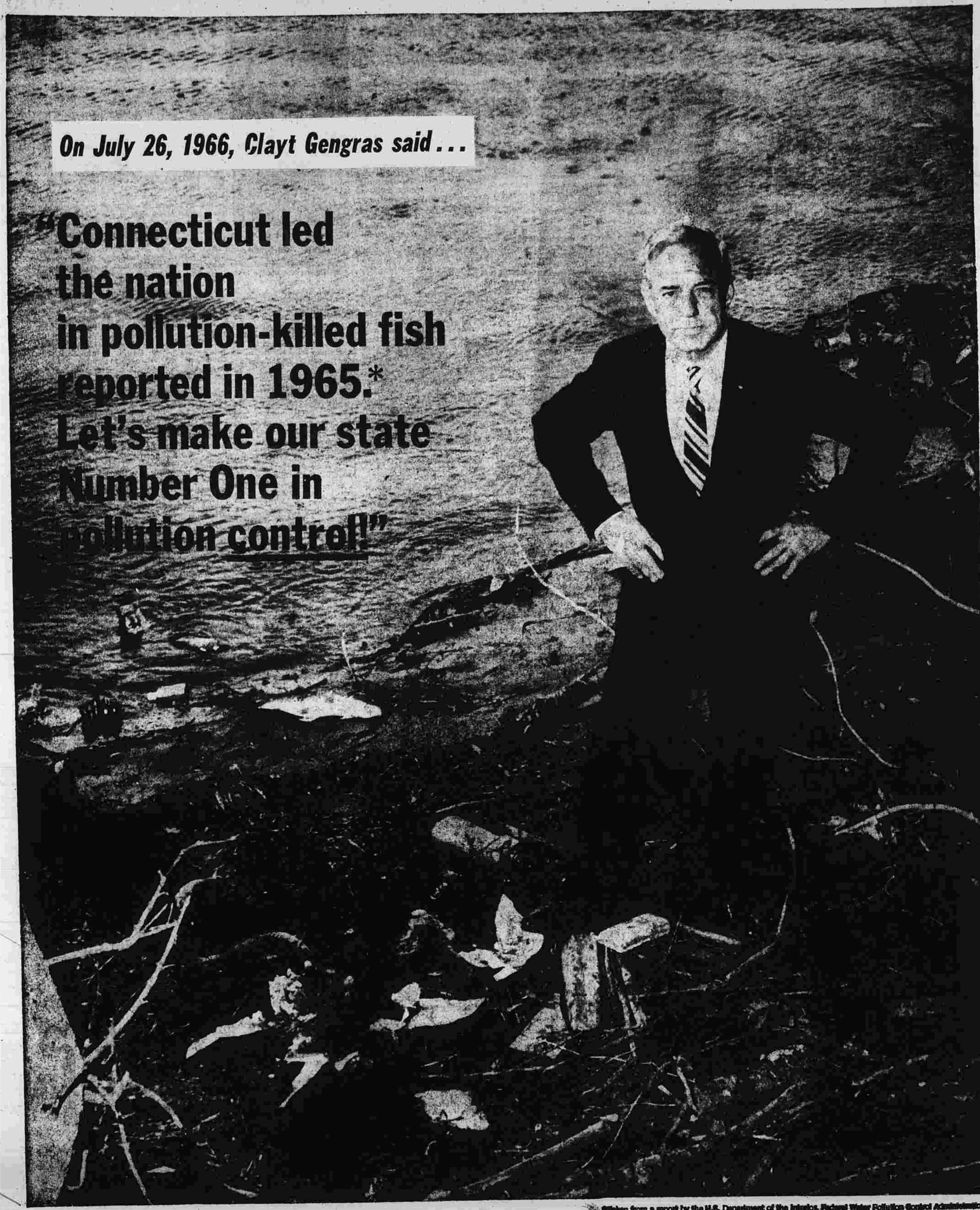

Grand Jury Called In Vennard Murder

A grand jury will meet in Hartford on Aug. 11 to consider a murder indictment against Dennis E. Vennard of Manchester, who is accused of killing his mother with a hammer.

In making the announcement, the state attorney's office said today that a first degree murder indictment will be sought against the 23-year-old Vennard, who lives with his parents at 184 Hollister St.

A spokesman in the state attorney's office declined to say who will testify at the grand jury session, but among those expected to testify are Dr. Joseph Sartor of the Manchester police, who led the investigation of the murder, and possibly Dr. Lewis P. James Jr., a Hartford pathologist.

Dr. James testified at a coroner's inquest last month that Vennard died as a result of injuries that included a fractured skull and jaw and contusion of the brain.

Relatively few witnesses are expected to be called before the grand jury, and the jury itself is expected to return an indictment within a short time.

While the grand jury sessions take place after a suspect is formally accused, an attorney might argue that his client is being denied the right of counsel and cannot intelligently exercise his right to silence unless counsel is present, citing the recent court decision for precedent.

Two motions Atty. Gryk filed the day of Vennard's arraignment may suggest the defense that will be followed at the trial. One motion sought to commit Vennard to mental institutions until he is sane.

Another motion sought to allow anyone speaking to Vennard while he is in jail because there is a question, Atty. Gryk said, whether his client "fully comprehends" the charges against him. Both motions were denied.

# Back to Work Today For N.E. Golf King

It's back to work today for Fran Quinn, the New England Amateur golf champion, who spent his annual two weeks' vacation playing golf in first the Massachusetts Amateur and then the New England Amateur Championships. He was more successful in the latter.

In the first All-Massachusetts final since 1960, Quinn, a graduate of Holy Cross, playing out of the Wachusett Country Club in Worcester, overwhelmed youthful Ken Corcoran Jr., of the Oyster Harbors Club on Cape Cod, 5 and 4 in the 36-hole final staged last Saturday at the picturesque Ellington Ridge Country Club.

The 28-year-old Quinn, a resident of Holy Cross, in his home city, never trailed in the match which attracted several hundred spectators on a beautiful afternoon. The success was the first ever in the New England Amateur for a Worcester representative.

Today it was back on the road for Quinn, a pharmacist out of the College for Laboratories in New Jersey, who covers the Worcester area.

Corcoran, 21, who will enter his junior year at the University of Arizona in September, resides in Beacon Hill outside Boston and summers with his family on Cape Cod.

This was the sixth time the handsome Quinn, father of three, participated in the New England's best previous achievement was in reaching the quarterfinals a year ago.

The success by the Bay State moved Massachusetts into a dead-end hole in the quest for producing the most champions, each state having 15. Among the other New England states, Rhode Island players have won five times, Maine and New Hampshire each won three and Vermont has yet to win since play started in 1926.

Quinn started out like a forest fire and never trailed. He won the first hole, lost the second but took the third and won his way. After nine, the 6-3, 200-yarder was 5-up. And after 10 holes, Quinn led by six holes—his biggest margin—and threatened to turn the final to a runaway.
